#### OBITUARY

Dr. G. L. Prince was born in Princeville, Gonzales County, Texas, August 15, 1870. He was a twin brother of the late Dr. Samuel Prince and one of a family of twelve children born to Mr. Samuel Prince and his wife, Sarab.

#### HIS EDUCATION

Dr. G. L. Prince was educated in the public schools of Texas, and he entered the ministerial profession after 29 years career as a school teacher. During this time, he served as president of the Sanjo College for three years, principal of an Indian School in Muskogee, Ohlahoma and principal of a high school in Tulsa, Oklahoma, In the fall of 1944, he assumed the presidency of Mary Allen College a school newly purchased by the General Convention of Texas. Under his administration, Mary Allen College was given Junior rating and later Senior "A" rating with no strings attached. The school rapidly grew under his leadership for he built the school with Christ at the center of his educational program.

#### HIS ELECTION

He was elected president of the National Baptist Convention of America in Chicago, Illinois in 1933. A recent article in the Union-Review, "This Convention was no more than a howling unorganized mob and order could not be obtained." Today this Convention is one that is recognized and respected by churchmen the world over. Dr. Prince organized the Baptist Brotherhood Union, The Junior Women's Convention and the Youth's Convention. These organizations have made a place for themselves in the ranks of Christianity. Today the National Baptist Convention of America raises far in excess of one hundred thousand dollars yearly and makes large contributions to Foreign Missions. Home Missions, Evongelical Work and other Agencies for the good of mankind.

He served as one of the vice presidents of the Baptist World Alliance and traveled extensively throughout America, Europe, Asia and Africa for the Cause of Christ,

#### HIS MINISTERIAL CAREER

Dr. Prince did his first pastoral work in San Antonio, Texas, and fater pastored the First Baptist Church of Tulsa, Oklahoma.

After serving there, he was called to Central Baptist Church at Moskogee, Oklahoma He pastored Francis Street Baptist Church at St Joseph, Missouri for more than ten years. He was the pastor of the Greater Zion Church of Denver, Colorado when he was elected president of the National Baptist Convention of America. Feeling that he could rende: better service to the convention if his church was more centrally located, he assumed the pastorale of the Avenue L. Baptist Church, of Galveston, Texas. He has been the pastor of this church for the last 23 years,



#### HISTORICAL REFERENCE

April 5, 1886, an open letter to the Baptist Clergy and laymen was issued by the Rev Wm. J. Simmons in the American Baptist, asking if we should have a National Baptist Convention to discuss questions of interest to our beloved denomination. At that time the following reasons were given.

- To promote personal piety, sociability, and a better knowledge of each other.
- 2 To be able to have an understanding as to the great ends to be reached by the Denomination.
- To encourage our literary men and women, and to promote the interest of Baptist literature.

4. To discuss questions pertaining to especially the religious, educational, industrial and social interest of our people.

5. To give an opportunity for the best thinkers and writers to be heard.

6. That, united, we may be more powerful for good and strengthen our pride in the Denomination.

Having been solicited to write the Call by many whose names and endorsement are hereunto affixed, the Call is hereby made by their advice and solicitations for said Convention to meet in St. Louis, Mo., August 25, 1886, 10 o'clock a.m., in the First Baptist Church, and the pastor thereof is hereby requested to serve as a Committee of Arrangement with power to select his associates, Wm. H. Steward, Louisville, Ky., and Rev. R. H. Cole, 2600 Goode Avenue, St. Louis are hereby requested to serve as a committee on transportation.

The Chronological report in our National Baptist Committee is hereby corrected, viz.: The parties as they appear below were officers of the Foreign Mission or National Educational Convention as were their predecessors. #### CONSTITUTION

#### THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

We, the members of the Baptist Foreign Mission Convention of America and the National Baptist Convention of America, do unite ourselves together for the purpose of doing Missionary, Educational and all Religious Work among ourselves, and throughout the world, therefore we adopt this Constitution.

#### ARTICLE L-Name

This Body shall be known and styled, "The National Baptist Convention of America."

#### ARTICLE II -- Membership

SECTION 1.—The membership shall be Annual, Orthodox Baptist Churches, District and General Association and State Conventions. If there be a group of churches within a State which has no General Association; or State Convention connected with this Convention, this group of representatives from these churches shall be considered a General Association or State Convention from that State

SECTION II.—Any individual in good and regular standing with a Baptist Church may become a member with full privileges by paying the sum of ten (\$10.00) Dollars.

SECTION III.—Each church shall pay Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars for representation and be entitled to one messenger and Ten (\$10.00) Dollars for each additional messenger.

SECTION IV.—Each District Association shall pay fifty (\$50.00) Dollars for representation and entitled to one messenger and Ten (\$10.00) Dollars for each additional messenger.

SECTION V.—Each General Association and State Convention shall pay One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars for representation and be entitled to five messengers and Ten (\$10.00) Dollars for each additional messenger.

#### ARTICLE III.-Use of Finance

All finance received by the Convention shall be placed into the treasury for its expenses and appropriations, provided that designated money shall be paid as so designated.

#### ARTICLE IV.-Officers

The Officers of this Convention shall be President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Recording Secretary, First, Second. Third and Fourth Assistant Recording Secretaries. Corresponding Secretary, Statistical Secretary, Treasurer, General Auditor, and History

torian. These shall be elected annually, and hold their office until their successors are elected and qualified.

The President of each State Convention and Moderator of each General Association cooperating with this Body shall be Associate Vice President.

#### ARTICLE V .- Duty of Officers

SECTION I.-The President:

He shall be the Presiding Officer: sign all Calls for regular or special meetings: sign all orders drawn on the Treasurer: appoint or cause to be appointed all committees and commissions not elected by the General Body. He may make any visit that will be profitable to the Convention. He is the Chairman of the Executive Board.

SECTION II.—First Vice President:

At the request of the President or in case of resignation, death, or inability of the President to discharge the power and duties of said office, the same shall devolve upon hlm.

SECTION III.—Second Vice President: He shall perform the duties that are carried by the President

and First Vice President when necessity demands.

SECTION 1V.—The Recording Secretary:

This Secretary shall keep a correct record of all the proceedings of the Convention in session, compile and distribute the minutes; prepare and distribute the enrollment cards, draw all drafts on the Treasurer that are countersigned by the President, and make a report to this Body annually.

SECTION V.—The First Assistant Recording Secretary:

This Secretary shall assist the Recording Secretary in making the records of the annual meeting and to do whatever the Body may require through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION VI.—The Second Assistant Recording Secretary: This Secretary shall record the doings of the Committee on Credentials, prepare his records for the minutes and do whatever is required by the Body through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION VII.—The Third Assistant Recording Secretary:

This Secretary shall record the work of the Committee on Finance. He shall keep a record of all finance received into the Convention. He shall report to the Convention as required by the Convention, and do whatever is required by the Body through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION VIII.—The Fourth Assistant Recording Secretary:
This Secretary shall record the work of the Committee on A

This Secretary shall record the work of the Committee on Accounts and Business and do whatever the Body requires through the Recording Secretary.

