

# Students learn how to learn in year-long project at Brownell

Last year a small group of students at Brownell Middle School took part in a pilot program in which they were taught study skills and shown how to organize themselves.

Because the program was so successful last year, it has been expanded. When school began at Brownell two weeks ago, each student was given a calendar/assignment book.

Much like a date book used by adults, the calendar has the entire week laid out on one two-page spread. There are large

spaces to write down homework assignments, what day tests are scheduled and a small space for the student to check off every completed assignment.

It was created and printed mostly through the volunteer efforts of a group of parents.

The study skills project was initiated at the request of parents who felt the school should work with students to help them adjust to the major changes facing them when they enter middle school.

"Here we're taking kids from an elementary school with one or two teachers and putting

them in a situation where they have eight or nine teachers," Principal Don Messing said. "If they're not provided with a structure, I think they may be lost."

Teacher Joanne Case was instrumental in getting the program off the ground.

"There are secrets to success," Case said, "but they shouldn't be secrets. Just like young athletes copy the expert athletes, we copied the expert students. They all seem to be organized."

Along with students being taught organization, they are also taught the elements of

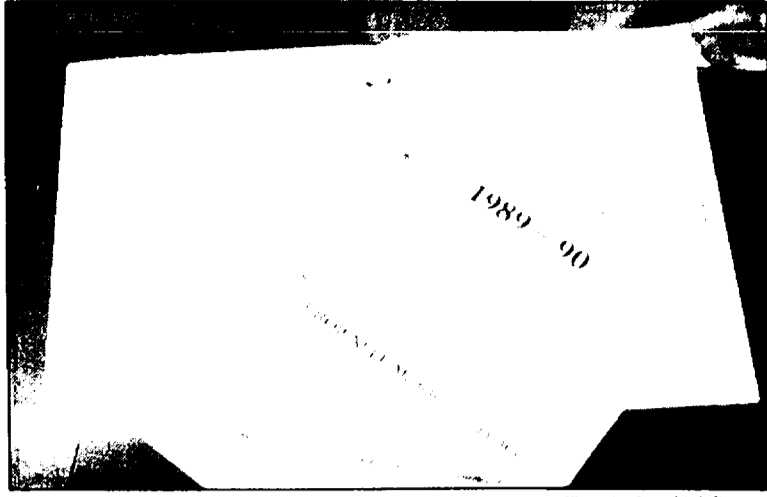

learning. That includes test-taking strategies, when to read for content and when to skim, how to write a report, listening skills, how to take notes and how to use a library.

"When these students get to high school, teachers assume they have these skills, and they should assume the students have these skills," Case said. "But these skills have to be taught, as well as the history dates and the ideas in literature."

Messing said all teachers are being encouraged to urge stu-

## State certifies vote; Casazza asks recount

Though a ray of light faintly shines at the end of the tunnel, no one is quite sure of the outcome of the Grosse Pointe Farms primary election for municipal judge.

On Friday, Sept. 15, the state Board of Canvassers certified the vote count taken from the Aug. 8 primary as correct.

By the following Monday morning, Sept. 18, candidate Eugene Casazza petitioned the state board for a recount. Under state election law, the recount must be granted.

The issue was originally reported after Wayne County Clerk James Killeen called a press conference Aug. 7, the day before the primary, and reported allegations that Irene Gracey, wife of candidate Paul Gracey, had improperly handled absentee ballots by delivering them to voters and returning them to City Hall.

Mrs. Gracey said she was offered absentee ballots by a Grosse Pointe Farms employee.

The Graceys say that the impromptu press conference was initiated by one of the other candidates, who told Killeen of the allegation of wrongdoing to discredit Gracey's bid for municipal judge.

Killeen refused to reveal the person who made the complaint to the county clerk and said that the fact he supported candidate Casazza in the primary election is not a conflict of interest.

The city on Aug. 22 declined to certify the election count, and forwarded the issue to Wayne County. On Sept. 6 the county board of canvassers also declined to certify the count and sent the issue to the state board for review and certification.

The other three candidates in the primary, Paul Gracey, Richard Roosen and incumbent Municipal Judge Matthew Rumora, have until Monday, Sept. 25 at 4 p.m. to file a counter-petition for a recount of the general vote taken in the original primary.

Brad Whitman, director of information for the Board of Canvassers, said the certification is a mathematical audit where the state board reviews the primary count and reviews the city's poll book containing the statements of votes.

"The certification and the recount of absentee ballots are very narrow in scope and have nothing to do with the investigation of election fraud," Whitman said.

He added that the certification is final and will not go back to the county level for approval or review.

Should any of the other candidates file a counter-petition, Whitman explained that a complete recount under the authority of a team of state canvassers will be conducted by sending the state team to City Hall. There, the team would investigate the original general vote count to determine if the tallies were accurately reported.

Whitman said the other three

candidates will be notified of their recount option. Meanwhile, state investigators will have to recount absentee ballots, as petitioned by Casazza.

In his petition to the Board of Canvassers, Casazza not only asks for a recount, but requests that the absentee ballots delivered by Mrs. Gracey be excluded from the count.

George Herstek, administrative assistant to the director of the Board of Canvassers, said there is no provision under the law where a candidate can petition for a partial recount.

"We can't count just some of the absentee ballots, we have to count all of them," Herstek said.

If an error is found in the absentee count, the city and county will be notified to adjust their vote totals.

Independent of the canvas of primary vote totals, the state police investigation has been completed and reports have been filed with the Wayne County Prosecutor's office as of Friday, Sept. 15.

Richard Duthler, detective lieutenant with the Michigan State Police, said now that its investigation has been completed, detectives will wait for word from the county prosecutor's office.

"The prosecutor's office will review the facts to determine whether warrants will be issued or charges will be brought," Duthler said.

He would not indicate whether the state police report recommends charges of criminal prosecution.

Richard Padzieski, chief of operations for the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office, said he has received the final report by the Michigan State Police and will review the documents to determine whether to approve the issuance of warrants in the case.

Padzieski would not speculate on the possible outcome of the prosecutor's actions in the matter.

### Robert Dupuis

Bob Dupuis didn't know he had it in him.

But when he retired, he knew it was time to face the dream and either do it or forget it.

So he did it.

He wrote a book.

"I just kind of charged into writing," he said. "It's my first effort. I knew nobody was out there waiting for my first book to come out -- but there were a lot of people planning to write about Bunny."

"Bunny" is Bunny Berrigan -- Bernard Roland Berrigan -- a style-setting jazz trumpeter who isn't quite Dizzy Gillespie or Satchmo, but almost. He was the lead trumpet for Benny Goodman and played with Paul Whiteman and Tommy Dorsey and everyone else who counted, until he died of alcoholism at age 33 in 1942.

A jazz legend, Bob Dupuis spent his working life as a teacher, counselor and principal in the Detroit public schools. He wrote letters, Memos, Reports.

But there was music in his heart. Dupuis has a big jazz record collection. He tried -- not very successfully, he says -- to play trumpet in high school. He listened to his records.

"I'm a good listener." He never got to hear Bunny Berrigan in person, a major personal disappointment. "I feel cheated," he said. "Everyone says that standing in front of that horn was a unique experience."

When Dupuis retired a little more than five years ago, he got himself a typewriter, a tape recorder, a lot of old show biz magazines like Billboard and a list of addresses of jazz performers and aficionados. For at least three of those years, he collected material.

## Park woman guilty in heroin shipment

The 60-year-old Grosse Pointe Park woman who was implicated in a Lebanon-to-Detroit heroin shipment in February faces at least 10 years in prison after she was found guilty last week.

Helen Mary Formanczyk, whose Westchester home was put up for her \$200,000 bail, faces sentencing Nov. 21 in U.S. District Court in Boston where she was tried and found guilty Sept. 12 of possession with intent to distribute at least 1,000 grams of heroin. Her attorney reportedly plans to appeal the conviction.

Formanczyk was arrested Feb. 14 in Boston after she purchased 1-1/2 kilograms of heroin from a courier from Lebanon who was acting as an informant for the Drug Enforcement Agency. DEA agents accompanied the courier to Logan International Airport in Boston on Feb. 13. Formanczyk was arrested the following day after the exchange took place in a downtown Boston hotel.

At the time of Formanczyk's arrest, DEA agents said the woman had admitted to acting as a drug courier on several occasions. During her trial, however, she claimed she was only helping fellow countrymen smuggle goods out of Lebanon. She claimed she did not know the valise she accepted from the courier contained drugs.

The jury in Federal District Judge John J. McNaught's court-

room, however, disagreed with Formanczyk and found her guilty as charged. McNaught allowed Formanczyk to remain free on the \$200,000 bond until her sentencing and pending the expected appeal.

The high bond was co-signed by Formanczyk's husband, Theodore. The couple own a variety store, T&H Discount, in downtown Detroit.

If the guilty verdict withstands an appeal, Formanczyk faces a minimum of 10 years in prison and a maximum sentence of life in prison.

# Farms opens municipal parking lot on the Hill behind shops

As Grosse Pointe Farms prepares for completion of the municipal parking lot behind retail shops on the Hill, three contracts have been awarded by the city for additional work.

The lot, now with paving completed, is open and available for parking by Hill employees and shoppers.

Work on areas of the lot will continue as the city waits for the parking attendant booth and ticket dispenser, expected soon.

On Sept. 11 the City Council, at its regular meeting, considered and awarded three contracts to three companies for curb installation, re-routing of utility lines and landscaping of the lot.

At the meeting, council members awarded a \$2,700 curbing installation contract to the Vanopdenbosch Co. for installation of approximately 200 feet of 2-foot-wide curbing for the islands and perimeters of the parking lot.

The contract was approved for a unit price of \$13.50 per linear foot. The bid by the Vanopdenbosch Co. was the lowest of three bids, ranging up to \$27 per linear foot.

The quotations were received by City Clerk Richard Solak during the first week of September and presented to the council for approval at the Sept. 11 meeting.

To re-route utility lines from overhead utility poles to an underground system, the city has awarded a \$8,750 contract to the

Bologna Construction Co. for approximately 380 feet cement saw-cutting, trenching and backfilling in the alley and surrounding areas serving the parking lot.

The work, now completed, featured several trenches across the alley for the installation of several stacked plastic 4-inch conduit pipes so that utility lines can be re-routed under the alley.

Bologna Construction has quoted a unit price of \$23 per foot for sawcutting, trenching, installing conduits and backfilling trenches across the alley.

Actual utility lines will be pulled through the conduits by Detroit Edison and Michigan Bell and may cause a temporary service outage in retail shops, most likely after business hours, according to city officials.

After all other work in the lot has been completed, landscaping featuring brick walkways and various plantings will be performed.

The Charles F. Irish Co. was awarded a landscaping contract in the amount of \$17,907, the lowest of four bids received by the city in early September. The high range for landscaping bids was just under \$25,000.

As reported by the city, the Grosse Pointe Farms Foundation has approved the sum of \$25,000 for landscaping and brickwork. The brickwork is now out for bid.

Solak said the parking lot is now open for public use, with the attendant booth expected to be installed shortly.

As recommended by the city's ad hoc parking committee, the council approved a no-lease policy for the municipal parking lot.

After six months, the council may consider allowing leases in the lot if the needs of Hill area employees needing short-term parking are not being met.

Solak said in recent years the demand for leased spaces in the municipal lot have far outnumbered the actual number of leased spaces available. Solak also mentioned that there is no

way to fairly distribute a small number of leased spaces.

The clerk added that the general contractor performing the paving of the lot, Master Plan Construction of Troy, will bill the city in the amount of about \$240,000. Edison and Bell's cost of re-routing utility lines will be approximately \$53,000. The above mentioned work and three related contracts will be about \$30,000.

Solak said the expected total for the parking lot reconstruction will be well over the \$300,000 mark.

Parking rates for the municipal lot are 25 cents per hour for the first three hours; 75 cents per hour for the next three hours; and a \$1 increase per hour for the next two hours, with the all day rate not to exceed \$5.

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# Farms approves further controls over War Memorial liquor license

Confusion reigned over an hour-long discussion at the Sept. 11 Farms council meeting regarding the liquor license the War Memorial has requested.

At a public hearing held prior to the regular council meeting, council members tried to decide whether to place the liquor license under zoning laws to give the city greater enforcement powers.

And although the council on April 17 approved the War Memorial's request to seek a Class C liquor license from the Liquor Control Commission, the new measure is an attempt to

strengthen the city's enforcement powers by placing the issue under a conditional use of Section 701.3 of the city's zoning ordinance.

Some council members doubt that conditional use under zoning laws will be effective in revoking the license if the War Memorial breaks any of the eight conditions that had been agreed upon by the facility and the city.

Others felt that the agreement between the city and the facility is strong enough and that strengthening the city's enforcement powers was not necessary.

The conditions set forth in the April 17 agreement are:

- That a five member advisory

board be established to periodically monitor alcohol-related activities at the center. The board is to include the pastor of Grosse Pointe Memorial Church, the Rev. Bruce Rigdon, or his designated alternate; the Farms police chief, Robert Ferber, or his designated alternate; and three qualified voters to be appointed by Mayor Joseph Fromm and approved by the City Council.

- That the War Memorial waive its right to appeal a council decision to revoke the liquor license should complications arise.

- That the War Memorial agrees to a no open-bar policy and that no permanent counter or bar will be maintained for serving alcohol.

- That alcohol will not be served at more than 230 separate occasions.

- That alcohol be served only to non-profit groups and not be served to individuals or for-profit corporations.

- That alcohol-related activities be pre-scheduled and confined to specific areas. Hours of operation will continue to end at 4 p.m. for afternoon functions and 11:30 p.m. for evening functions.

- That all conditions be published in the Grosse Pointe News.

At the Sept. 11 council meeting, an additional condition was set forth: that food be served at any function where alcohol is served. The food service condition was incorporated into the original agreement as the eighth condition.

Mark Weber, War Memorial president, said the War Memorial Association has no problem with the city taking steps to strengthen enforcement powers.

"In fact, we support any measure to guide and monitor alcohol distribution in a responsible manner," Weber said.

"Many people think we are trying to open a bar here, which is not true. We will never have a bar where people can stop in af-

ter work for a beer and a burger. And we're willing to make a legal agreement with the city so that this never happens."

Opponents of a liquor license at the War Memorial, the Grosse Pointe Property Owners Association, filed a petition of opposition to the LCC in early August.

The seven-page document contains a plea for denial of the license application and a request for a hearing before the LCC to state reasons why the license should be denied.

Also, the property owners association claims that the conditions outlined in the agreement conflict with the legal concept of a public liquor license and are not enforceable by the city or the state.

Both Weber and council members say that the conditions are not intended to be enforced by the state, but are enforceable by the city.

Councilman Gregg Berendt, a supporter of the liquor license, said now that the conditions have been placed under the zoning ordinance, the city can revoke the conditional use of the license should any of the above conditions be broken.

"If the War Memorial is granted the license by the state, they (War Memorial) will live up to the agreement and will not give the city a problem in any way," he said.

But Paul Marco, an attorney and member of the property owners association, said while many residents in the area support the War Memorial, they are not in favor of the commercialization that a liquor license could bring to the area.

