All plants are of a size considered suitable for planting out in final position. Trees may be available in any size from a whip to a standard. Perennials, grasses and ferns may be available in 9cm pots or in 2, 3 or 4 litre pots. The prices in the catalogue are appropriate to the plant size considered most likely to be on sale during 2011 and they may vary accordingly. Prices for some plants may appear inconsistent; this is due to the size of the plant. In some cases it may be appropriate to plant small plants, particularly where large groups are needed. It may be possible to provide small plants of some perennials. Please telephone to check availability.

<b>Acacia baileyana</b> <b>'Purpurea'</b> AGM	Beautiful form of Wattle with finely bipinnate fern-like foliage. New foliage is deep purple contrasting with the glaucous older leaves. Only hardy in the most sheltered garden, but a good conservatory plant.	<b>£12.75</b>
<b>Acacia dealbata</b> AGM	Fast growing evergreen with cheerful clear yellow flowers en masse in late winter and early spring. Feathery, fresh green foliage. Hardy in a sheltered position in many of the southern counties. To 10 m.	<b>£16.50</b>
<b>Acacia pravissima</b> AGM	Arching shoots densely set with bright green triangular leaves. Yellow flowers in spring. Hardy in a very sheltered garden.	<b>£12.75</b>

<b>Acorus gramineus 'Ogon'</b>	Graceful arching grass-like plant with unusual one-sided tufts of foliage brightly striped gold and cream. Compact to 12 inches.	<b>£5.75</b>

<b>Aesculus - Horse Chestnut</b>	Easily grown handsome foliageed trees with tall upright flower panicles.

<b>Aesculus x neglecta 'Erythroblastos' AGM</b>	New growth carmine red turning shrimp-pink then green. Slow growing.	<b>£19.75</b>
<b>Agapanthus - Blue African Lily</b>	Mostly originating from South Africa, these lilies look exotic and extravagant in a border or in a tub. Stout stems support bunches of blue or white tubular bells well above rosettes of glossy green, strap-like foliage.	
<b>Agapanthus 'Jack's Blue'</b>	Deep purple-blue flowers from July-October on 1.5m stems. Vigorous from producing many flowers each season. Hardy.	<b>£6.75</b>
<b>Agapanthus 'Purple Cloud'</b>	Large form with deep purple flower heads.	<b>£6.75</b>
<b>Agastache mexicana 'Red Fortune'</b>	Feathery spires of fiery red flowers produced all summer.	<b>£3.50</b>
<b>Agastache 'Raspberry Summer'</b>	Low-growing Korean Mint with raspberry red flowers set in darker red calyces - very effective and a lovely colour!	<b>£2.75</b>
<b>Agastache 'Summer Glow'</b>	Pale apricot-yellow flowers set in dark purplish calyces - a most striking contrast! Low-growing and aromatic. 12ins.	<b>£2.75</b>

<b>Allium sphaerocephalon</b>	Deep garnet coloured dense globular heads, 1 inch diameter, on wiry stems to 2ft. July and August. Beautiful for its intense colour, easily grown and loved by bees.	<b>£3.75</b>

<b>Amelanchier 'Ballerina'</b> AGM	Abundant racemes of large white flowers are produced in spring amongst bronze-tinted new foliage. Brilliant red autumn colour. <b>Amicia zygozeris</b>	Tall stems shoot up from the base furnished with lush bright green leaves that emerge from between purple-veined stipules. After a hot summer, yellow pea flowers flushed purple are borne in the leaf axils. To 6ft in a sheltered, sunny spot.	<b>£6.75</b>
<b>Ampelodesmos mauritanica</b>	A large, evergreen clump of arching, bright green leaves, bold and imposing to 5ft. Hardy and easily grown, even in dry soils .	<b>£4.50</b>

<b>Anemone hupehensis 'September Charm'</b>	Really good pink form with single flowers.	<b>£5.75</b>
<b>Anemone palmata</b>	Creamy yellow flowers rise above divided foliage from April to June. 6ins.	<b>£3.75</b>

<b>Anemone rivularis</b>	White flowers, blue stamens and a metallic blue hue to the back of the sepals. Deep green divided foliage. Flowers in June/July. Prefers moist, humus rich soil. 2ft.	<b>£3.75</b>
<b>Anemone x hybrida 'Honorine Jobert'</b>	Large pure white blooms with yellow stamens. 5ft .	<b>£6.50</b>