SECTION IX .- The Corresponding Secretary:

This Secretary shall do all the correspondence of the Convention and Executive Board as directed by the Convention through its President. He shall make his report annually to the Convention.

SECTION X.—The Statistical Secretary: This Secretary shall gather the statistics of the Convention and report same annually, preparing it for distribution.

SECTION XI.-Treasurer:

He shall receive all finance of the Convention and pay or appropriate it as required by the Convention. He shall keep his rec-

ords so as to preserve them perpetually for reference and report annually all receipts and disbursements.

SECTION XII.-General Auditor:

He shall receive and audit all reports of the Board as audited, also the report of the Treasurer of the Convention, each given to him thirty days prior to the annual sitting of the Convention.

SECTION XIII -- Reporter:

He shall give publicity to all the doing of the Convention necessary to be published.

SECTION XIV .- Historian:

He shall act for II Boards and shall keep a correct history of the Convention, report annually, and preserve the history for future reference.

#### ARTICLE VI.-Boards

SECTION I—This Convention shall have the following Boards: Home Mission, Foreign Mission, Educational, Publishing, Evangelical, Benevolent, B.Y.P.U.

SECTION II.—Each Board shall be composed of one member from each State Convention and General Association, elected by the said State Convention and General Association, and approved by the Convention, said election shall be annually.

SECTION III.-Officers: /

The Boards shall have a Chairman. Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer. The office of Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer may be combined.

SECTION IV .- Duty of officers:

The Chairman of Board shall preside at all Board Meetings.

The Recording Secretary of each Board shall keep a true record

of the doing of the Board.

The Corresponding Secretary shall be Secretary-Treasurer of each Board and shall do all the corresponding of the Board, being subject to all its rules and regulations. The Secretary-Treasurer of each Board shall receive and disburse all finance, hold all deeds and other property as the Board may direct, and be governed by the rules and regulations of the Board.

SECTION V .- Management:

The Chairman, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and three other members of the Board shall constitute the Board of Management Each Board shall be subject to the Convention in all it does at recess or during the meeting of the Convention.

SECTION VI.-Reports of Boards:

Each Board shall make its report annually,

SECTION VII.-Duties of Boards:

Mission Board shall have charge of all the Home Misn and Church Extension work done by the Convention.

m Mission Board shall have charge of all Foreign Mission work

The Educational Board shall have charge of all the educational work in the Convention.

The Publishing Board shall have charge of all the publication and publishing Work of the Convention.

The Evangelical Board shall have charge of all the evangelical work done by the Convention.

The Benevolent Board shall have charge of all the business pertaining to the relief of aged ministers and members of the Convention.

The B. Y. P. U. Board shall carry out the work of the B. Y. P. U. of the Convention.

#### ARTICLE VII.-Auxiliaries

SECTION I.—There shall be a National Brotherhood Convention, a Woman's Auxiliary National Baptist Convention, and a Junior National Baptist Convention, Youth National Baptist Convention, all of which shall be subject to the General Body of the National Baptist Convention of America.

SECTION II.—All monies collected at the Annual Session of this Convention by all Auxiliaries, shall be reported and turned over to the Parent Body, along with their bills and expenses, to be voted out by the Parent Body before any disbursements of said auxiliaries shall take place at the Convention.

#### ARTICLE VIII.-Railroad Commission

This Commission shall consist of five members, elected annually by the Convention. It shall have charge of all transportation, transit, and travel, and work harmoniously with the several States, as will best suit the interest of the Convention, and report annually to the Convention.

#### ARTICLE IX - Special Committees

There shall be three business committees appointed by the President to take care of the business of the Convention. The regular Committee shall receive and be responsible for all finance coming into the Convention. The second Committee shall receive and investigate all bills, accounts and recommend the amount of all causes, and after being approved by the President, it shall bring the same to the General Body for adoption before execution. The third Committee shall investigate, if required, all applying for membership into the Convention that the Constitution requirements may not be violated. There shall be a Standing Committee on Orthodoxy and one of Social and Economic Welfare.

#### ARTICLE X .- Executive Board

The Executive Board shall consist of all the elected officers of the Convention, the Chairman and the Corresponding Secretary of each Board. It shall hold its meeting as the President sees it. It is the Board of Management.

#### ARTICLE XI.-Annual Meetings

This Convention shall begin its meeting Wednesday before the second Lord's Day in September and close the following Sunday

night. The place shall be selected by the Convention in session. The Executive Board shall have power to change the time and place when the necessity demands, informing the Convention of the same.

#### ARTICLE XII.-Amendments

This Constitution may be altered or amended at any time necessary by a majority vote of the Convention.

#### ARTICLE XIII.-Salaries

The Salaries of officers shall be as follows: President \$2,500.00-First Vice President, \$150.00: Second Vice President, \$125.00: Secretary \$250.00: First Assistant, \$75.00; Second Assistant, \$50.00: Third Assistant, \$50.00: Fourth Assistant, \$50.00; Corresponding Secretary \$75.00; Treasurer, \$275.00,

#### BOARDS

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#### PRESIDENT'S LAST ANNUAL MESSAGE

To First Vice President. Dr. Pettaway Second Vice President. Dr. Sams Presidents of the Auxiliaries Officers. Members of the National Baptist Convention Of America. Greetings:

Through His mercy and by the wise providence of God, I am now permitted to bring to you my 23rd annual address on this 76th annual session of the National Baptist Convention of America.

As we meet here in this historical city of Richmond. Va. let all of us who were with this convention 23 years ago, let our minds run back and see the mighty host who started with us at that time but are now gone to meet the Great Judge of all the earth.

Many who met with us last year in Chicago, have gone to give an account of their stewardship during their sojourn while here on this earth. Let us be mindful, many of us here today will not be allowed to meet this convention again, we too will have gone to give an account to our Master.

We meet today in a very troubled world, a most challenging hour, nations against nations, crime, murder, robbery, assault, liquor and juvenile delinquency all are at their zenith. In spite of all our new inventions and comforts there still remains the devastation and sin never before witnessed in the history of the world.

We meet at a time when men live and boast in vain glory, when man lives in his vaunted pride, when he boasts of his physical power. We are living at a time when man feels that he has captured the physical universe. A time when man has been able to unravel many of the deepest mysteries, at a time when he has pushed back the foot hills of ignorance and solved the most intricate problems. We are living in both an atomic age and an electronic age, for all this, man lives and rejoices.

Let us not be mislead in the great accomplishments of civilization in the world today, this is not the Supreme need of the world. The world's chief lack is not in material goods, but abundant Spirit Life. The men and women who stand in God's presence should carry the consciousness that we are not speaking for ourselves but that we are speaking for God, and with the authority of God.