"It would bring a lot of activities in, attracting people from outside the area. It is zoned as a cultural facility to benefit the residents of Grosse Pointe, not the residents of metropolitan Detroit," Marco said.

Weber said a liquor license will not commercialize the facility in any way.

"We're a non-profit entity. A liquor license will not change our status in any way. As far as attracting people from outside

the area, we will not discriminate against non-residents who are invited to a function. We never have.

"As our mission statement says, our programs are primarily designed for Grosse Pointers, but not exclusively. Many of the groups that use our facility have former residents as members. We will not check ID's at the door," Weber added.

The conditional use of the license was placed under the zon-

ing ordinance by 4-3 vote, the same ratio as the original vote April 17.

The LCC has not completed its investigation of the War Memorial's request.

Weber said he expects final reports from the city to be forwarded to the LCC. Once the state agency receives final reports from the city and its police department, the application review process can begin. No time frame is given by the LCC.

## NBD customers robbed at ATM

Two customers at the automatic teller machines at the National Bank of Detroit branch at Mack and Moross were robbed by the same suspect during separate incidents last week.

During the most recent incident, at 8:55 p.m. Sept. 15, the suspect told a Farms woman using the automatic teller that he had a gun.

The first robbery occurred between 7:05 and 7:15 p.m. Sept. 13 when a man wearing a University of Michigan sweatshirt approached a Farms man using the teller. The suspect told the bank customer that he was "checking the change" at the teller machines.

The suspect then reached into the Farms man's coat pocket and pulled out two fresh \$20 bills the customer had just gotten from the teller machine. The suspect then extracted the customer's banker card for the teller machine and asked the customer for his personal identification number, which the customer recited. The suspect then departed with the Farms man's \$40, banker card and password number.

The Farms man drove to the police station on Kerby and reported the incident. Farms detectives called NBD security to report the theft, and to have the banker card and password number nullified.

The second theft, Sept. 15, occurred when the Farms woman was at the machine and the suspect entered the automatic banking shelter. He had his hands in the center pocket of the navy blue sweatshirt and told the woman "not to move; he had a gun," according to police reports.

The suspect then asked for her

bank card and personal identification number. She gave him her card and he left. She then drove to the Farms police station to report the theft.

About three hours later, the woman called Farms police to state that she was so nervous she hadn't realized she had withdrawn \$10 for the suspected armed robber.

Farms detectives are investigating. Both victims described the suspect as black, 25 to 30 years old, about 5 feet 8, thin and wearing the sweatshirt and jeans. According to NBD security, all customers at the automatic teller machines are recorded on videotape.

The man was released after posting \$1,225 bond.

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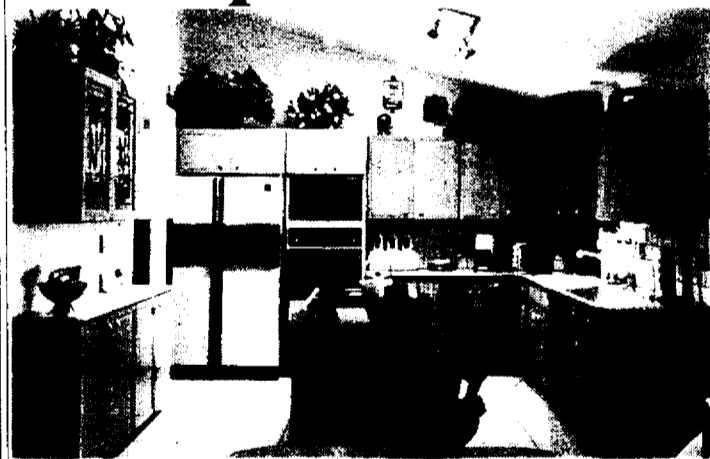
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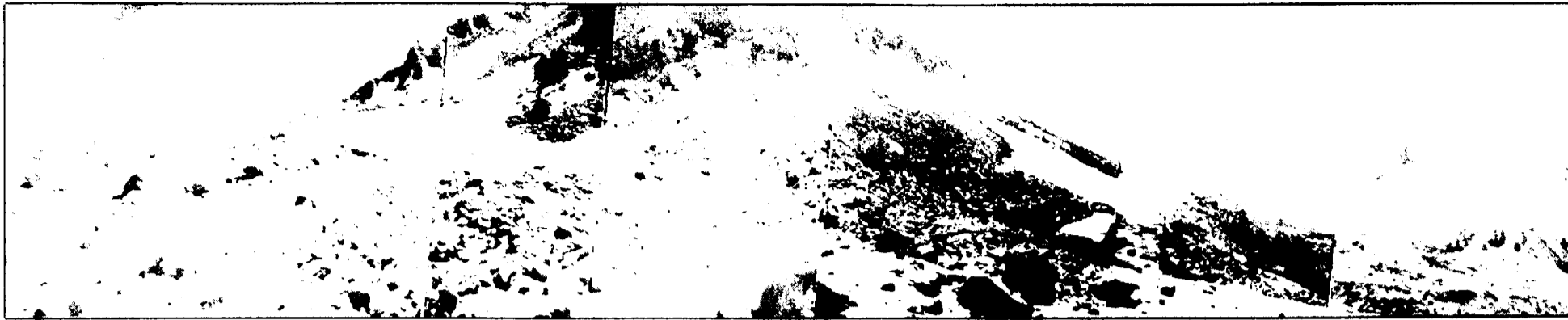

# Pierce teacher studies, descends Mount St. Helens

"I can't even describe it. It was so incredible." Arlene Hicks shook her head in wonder. "There aren't even words."

Hicks, a Pierce Middle School science teacher, was a member of a group of 30 outstanding teachers from across the country chosen to study the area in and around Mount St. Helens, the volcano in Washington which erupted in May 1980.

The two week study-session included not only study of volcanoes in general, but also a study of the ecology around Mount St. Helens, the natural regeneration of wildlife in the area and time spent inside the volcano itself. But more importantly, the teachers on the expedition were instructed how to teach students about volcanoes and the aftermath of an eruption.

"I'm so glad I went, not just for the experience," Hicks said, "but because all the things in the books about volcanoes are wrong."

For example, Hicks, who has been teaching science for years, said she had no idea there were different forms of volcanoes. She thought they were all dome-shaped and that the lava erupts from the top. That is not true. There are some volcanoes from which the lava erupts from the sides and others that aren't domed, but instead are nothing more than bottomless pits which have erupted.

Mount St. Helens erupted not only from the top, but also from

the side, spewing debris and rocks for miles.

What impressed Hicks most was the area around the volcano.

"Everywhere you look, it looks like a bomb exploded," she said. "It's been almost 10 years and they still haven't got all the logs up yet. I just couldn't believe the devastation."

It isn't hard to tell where the lava stopped, she said. Near the edges of the destruction, the starkness contrasts greatly with the green of the trees which

were only yards away from the flow of the lava.

More than 65,000 acres and an estimated 5,000 blacktail deer, 1,500 elk, a herd of mountain goats, 200 black bear and uncountable smaller animals and birds were lost. Almost all the fish in more than 138 miles of streams and 48 lakes were also victims of the blast. Thirty-six people were killed, and 21 are presumed dead, although their bodies haven't been found, she said.

The explosion, comparatively, has been called "very small."

Spirit Lake, once a beautifully timbered area, now looks like a desert, Hicks said. The blast pushed all the water and fish out of the lake. A new larger lake — one without fish — formed naturally on top of the sediment deposited in the former Spirit Lake. It is between 200 and 300 feet higher in elevation than the first lake.

Even today, Hicks said, there is sediment and silica from the explosion floating in the streams and rivers around the site and huge boulders which have been precariously perched for the last 10 years are falling hundreds of feet to their final resting places. Hot gasses, called fumerals, still shoot forth into the air.

Scientists are using Mount St. Helens to study the effects of an eruption. Because the volcano is located in a national park, no trees have been planted to replace the loss from the blast. Only the land devastated outside the boundaries of the Mount St. Helens National Park has been replanted, although the reforestation efforts have met with mixed success, because practically nothing can grow in the ash and the pumice left behind.

The ash can still be seen on days when strong winds pick it up. Even simply walking on it stirs it up. Hicks' camera was ruined by particles of ash getting

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

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# 1991 library vote to seek new building

At long last, the voters of the Grosse Pointe School District will have a second opportunity to vote on a public library expansion program.

The vote will come in a special election tentatively set for February 1991 on a bond issue to finance in whole or in part a new \$7 million library building on the Brownell school site.

Unlike the library expansion program defeated in 1987, the new plan does not propose any renovations at the present Central Library building, and the minor improvements planned for the Park and Woods branches would be paid for out of

the library's general fund budget. Under the new plan, the proposed new building would replace the Breuer Central Library building.

At a future meeting, probably in November, the board will seek to name the architect for the new building and to decide what use to make of the Breuer building. A special committee headed by Vincent LoCicero is studying the options for the possible uses.

The additional tax burden to be imposed is still undetermined by the Grosse Pointe Board of Education, which operates the li-

brary system. The board has retained a private fundraising company to raise as much of the \$7 million cost of the new building as can be obtained, with the balance to come from a bond issue.

The library system long has suffered from a lack of space, not just to house its books but the newer services it provides to Grosse Pointe residents in the form of non-print items, such as records, videocassettes and compact discs. In addition, the Breuer building itself is, in the words of Superintendent John Whritner, a "very tired building" which needs a new heating sys-

tem, air conditioning, electric wiring and even carpeting and painting.

Because the community voted down the \$8.6 million proposed bond issue in November 1987 that would have expanded the Breuer building as well as the two branches, that expansion plan was not given any further consideration. As a result, the Building Advisory Committee was called upon to devise an alternative, which now has been adopted by the board.

While many people in the Grosse Pointes have their own ideas about library needs and plans for the future, the program worked out by the committee and now apparently headed for a vote in 1991 appears to be a sensible compromise.

The question is whether it can be sold to the community as a necessity, which we think it is, if the Pointes want to preserve a library system that provides the information, special services and other programs now expected from the best community libraries.

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## Why Bryant backs Durant

It came as no great surprise, but the wholehearted endorsement that Rep. William R. Bryant Jr. gave this week to Clark Durant's candidacy for the GOP nomination for the U.S. Senate offers evidence that Durant is making a broad appeal to Michigan voters.

In announcing his endorsement, Bryant explained that he has had a "very respectful relationship" over the years with Clark's father, Richard Durant, and other members of the family even though the state representative said he often found Richard to be "considerably more conservative" than he has been.

In Bryant's view, Clark Durant has an "independent viewpoint," does not reflect the far right and, like former Rep. Jack Kemp, the current head of the Department of Housing and Urban Development, seeks to deal with problems in a practical way. As a consequence, Bryant said he feels "very comfortable" supporting Durant and, in fact, believes he is a GOP candidate who can win.

For his part, Durant said he was "pleased to announce Bill Bryant is on my team" and will help him beat Democratic Sen. Carl Levin, who will be seeking reelection next year.

First, however, Durant will have to win the Republican nomination. At the moment the only other GOP contender is U.S. Rep. Bill Schuette of the 10th District who officially announced his candidacy Monday — the same day Bryant came out in support of Durant.

Durant said he has surprised some media people by the breadth of his support from around the state. He pointed out he has won endorsements from 10 of the 18 congressional district GOP chairmen, 46 percent of the members of the GOP State Committee and perhaps 24 or 25 county chairmen.

He reiterated that he is running as an "opportunity society" candidate who favors, among other proposals, reducing taxes across the board so that people have more money left to invest in improvements in home and business and other opportunities that help create jobs.

Bryant, with 10 terms of service in Lansing, is one of the more thoughtful and progressive of the Republican legislative contingent and his strong support for his fellow Grosse Pointer ought to be helpful to Durant not only in this community but throughout the state.



## Racism rears its ugly head

In New York last week, David N. Dinkins, who is black, won the Democratic nomination for mayor, defeating the incumbent, Edward I. Koch, and becoming the early favorite to win in November, even though New York is only about 29 percent black.

In Detroit last week, Maryann Mahaffey, who is white, led the ticket for City Council in the primary and could become the council president should she duplicate the feat in November, even though Detroit is only about 30 percent white.

But in New York, a New York Times-WCBS-TV poll of voters leaving the polls found that more than 6 out of 10 Democrats who voted for Koch said they would support either the Republican or Conserva-

tive nominees or sit out the election rather than vote for Dinkins.

And in Detroit the Rev. Jim Holley, a black minister, called on the three top black council nominees to meet with him to discuss ways of preventing Mahaffey from repeating her primary victory in November. Two of the three rejected Holley's proposal, but the third agreed with it.

Holley said if Mahaffey is elected council president, she could move up to mayor if that office is vacated in the next four years. The minister said he is not a racist but does not believe Mahaffey is qualified to be council president in a community with a majority of blacks.

And we had thought racism is dying in both New York and Detroit.

## To prevent delayed justice

Starting Oct. 1, Michigan's Supreme Court will in effect guarantee speedier justice in the cases that it hears under a new rule it has imposed on itself.

It is a common saying in the law that "justice delayed is justice denied." To counter any such view about its work, the high court has decided that any case in which it hears oral arguments in a given term from October through June must be "out," meaning the court's decision must be released or completed, by Oct. 1 of the following year.

The ruling is especially important in view of the increase in litigation in Michigan and elsewhere in the country. Last year about 2,700 cases sought to be heard by Michigan's high court, an increase of 500 over the previous year. And yet the court regards its maximum load as 65 to 70 cases.

That doesn't mean that it disposes of only that many issues. It remands many appeals to the court of appeals and disposes of others through preemptory orders. But it decides to hear chiefly the cases that offer opportunities for new and significant interpretations or deeper understanding of state statutes.

Chief Justice Dorothy Comstock Riley, in a wide-ranging interview reported in detail elsewhere in today's issue of the Grosse Pointe News, also made these other points:

- She does not approve of the present system of picking supreme court justices, who are nominated by political party conventions for the most part, and then run on a non-partisan ticket in the general election, but she favors retention of the system of electing judges outside of the appellate courts.
- She enjoys her judicial work but admits that the administrative responsibilities of supervising the state-funded lower courts sometimes make it seem she has two jobs.
- Her current plans are to seek re-election in 1992, a statement that prompts her husband to comment, "Nothing lame about this duck."

No, indeed. But it is also clear that the tiny Mrs. Riley is a legal powerhouse who already has left her mark on the state's laws and courts after three years as chief justice and five on the high court.

In the Pointes, she has another distinction. She is the second chief justice in a row to reside in Grosse Pointe Farms.

### EMS

To the Editor:

In March 1985 the Grosse Pointe Branch of the AAUW (American Association of University Women) recognized a gap in community service and set up the EMS (Emergency Medical Service) Committee to "familiarize citizens with the need for, and the benefits of, an advanced life support (ALS) emergency medical program for the four Grosse Pointes" that did not have it. (The Woods had implemented ALS in 1983.)