<b>Angelica gigas</b>	Stunning display of large purple umbels in late summer. 4ft. Self-seeding biennial.	<b>£4.75</b>
<b>Anthemis 'Tetworth'</b>	A hybrid between <i>A. tinctoria</i> and <i>A. cupaniana</i> with the pure white flowers and grey foliage of the latter and the upright habit	<b>£5.75</b>
<b>Aralia cachemiriana</b>	Large mounds of handsomely divided basal foliage and green flowers in striking umbels on an unusual and very rare large woodland perennial. 4-5ft.	<b>£7.50</b>
<b>Arbutus 'Marina'</b>	(Probably a hybrid between <i>A. x andrachnoides</i> and <i>A. canariensis</i> ). Large panicles of rose pink flowers, beautiful peeling bark similar to the Madrona, robust and easily grown. The origins of <i>Arbutus Marina</i> are not known although it is thought that it was included in a batch of plants sent over from Europe in 1917 for the Exposition in San Francisco. A few plants were propagated by nurseryman Charles Abrahams and on the closure of his Western Nursery in the Marina district of San Francisco, a plant was purchased for the Strybing Arboretum. <i>Arbutus 'Marina'</i> was evaluated as a possible introduction by the Saratoga Horticulture Foundation Inc. The name 'Marina' was chosen to commemorate the location of the Western Nursery and as a tribute to Charles Abrahams.	<b>£19.75</b>
	Smooth, satiny, cinnamon coloured bark, peeling off in rough strips to reveal the smooth pale green under-bark, most resembling the Madrona. It may be grown as a multi-stemmed specimen or trained on a single stem. Foliage is leathery dark green, similar to <i>Arbutus unedo</i> but larger and unfurling with a distinct orange-red blush. The flower clusters are in drooping racemes up to 6 inches long. Each raceme may contain 100 individual rose-red flowers. A tree in full bloom during autumn and winter is a stunning sight. Bright red strawberry fruits are about 1 inch in diameter. <i>Arbutus 'Marina'</i> is easily grown and fairly easy to establish. It is necessary to ensure that the planting site is adequately drained, it will tolerate some lime. Flowers will be produced most prolifically in full sun. Plants have withstood temperatures down to -15 deg. C.	

<b>Arbutus menziesii</b> AGM - Madrona	The Nursery's namesake. Magnificent evergreen tree with large glossy deep green leaves. Bark peels off leaving yellow-pink areas, turns to smooth orange-red in winter. Native of the West coast of America, it grows in abundance and to its finest development, sometimes exceeding 100ft in height in the rich valleys of Northern California. W.L. Jepson describes the Madrona thus: 'No other tree makes so strong an appeal to man's imagination, and wherever it grows one is held by the spell of its crown of flowers and mass of red fruits; its terracotta bark and burnished foliage.' <i>Green above thy scarlet hose How thy velvet mantle shows Never tree like thee arrayed O thou gallant of the glade .</i> Plant in its final site while a small plant as it transplants badly.	<b>£19.75</b>
<b>Arbutus unedo</b> AGM <b>Killarney Strawberry Tree</b>	Small evergreen tree, slow to 20ft. Bark gnarled, dark and shedding. White flowers in autumn, strawberry-like fruit. Plants trained on a single stem as a tree.	<b>£19.75</b>
<b>Arbutus x andrachnoides</b> AGM	A hybrid between A. andrachne and A. unedo and bearing features of both. Beautiful cinnamon-red, slightly flaking bark. Flowers in late autumn and winter.	<b>£24.50</b>
<b>Armoracia rusticana</b> <b>'Variegata'</b>	Variegated form of Horse Radish. Leaves splashed and streaked cream .	<b>£6.50</b>
<b>Artemisia absinthium</b> <b>'Lambrook Silver'</b>	Fine, very silvery example of the well known medicinal plant, the flavouring of the drink Absinthe, so popular in the 19th Century. Now a valuable silver addition to many planting schemes in full sun with good drainage. 2½ft.	<b>£5.75</b>
<b>Artemisia arborescens</b> <b>'Faith Raven'</b>	Silvery finely cut foliage on a mound forming, quite upright shrubby plant. Evergreen, or should that be ever-silver? Similar to A. 'Powys Castle'. 18ins.	<b>£5.75</b>
<b>Artemisia arbotanum</b> <b>- Lad's Love</b>	Old cottage garden shrub. Planted by a path it releases it's sweet aroma when brushed. Grey-green soft filigree foliage.	<b>£5.75</b>
<b>Artemisia lactiflora</b> <b>Guizhou Group</b>	Handsome clumps of jagged purple flushed leaves topped by strong upright stems bear-ing creamy white flowers. 5ft.	<b>£5.75</b>
<b>Artemisia 'Powis Castle'</b> AGM	Beautiful evergreen filigree silver foliage . Quick growing and very effective. Best results if hard pruned in spring.	<b>£5.75</b>
<b>Artemisia pycnocephala</b> <b>'David's Choice'</b>	Very dense soft and silky dissected silver foliage. Needs a warm drained sunny site. Low growing to 12ins.	<b>£6.75</b>
<b>Arum i. ssp. negl.</b> <b>'Chameleon'</b>	Particularly good form with large shield-shaped leaves having a silvered centre section.	<b>£6.50</b>