Unfortunately men's hearts and minds all over this nation are disturbed as never before over the "Civil Rights" issue. Remember God that made the world and all things therein . . . hath made of one blood all nations of men to dwell on all the face of the earth, and hath determined. ALL MEN ARE BROTHERS. This is not a statement of a pious hope nor an idealistic goal. It is the statement of a fact, when men fail to act as brothers they violate the laws of God, regardless of race color or creed. Men who deny true kinship with their fellowmen, and that means all men, find themselves at odds with their own destiny.

It is the purpose of God to make our personal character approximate our high calling in Christ Jesus, which means that holiness is obligatory upon every one of us who has been redeemed. When we have truly been redeemed, regardless of public epinion or, any other opinion, we are willing to rightly interpret the teachings of the New Testament and be guided by the Holy Spirit.

True Christians are the guardians of the truth that all men are the sons of God and cannot but be brothers, hence they should sense the true significance of Man's "inalienable rights" to life. liberty, his right to live in peace and dwell in safety. They would realize that there is a standard set by God's creative love that men are each others brother. Men are not tools for other men. What serves one at the cost of others welfare cannot be the will of God who loves them all.

Remember Christ died for us that He might live in us. Men who profess to be Christians ought to live and act like Christians. The appalling conditions under which we are living now should shame all Christians who have the power to take the Christ stand against it, and fail to do so.

Prejudice is taking a particularly vicious form in the world today. Let us be very mindful less we too, find ourselves filled with it. When we allow our minds and hearts to be overcome by prejudice we suffer wasted potentialities, warped personalities, lowered economic standards, conflicts and tensions which are obstacles to progress. Crime, disease and death itself, are just a part of the price we or any one who allows prejudice to over shadow his heart and mind must pay.

As your President, let me admonish you to take the Christ way. The Christ Way is the right way. Let us as a body of Christian: believers realize the in ercapable responsibility which rest upon us to seek peace, justice and freedom for all mankind. Let us be reminded that our conscience lives not in our own strength or reason, but in the power that comes from God. Impelled by this faith, all our actions will be humble grateful acknowledgment that He has redeemed the world and be can and is able to redeem us.

Spiritual regeneration is the only hope of our world today.

We are not responsible for being a separate group racially speaking from all other groups in the United States of America, neither
are we responsible for the segregation and discrimination imposed
upon us by those who have the power to do it. Even the scientists
declare that all men are one species, and offers no defense for prejudice. In the midst of all this the Negro has thrown out a challenge
to the world. There is not another race on the face of the earth
that has made the progress the Negro race has made in these 91 years
of partial freedom.

Our faith in our own capability is founded on the outstanding achievements the race has made in fields of science, education, economics, architecture, engineering, agriculture, sports and last but by no means least, religion. Time nor space will permit me to name many we know in person that have made enviable records in

these named fields and other fields as well.

The Negro has demonstrated to the world that he has physical and mental ability equal to any other race with the same opportunity. The present cendition through which we as a race are passing should encourage us as a group to take every advantage to assert our claim and right to full status of first class citizens in this country for which our sons have bled and died. The day of "Uncle Tom," is gone for ever

In the out set I mentioned that this was my 23rd year to altempt to bring you an annual message. To give a brief resume of my stewardship during these 23 years, as your president, I think is quite in order. You will please consider facts are just facts and one is not considered being selfish or self-centered in stating true

When I became your president this convention was not a true representative organization, its membership consisted of persons who paid the annual fee of \$5.00. Because of this policy of raising money the convention was unable to meet current expenses, and the convention was deeply in debt. Its boards were paralized so that they could not do reflective work in their various fields.

God gave me the wisdom to see this could never be a great convention unless its membership was composed of Baptist organizations such as churches, district and general associations and state convention. God be praised, you accepted this plan as a convention, and through your fine cooperation this National Baptist Continuo of America has grown mightily numerically, financially and I hope I can truthfully say spingually.

When I became your president there were only two bodies, the parent body and the Senior Women's Convention. We now have through your cooperation five well organized religious bodies doing work for God. Many of you have not fully accepted some of them, but I am praying that you will fully accept and give them the full

right away in your churches.

It was through and under the leadership of this president that all discrepancies of our membership into the Baptist World Alliance were removed. Each time you have honored your president by sending him to the Alliance, I have seen to it that the heads of the auxiliaries had the opportunity to go and the convention paid their way too, as well as the president, (in spite of the unmerited things that have been said about this president not allowing you certain apportunities in the Alliance. I have given each of you the opportunity you had not had?

Your president was elected to the executive committee of the Alliance and served for 5 years and was then elected as one of the vice presidents. I have served on program in the Alliance three times, was on program when it met in Ohio but the automobile accident prevented my serving.

Your president was on program last year in London, Please pardon me. There is a reason for telling you this. Each time the Alliance honored the president of the National Baptist Convention of America,

it was honoring you as well,

As your president, everything has been done that could possibly be done to dignify this convention, not only with world organizations, but above all. I have stressed our supreme obligation to God, in our homes, to our fellowman, and our conduct as we attended these meetings. I have ever stressed it is just as obligatory for an organization to be honest in the sight of God as it is for an individual to be honest.

I have ever spoken out against padded bills, against the idea some seemed to have had that the convention was organized to fatten a few and leave the great cause for which the convention was organized to carry the gospel to the uttermost part of this world, to suffer. Lest we forge? all of us who have had to do with the monies collected in and through this convention and it was entrusted to us and we failed to let it reach its designated source, not-may-be-so, but must give an account to God for our stewardship. That is going to be an awful day for some of us.

A moral life will automatically follow a spiritual life. It is of vital importance that this convention will at all times carry on in such a way that what it does will advance the work of Christianity in the world.

#### OUR EDUCATIONAL WORK

The greatest mistake ever made in fostering Christian education was made in mal-administration which resulted in the lost of Boscobel College in Nashville, Tenn. Hence when this president came to office this convention was not doing any tangible thing for Christian education. I didn't feel it safe for us to undertake the responsibility of trying to operate and maintain another college, so I recommended that this convention make liberal donations to eligible Christian colleges. You acceped the plan and more than 10 different religious colleges have been helped.

As a convention, we must realize the great need for effective moral and spiritual training in education. God and the Bible must be the source and the dynamic back of moral teaching if it is to be effective in building Christian character in our boys and girls. They must be taught with positive emphasis on spiritual living for God.

Under this administration the following organizations have come into being and doing a great work:

The Junior Women's Convention, The Brotherhood Convention, The Youth Convention. The Benevolent Department, All have added tremendously to the work of this convention.

All Christians must be alarmed over the appaling and ever increasing crime wave of our youth today. Your president felt that if youth could nationalize crime, why not give them a chance to nationalize Christ? They can and will if enough time and patience and guidance is given them.