Patience and persistence have produced some benefits. Grosse Pointe Park and Dr. Ronald Laskowski, director of emergency room services at Bon Secours Hospital were the first to cooperate

with the EMS Committee to develop the protocol for automatic defibrillating equipment (Heartstart), and the Park then purchased a Heartstart. Since then, Bon Secours Hospital has given the Park a Heartstart for the second ambulance; Cottage Hospital has donated one to the Farms, and St. John has made a similar donation to the Shores. A good start has been made.

Now we need to press on to limited ALS, and ultimately to ALS. To that end a grassroots committee consisting of representatives from all of the Pointes was formed in June, designated as Grosse Pointe Citizens for Improved Life Support.

The objectives of this broadly based committee are the same as those of the AAUW EMS Committee. That is:

1. To research the current system and the needs of the community.
2. To increase public awareness.
3. To advocate defibrillation with an upgraded level of service to limited life support or advanced life support.

Therefore, the Grosse Pointe Branch of the AAUW endorses the efforts of the Grosse Pointe Citizens for Improved Life Support in its pursuit of our mutual goals.

## The arts

To the Editor:  
Censorship, tax money and art:

One of the problems of living in a democracy is that one has to live with the good, the bad and the ugly; all of which the arts and the National Endowment for the Arts seem to embody these days.

It has always amazed me as to what people can get away with under the guise of art. Art for art sake has long been a battle cry in the arts. The essence of the problem is: Do we, as taxpayers have to pay for this kind of art?

I say the real fault for this kind of art falls in two places. One, with the endow-

ment itself, and second, with the curators of these shows. Better screening by the curators and more backbone by curators to say I will not hang this type of work.

My art colleagues say that I am advocating censorship. People often mistake censorship for something else — responsibility. After all, art is made for the public — or should be.

If not the art is made for some other reason and in the end becomes elitist art. Something most artists seem to want to forget, that art is made for public consumption.

I believe Mr. Andrew Serano's work falls in the school of art therapy. Mr. Robert Mapplethorpe's are also very self-indulgent. The exhibit in Chicago of Scott Tyler, "What is the proper way to display a U.S. flag?" was to me most disillusioning, if not in poor taste.

Many Americans died defending this flag. To question our patriotism under the guise of art and invite us to step on the flag is nothing but pure garbage. And to think our tax money helped pay for these works of art only sickens me as a taxpayer and artist.

Roy Slade, president of Crambrook Academy of art, to me represents the elitist attitude in the arts and art education in his total disregard of the public in the arts. Of course non-professionals should sit and be involved with the National Endowment for the Arts. It is public tax money we are talking about. People have opinions on what is art and what is not art. If art is in the eye of the beholder, what makes Mr. Slade's eyes any better — certainly not his education.

There are two points which I hear most often from my colleagues about this problem in arts. One, that

am advocating censorship, which I am not. Secondly, that we must tolerate a few bad works of art in order to gain a few great works of art.

Once you choose to become an artist, and show your work and ideas publicly, you in essence become responsible for it. Not everyone is going to like your work and ideas. As one sits in his or her studio and creates these so-called works of art, people and the public will come into your studio and state opinions and dislikes, perhaps even ask for changes.

If you tell them to go to hell, you probably will not sell a lot of art work in your lifetime. But either way you are taking responsibility for your art work.

Isn't this basically what we are asking of artists who get grants from the N.E.A.? We are not telling them what to paint, draw, or photograph. We are just saying we, as taxpayers, will not pay for this or that, such as bondage, urine, and flag desecration.

I believe the true goal of the National Endowment for the Arts, is to give money to the best artists in the arts in America. Then the N.E.A. must tighten up their procedures and bear more responsibility. In my opinion, they are not doing their jobs and a lot of weeds are growing in their garden and overrunning the flowers.

Not in my wildest dreams would I have ever thought I would line up with William F. Buckley, U.S. Sen. Alfonse D'Amato and Sen. Jesse Helms on anything. But I believe something must be done about the trend in the arts which seems to represent points of view against public morals and standards.

Democracy does not mean anything goes — what democracy means is art can be produced freely anywhere, anytime. But, we as taxpay-

ers do not have to support it.

The best thing that has happened out of all of this is the amount of conversation about art and the arts in the press and media. A democracy grants us this freedom. If we were truly censoring these artists and their works of art, they would have been burned and removed.

The sad thing is how many artists don't gain grants they need and these artists do. Perhaps it is time we look a little harder at the N.E.A. grant process.

Police detectives from Detroit's 5th Precinct say no suspects are in custody and a report was sent to police headquarters downtown.

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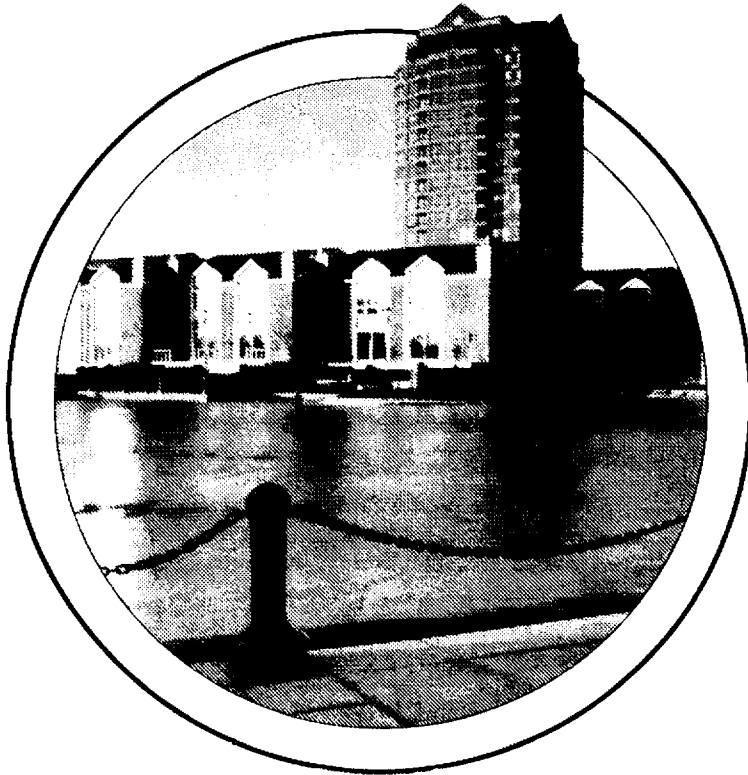

He interviewed about 75 people who knew Bunny Berrigan: friends, family, musicians. He traveled to Berrigan's home town in Wisconsin seven times, soaking up the ambience and talking to the folks. He read Billboard and Variety.

"I had to be careful," Dupuis said. "There's a lot of what-ain't-so, a lot of myth about him."

He wrote letters. And received about 1,000 responses. "Actually, I didn't have the heart to count the letters," he admitted. "I measured them."

He found Bozy White, a Californian who has been researching Berrigan for 30 years in the hope of eventually writing a comprehensive discography. Dupuis convinced White that they have a shared interest in the subject and that their books would complement — rather than compete with — each other.

He talked with Bunny Berrigan's widow, an aging and ill woman, suffering from emphysema and living in poverty. "Nevertheless, she was gracious and generous in sharing her memories, including some intimate details from their marriage," he said.

He traveled to New York to talk to jazz artists, one of whom let him photocopy a diary with dates and details right down to the condition of the piano at the hall and the cost of a shower at the hotel.

And he met Norm Krusinski of Mount Clemens, who has been Bunny Berrigan's main fan for years. With the help of all these people, Dupuis was able to put

together a body of original material for his book.

"I got lots of material," he said. "It's all over the house."

"Now what do I do with it?"

"I decided to try something William Faulkner did: I stuck little color-coded papers all around the room."

"Then I hung cards on a laundry line across the office. One day it broke and I panicked. But the cards stayed together."

"Once it's organized, all you have to do is write it."

Sure. Well, Dupuis did go right at it and, as we shall see, he finished it, but not before a pitched battle with his typewriter and a conversion to a word processor.

His daughter, Diane Dupuis, an editor at Gale Research, acted as editor on the project. Working with family was successful:

"We only had two major disagreements," he said, "one of which I won!"

"Started: The Unfinished Life of Bunny Berrigan" is the working title, inspired by Berrigan's signature tune, "I Can't Get Started." Chapter titles are based on other Berrigan tunes.

"There are no secrets to writing," Dupuis said. "You just have to do it. There's a blank page or a blank screen in front of you — you just have to fill it."

He filled many blank screens with words that pleased the publishers at Louisiana State University Press, which accepted the book a month ago.

"I'm just now coming down to Earth," Dupuis said.

The book is written for the

general reader, but "with enough detail about music that those who are interested in jazz can find some sustenance." Dupuis footnoted the book extensively.

Marketing the book was tougher than writing it, according to the author. He received encouragement from a New York agent at the annual Oakland University writers' conference. She, however, was unable to market the book to the usual publishers.

But she told Dupuis not to give up. After all that work, he wasn't about to. He marketed it himself, poring over publishing references and sending dozens of

queries. "LSU Press wanted the right of first refusal, so then I couldn't show it to anyone else," he explained. "But month after month went by. It was in the hands of an expert, who was having some personal problems. They would call and tell me to be patient, that the guy really seemed to like my work. So I waited."

Dupuis' waiting was rewarded in August — on the 52nd anniversary of Bunny Berrigan's song.

"Now I hope to have the book in hand in time for Bunny Berrigan Day up in Fox Lake, Wis., next May."

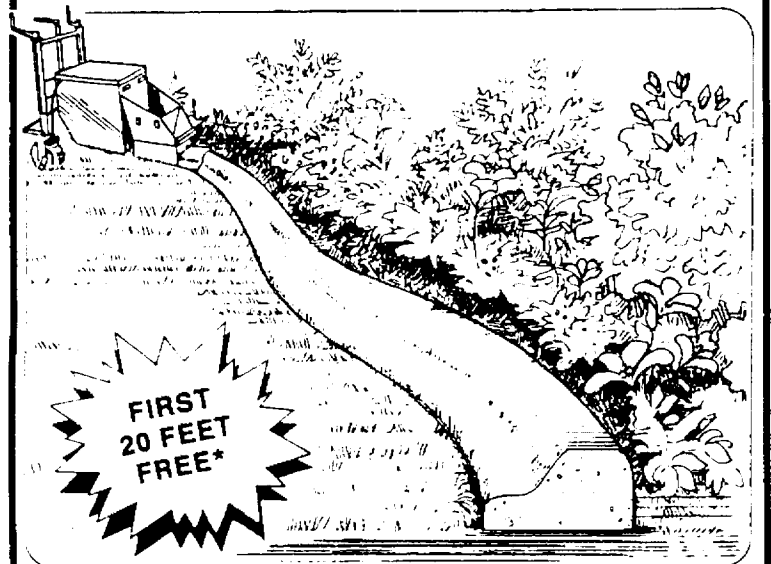
"We think this will help make a good transition from elementary school to high school," Case said.

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# Bryant throws support behind Durant for U.S. Senate

Local state Rep. William Bryant Jr. announced Monday that he is supporting fellow Grosse Pointer W. Clark Durant III's bid for U.S. Sen. Carl Levin's seat next year.

Before challenging the Democratic incumbent, however, Durant will have to win the Republican primary contest against U.S. Rep. Bill Schuette of the 10th District. Schuette ended speculation Monday by officially announcing his candidacy.

Referring to Schuette, 35, as "just a kid," Bryant said he believes 40-year-old Durant is the best candidate to beat Levin.

Bryant, a 10-term state representative and an influential Michigan Republican, said he has had a political relationship with the Durant family for years, though he often found Durant's father, Richard, "considerably more conservative than I am."

He described Clark Durant as an independent-thinking Republican who seeks practical solutions to problems, similar to former New York state Rep. Jack Kemp, who now heads the Department of Housing and Urban Development in the Bush administration.

Durant, who in 1985 was appointed chairman of the board of Legal Services Corp., a federal agency providing free legal advice for the poor, describes himself as an "opportunity society" Republican.

He said that by providing people with opportunity and the power to improve their lives, you are doing more for society than just throwing money at a problem. For example, he said, people don't want to just live in subsidized housing; they want to be able to own the house.

Durant's track record shows a non-status-quo type of logic.

He created a storm of controversy by telling the federal government that while Legal Ser-

vices Corp. was a good idea, in practice it was making lawyers rich instead of helping the poor. Durant even called for a reduction in funding for Legal Services Corp.

The American Bar Association called for Durant's resignation, but later rescinded its request. Democratic congressmen charged that Durant had made personal phone calls and personal trips on Legal Services money, but an investigation revealed that the government owed Durant money instead of the other way around.

It is Durant's willingness to look critically at the status quo that Bryant believes makes Durant the superior candidate for the Senate.

Durant is trying to develop a broad base of support throughout the state. Already he has endorsements from 10 of 18 Michigan congressional district chairmen, 46 percent of the members of the GOP State Committee and

# Grosse Pointe featured in new calendar Larceny arrest nets weapon

Freelance photographer Elizabeth Carpenter knows Grosse Pointe.

The Grosse Pointe Farms resident also knows photography, having owned and operated Lion's Gate Unlimited, a freelance photography business, since 1981.

So she took what she knows about photography and what she knows about Grosse Pointe and combined them into a special project.

Carpenter recently published a 1990 wall calendar which features 12 high-gloss color scenes of Grosse Pointe.

There's Kercheval in the fall. And there's the lakeshore in winter and again, with boaters in summer. All the scenes are interpreted through Carpenter's eye.

"Because I know the community," she said, "is that when I see the right lighting outside, I know just where I want to be. I know what a certain row of trees looks like when the sun is just right."

But some photographs included in the calendar are just "dumb luck," she says, as when she was taking a picture of the Crescent Sail Club and a

freighter steamed by in the background.

The calendar has been a project she has been working on for a number of years. It stemmed from the success of her series of postcards featuring scenes of Grosse Pointe. The cards debuted in 1984 and have been a steady seller ever since.

"With the success of the cards, I realized there was a market for a calendar," she said. "I figured the time was right, the finances were right, so I decided to put the thing together. No guts, no glory."

The calendar is a combination of her best photos from the past few years and new photographs taken especially for the project.

Only 6,800 calendars were printed. There will be no more 1990 calendars printed, in order to keep a limited edition feeling, but she is already working on the 1991 and 1992 calendars.

The calendar is available for \$10.95 at approximately 25 different stores in the Pointes. Carpenter praised the local merchants for pulling together to help a local photographer promote a local project.

"That's one of the great things about this community," she said. "We stick together."