<b>Aruncus</b>	Handsome woodland perennials, that also thrive in the shady border. Leaves pinnate, of a fresh green, and flowers creamy white in airy, elegant sprays.	
<b>Aruncus dioicus</b> AGM	Forming a hummock of fem-like deep green leaves, topped by great creamy plumes of starry flowers in summer. Makes a fine specimen. 6ft high by 4ft.	<b>£7.50</b>
<b>Aruncus dioicus</b> <b>'Zweiweltenkind'</b> <b>('Child of Two Worlds')</b>	A more dense, tighter form with an overall brownish tone to the whole plant. As the name suggests, it has an ephemeral, shadowy character, with the whiteness of the flowers, that are produced later than the type, shining against the dark foliage .	<b>£6.75</b>
<b>Aruncus 'Horatio'</b>	A. aethusifolius x A. dioicus. Bronze-tinted elegant foliage and creamy spires. Easily grown, undemanding, sun or shade. 2½ft.	<b>£7.50</b>
<b>Arundo donax</b>	A giant reed with elegant drooping blue-grey leaves on stems to 10 ft. Happy in most soils including very damp. Available in a range of sizes.	<b>£19.50</b>
<b>Arundo donax</b> <b>'Golden Chain'</b>	Leaves striped boldly gold. A unique plant first named by Liam Mackenzie of Madrona Nursery. Leaves striped gold.	<b>£12.75</b>
<b>Arundo donax</b> <b>'Versicolor'</b>	Beautiful variegated form with broad white striped leaves. Only hardy in the warmest gardens but makes a wonderful specimen plant in a large container. 6ft	<b>£9.75</b>
<b>Asarum europaeum</b>	Glossy rounded leaves and a curious brown flower, much like an insect. Good for ground cover in shady positions. Invaluable under shrubs.	<b>£5.75</b>

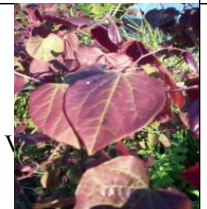

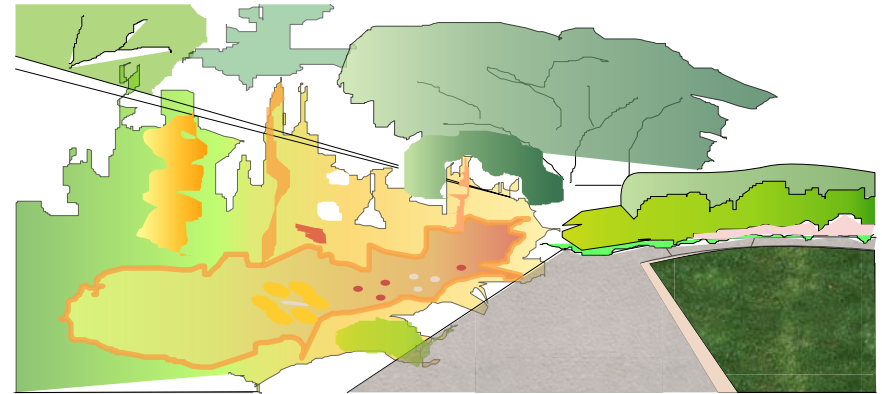

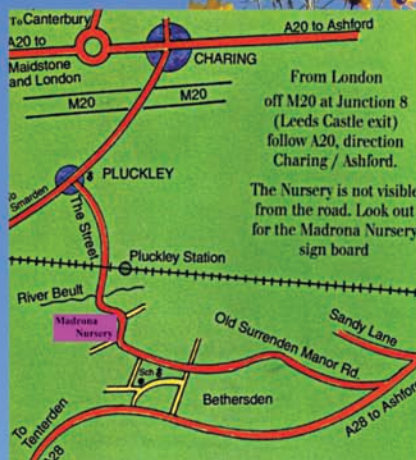