J. Edgar Hoover, director of F. B. I., our best authority on crime says "Major crime in youths went over the 567,000 mark in 1935 in youths below 18 years of age, many even below the age of 15 years,"

There are many contributing factors in JUVENILE DELINQUECY. Parental duties neglected in the home, fathers should be men of prayer and power to properly teach and lead a son or daughter. Mothers are charged with the most sacred trust ever committed to human hands, the molding of precious lives, what patience and tirelessness, what love and tact; what wisdom and wealth of resource a mother needs to do the task that God has assigned to her hands. She should above all, be a praying mother.

Not only are the mothers and fathers responsible for the right example being set before the youth of today, but all Christians are held responsible for making Christ known to human hearts, not by telling only, but by living it daily. The youths need to feel that they are getting advice from those who know and have experienced the

power of God.

God's eyes are on world conditions and He cares with a concern

beyond the understanding of man.

When we read where graft and corruption have stolen their way into city, state and national governments, we have been shocked and our confidence severely shaken, to read the list of betrayers of trust, but this makes us know something of the devastating, demoralizing, and destroying power of the forces of the devil.

#### OUR DEAD

While deeply aware of our loses, for the valiant servants of Christ we as Christians must proclaim with apostle John: Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord from henceforth; Yea saith the Spirit that they rest from their labors and their works do follow them.

#### A CHRISTIAN BODY AND NOT A POLITICAL BODY

This is a Christian organization and I am appealing to you as a convention to keep it so. Political methods of attaining office is no; in harmony with Christian principles. The Holy Ghost should have something to do with the selection of Christian leaders.

Prayer was said by Rev. Mr. Frverson of Florida; the congregation sang, "Stand By Me." led by Rev. E. H. Branch of Kansas City, Mo. Remarks by Rev. C. D. Pettaway; "Blest Be The Tie," was sung. Benediction by Rev. J. C. Sams.

#### APPLICATIONS ACCEPTED

The forms are now ready by means of which religious groups may file claims before the Foreign Claims Settlement Commission of the United States to carry out the amendment approved August 6 1956. Groups that aim to benefit by the revision of Public Law 997 may make their applications from August 6, 1956 to midnight February 6, 1957.

The law was amended to provide for the \$8,000,000 claims being pressed by Representative John W. McCormack of Massachusetts and others in behalf of the Archbishop of Manila. (See Report from the Capital, August, 1956.) To take away the appearance of a sectorian grant, the bill provided for a new six month period of application. Some are predicting that the claims will now be reworked and that they may go much higher. Few Protestant claims are anticipated

According to the Federal Register of August 25, 1956, eligible claiments under the act are now limited to "religious organizations functioning in the Philippines and of the same denomination as a religious organization functioning in the United States which furnished telief as described.

This vocabulary is so broad that it is at present difficult to know where the limits will be drawn. An attempted clarification in the Federal Register says:

"The term 'religious organization functioning in the Philipplnes' for purposes of section 7 (h) of the act, means any church, sect, denomination, religious order or congregation, or any group, body, corporation, association or other entity formed for religious purposes, professing and adhering to the tends of some particular religious feith or form of worship and which maintained under its auspices in the Philippine Islands, on or after December 7, 1941, a church chapel, or other place of divine worship or a religious house, community, mission, convent or facilities for divine worship, or operated a school, dormitory, hospital, disponsary, orphanage or other like institutions under teligious auspices; or any part, division or association of such churches, sects, denominations, religious orders, congregations, groups, bodies, corporations or entities."

The Federal Register defines the vocabulary of the act for administrative purposes, developing the anaequs "Expenditures incurred." "Fair value of supplies used." "Furnishing shelter, food, clothing, hospitalization, medicines, and medical services and other relief.", "Members of the armed forces of the United States.", and other phrases.

The non-American religious organizations in the Philippine Island now face the problem of deciding whether or not to dip into the American public treasury to reimburse themselves for their acts of charity to American troops.

#### GOVERNMENT AND PERSONAL DEVOTION

At 4:1f p.m. on August 30, 1956 Proclamation 3150 was filed, bearing the signature of President Dwight D. Eisenhower and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, setting aside September 12, 1956 as a "National Day of Prayer."

"NOW, THEREFORE, I DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER, President of the United States of America, in consonance with the Congressional resolution do hereby proclaim Wednesday, September 12, 1956, as a National Day of Prayer, on which all of us, in our places of business, in our places of worship, in our homes, and in our hearts, may beseech God to continue to watch over us in our daily lives and in the conduct of our national affairs. Let us also render thanks to Him for the manifold bounties vouchsafed us throughout our history.

"IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Scal of the United States of America to be affixed."

The President has this authority to call the nation to prayer to fact, he was instructed to do so by Resolution of Congress, adopted on April 17, 1952 It is not difficult to imagine a steady expansion of the religious functions of our presidency until we have procheally if not in reality, a head of an 'American church'

It should also be borne in mind that, we now have a new "national motto."

From the House of Representatives record of Monday, April 18

"Resolved, etc., That the national motto of the United States is hereby declared to be 'In God we trust.'

The Senate record on July 23 is langer and explains, in part It will be of great spiritual and psychological value to our coun-

try to have a clearly designated national motto of inspirational quality in plain, popular accepted English."

Few Americans would want to oppose either prayer or a religious slogan and certainly no one in public life would be expected to register such opposition Many Baptists, however, will ask, What do these things mean?" Do people pray because of government proclamations? Do people "trust" because of a national motto" How are these things related to spiritual experience?

If there should be some who admittedly do not trust in Ged nor pray to Him, are they now slightly "un-American" May we now accept these positions as personal testimonies or our legislators and executives? Might we expect to reduce armaments, raise our ethics, or adjust our national policies by virtue of such expressions?

The new motto replaces "E pluribus unum," which was our former motto. We hope our unity is not endangered by the repeal of the motto. Probably not, for the Senate committee said that "few neaple know what it means'

#### U S AND UN

The Promise Vs report to the Congress on U.S. Participation in the UN for 1955 has just been published by the Superintendent of Die meil U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C. Price 79c1

The report tells the story of the year's efforts in the continuing search for peace and records the progress made toward the relief of suffering and the improvements of health and well-being

Many of our readers will be particularly interested in the section describing the work in the fields of human rights and fundemental freedoms. The sections dealing with prevention of crime, the health will be of high peterout.

The 1977 Chair emphasis in the United States is scheduled for October 24th.

#### RELIGION AND POLITICS

The photo-finish race between Senator Kefauver and Kennedy in the Chicago convention was as exciting as any good athletic event Even though a person knew nothing of the strategies back of the score-board and had no knowledge of the game plans, yet the closeness and the speed of the game were exciting.

A wave of editorializing and speculation had been set off some weeks before the convention when the backers of Senator Kennedy decided to use his religion as a major argument for his selection. Kennedy is well known as a member of a leading Roman Catholic family. A report was prepared and released carried in U. S. News and World Roport, August 10, 1956) purporting to show that there is a large "Catholic vote" and that this vote is so located as to constitute a balance-of-power element in the national electorate.