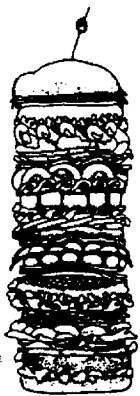

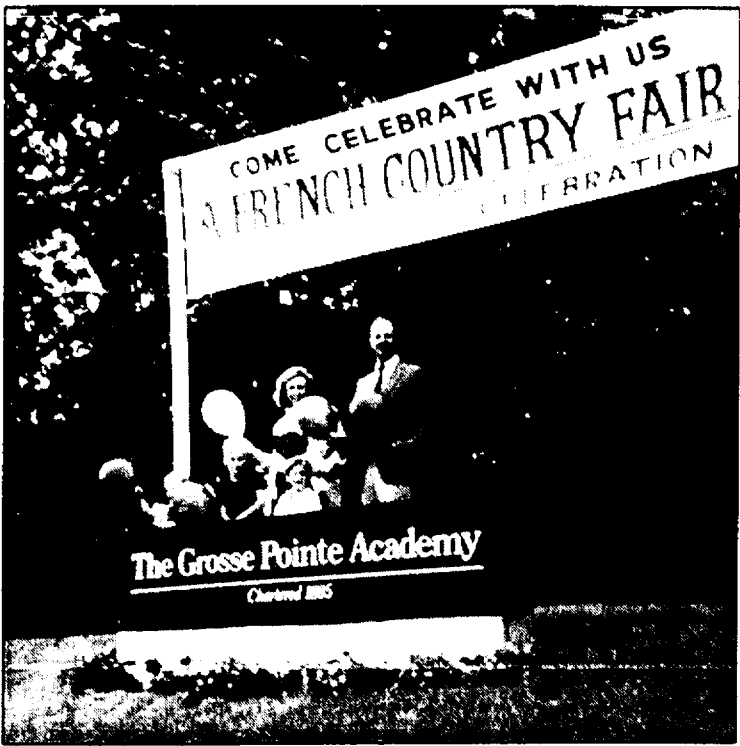
The series will examine all developments in American art during a time period Palmer describes as "powerful and personal, filled with uncompromising energy."

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# 4-wheel-drive sports utility vehicles are today's sports cars

When I was young, they still made cars without roll-up windows, cars that rode harshly and transmitted all the feel of the road to the driver, cars you had to shift yourself with a stick on the floor.

But they were cars with a flair, cars that were fun to drive, cars you wore like you wore a sporty cap or silk suspenders, cars you wanted to be seen in, even if they were not practical like a station wagon or a four-door sedan.

They were not even made in America. Most were made in England, although they also came from Italy and Germany and even France. They were called sports cars and they appealed to the sophisticated and romantic set who drove garbed with soft leather driving gloves and tweed caps.

The sports-car crowd was a little older than my crowd and much more sophisticated. We admired chopped Mercurys and flamed Chevys, Olds Rocket 88s and old Ford highboys with exposed and chromed V-8s, but the trendier set, our automotive betters, favored MGs, Austin-Healeys, Porsches, Jaguars, Triumphs and Alfa Romeos.

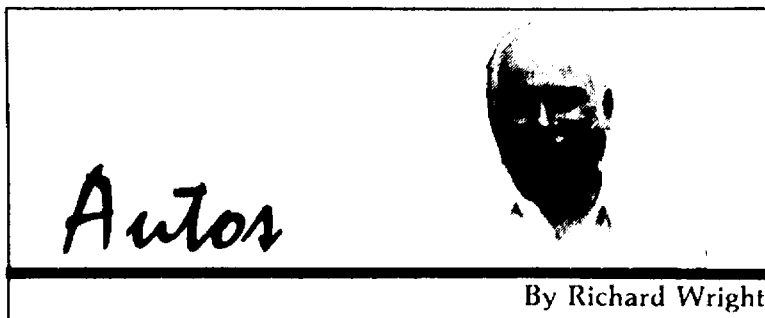
Over the decades since that automotive golden age in the

'50s, the sports cars became GTs and the hot rodders graduated to Corvettes and a wide variety of muscle cars, then on to the less powerful but superior handling cars of today, still favoring Detroit iron but now it's getting hard to tell where they come from.

But what happened to the trendy guys, the automotive pace setters who used to steal the spotlight with their Sunbeam Alpines and their Morgans?

Market studies conducted by people who need to know these kinds of things came up with some interesting conclusions. The old sports-car buyer type, they say, now goes for four-wheel-drive utility vehicles. So that's why they are so sporty and luxurious. They are no longer aimed at the hunter, the sportsman and the farmer. They are the favored toys of the urban and suburban professionals, young and middle-aged.

This seemed unlikely to me. I assumed that the Alfa owner moved on to Ferrari and the former MG crowd had moved to Corvettes. But after driving a Ford Bronco to South Bend recently, I changed my mind. Four-wheel-drive sports-utility vehicles are indeed the sports cars of today — different from the usual vehicles and, for some

reason, a lot of fun to drive.

The Bronco was bright blue and cream, equipped with all the amenities of any sporty passenger car — stereo radio, power windows and door locks, automatic transmission (along with electronically selected four-wheel-drive), carpeting, a big V-8 engine (it had an updated Ford 351-cubic-inch unit that used to power passenger cars, but the 302 V-8 which can still be had in a Mustang is also available).

But it was not just the features that made the Bronco fun. It is not like a truck, it is not like a car, it is something else. It has suspension that is the equal of family sedans, but you still sit up high, as if it were a truck (it is). It is a totally civilized vehicle, but it is also macho and rugged; characteristics which give one a powerful sense of well-

being. This is a car for trendy guy and cool guy alike. Totally unlike the sports cars of the '50s except in its spirit and soul, the Bronco was a machine I fell in love with on the way to and back from South Bend.

So wide that it looks shorter than it really is, the Bronco looks almost square, a shape not unusual to sports-utility vehicles and a shape I find attractive. Some vehicles are not wide enough. The Chevette wasn't. Even so beautiful a car as the Avanti seems to be too narrow. The Bronco is not. The driver sits up high, with a commanding view of freeway or urban traffic.

If I might digress a bit, South Bend may seem an odd destination, but it is an excellent place for an auto buff to visit. Formerly the home of one of the oldest and most honored American

nameplates, Studebaker, it has much automotive interest. For example, if you are ever asked in a game of Trivial Pursuit where the largest Chevrolet new-car showroom in the country is located, you will wow your friends with the knowledge that it is at Gates Chevrolet in South Bend.

There is an excellent Studebaker museum which opened recently in two locations, recounting not only the history of Studebaker, along with numerous examples of this most unusual and beautiful automobile, but the history of South Bend.

Who built a car named after a football coach? Studebaker, when it produced the Rockne in 1932-33. Legendary Notre Dame football coach Knute Rockne served as sales manager for the auto maker, but the car named after

him was not as successful as his football teams. The Rockne, by the way, was not built in South Bend, but in Detroit.

The museum displays the Bendix, a car built in the '30s by the auto component maker of the same name, an advanced, aerodynamic vehicle which never got into production.

There are a surprising number of good restaurants in South Bend, including one in the Studebaker mansion, and another on the beautiful Notre Dame campus. Big-time college football is played there from time to time, and if you're a baseball fan there is a Class A minor-league team which plays in a delightful stadium.

And if you don't have a Studebaker in which to make the trip, a Ford Bronco is a great way to go.

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## Man with knife found wanted

## 7-foot pot plant uprooted in Woods

Two Grosse Pointe men and a Troy man were found possessing what police say is a 7-foot-tall marijuana plant that was uprooted from the rear of a Grosse Pointe Woods home last week.

Also during the Sept. 16 incident, police found a suspected 5-foot pot plant in the trunk of a car driven by the Troy man.

A Woods officer on patrol saw two young men run to a car parked in the 1400 block of Yorktown at 1:35 a.m. The officer saw one of the men discard what looked to him to be a 7-foot pot plant that had been pulled out by the roots. Also found between the sidewalk and curb was a 7-inch, wooden-handled kitchen knife.

When the officer got to the parked vehicle, the two young men, who turned out to be Grosse Pointe City and Woods residents, were trying to get into the car. A Troy man was sitting behind the wheel of the car. All the men were 18 years old.

The officer ordered the Troy man out of the car and all three men were placed under arrest. The Troy man was found to be wearing a gun holster and when asked why he had a holster, he said, "I'm Italian." A "Simulated German Replica Police Pistol" was found under the driver's seat and was loaded with a .22 caliber shell, according to police reports.

The two young men had apparently discarded the 7-foot marijuana plant and kitchen knife when they saw the police officer approaching. A second suspected marijuana plant was found in the trunk of the vehicle. The trunk lid had been slammed down with part of the plant sticking out. The 5-foot plant's stalk had been cut. A 7 1/2 inch kitchen knife was also found in the trunk.

Police checked behind houses in the area trying to discover where the uprooted plant had come from. Officers found an 8-inch deep, 6-inch diameter hole in the rear yard of a home in the 21600 block of Westbrook. The resident at the Westbrook home denied any knowledge of the suspected pot plant.

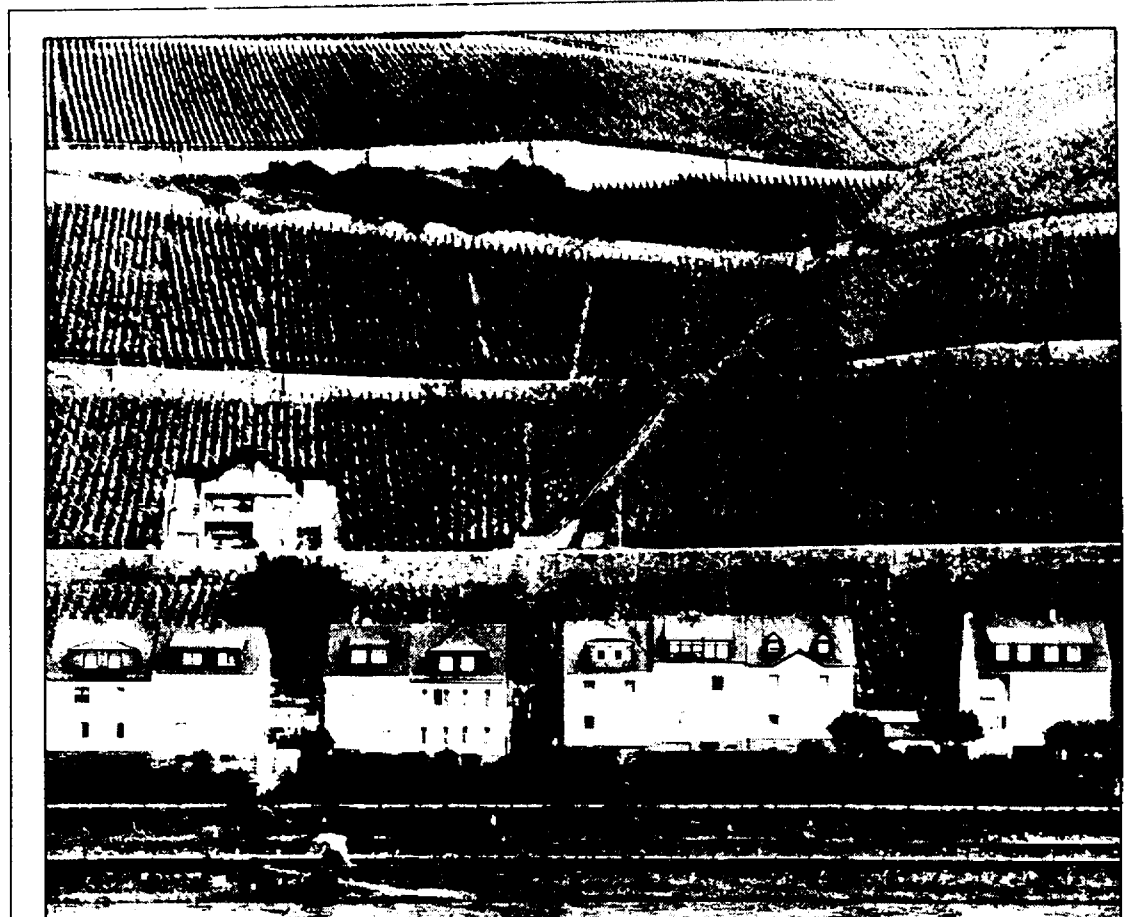
Taken from the bag was \$4,500 in cash. The Taylor man told police that the only person who knew about the money was an employee who was working his last day.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the City Council will be considering the following proposed ordinance for second reading and final adoption at its meeting scheduled for October 2, 1989. All interested parties are invited to attend.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND TITLE V, CHAPTER 8, SECTION 5-8-6 AND TO AMEND TITLE V, CHAPTER 11, SECTION 5-11-5 OF THE CITY CODE OF THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE WOODS OF 1975 (THE ZONING ORDINANCE) ENTITLED "BUILDING FRONTS."

THE CITY OF GROSSE POINTE WOODS ORDAINS:

Section 1: That Title V, Chapter 8, Section 5-8-6 and Title V, Chapter 11, Section 5-11-5 of the City Code of the City of Grosse Pointe Woods of 1975 (the zoning ordinance) be amended to read as follows:

5-8-6 BUILDING FRONTS: All plans for the reconstruction, remodeling, altering, painting/repainting or any other changes in the exterior appearance of any building or structure front or fronts, including signs, awnings or canopies within the Commercial Business District, the Restricted Office District and the C-2 High Intensity City Center District shall be presented to the Building Inspector and referred to the Planning Commission, with the Building Inspector's recommendation for their approval, prior to the issuance of a building, sign or awning permit and/or any new certificate of occupancy as may be required.

All requests for a permit to install a replacement awning or canopy on buildings within the Commercial Business District, the Restricted Office District and the C-2 High Intensity City Center District may be issued by the Building Inspector provided, however, that the replacement awning or canopy is the same dimension and style as the awning or canopy being replaced and that the color of such shall be an earth tone as approved by the Planning Commission.

All requests for a permit to install a new awning or canopy on buildings within the Commercial Business District, the Restricted Office District and the C-2 High Intensity City Center District which are not a replacement for a previously existing awning or canopy, or which is of a different dimension or shape than an existing awning or canopy shall be referred to the Planning Commission for review and approval. Such permit applications shall be accompanied by a sketch showing the exterior elevation of the building with the proposed awning or canopy installed. The Planning Commission shall determine whether or not such proposed installation conforms with or is harmonious with Early American or Colonial design or comports with any master building front design or scheme in effect within the City. If such proposed awning or canopy installation meets the requirements, the permit shall be authorized provided, however, that the color of the proposed awning or canopy shall be in earth tones as approved by the Planning Commission. If such proposed awning or canopy design fails to meet such design standards, the requested permit shall be denied. (Ord. 517, 8-20-84, eff. 8-30-84)

5-11-5 BUILDING FRONTS: All plans for the reconstruction, remodeling, painting, altering, or change in the exterior appearance of any building or structure shall be presented to the Building Inspector and referred to the Planning Commission with the Building Inspector's recommendation prior to the approval and issuance of a building permit and/or a new certificate of occupancy. Gable ends of such buildings or structures above the roof spring line may consist of white baked-on enamel siding in widths not over eight inches (8"), the appearance of such siding to be equivalent to that of white painted wood siding.

The white baked-on enamel metal shall be of a noncorroding type of material such as aluminum or other equal metal, to be installed on fire retarding backing of such gables.

White baked-on enamel metal trim may be used instead of wood trim. This trim shall consist of rolled or extruded hollow or solid noncorroding metal shapes such as aluminum with white or baked-on enamel, and shall be fastened to buildings or structures with anchors or inserts of a noncorroding type. "Trim" means door or window frames, cornices and Colonial type ornamentations. Metal used for siding of gable ends or trim shall be of a minimum thickness of No. 26 gauge.