This report took the position that "there is, or can be, such a thing as 'Catholic vota' whereby a high proportion of Catholics of all ages, residences, occupations, and economics status vote for a well-known Catholic candidate or a ticket with special Catholic appeal."

The report also argued that "the Catholic vote is far more inportant than its stumbers-about one in every four voters who turn out-because of its concentration in the key states and cities of the North". In support of this evaluation the authors ascribed the Democratic victories of 1940, 1944, 1948 to this vote, and so also the Democratic defeat in 1952.

A study in the same publication on August 17th showed that the facts are not as simple as the Kennedy backers had painted them. The arm chair political analyst would normally assume that many of the southern delegations read only the first of these reports, but some day a study may show that these facts are not so simple. cither, as they appear.

Do people "vote their religion?" is the question that politicians and writers have sought to enswer, and that is a question which deserves discussion, at least until the nation comes to a better understanding of the numerous meanings possible in that phrase.

If we use the term religion to include the patterns of conviction, of association, and of behaviour which are tied into the person's spiritual commitment, then obviously everyone "votes" whatever religion he has. From this viewpoint A) Smith's attitude toward the liquor industry is correctly seen as part of his 'religion." From this viewpoint, also, we would hope that all Christians have a distinctive way of voting, thereby reflecting their response to the righteousness of God and to the "royal law of love."

The freedom of the democratic process however, meets its tests at the point of interpretation and application. If, in the name of religion, one person is placed under the authority and discipline of anothers person and that discipline is extended to cover points of public policy, then the democratic process has broken down. The

problem then is that the old "votes" not his own "religion" but that of gome one else, under this kind of relationship the millions on go to the voting bacth simply to rubber stamp the "party line,"

Many of the more liberal Roman Catholic writers in the United States are aware of the dangers involved in this "bloc" formation process. One bloc tends to produce other blocs. Hence with one voter cut of four involved in the Roman Catholic positions, a "Roman Catholic bloc" known as such is most undesirable to them. The consolation of viewpoints in their segment of the population, on the other hand, can give opportunity for targining and for "balance-of-power" influence.

The Roman Catholic church has a leng history of political experience and a large body of political pelicy. The adjustments which are currently strategic in the United States are by no means comprenues of that larger or longer record While current situation are not ideal to the Roman church, they are on the path to those ideals and are processly misunderstood. It viewed outside as the context of that church's philosophy and objectives. For a true discernment, then, the American seem must be viewed against the background of Catholic and "Christian front" parties in other name of the world, notably in Europe and in Latin America.

#### AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY NAMES CHAPLAIN JAMES E. JONES

The American Bible Society announces the appointment of the Rev. James E. Jones. Army Chaplain returned from Korea, as Secretary-Elect of the Dallas division office.

In this new ministry with the Society Mr. Jones will give his full attention to distribution of the Bible and the encouragement of its use among the Negro population of Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, and Arkansas

Both Mr. Jones and his wife, fermerly Martha Corter of East Orange, New Jersey, are 1946 graduates of Virginia Union University in Richmond, after which he was the minister of Baptist Churches in Waverly and Newport News. Virginia.

As an Army Chaplain in Japan and Korea Mr. Jones had epportunity to observe the Bible Society's work of publishing and distributing millions of volumes of the Scripture for those countries.

For 140 years the American Bible Society has served the Protestant churches of this country in translating and publishing the Bible and distributing it throughout the world. Since 1945, the Society has also sponsored the annual program of Worldwide Bible Reading from Thanksgiving to Christmas which has had wide participation by churches throughout the United States

A minister of the National Baptist Convention of America. Mr. Jones now concludes his Army duty at Fort Belvoir, Virginia, and begins his new assignment in Dallas June 20, where his work will be closely coordinated with that of Dr. Frank W. Langham, the Society's voteran South-western District Secretary.

We your Committee on Human Relations, beg leave to submit the following as our report:

We are sure that all intelligent persons who get reports of local and world news through the media of the press, the radio, and the television are aware and conscious of the tension of human relations and the critical period through which our social order is passing.

On the international level, our world is divided into two distinct ideologies of government, with the proponents of each ideology feeling and seemingly strongly convinced that his ideology of government is the way to the salvation of the social order and that the other ideology is a sure way to chaos and destruction. Because of these conflicting ideologies and sentiments our world for the past ten years has been involved in what is called a "cold war" which at frequent intervals threatens to burst forth into a hot war and a conflagration which with modern weapons and new inventions of forces of destruction threaten to annihilate the conqueror and the conquered, should such a war blaze forth. Possibly the most vicious product of the cold war has been the propaganda of hate and diabolical representation of one ideology against the other. These things have not only tended to divide men but to pervert and poison men's thinking.

On the national and local level, our nation seems to be going through a social reformation. Labor is becoming more aware of its contribution to production and is determined to procure what it regards as a more equitable distribution of the profit and the wealth of production. On the others hand management seems to inclined to not be willing to make changes from old practices.

For the past two decades minority racial groups have become more aware and more sensitive log injustices and inequilies meels because of race. These groups have not only become aware of these things but have determined to do something about these injustices and inequities through organization and through democratic procedures within the frame work of the Federal Constitution. The Softene Court decision of May 17, 1934 in which segregation in education was ruled as unconstitutional was possibly the climactic achievement of the minority racial groups. There have been varied reactions to the Court decision. While some cell that the decision was the second emancipation proclamation of freedom, others have regarded becourt decision with great album and have reacted with emotional recriminations.

In the light of the international, the national, and local developments and tensions we submit the following statements:

f. That this Convention go on record as allying itself with this groups that strongly believe that the economic, the governmental and national differences and problems of the world can be resolved through furthright and sane arbitration without resorting to force and violence.

This Convention further endorses the idea of the leaders of the nations of the world meeting in conferences and other peaceful meetings in an effort to resolve the problems of the cold war and the problems that threaten world destruction

This Convention also endurses the United Notions as a medium of international indeestanding and of resolving the problems of war and of human relations.

II. In regard to the Supreme Court decision and to national problems that grow out of the decision, the Convention submits the following as guiding principles of action pertaining to Negro educators and Negro leaders: These statements grow out of an official statement adopted at a Conference of Southern Negro Educators in Hot Springs. Ark. shortly after the Supreme Court decision was banded down. The centerence consisted of 64 Negro leaders in education from 14 Southern States and the District of Columbia!

l Negro leaders should be positive and incompromising in the belief and in the conviction that the Suiteme Court decision was right and moral.

2 Negro leaders and Negro organizations should very strongly disapprione and condemn the effort on the part of some leaders in section difficults intiminate Negro teachers and other under threat if loss of jobs if they express approval of the Court's desire and if it is not maintained. Such an effort is but safe if you delive, and contrary the fundamental sense of fair play of the American people.

Negricultures and leaders should not and cannot afford to be a porty to plan designed to nullify the Court's decision. To do fills the constitutional Government This Convention regrets that put officials have sought to persuade Negro educators and othe leaders to evade the decision by agreeing to gate of the convention of the leaders to evade the decision by the officials seeking such computer of principle.

4 NEGRO
COOPERATE FOR DVERALL GOOD OF ALL PERSONS INVOLVED. This Convention wishes to inform public officials that

Negro leaders are fully aware of the fact that both Negro and white are deeply and equally involved in the Court's decision. This Convention further wishes to inform-public officials that many Negroes can contribute sound, intelligent and statesman like techniques for the handling of the inevitable issues arising from the Court's decision. This Convention wishes still further to make it generally known to public officials that Negro leaders are able and willing to serve on boards, committees, and the like with members of the white race in any sincere effort to calmly and peacefully implement the spirit of the Supreme Court's decision for the achieving of first class citizenship for the Negro and for the overall good of all persons involved.

5. THERE SHOULD BE NO FEAR OF AN OVERNIGHT SOCIAL. REVOLUTION. If the schools now serving Negroes - the colleges, the high schools and the elementary schools - are built up to and are kept up to a high level and a comparable quality of efficiency and service in physical facilities and in educational offerings, there will not be, at the present nor for some time in the future, a wholesale rushing of Negro students into other schools, even if all schools are fully and cordially opened to all students without regard to race. The rank and file of Negroes have certain attachments and certain associations that have been built up across the years and that are pleasant and gratifying. There may be a few adventurous and pioneering Negro students, because of the nearness of a school or because of some special feature of a school, who will make application for admission to other schools. These in the light of the American creed and in the light of the basic principles of a Christian democracy should not be denied admission to any school merely because of race or color,

6 The integration of the public schools should not only be the integration of students but also the integration of teachers and other staff personnel. The procurement and employment of teachers should be on the basis of competence and the basic qualities of the good teacher. If this procedure is used, we are sure that a proportionate number of Negro teachers will qualify for employment in the denocrate school.

From the 1934 report from the South Carolina State Department of Education the following facts are significant.

(1) Percentage wise, that is, the radio of teachers to the number of students, the Negro teachers with the baccalaureate degree plus are approximately the same as the white teachers with the baccalaureate degree plus.

(2) The number of white teachers now in the elementary or secondary schools without a baccalaureate degree is 2.038; the number of Negro teachers in the public school without a baccalaureate degree is now 1, 838.

The above facts indicate about the same competence of Negro teachers as of white teachers when measured in terms of academic training.

III. This Convention regrets to note the interruption of our National economy and comfort because of labor strikes. Yet, this Convention feels that the time has fully come when labor through urganization should have a voice in regard to safe places of service, in regard to fair wages, in regard to social security, and in regard to a fair share of the profits that accrue from the sweat of labor along with the investments of management in the factories

Therefore he it resolved that the Executive Board of the National Baptist Convention of America, representing a centificency of that and one holf million Baptists, go on record commending thirty 120 Regro ministers and eighty 1800 or more other Negro feaders for their stand against racial injustices and the use of moral force instead of violence and we further commend the law abiding what citizens of Alabama and in other parts, of the Nation for their financial and moral support for justice in the American Republic form of government; and,

That the Executive Board of the National Baptist Convention of America shall contribute five thousand dollars (\$5000.00) to the property agency of the NAACP for the defense of those militant leader in this case.

The Committee on Resolutions from the Executive Board of the National Baptist Convention

Recommends that this committee or a committee shall be authorized to conduct a drive to underwrite five thousand (5000.00) dollars and that the drive shall end on the little April 1956 - and all funds shall be sent directly to the treasurer of the Convention - Dr. A. A. Lucas, 5109 Farmer Street, Houston, Texas.

Bro. President, Chairman of the Board, Members of the Board of Managers, other members of the Board and friends:

In conclusion I come again to set out a few logical reasons for a uniform program of Evangelism.

#### Jst REASON

The world condition makes it necessary. Every field of human activity is organized for concerted action. Men have learned from experience that in union there is strength. The old proverb, united we stand, divided we fall, applies to Christianity as well as to other movements. Unity is a law of God. It was the burden of Christianity are proved in John 17: "And the glory which thou gaves me I have given them; that they may be one, even as we are one"

#### 2nd REASON

Dissatisfaction with past results in soul to do something different. The most tragic phase of our record is the thousands of churches in our convention that from year to year NEVER report a single baptism

For a Baptist Church to go twelve months without baptising a convert should be sufficient cause for members of that congregation

to put on sack cloth and ashes. Such a thing should sadden the hearts of all who call themselves New Testament Christians. We wonder how many of these churches have pastors. It does appear that any preacher could win one soul to Christ in one year. But the main fault is that there is no soul-winning program in these churches. Plans and programs are as essential in winning souls to Christ as in raising money. When we do not plan to do things usually they are not done. We must do something to make soul winners of our church members.

#### 3rd REASON

In order to train our ministry in methods and technique in evangelism, we need a program, We live in an organized, specialized and highly technical society. The world has new problems, competition is keen. Men must be trained regardless of the field in which they serve if they are to meet competition. The problem of reaching lost people for Christ and then enlisting them in his service in the church becomes more and more difficult. Highly promoted entertainment, such as is found in night clubs, taverns, theaters and the field of sports, attracts both saint and sinner from our church services. Radio and television brings every type of program, religious and otherwise, into our homes. People can stay home now and hear almost any type of religious service they choose.

#### 4th REASON

Because evangelism was first in the program of Christ. What we mean by evangelism is this: Preaching the gospel of Jesus Christ to all men, bringing them to a state of a guilty conscience before God (which is conviction) until they come to a godly sorrow for sin (which is repentance) and confess Christ as a personal saviour (which is salvation) and baptizing them toto the church in order that they might be taught to observe whatsoever things He has commanded them.

Evangelism is the spearhead of attack against the forces of evil in this world. It is the vanguard in the conquest of God's great army against the gates of hell as we try to rescue the deluded victims of Satan and lead them from darkness to light. Evangelism kindles and rekindles the flames of compassion in the hearts of all Christians and especially in the hearts of our preachers, teachers, officers in our churches. Without it, we drift into cold, clammy formalism and ritual that breatness the breath of stagnation and death into church life. If we are agreed on this, then we should give evangelism its rightful place in conventional life. Amen.

#### "WHAT IS REGENERATION?"

#### By-REV, H. H. ROBINSON

Through all Theology and Religion, there runs a clear antithesis between, outwardness and inwardness. In Theology, this shows itself

in the opposition between transcendence and immanence, anthropomoral ism and anomism. It asks, "is God a glorified man or an indwelling potency

Does He operate on nature from without or from within? Should we concentrate our thought and faith on Jesus as the Risen Lor1 the ascended mediator; or on Christ as spirit operating in His church

and in us as believers?

Ought my great concern to be, what am I to do, or what out I to become? The Jew asked of life an action to tell him definitely what to do. The Greek asked not what am I to do, but what am I to be. He wished to become something different.