Section 2: EFFECTIVE DATE: This ordinance shall become effective after a public hearing before the Planning Commission, approval by the City Council and publication of notice of adoption.

If Daphne Du Maurier and, say, Bram Stoker had a child like, say, Groucho Marx, the Attic Theatre's "The Mystery of Irma Vep" would be that child's tribute to his parents.

Not simply a farce of bad 1940s' horror movies and Victorian melodramas, "Vep" is more a tribute to the style and the timeless fears employed in those movies to evoke fear (and often unintentioned laughter).

There are the doors which open and close by themselves, the portrait of "The First Wife" hanging over the mantle, the full moon that shines despite all the thunder and lightning, and the howling of the wolves.

Just as all the elements are in place, so are all of the characters — the new wife, the severe housekeeper who is utterly devoted to "The First Wife," the husband unable to shake his love — or fear — for "The First Wife," and the hunchbacked woodman.

The humor in "Vep" comes not only in the characters and the plot devices which are being spoofed at every turn, but also in the fact that the eight distinct characters are played by only two actors.

When the new lady of Mandacrest wishes to speak to Nicodemus the woodman, Jane Twisden the housekeeper tells her that that would be quite impossible and she is right, just as it would be impossible for Twisden to speak to Lord Edgar Hillcrest, the man she loves, for those characters are played by the same actor.

Author Charles Ludlam, who died in 1987 and was the author of some 30 farces which spoofed everything from horror movies to Wagner's operatic ring cycle, has honed his craft so well that the gimmick of two actors playing eight roles never gets in the way of the plot and is not the main focus of the humor, although it is hilarious.

The performances by Morgan Duncan (as Twisden and Lord Hillcrest), and Michael Kissin (as Nicodemus, Lady Hillcrest and others) are exactly right for the type of play Ludlam wrote. The two men are not only imitating B movie performances, but are camping them up — not too much, just enough.

The actors are members of Minnesota's Mixed Blood Theatre Company, which co-produced the show with the Attic.

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# 'Les Miserables': A story with universal appeal

Don't Miz Out, the ads say, under the widely recognizable drawing of an appealing, imploring waif who is the symbol for "Les Miserables." Believe the ad.

This is theater that is spectacular, rousing, emotion-filled, magical. It's also schmaltzy, self-indulgent, unctuous. In a word, it's wonderful.

Even with a top ticket price of \$45, there shouldn't be too many people who leave the theater feeling they didn't get their money's worth.

"Les Miserables," based on the classic novel by Victor Hugo, is the story of a fugitive and his policeman pursuer. The action spans three decades of 19th century French history, when Parisian streets were filled with the homeless and disenfranchised, with street gangs and beggars and prostitutes. Like big city American streets today.

A group of students, whose idealism is greater than their common sense, tries to inspire the masses to revolution. They fail in the sense that they are killed and nothing much changes.

Their ideas of equality burn brightly, however, only to be nearly snuffed out and to flicker weakly until another group of young idealists comes along. And we have plenty of examples of that today — most recently, the Chinese students.

That is, perhaps, the universal appeal of this epic, exemplified appropriately by the French saying: *Plus ça change, plus c'est la même chose* (The more it changes, the more it is the same thing).

While all of the roles are sung, the people connected with "Les Miserables" are careful to describe it as a musical and not an opera. It's done so well that it's not necessary to know anymore than the bare-bones outline of



the story to follow it easily. There may be a problem for people who are seated a distance from the stage, and in this case, it would probably be better to get in as close as your budget allows.

The acting and the voices of the principals are strong, especially J. Mark McVey who is Jean Valjean, Hollis Resnick who plays Fontine and Melissa Errico who is Cosette. Charles Pistone as Javert, the policeman, is superb, and Jennifer Naimo as Eponine is especially appealing.

Drew Eshelman as Thenardier, the sleazy, comical innkeeper, uses his body like a bag of

bones that can go off in different directions. The man has a tongue to rival the Stones' Mick Jagger's.

It's a solid company — there isn't a weak or bad voice in the lot and the songs are displayed to their best advantage.

The sets are awesome, particularly the mean streets of Paris and the barricade built by the students. It looks like some laws of gravity are broken here.

"Les Miserables" will run Tuesday through Sunday until Nov. 26 at the Fisher Theatre.

## Assassination is plot of 'The Package'

Packages come in all sizes and shapes. In "The Package," an action-packed tale of treachery and conspiracy, the package is a court-martialed soldier being transported from West Berlin, where the story begins, to Washington, D.C.

Sgt. Johnny Gallagher (Gene Hackman), a 25-year Army veteran, is assigned to deliver him



by Col. Glen Whitacre (John Heard), who for some reason actively dislikes him.

Unknown to Gallagher, his prisoner, Thomas Boyette (Tommy Lee Jones), is not the real culprit but a mercenary Army vet planted by sinister forces.

The scenario heats up when Hackman loses his "package" during an orchestrated mugging by a group of sailors.

Hackman, with the help of his ex-wife Johanna, who is an officer in the Army personnel department, learns that Boyette has served in countries worldwide. Still unable to fit the pieces together, he calls on an old Army-buddy who owes him a favor to unravel a situation that is becoming more and more dangerous. Several attempts are made on Hackman's life. In spite of all their efforts, it seems impossible to track down reasons or clues for what is going on.

There is intrinsic interest in films like "The Package." Presidents are assassinated and there is always speculation on how and why it happens. "The Package" shows just how it can be arranged and justified by conspirators firm in their belief that

they are doing the right thing.

All of those involved believe that an agreement to ban nuclear arms would make America vulnerable and an easy target for a takeover.

While Jones is wily and laid back in his role, Heard as Colonel Whitacre is cold, calculating, bloodless as a robot and thoroughly despicable.

Hackman never fails to intrigue. He's a down-to-earth character, a little rough but with lots of rugged charm that makes every film he appears in better.

## 'Sea of Love' is adult fare

A sexy, suspenseful thriller, "Sea of Love" may not be the most appropriately titled film of the year, but it is one of the most fun.

Al Pacino and Ellen Barkin have a fiery chemistry on the screen together, which only adds to the host of wonderful elements in the film. Viewers are also presented with a well-written, intelligent script and stylish production values.

The film is similar in plot and style to, among others, "The Jagged Edge," and "Suspect," though it takes enough unique and unexpected turns to make itself a very satisfying movie experience.

Here's what Pacino, the cop, thinks he knows: Some woman is killing men who write poetic lonely heart want ads. The woman he's falling in love with (Barkin) is supposed to be one of the suspects, but she just seems too perfect to be a killer.

So Pacino, who is fighting off a midlife crisis, goes with his heart and against his instincts and gets about as deeply involved with her as two people



can get in a week.

Which, from the looks of things, is pretty involved.

Indeed, the film spends only enough time on the murder mystery portion of its proceedings to provide a framework for the love story and personal interaction of its stars. This is good. Pacino's alcoholic cop — brash, rough around the edges and living on the edge — is one of the more convincing characters to hit the screen in some time. And Barkin's sexy mystery woman is elusive enough to maintain our interest but vulnerable enough to make viewers want to root for her.

The time the film does spend on mystery and cop-plot development is time well-spent. The film does not get bogged down in plot complications that do not add

anything to the ultimate solution; everything has its purpose.

As for the love scenes, Barkin is similar here to her role in "The Big Easy." Sexy beyond belief. As for Pacino, it's difficult to understand how snuggling up to someone like Barkin could be work, but, for what it's worth, he looks convincing when the two of them are in a clinch.

"Sea of Love" is a movie for adults; there's no question about that. In content this picture is full of material that youngsters have no business looking at. Adults are bound to get a charge, however.

Meanwhile, the only thing left to figure out is the title. For some reason, the song of the same name is used repeatedly through the picture. Precisely what it's significance is, we never quite figure out.

But from the beginning we're riveted.

## Skies growing friendlier for business contract flights

The mid-decade hard times for business aviation have finally passed, with hopes for nothing but clear skies ahead. After a four-year down cycle, the bottom line has improved — for some surprising reasons.

The last recession hit hard. Companies trying to save money cut personnel and perks, and one area that seemed to scream extravagance was the corporate flight department. Business people began to line up for scheduled commercial airlines.

"Cutting the plane out of the budget looks good for the company image. It makes the stockholders happy," says business aviation owner Robert Carnell. "But it may not really save money."

If a Detroit company has business in Atlanta and needs to send only one person to accomplish the deal, a commercial flight is the most economical way to go. That's because both

cities are airline hubs, served by frequent flights.

But if the deal requires six people and can only be done in Greenbriar, W. Va., a private chartered or leased plane is probably cheaper. There are more than 12,000 general aviation landing fields in the country.

### Bob Carnell

Bob Carnell started in aviation as a mechanic's helper when he was 19. He worked his way up to pilot, flying for oil corporations.

"Once I started, it was as addictive as gambling or crack," he said.

He began managing airplanes 17 years ago, when only a few companies were in the business. He knew the flexibility would make economic sense.

"People were cynical," he said. "They thought I'd only last six months. Now there's lots of competition."

compared to just over 500 commercial service airports.

"By the time you figure commercial plane fares and a couple of rental cars, plus two nights in a hotel because there's only one flight a day..." the company will have spent more than the cost of a charter," says Jan Olsen.

Olsen is the owner and president of Olsen Flight Services, headquartered at Detroit City Airport. Carnell heads up Corporate Flight, Inc., out of Metro Airport.

Both companies perform the full range of business aviation services: maintenance, charters, management of company-owned planes, leasing. They both employ 13 full-time pilots. Both

### Jan Olsen

Jan Olsen is a former professional pilot who still flies for fun. She started her own flight school and charter and management company after teaching flying at Wayne State University's flying club.

She started her business at City Airport in 1968, sticking with it through good times and bad.

"Everything they've done here is for the good," she said. With the airport's recent expansion, she has picked up the maintenance contract for Southwest Airlines, along with the corporate management she has always done.

"Business is at least 100 percent better than last year," she says. "I don't see the need declining."

serve major Detroit corporations, hospitals, law and accounting firms, banks and a few families who can afford private travel. Both protect their client lists.

If your business wants to fly somewhere, both companies need only about 45 minutes to an hour's notice.

"All we have to sell is service," Olsen said.

So, even in the middle of the night, a plane can be arranged, pilots contacted by beeper, pre-flight checks done, and, as Carnell says, "the pilots stop and

pick up the catering on the way." All in an hour. Or less.

On the surface, it doesn't seem to jibe with the image of the trimmed-down corporation. But business aviation professionals say that image is misleading. Business these days is less interested in ticket cost than in time-saving, security, privacy, efficiency and productivity. And that means not wasting time in airports.

"Business aviation is stronger than ever and will probably continue because companies have

learned to operate with fewer people," Olsen said. "There is a demand for top executives to be more productive. They can't afford to miss an appointment or have a flight cancelled. Their time is too valuable."

Business aviation hit rock bottom in 1982. Business failures, belt-tightening, and the wave of corporate mergers in recent years all had a negative impact on corporate flight. The rebound of the last year has about brought business aircraft registration back to the levels of the late '70s, according to Carnell.

"We're as cyclical as the automotive industry," he said. "We were really hurting in the early '80s because of the fuel price crunch and the automotive downturn."

"As times got tough, lots of companies were trying to justify the expense — and lots of them sold their planes," he said. "Owning a plane is expensive, but you can justify it in certain ways. But not to a bean counter."

As a result, the number of business aircraft declined by 12,000 units nationwide from 1984 to 1988, according to FAA figures.

However, aviation management companies have found ways to a bean counter's heart. Much of the growth in business flying is in charters, leases and time-shares. Some corporations lease their planes back to management companies to reduce down time.

Carnell, for example, owns two jets that he flies on a shared-time concept. "It's economical," he said. "If you only need 100 hours, you just pay for what you use. A plane should be flown for 400 hours to justify owning it."

Satisfying a demanding clientele is expensive. Both Carnell and Olsen emphasize the high ratings and skills of their pilots. Olsen is shopping for a new turbo-prop so her customers can fly further and faster. Carnell is spending \$50,000 apiece to spruce up his jets.

"The overhead is dramatic," Olsen said. "We have to meet \$1 million in bills every year. If we make 7 percent, we're ecstatic."

General aviation (all aviation except scheduled commercial flights) is the primary air link to almost 20,000 communities across the country, according to the Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association. It directly and indirectly generates more than 500,000 jobs and \$15 billion in economic activity nationwide.

In Michigan, there are almost 7,000 general aviation aircraft registrations (about 1,700 of them are specifically business aircraft). The industry employs nearly 10,000 people, with a total economic activity of \$640 million.

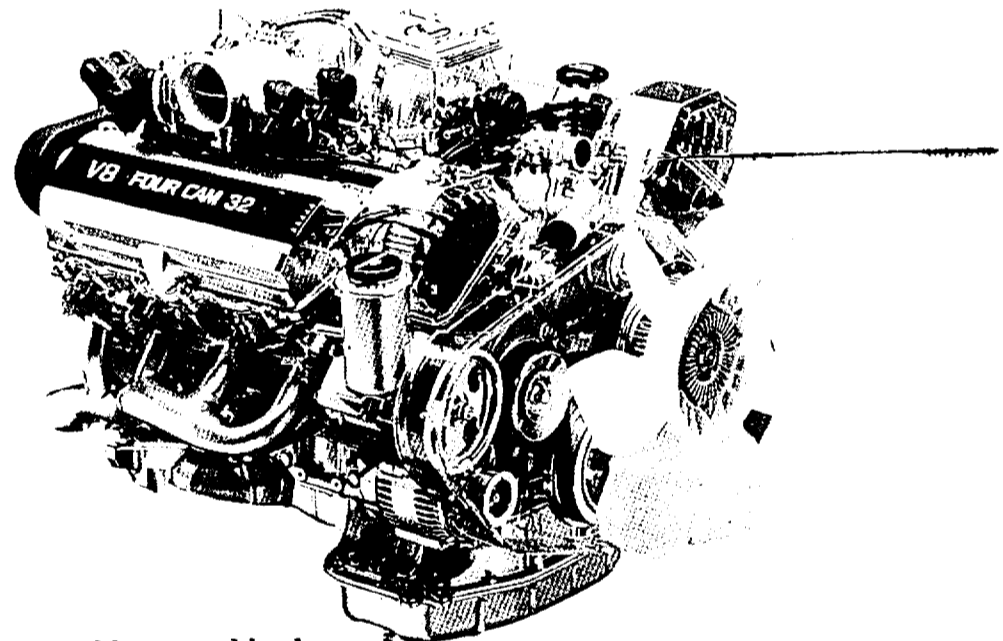
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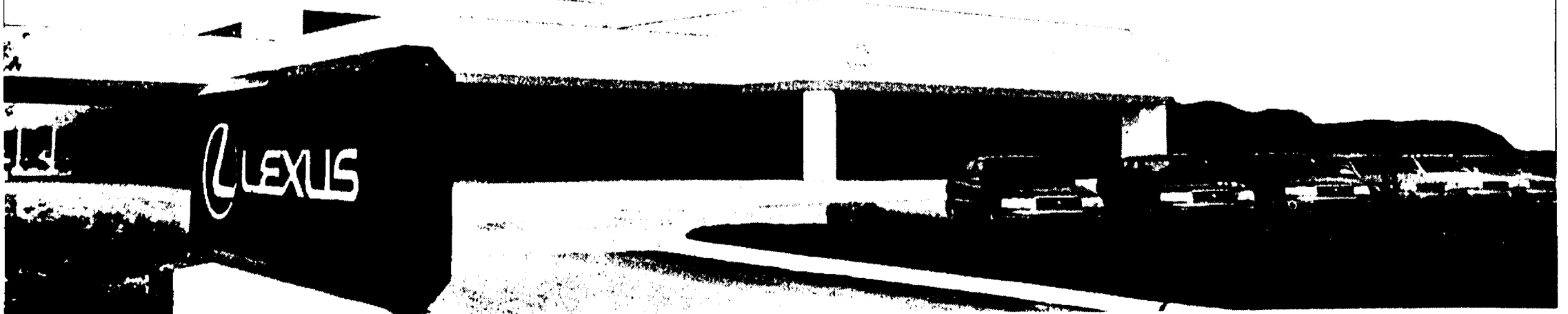
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## Novelists collaborate to create medical thriller

### 'The Master Cure' by Charles H. Buck

It's October 1994. The AIDS epidemic is under control. A vaccine has been developed to prevent it.

Unfortunately, a brand new killer virus is taking its toll. It's selective. It only attacks blacks, Jews and homosexuals. The victims suffer gruesome, painful symptoms that come on quickly and leave them dead within four days.

"The Master Cure," by Charles H. Buck, is a medical thriller a la Robin Cook ("Coma," "Mindbend," "Mutation") and Michael Crichton ("Andromeda Strain.")

Gloria, the protagonist in "The Master Cure," is a gutsy photojournalist with a background in biochemistry and computers. When a friend dies mysteriously after the sudden onset of an unusual illness, she tracks a bunch of diabolical neo-Nazis and right-wing religious fanatics who are plotting to rid the world of so-called "undesirables."

Subplots and sidetracks involve murders,

slick computer sleuthing, a drug addict love interest, a corrupt and hypocritical preacher from the Church of Eternal Salvation, a Nazi scientist and a kindly professor-mentor. It's all wrapped into a fast-moving plot that carries the characters from San Francisco to South Africa to Utah to Michigan, and includes a bit of graphic violence, some vivid descriptions of the virus' horrible symptoms, and a generous sampling of sex.

It's a fast read; almost un-put-down-able.

More fascinating, however, is the book's author, Charles H. Buck, a pseudonym for two authors: Hugh Charles Culik of Grosse Pointe Farms and Ray Buck of New Baltimore, formerly of Grosse Pointe.

Still more fascinating — is how they wrote it. And — that the two men's wives were co-collaborators. The women had an equal voice in decisions of character and plot, although the men did the actual writing.

"Our agent said he would not handle a collaboration," Culik said. "He claimed it wouldn't work."

"So — we didn't tell him until after he read the manuscript and liked it." The two men met at an office party they attended with their wives, who were colleagues. Both men discovered they were in the process of writing books. They began comparing notes and became friends.

When they decided to collaborate on a work of fiction, they agreed to tap the combined experience, points of view, skills and creativity of four minds.

Ray Buck is a psychiatrist and administrator of the Psychiatric Center of Michigan. Hugh Culik is a father, teacher, literary scholar and writer. He has bachelor's and master's of arts degrees in English and has completed all of the course

work for his Ph.D. in English.

Lynne Buck is a psychiatric social worker at St. John Hospital. Diane Culik is a physician, a family practitioner with an office in Grosse Pointe Woods.

"The Master Cure" was a conscious, carefully planned effort to write a medical thriller that would scare people to death, Culik said. "We talked about what makes people frightened. We settled on a plague-like virus, like AIDS. We decided we wanted a strong woman for the main character and we decided she should have a male side-kick."

During the creation of the novel, the two couples sat around a table and talked about characters and plot. "We did extensive, detailed sketches for each character — even down to what that character's favorite color was," Buck said.

He said that someone took notes during the discussions and wrote summaries of the group's decisions. They made an exacting outline of the whole book before anybody started writing.

Buck said the outline was followed pretty closely, with only minor revisions. The men took turns writing chapters. "Hugh would write a chapter," Buck said. "He would read it aloud to the three of us.

We'd all have a chance to criticize, to add, to suggest changes."

"Sometimes the three listeners would shred the writer," Culik said. "Sometimes they'd be moved and frightened."

Then Buck would take the chapter home. He had total editing freedom.

He could rewrite, change, throw out scenes, add descriptions, write new dialogue — do anything he wanted to do.

Two weeks later, Buck would bring the

chapter back to the table and read the rewritten version.

More criticism, input, suggestions.

Then Culik would get it back for the final rewrite.

Buck would write the next chapter, and the process would be repeated again.

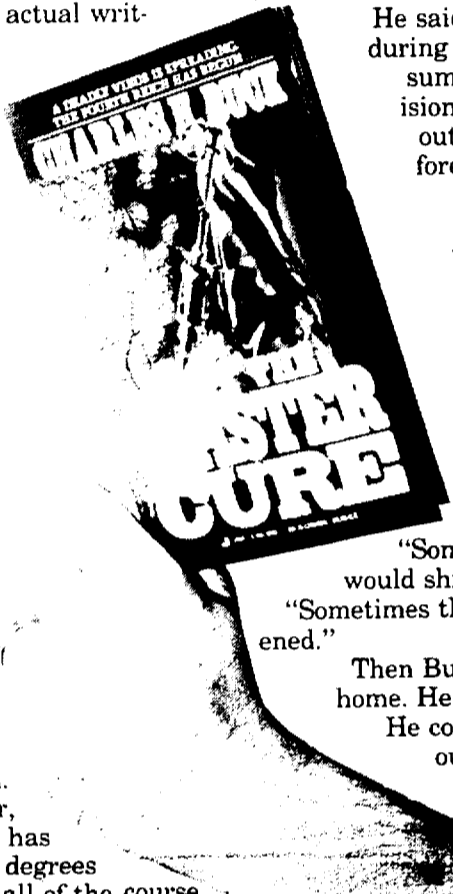
If there was a controversy over what a character would do or say — they voted. "Three to one — and the outnumbered person lost," Buck said. "In two to two votes, we let it lay until the final proof."

"For instance, Gloria is a strong protagonist," Buck said. "About three-fourths of the way through the book, Gloria and Joe are escaping. I wrote the first version with Gloria driving the Jeep. When Hugh rewrote it, he had Joe driving."

We argued about who should drive. Our wives were uncertain. When I rewrote the chapter, I put Gloria back in the driver's seat."

Buck said that "putting Gloria in the

driver's seat" became a statement that the four referred to whenever they disagreed about a detail of their collective efforts.

The two men also disagreed about the color of Gloria's hair. Buck thought it should be light and Culik thought it should be black. "We argued about this for two months," Buck said. "We settled on auburn."

Buck said they were probably successful in their project because they were compulsively organized. Because of their detailed outline of the whole novel, the designated writer of each chapter knew exactly what he had to do before he started writing. He knew what subplots were to be developed - which characters would be interacting - how and why the plot was to advance.

"The writing was the fun part," Buck said.

Both men had written professionally before "The Master Cure." Buck's writing was an avocation. Culik wrote scholarly articles for literary journals. He still does.

Buck is strong on plot and dialogue. "I'm not good enough to get a novel published," he said. "My style is like comic book writing. About 10 years ago, after I read Robin Cook's 'Coma,' I tried to write a psychological thriller, but it wasn't very good.

"Hugh writes like a poet, beautifully."

Culik said he has never read Robin Cook or Stephen King. He reads serious literature: Samuel Beckett, William S. Burroughs, Thomas Pynchon.

"Although we started out with different styles," Buck said, "about halfway through the book, our writing became extremely similar."

Culik said the whole project took 13 months. The Jove Books paperback came out this month. It's available at Waldenbooks at Eastland and in the Village and at B. Dalton at Eastland.

The collaborators have already

completed their second book, which is also a medical thriller. It's set in Mexico. "It's about the exploitation of women's procreative powers," Culik said. "It concerns the use of fetal parts for therapeutic purposes." Although the contract hasn't been signed yet, Culik said the new novel will also be published by Jove Books.

They're ready to begin their third thriller. Culik said he likes working with Buck. "He's a great friend and a good writer. The pleasure (of writing together) is worth more than the money. We think we can have fun writing six or seven more

thrillers."

Buck said he likes writing fiction because he can deal with painful realities in a therapeutic way. "I can create my own world; my own people. I can make these people do anything I want. If I get angry with them, I can kill 'em."

Culik and Buck said they're not in the fiction-writing business for big money - at least not yet. They got an advance of \$4,000 for "The Master Cure," which had a first printing of 80,000. They make 25 cents on each copy sold.

"We figured out that's about 7 cents an hour," Buck said.

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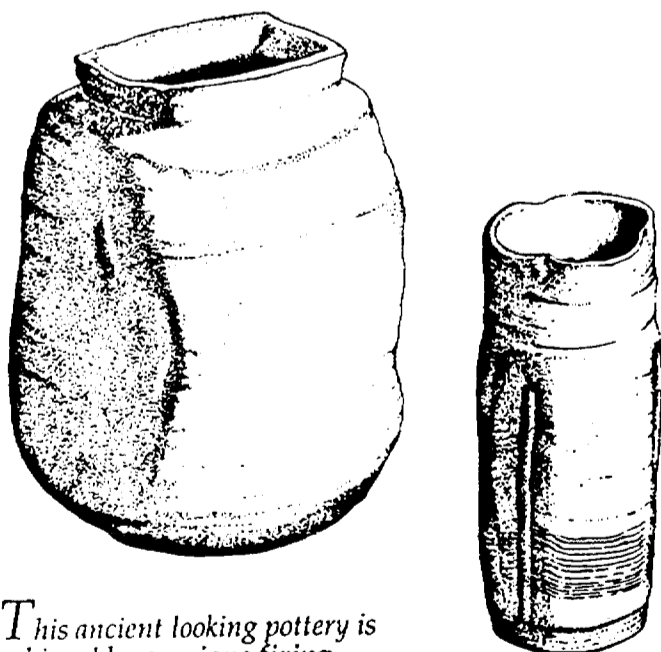
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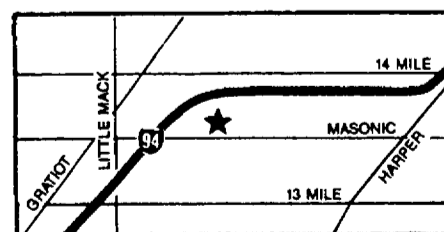

## First English Ev. Lutheran honors pastor

The Rev. Paul F. Keppler will be honored Sunday, Sept. 24 on the occasion of his retirement as pastor of First English Ev. Lutheran Church. He will conduct worship and preach the 10 a.m. sermon. A coffee hour will follow.

Later in the afternoon, members, friends, and family will gather at the Assumption Cultural Center in St. Clair Shores for a dinner reception as an expression of gratitude for his dedicated and inspirational service to the church for nearly 40 years.

Keppler was born in Hamilton, Ohio. He attended the public schools and began thinking of becoming a minister a year before entering high school. Family nurturing and his own personal experiences led to his decision. It was then, he said, that he laid down goals for his life, realizing that many years of study and schooling lay ahead.

Keppler graduated from Capital Lutheran University in Columbus with a degree in history.

After college he entered the Evangelical Lutheran Theology Seminary and accepted an internship at Salem Lutheran Church in Detroit with Pastor Ted Pretzlaff. It was at Salem that he met Janet Perlick. They were married in 1951.

Following the internship at Salem Church, Keppler taught religion at Capital University. After a year of graduate study on New Testament theology at Princeton Seminary in New Jersey, he received his Master of Theology degree.

He became acquainted with First English Lutheran Church in Detroit while preaching during the summer months while the Rev. Walter O. Hauck was on vacation.

Keppler received a call from First English to serve during Hauck's illness. After the senior pastor's death, Keppler was installed as pastor in November, 1952.

The Detroit congregation soon

had to make a critical decision. Membership was down and people were moving to the suburbs, especially Grosse Pointe Woods. Three acres of land were purchased at Wedgewood and Vernier for \$38,000. Ground was broken for a new building in 1956 and the church was dedicated December, 1957 at a nationwide peak in church membership. As a result of property development, new homes were being built and families were growing.

To accommodate a growing Sunday school, the educational building was completed in 1964.

Keppler's ministry has been basically the work of a pastor — that is, to care and have concern for the spiritual needs of church members. He served as counselor, advisor, and confidant to those in need. His preaching has been based on the Bible in the original setting of scripture, yet he said he has tried to keep it relevant to the times and related to circumstances of human life

today.

He emphasized education. To encourage members and friends of the church to become more literate about scripture, he taught classes Sunday mornings and Monday evenings.

When Georgian East Nursing Home opened 27 years ago, Keppler began conducting services twice a month for the residents. Keppler said his goals have always been to lead a useful life and to serve others. Although these goals will now be redefined, he said he is looking to the varied opportunities of a productive retirement.

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## Helen Hayes has wisdom, inspiration, optimism for seniors

For 70 years, Helen Hayes has graced the stage and screen with her talent as an actress. Her career has taken her to all corners of the earth where she has met all kinds of people. It has also provided her with a unique opportunity to observe and learn from many situations. Out of her experiences both as a professional and private person with many of the same problems we all have encountered, she has compiled "Loving Life" — her singular insights, wisdom, opinions and inspiring advice.

In the introduction, she poses such questions as: "What is our sense of the future and the past?" and "What disciplines, restraints and decisions must be contemplated?"

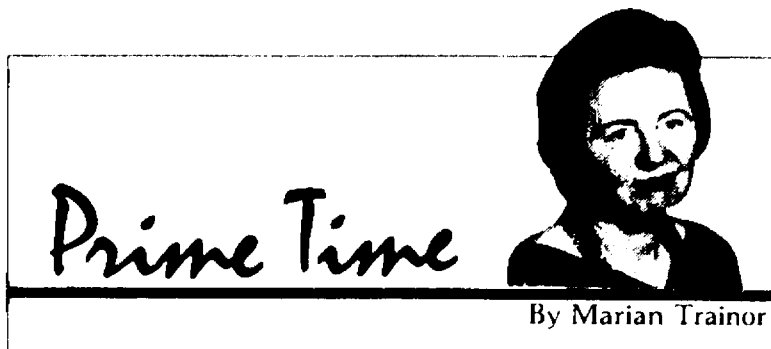
She goes on to write that her book is a panoramic view of the world as she sees it — matters that do or should concern everyone. She certainly addresses a variety of subjects in more than 30 chapters that encompass relationships with grandparents, stress, routines, drunk driving,

women's issues, illiteracy, death, divorce, travel and more.