What distressed him was the feeling that his very being was corrupt and he wanted a religion that would help him to become a

A change of clothing. This metaphor thought significant, is an fully adequate. Clothing is external; regeneration is internal, physical fittingly represent it.

#### NATURE OF THE CHANGE

The change is new. All are agreed as to the newness. The Holy Spirit creates new faculties. A new volition, knowledge feeling, a new self- consciousness. In brief, He produces a new person (Horace Bush-

Life proceeds from a new centre. The Bible is a new book. Duties are new. The very world itself is revealed in new beauty and joy to the mind

This new life therefore, manifests itself in new views of God. of Christ, of sin, of holiness, of the world, of the Gospel and of the

Regeneration is a powerful change wrought in the soul by the working of the Holy Spirit, wherein, a vital principal, a new habit the law of God and a divine nature are put into and framed into the heart, enabling it to act holy and pleasingly to God.

Note that a divine nature is put into the heart. But regeneration is not an addition to nature, or a change in the substance of the roul as in the cure of a man, health is not added to the disease; but the disease is expelled and another form and habit set in its place.

Regeneration is like another and higher will sustaining our. and gradually subduing the whole nature to itself, till the natural life becomes spiritual life, and that which has been started by the Holy Spirit turns all the forces of one's being into a new channel. All the energies that formerly made a man a sinner, are now employed to make him a saint, Such sudden and radical changes in a man's life as those of Paul, may often be led up to by many experiences and thoughts.

But these often culminate in what may be called a violent spiritual and emotional tempest which shakes the whole being to its utmost depths. But when shaken and stirred, it is said that Regentration is the birth of new powers

It is as if there had been the liberation of fresh energy, or as if new streams had flown into one's consciousness. Here is what it is with on a higher plane. It is a process of realizing the possibilities of spiritual growth, which might otherwise have lain dorman always.

As the Spirit of Christ, he carries in himself the power to

diffuse the divine human life and the personal unity is emgloyed for the purpose of propagating the life of the God-man, Jesus Christ, for through the Holy Spirit as the Spirit of Christ humanity is led

Regeneration is the work of the Holy Spirit and it is an instant act. It does not take away from you the old nature, but it sets In motion a new nature, and if cultivated, it is fully capable of conquering the old nature that is within us; therefore regeneration is on act of God's Holy Spirit and a part of God's work which He has set in motion in the heart of man to complete the jub of making

man to become God's son, and to look like His son. As Baptists we believe that when a man is regenerated, there is a movement set in motion so strongly and so definitely, that there is nothing in this world with which he might come in contact that will in no way prevent or stop that movement within. Wherever we find a person who has been stopped by the things of this world. that of itself tell us he has not been regenerated. For when we shall have been regenerated, we can say with Paul. "Who shall separate us from the love of God?"

Shall tribulation or distress or persecution or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or work? Nay, in all of these things we are more than conquerors through Him that loves us. For I am persuaded that neither death nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come nor height nor depth, nor any other creature, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which

is in Christ Jesus our Lord. Romans 8:35-39.

But all of this had its start in regeneration. This world today needs leaders who have been regenerated in whose hearts the movement of love hath been storted.

When the act of regeneration takes place in the heart of man,

it starts him:

1-Thinking like God.

3-He then begins to look like God and everybody who has dealings with him will begin to call him God's Son.

#### REGENERATION -

Regeneration starts man to thinking and he thinks not of himself, but his thoughts are directed to others, thus regeneration opens his eyes to the conditions of his brother, and being regenerated, he is not satisfied and cannot be until something is done about his brother's condition.

Regeneration is a reminder, and everyone who is regenerated

is reminded of the condition of his brother.

When Jesus came to this earth he found every man over board. and we all were drawning. No one could help the other and He (Jesus) stood on shore and saw us. In his hands was a life line, and while we were struggling for life helplessly. Jesus threw out the life line. Man caught it and He pulled him in He was facing Jesus on the shore because Jesus pulled him in But when a man looks Jesus in the face, something happens in his heart, and that something which happened is called Regeneration, and regeneration is a reminder and thus the man pulled in by Jesus remembered his brother, and by having the same life line that was thrown to him by Jesus, he threw that line back to his brother and pulled him in.

The first man was putled in by Jesus and looked into Jesus face. Jesus transmitted Himself into that man and he received the spiritt of the Christ and he began to think like Christ, and to at like Christ, and to look like Christ,

Thus regeneration is an act of God's Holy Spirit. Jesus face the father and the father sent Him. and man faced Jesus. and Jesus sent man. John 20-21

When a man faces Jesus or meets, Jesus, a new creation take place in his heart which starts him acting in a different way, John 1:38:42.

So Regeneration starts in man a movement and that increment in man starts him to acting like Jesus, and he. like Jesus starts looking for man.

Jesus was so interested in man until He became the Son of Man thus Luke says of Him. "The Son of Man came to seek and to say that which was lost". (Luke 19-10). He became man in order to mate man like Himself. The movement of regeneration in man keeps werking until man himself discovers in himself the likeness of the Sor of God. I John 3:1 "Behold, what manner of Love the Father but bestowed upon us that we should be called the sons of God. He keep working and searching for his brother until he makes this decovery and says, "Beloved now are we the sons of God and it doth not yet appear what we shall be but we know that when Is shall appear, we shall be like Him, for we shall see Him as He is

Thus I say regeneration is the act of God's Holy Spirit that has set in motion a movement in the heart of man to complete the job the God Himself hath started in the beginning when He had finished the work of 'creation.

Then He said: "Let us make man" Genesis 1:24.

Thus by Regeneration only can men become the sons of Ged

Box 23 - Eola, Texas

## 1. What does the Bible say about Negroes?

Nothing The nearest it comes to mentioning Negro is to name Saul, Barnahas. "Simeon that was called Niger" and several other as prophets and teachers in the church at Antioch. Niger meast nothing in the Bible to show whether Simeon was of dark completion, or of a dark race, or was called Niger for some reason not related to his complexion. Acts 13:1.

# 2. Do all people have the same ancestors?

If we go back far enough they do. Scripture teaches that all descended from Adam and Eye.

## 3. How many sons did Adam have?

Nobedy knows. The Bible names three, Cain, Abel and Seth and says, "And the days of Adam after he had begotten Seth were eight hundred years; and he begat sons and daughters." Gen. 5:4.

## 4. How did different colors of people begin?

The Bible does not say. But in Jeremiah the Bible asks, "Can the Ethiopian change his skin?" Jeremiah 13:23. Today the Ethiopians, beoply of Ethiopia, are Negroes but not all Negroes are of Ethiopia.

## 5. From which of Adam's sons are the Ethiopians descended?

According to Scripture atl the people in the world are descended from Seth. How many other sons and daughters of Adam were also blood ancestors no one knows. Records of mothers were rarely considered. Who were all the wives in the many generations of Seth down to Noah? Gen. 5:6-32; 9:18-19.