Under the heading "Psycho Logic," she discourses about psychoanalysts and we get the impression that she does not regard them highly. She advises her readers that there is a cheaper way to find out what's bothering you — keep a diary. A bound notebook will do. She warns that you must never tear out a page. Maybe what you wrote will look crazy to you next week, but you will find out that what hurt you, angered you or frightened you wasn't worth those exaggerated emotions.

You will get to know your thoughts and have the chance to examine them in retrospect to better understand yourself as well as the people who populate your life. Once you have put a thought on paper, you have it in your hand to study, to improve, to discard and — most important — to forgive yourself.

In another chapter she discusses what a house means to its owner, with thoughts that came



to her when she was selling her own home.

"A house is not a financial investment," she said. "It is part of you. Your fingerprints are on the garden soil. Your life is painted on the walls. Every step you have ever taken is etched on those floors. The dreams you dreamed are just outside the windows. The tears you shed are still on the glass. Can you sometimes not go into a room because memories will overwhelm you? That's better than none at all."

She writes of what life as a widow means. She asserts that

there is life after widowhood and that the word alone can be read "all one."

She believes that in this new phase which is thrust upon widows, they can develop into someone they never were before. Being alone doesn't have to mean being lonely. It can be a means of becoming an individual.

Although the situations upset her, she writes with humor about such annoyances as public address systems in supermarkets, in-flight movies preceded by commercials, flashing advertisements in taxis, people who walk around with antennae coming out of their heads and wires strung from their pockets, uninterrupted all-day weather channels: "They may yet drive us underground in abject insecurity."

She has some interesting observations about death. She contends that doctors do too much to maintain hopeless cases for fear of malpractice suits. She believes that people should talk to their families and express what they wish done if they are beyond hope of recovery. At times, she writes, she looks forward to death as an adventure.

She quotes J. M. Barrie's Peter Pan: "To die will be an awfully big adventure," and concludes that she loves to travel.

It will be just one more trip. One of the most interesting chapters is titled Grandparents are History. "Social scientists apparently never run out of new groups to study," she writes. "The latest is grandparents."

That's no surprise. There are 24 million elders in America. The question is: What is their role in three- and four-generation

families and in society? She ponders whether they want to be considered living symbols or active participants.

The best answer is both. "By simply being there, grandparents perform a valuable function," says the author of a research book on the subject. "Their mere existence is an expression of family continuity. They serve as an anchor of stability. They are a link to the past — not just to members of a particular family, but to members of a previous social order. They function as a connection with humanity and history."

Among the many observations she presents on being a grandparent today: she noted the acronyms that have been coined to describe them such as Grumpies, which stands for Grownup Mature Persons, Oafs — Older Active Folks, and Sippies — Senior Independent Pioneers.

She likes Aimies: A for active, I for independent, M for mature.

There is a bitter edge to her remarks concerning how Prep-

pies, Yuppies and Puppies sometimes regard older people.

She writes: "You collect old furniture, old cars, old pictures, everything but old people. Bad souvenirs. They talk too much. Even quiet, they tell you too much, they look like the future and you don't want to know."

Who are these people, these oldsters, this strange race? Put them with their own kind."

She goes on to warn that even the youngest will one day join their tribe. The problem is not that life is short but that it's very long. The old people are the survivors. They know something. They haven't just stayed late to ruin your party.

The very old are miracles like the just-born. Close to the end is precious, like close to the beginning.

A sobering thought. A book that should appeal to all ages, "Loving Life" is one that can be picked up and read at intervals whenever the reader feels a need to be inspired, instructed or just amused.

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

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# Grapevines, grapes: Popular decorations for 6,000 years

September marks the end of vacation time for most of us, and is the signal for a return to more strenuous activity. For nature, September is the beginning of a resting period. The first indication you may see might be a yellowing tree in the woods.

This is the time of year when anything done in the garden is for the future and must be seen with the mind's eye. This is really the month when using one's imagination is necessary as all the planting that is done currently will have no present effect. All the beauty that will result will come much later and be the ultimate reward for effort now.

According to Indian lore, September is the Hunting Moon. In the medieval calendar of the seasons, this is the season of vintage and the flower for the month of September is morning glory.

The Chinese flower calendar lists the mallow blossom as the flower for this month and claims it is a magic charm against evil spirits. On the other hand, the Japanese flower calendar regards the lovely chrysanthemum as the flower of the month, and in the Victorian "Language of Flowers," which was popular in the 19th century, the mallow sig-

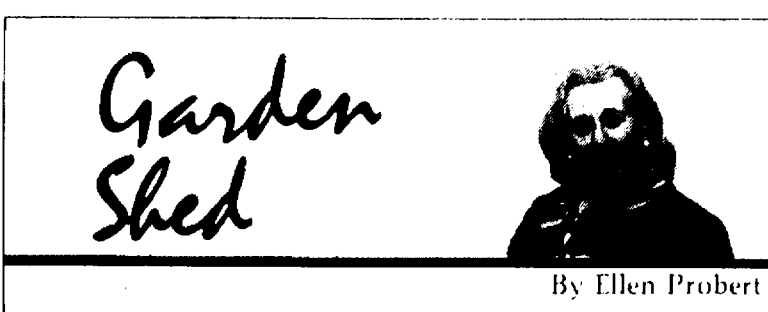
nified gentle affection and the chrysanthemum was the emblem of cheerfulness and optimism.

September was the seventh month of the Roman calendar, but is the ninth according to our reckoning. The Anglo-Saxons called it "gerst monath" or Bardsly Month. A very old country saying is: "Fair on September first, fair for the month. Rain on September first, cloud and rain for the month."

In the Eighth century B.C., the author of a book called "Works and Days" wrote, "When Orion and Sirius come into mid-heaven, and rosey fingered dawn sees Arcturus, then cut off all the grape clusters and bring them home."

Grapes are among the very oldest of cultivated fruits. The Bible tells us that the first thing Noah did after the flood was to plant a vineyard. He soon discovered what to do with the crops he raised. Jacob cultivated his grapevines, and many others of his time had vineyards and wineries.

In ancient Mesopotamia, grapevines were planted in gardens and the vines were swung between trees planted in rows to create arbors which were used for alfresco dining. The book of Esther describes such an occa-

sion in the feast given by King Ahasuerus to his princess.

In Egypt, grapevines were trained over trellises to form a high round mound to be used as outdoor rooms. Pictures of them are found in ancient wall carvings and tomb decorations. Records of grape cultivation appear in Egyptian records as early as 4000 B.C. Soon the round trellises grew larger and became pergolas sometimes very large indeed. They were used as summer living rooms, for entertaining. It is interesting to realize that during the early years of this century the pergola was a most fashionable addition to many estate gardens and was used in exactly the same way as the ancient ones were. Even today, many gardens have small trellises or pergolas upon which grapevines grow, and echo of the great hall of pillars at Amarna

where the ceiling represents a vine covered pergola roof.

Although the Romans grew many kinds of fruits, and were experts in the art of grafting, the most important fruit, the one that played a large role in the advancement of the Roman Empire, was the grape.

Pliny said that Italy opened up its hills and plains to the triumphal entrance of Dionysus between 130 and 120 B.C. and from that time on the process of grape growing has continued without interruption in Italy.

By the first century A.D., Pliny declared that the 80 best qualities of wine made in the whole world, Rome made about two thirds. Wine was exported from Rome to as far away as India. One reason for the growth of Rome's prestige as a city among Italians and foreigners, was because the best wines were to be

had there. This of course brought increasing wine commerce and wealth, and much of the new money went into the cultivation of more vineyards, and of gardens in general.

In the Middle Ages, grape growing and wine making were important sources of income for many monasteries, as were the herbs gardens and the compounding of medicines from the herbs.

The earliest settlers in this country found wild grapes and varieties of grapes which they had not seen before. One of the first shipments of the Massachusetts company to New England included grapevines for wine-making. These along with the new varieties that were already

here, provided the start of the American wine making industry.

One of the most attractive uses for grapevines in our contemporary world is their use for makings ornamental wreaths. These carefully wound, almost woven wreaths may be seen on many front doors. The wreaths are embellished with flowers, pods, cones, ribbons or grasses to suit the whim of the owner or the season of the year. In the ancient times grapevine wreaths were considered a protection from evil spirits.

Who knows? That might even be true now. In these violent times, we need all the protection from evil we can get — and grapevine wreaths are vastly ornamental anyway.

West opened the Queen of Hearts! Declarer paused ever so long and played low from dummy. East signaled encouragement with the Heart eight! This, I suggest, was an experienced play by East who had immediately concluded that it was likely South didn't have much of a Heart holding. Eve therefore had reasoned that a likely deception was being perpetrated and cooperated to the fullest extent. West then continued with the Heart ten and again declarer played low while East completed the echo by dropping the Heart Deuce. Now West, sure the visual fallacy had been established in South's mind, played the Heart three and again a sprawling pause. Finally a third low Heart from dummy as South, it seemed, expected to hang up East's ace. To declarer's noted surprise Eve produced the Jack and quietly shifted to her Spade seven! More fidget and fuss by South who was now accompanied by dummy too. The Spade nine was inserted and this lost to West's Queen! The Heart ace and three plus East's Spade ace gave the defender's seven tricks for a coup de grace sensational set. When the score was unfolded the mortified North and discombobulated South had the only minus on the board.

Declarer must have been a terrible player you conclude. Hardly. They won the event handsomely with a magnificent 106 score on an 84 board average.

You decide for yourself; was it spectacular defensive execution or poor declarer play? Likely both, but before you judge too harshly, remember the world's greatest players have made similar errors. Over sixty percent of the time there is a given lead that will beat a given contract. Add to that the defense's ability to contrive a believable imagery and even the finest declarer can be hoodwinked. West's lead was creative, but Eve Perk's coup de illusionary carding was truly master crafted and to be commended.

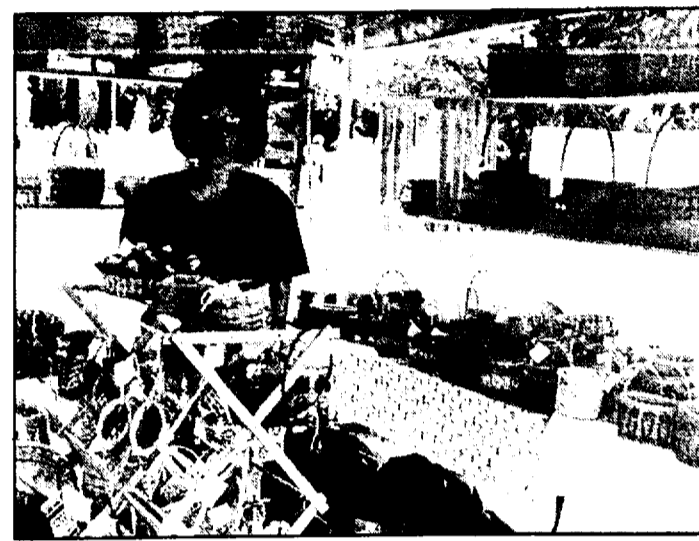

# Buhl races to SAAB championship

Robbie Buhl may not be the fastest driver in America, but he's established perhaps the quickest time for closing out the race for a national championship.

Buhl, 25, of Grosse Pointe, captured the Barber-SAAB Pro Series championship with a dominating flag-to-flag win at Sears Point International Raceway on Sept. 10.

In its four years, the Barber-SAAB series has never been determined before the final race. Buhl changed all that, however, when he rode his Copper and Brass Sales Inc. car into the winner's circle in race 10.

"I'm very glad it's over," said Buhl, who's in his second year of SAAB racing. "The pressure was really mounting, and three days prior to the race I was having some nightmares about how I could screw things up. I was in a lose-everything situation and the other racers could go all out because they had nothing to lose and everything to gain."

"It's nice to have the championship over with with two races to go," continued Buhl.

Buhl won't develop ulcers this season because his worries subsided once he took his sixth checkered flag.

"I looked back to see who was behind me," recalled Buhl, "and I didn't see anybody. I knew I had pulled in front of the pack, but when I crossed the line, I couldn't believe it (the run for the championship) was over."

At this point, Buhl is approximately 65 points ahead of second

place Justin Bell of England.

Buhl, who almost checked out of the SAAB series last year due to frustration and lack of success, will also collect a \$100,000 enhancement scholarship from Barber-SAAB.

"The money is nice, but the championship will take me a lot further," he said. "It's a great piece of information to put on my resume."

The check, which he hasn't collected yet, will also help re-establish a depleting bank account.

"The money will help get me back to square one," he said. "I've gone out on a very expensive limb to race. I over extended myself last year, so now I may have some breathing room. Right now I know I'll put most of it back into racing, but perhaps not all of it."

Buhl, whose expenditures to race this year exceeded \$80,000, got some of that back by earning a SAAB-record \$64,500.

"That's considered very good money for support series racing," Buhl said. "Spending a lot of money, well, that's the nature of the business. It's brutal, but you begin making more money when you're at the top level (Indy)."

For now, though, Buhl will ride the final two races as the champion; something he's worked extremely hard for.

"If you don't qualify in the top four spots, your chances of winning a race are slim," said Buhl. "This year's racers were perhaps the best the series has seen in its four years. I don't know what you contribute it (championship) to, but I'd have to say Lady Luck had something to do with it."

Lady Luck, perhaps, but plenty of skill, too. Buhl set all sorts of records during his magical season. In 10 races, he has the most wins (6), most consecutive wins (5), most poles (4), most poles won in a row (4), and most points (191).

"There's been many champions, but nobody's really done it with the records, as well," said Buhl. "It's just been a great year for me, and if you look at what's happened to me, I think I've paid my dues. I'm the champ, but there's still a long way to go."

Buhl would like to race in the Indy, but for now he'll concentrate on one of two options.

"What we'll look for is either to race in the American Racing Series, or the International Motor Sports Association," Buhl said.

Under the ARS, Buhl would own and operate his own team. Under the IMSA, he'd become part of a team, generally called factory drivers and supported by large corporations.

"If the deal was right at this time, I'd be a factory driver," Buhl said. Factory drivers are essentially employed by the sponsor.

Buhl is still looking for a sponsor before the 1990 season begins in March, but first he's waiting for the championship to settle in.

"With something like this, I hope I've created more opportunities for myself," said Buhl. "The money is great and the championship is great, but I still have a lot to learn. Championships are rare, and this one has yet to settle in."

# Devils win with wild West show

South senior Z-back Jim West takes a lot of razzing for his method of suiting up before a game, but after his outstanding display at L'Anse Creuse North Sept. 15, the team may begin to believe in his unique ritual.

West, who collected 206 total yards and ran for two touchdowns, provided enough spark to carry the Blue Devils to their second consecutive Eastern Michigan League win, 35-10, over the Crusaders.

South remained unbeaten (2-0) and in first place in the Eastern Michigan League, and improved to 2-1 overall.

"Every game I just try and do the same thing beforehand," said West. "I wear the same shirt, the same boxers and the same socks. It's superstitious, but it's worked for me."

So has getting dressed at home.

"I come to the locker room with everything on except my shoulder pads," said West. "I get dressed in my room, not to any particular music, but I get ready by dressing in my room. The guys have always kidded me about it, but that's just the way I am."

West's career game was highlighted by 49 yards rushing, 29 yards receiving, 33 yards in punt returns and 95 yards in kick returns.

"This was a great game for me," said West, "but more importantly it was a great game for the team. I don't know if I'm going to play college football, so this is the type of game I want to go out with."

West, whose 60-yard touchdown on the second play of the game was negated by a penalty, erased the Crusaders' 3-0 advantage by sprinting for a 49 yard touchdown in the second quarter. Jason Weissert booted his first of five extra points, giving South a 7-3 lead.

"One of the reasons we moved Jim to the Z-back spot this year was to get him the ball more in

the open field," said South coach Jon Rice. "One of Jim's best attributes is his speed in the open field."

Late in the first half, the South defense, which held the Crusaders to 159 yards, forced a punt. West dropped back to receive the kick and returned it 25 yards to the North 38-yard line. 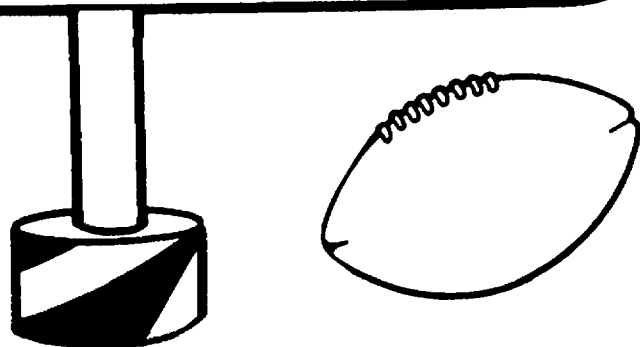

Five turnovers and Utica Eisenhower's Mickey Narush proved too much for the North football team to overcome as it dropped its first game of the season, 41-12, to the Eagles.

North, which had won its previous two games and still leads the White Division of the MAC at 1-0, has yet to beat Eisenhower in its four meetings.

"We really got a slap in the face," said North coach Frank Sumbera. "We were our own worst enemy with five turnovers, but we also gave Narush too much room to run."

"Marc played a good ball game," said Sumbera.

North held Narush through the first quarter, but after that it was the Mickey Narush show.

"The first quarter ended 0-0 and that's the kind of game I expected," said Sumbera. "Even though it was raining, I didn't think we'd commit five turnovers and continuously put their offense on the field. If Narush isn't out there, then he can't score."

But he was. Narush took off on touchdown runs of 60, 45 and 1 yard to give Eisenhower a 21-0 cushion at the half.

"When we were down 14-0, we were looking for a ball control situation to try and tuck a touchdown in before the half," said Sumbera. "But things turned on us with another interception."

North quarterback Scott Bernhardt, who completed eight passes for 73 yards, was intercepted for the third time late in the second quarter, leading to the Eagles' final touchdown of the first half.

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## Staying active with arthritis

As we run headlong into September, most of us ponder our fitness goals for the chilly fall and frigid winter. For some, however, there is the added constraint of what is commonly called their "rheumatism."

Throughout the centuries, people have been handicapped to varying degrees by rheumatoid arthritis and osteoarthritis. These are both forms of a rheumatic disease process. There are almost 100 forms of this disease, but the following article will focus on the two mentioned above.

Almost everyone has some pathologic abnormality in

their weight bearing joints by age 40 or 50. Basically the normal state of supportive and connective tissues in the joints is disturbed and often destroyed. So, how does one have fun and stay fit as this progresses year after year?

### Rest or not?

For years, physicians have prescribed certain exercises and activities with the goal of preserving joint function (range of motion). A certain focus had also been on non-stress muscle toning or strengthening.

The caution here was avoiding activity and encouraging rest during any "flare up" of arthritis. There has been more recent positive support, however, for dynamic movement and aerobic exercise.

More and more patient group studies have shown that regular aerobic exercise does improve one's cardiopulmonary endurance with very little risk to the arthritic condition. To be sure, rest at the appropriate time is essential. However, if one can improve his or her stamina (daily functional capacity) there will be much more enjoyment in life.

### The case gets stronger

Depending on who you consult, the experts' response may be that, "the jury is still

out," on the benefits of aerobic exercise.

Fortunately, there is mounting evidence that low to moderate exercise participation can result in improved aerobic capacity — physical endurance with no harm to the joint systems. A recent study at the University of Michigan involved rheumatoid arthritis patients with bicycle conditioning. The aerobic capacity improved with the entire group.

In many cases there was a decrease in the severity of the disease, i.e., reduction in the number of painful or swollen joints. Another group from Sweden was able to show the benefits of aerobic exercise with RA patients several years ago. Here, the patient group experienced improvements in oxygen endurance, muscle strength as well as decreased joint pain in half the subjects.

Dr. Samir R. Yahia, chief of rheumatology at St. John Hospital, supports the approach of sensible aerobic exercise.

"We always recommend exercise for our patients, but there needs to be a judicious use of it. Patients will often confuse exercise and exertion," said Yahia. "They often think that exertion, like going up and down the stairs and repetitive chores, are ade-

quate enough.

Needless to say, this is not beneficial aerobic exercise.

"We do want our patients to avoid vigorous exercise that can cause undue stress to the joints and orthopedic system," added Yahia. "Our focus is to preserve range of motion in all joints, achieve improvements in conditioning and build muscle strength. We recommend healthy walking, swimming and range of motion as most beneficial with the arthritic patient."

### First things first

As with all exercise programs, proper screening is very important.

The individual should know the current status of their rheumatic disease and review this with his or her physician. There are certain commonalities with the rheumatoid arthritis and osteoarthritis patient. These include:

- Most patients have a poor aerobic capacity due to inactivity as much as the disease itself.

- The patient's cardiovascular endurance can be improved by participating in a supervised low to moderate intensity program.

- The aerobic exercises can be performed without having a damaging impact on the joints.

In many cases an exercise tolerance test (stress test) may

be indicated. This test can be modified depending on joint mobility. This is intended to also help reduce the risk of joint complications or unexpected cardiac events. Now that you have reviewed these systems carefully with your physician, the green lights are on.

A gentle strengthening and warm-up routine, five to 10 minutes, is always recommended for a safe beginning. Start your sessions with a 15-20 minute duration during the first couple weeks, after that you can extend it to 30-40 minutes. A regular schedule of these exercises three to four times a week is essential for any cardiopulmonary improvements. An intensity or exercise heart rate of 60-75 percent of maximum capacity, based on the stress test, is a key to healthy conditioning.

Finally, using the same stretches to cool down and maintain flexibility is as important as the warm up.

A word of encouragement during the initial weeks: there may be some aching in the arm and leg muscles, but it should not require altering or stopping your program. If joint pain does last longer than one hour after exercise, you should curtail that activity until the pain subsides.

### Keep moving

A final point here is selecting the appropriate type of exercise activity. It is essential to avoid any high impact or punishing weight bearing activity. Any hard jogging or high flying calisthenics should be avoided.

Running may indeed aggravate any pre-existing osteoarthritis of the knee joint. However, there is still no evidence that it can cause or initiate the disease.

The very low to moderate impact choices might be swimming, bicycling, rowing or simply fast walking. Most of the force or impact across a joint comes from the muscle contracting. That force will not usually damage normal joints.

Because of the stress impact concerns, proper footwear is vital. One should wear a stable shoe with a built-up heel and firm heel counter. A wide sole and a cushioned mid-sole is also important.

Whatever you do, enjoy and relax with it.

## Nutrient teamwork

You don't often see a winner who works alone. Even in the sports that we may consider "lonely," such as swimmers, track stars and marathon runners, there is usually support given, whether it comes from family, friends, coaches or sponsors.

Few people achieve success through their sole efforts. The body, also, requires a lot of team work for building, repairing and renewing its bones and tissues. Many nutrients are involved in this complex process and seldom do they work alone. Merely knowing the individual value and purpose of a single nutrient does not give a total picture of the benefits of nutrient consumption.

Over the past 40 years science has given special attention to the way nutrients help each other and work together to achieve the ultimate benefits.

It is important that we get the best nutrition possible from the foods we eat. Often times, we focus our attention on calorie consumption, whereas the body is mainly interested in nutrient intake. Sometimes, even though we may be making a conscious effort to eat healthful foods, we

could be shortchanging our bodies because of our lack of understanding. The body requires six essential nutrients to not only survive, but thrive. They are: vitamins, minerals, water, proteins, carbohydrates and fats. The efficiency with which the body utilizes certain nutrients is often determined by the simultaneous presence of other nutrients.

When some nutrients combine with others, it becomes much easier for the body to digest, absorb and utilize that nutrient. Calcium, the most abundant mineral in the body, not only helps build strong bones and teeth, but it also helps regulate the heart and assists in blood clotting.

Because of the increased concern over the last decade about the development of osteoporosis, the sales of calcium products have skyrocketed. But without the key ingredient of vitamin D, it is difficult for the body to receive those benefits of calcium that are so important to the body.

The best source of calcium is dairy products — milk, yogurt and ice cream. They are foods that are not only rich in calcium, but they also contain vitamin D, (if

made with fortified milk), which helps calcium pass through the cells of the small intestine and into the bloodstream. Broccoli, oranges and salmon, (with the bones) are also good sources of calcium, but without vitamin D their calcium is not easily absorbed by the body.

The calcium in spinach, another good source, is even more difficult for the body to absorb. Spinach contains substances called oxalates, which bind with calcium so the body cannot absorb it. Therefore it is a good idea not to rely solely on these foods for calcium supply.

Those who are restricting dairy products consumption, due to allergies or while on a restricted diet should consider supplemental calcium to ensure adequate intake of this vital nutrient.

Iron, another important mineral, heightens the oxygen-carrying capacity of the blood,

helping us feel energetic. Middle-aged women often have a difficult time replenishing their supplies of iron. And often, eating iron-rich foods alone does not accomplish that purpose. But by consuming foods rich in vitamin C along with iron-rich foods at the same meal, the body is able to absorb the iron more easily.

Here are a few examples of food combination that will give you good sources of iron and vitamin C.

When you eat liver, clams, oysters, lean beef, sardines or shrimp, include sections of grapefruit, a dish of strawberries or orange slices on the side. Accompanying vegetable selections could include one or more of the following: cauliflower, brussel sprouts, broccoli, turnip greens, tomatoes, green peppers, cabbage or collard greens.

These combinations will afford you high concentrations of iron along with the necessary vitamin C to make the most of

what you are eating. Calcium and iron are only two of the many nutrients that benefit from nutrient interaction. There are many others.

Science continues to isolate and explore these micro-miracles called nutrients. Being aware of these discoveries will enable us to improve our bodies' health through the total use of these nutrients. And you don't need a degree in nutrition to understand or put into practice the concept of nutrient blending and balancing. The key to a healthy diet is variety from all six basic nutrient groups. The number one nutrient is water followed by (alphabetical order, not necessarily importance), complex carbohydrates, fats, minerals, proteins and vitamins.

If we are eating from 1) a variety of foods, and 2) good, basic sources of those foods, that have not been over-processed we will easily meet our daily requirement for all of the basic nutrients intrinsic to our good health.

The following menu plan is just one of hundreds that will insure you with the necessary nutrients to a healthy and happy body:

### Breakfast:

- 1/3 cup dry oat bran cooked in 3/4 cup water (complex carbohydrate)
- 1/2 grapefruit or 1 cup strawberries (fresh) (complex carbohydrates)
- 1 egg or 1 ounce substitute cooked in vegetable spray (protein)

### Lunch:

- Large salad made from fresh lettuce, (the darker, the better) cauliflower, green peppers and red tomatoes, parsley or endive, (let your imagination and taste buds roll) (complex carbohydrate)
- 4 ounces chicken, (broiled or baked dry) or substitute shrimp, crabmeat or tuna in place of chicken. (protein)
- a slice of whole wheat bread, can also be rye or 7-grain bread types.

### 3-4 p.m. snack:

- 1 cup plain yogurt, mixed with 1/2 to 1 cup fresh fruit slices, such as peaches, apples, blueberries or raspberries

### Dinner:

- 4-5 ounces cooked fish or lean piece of beef (protein)
- small salad, see above description (complex carbohydrates)
- 1-2 cups cooked vegetables medley of squash, peppers, onions, mushrooms, carrots and broccoli (complex carbohydrates)
- 1 cup fresh pasta or brown rice (complex carbohydrates)

### Dessert:

- Fresh fruit, such as an apple or orange, pear or banana, with 2-3 thin slices of a low-fat cheese.
- If you choose fresh food products, drink eight glasses of water per day, and make sure that you are choosing from a variety of foods you cannot help but make sure that your intake of vitamins and minerals is safe and adequate.

Bon appetit.

## Learn safety before exercising

Exercise should be a fun and enjoyable experience providing we take some safety precautions that both anticipate emergencies and minimize risks.

To lessen your chance of injuries, be sure to include a proper warm-up at the start and a proper cool down at the finish of each exercise session. Learn skills on a progressive basis; master easier skills before attempting advanced ones.

When starting an activity, if at all possible, take instruction from a qualified person to learn how to do it safely and correctly. Know the hazards that might be associated with a particular activity or sport including your physical and mental limitations as well as the limitations of your equipment.

Before starting, consider potentially dangerous situations. Temperature and weather conditions may change dramatically in a short period of time. Take clothing that can help you meet these changes. Try to stay away from high traffic areas; this will help reduce your risk of possible injury. When jogging and cycling, plan water stops; if none are available, be sure to take water with you. Take some protection for your skin and eyes and, if applicable, a small first aid kit.

Carry some identification, including the name of someone to call in case of an emergency. If you have a medical condition that requires special treatment, wear a tag to indicate what it is. Always carry a small amount of money so you can make a phone call if necessary.

Water activities remain popular, despite the weather changing. They can be very enjoyable and safe with a few simple rules. Before skiing or sailing, learn to swim well enough to remove yourself from danger and always comply with recommended safety rules. A variety of organizations offer lessons in basic water safety and swimming skills for individuals of all ages.

Boaters should take a safety course. The Coast Guard and many boat clubs offers these courses each year. Additionally, the American Red Cross offers instruction in basic canoeing and boating.

Here are some safety suggestions for other activities:

- Bicycling: always wear an approved helmet; make sure your bike is in good repair; inspect your bike each time before riding; learn to make simple repairs that might be necessary; and always follow the road's rules. White is the universal distress signal for cyclists, also,

carry a white cloth with you in case you require assistance.

- Walking/running: use well-traveled paths; for personal safety to avoid attack, vary your routine frequently; run or walk with someone or in a group; wear reflective or bright colored clothing when exercising during times of low visibility; let someone know where you will be and when you expect to return; determine the route you are going to take before beginning.

- Swimming: never swim alone; do not dive when you are unsure of the bottom surface;

swim on guarded beaches and obey lifeguard warnings regarding water conditions; do not overestimate your abilities.

With millions of Americans participating every day in sports and physical activities to enhance their health, extending common courtesies and assistance when needed will help everyone have a pleasant and safe experience.