#### s. What was the curse on Cain?

The Bible says that he was to be a fugitive and a vagabond and that the ground would not yield well when he tilled it. Gen. 4:10-12. This curse was similar to the curse because of Adam's sin, Gen. 3:17-19.

#### 7. What was the mark on Cain?

The Bible gives no idea what it was except that it was to keep others from killing Cain. Gen. 4:13-15. There is nothing to show that Cain's mark for his protection passed to his descendants

# 8. Who were "the sons of God" and "the daughters of men." Genesis 6:14

The "sons of God" seem to be the men who believe truly in God Job 1/6; 2/1; Hos. 1/2-10; John 1/12; Roman 8/14-19; Phil. 2/15; 1 John 3/1-2.

The "daughters of men" would be all the daughters of the human family taken together without regard to religion, or would be the daughters of men who did not believe in God. The Bible does not say that marriage between "sons of God" and "daughters of men" produced giants. The reading seems rather that glants were fathers of certain "daughters of men" who bore to "the sons of God" certain children who became mighty men of renown.

Either way the point is clear that "the sons of God" sinned in begetting children without regard to God.

#### 9. What was the curse on Ham?

The Bible says that when Noah got over his drunkenness, seeing that his non Ham had wronged him, he cursed Ham's son Canaan, saying "Cursed Canaan; a servant of servants shall he be unto his brethren." Then Noah wished a blessing for Shem and a blessing for Japheth and said of each "and Canaan shall be his servant.

The wording does not say that God cursed Canaan or that God

approved or disapproved Noah's curse. Noah's cursing did not mention Ham's other sons. Genesis 9:20-27.

Canaan became the father of the tribes in the land of Canaan Gen 10.15-19. Nothing in the Bible is said of any of them being black and history does not.

Ham's other three sons were Cush. Mizraim, and Phut. Gen 16t. I Chron. 1-8. (For other examples of different spelling of the same names. as Phut and Put. at different places in the Bible compast Gen. 5:4-32 and 10:1-29 with I Chron. 1:1-23, Matt. 1:1-6 with Luk 3:31-34.)

Phut (Put) has no children listed to him in the gen-aclogies but a nation, or people, by that name is mentioned in Ezek, 27:10 and Nah. 3:9.

Cush: some historians say that the land of Cush was Ethiopia Descendants of Cush also dwelt in the regions of Babylenia and Assyria; these were not black. Gen. 10:8-12.

Mizraim is called Egypt in some versions of the Bible. He is said to be the father of Egypt, the Philistines, and other tribes Get 10:13-14. I Chron. 1:11-12.

#### 10. What is meant in the Bible by the bounds of a nation?

In the Bible a nation often meant a tribe claiming a common male ancestor and usually having the same religion and leader. Thus Abraham became the father of many nations. One of these was Israel Jacob itself made up of 42 tribes, or nations, Gen. 17:4; 25:23; 35:10:11.

"Nation" also meant the people under one government as when the Midianites called Moses an Egyptian, and the Bible mentions that one nation (Israel) was taken out of another nation (Egypti, Ex. 2.19; Deut. 4:34.

The bounds of a nation were the boundaries or limits of the country held or inhabited by that nation. Ex. 23:31.

(Job indicated that the bounds of a man are the days of his life, Job 14:5-10.)

## 11. Who determines the bounds of nations?

The apostle Paul said that God is the Lord of heaven and earts "and both made of one blood all nations of men for to dwell on all the face of the earth and both determined the times before appointed, and the bounds of their habitation." Acts 17:26-31.

In like manner regarding what ever exists as having been permitted by God, Paul advises Christians to obey their powers of government, Rom. Ch. 13. However, Paul's own suffering and imprisonment and death shows that he did not intend Christians to violate the commandments of God to please governments.

## 12. When were nations first divided?

The Bible uses the words divided, scattered, and separated, with somewhat different meanings.

It says the nations were first divided in the days of Peleg Gen. 10:25. Peleg was born 10! years after the flood. Gen. 11:10-16.

# 13. How were the nations divided? The Bible says they were divided by the families of the sate of Nosh. Gen. 10:32.

#### 14. When were the people scattered?

The Bible does not say. It says that they were scattered with confusion of languages from Babel in Shinar. Gen. 11:1-9.

#### 15. Who scattered them?

The Bible says that the Lord did. Genesis 11:9.

#### 16. Who separated the people?

The Bible says that God separated the sons of Adam, divided to them their inheritance, and set the bounds of the people. Deut. 32:7-8.

#### 17. How did God separate them?

"He set the bounds of the people according to the number of the children of Israel For the Lord's portion is his people; Jacob Harael, Gen. 32:28) is the lot of his inheritance." Deut. 32:8-9. (Num. 34-2: 32-19, 31-33.)

"I am the Lord your God, which have separated you from other people." Lev. 20:24.

Moses speaks of God's people, the children of Israel, being separated 'from all the people that are upon the face of the earth Ex. 33:16.

These people separated to serve the Lord, and not idols, included descendants of Harr and of Shem in whose tents Japheth was to dwell. The numbering of Israel before they entered their new homeland included numerous descendants of the sons of Joseph of a son of Judah, and of a son of Simeon who were born of women from the nations of Ham. Gen. 9:27; 41:2-5; 46:10; Num. 26:28-37 19-22, 12-14.

Though their law later forbade mixing with other blood lines in the land of Canaan, because the other peoples were idolaters, they continued to do so throughout their history.

Jesus and His disciples taught that not ancestory but faith determined the children of God, not Abraham's blood line but the seed of his faith and obedience. Matt. 3:7-10; John 8:31-59; Gal. 3:7-9. 29. The true country sought by Abraham and the other faithful is heaven. Beb. 11:8-16, 39-40.

Paul wrote the church at Corinth and the saints in Achaia to "come out from among them, and he ye separate" from idolaters, unbelievers, the unrighteous, and Belial, and not to be yoked with them. Paul was not writing about marriage, or about races, or nations, but about taking part in wrong beliefs or deeds. If Cor. 1:1; 6:14 through 7:1. Faul had already told the church at Corinth and all Christians that if any of them were married to unbelievers not to leave their unbelieving partners, I Cor. 7:10-17, but also had told them not to keep fornicators and other known wicked persons in the church. I Cor.

#### 18. What does the Bible say of Ethiopiane?

They are mentioned a good many times in recording wars, treaties, enemies and allies. Among other important items two questions are taked concerning Ethiopians.

a "Can the Ethiopian change his skin", This question is in a discussion pointing out that those who are evil are as unlikely to do good as an Ethiopian is to change his skin. Jer. 13:23.

- b 'Are ye not as children of the Ethiopian unto me. O children of Israel?' saith the Lord." Amos 9:7.

  The Prophet Amos declares for the Lord in Chapter 9 that the people of one nation are as the people of other nations in God.
- c The man who with the king's help saved Jeremush from death and was rewarded by the Lord, was an Ethiopian. Jer. 38:6-13, 39:15-18
- d. The Bible says that Miriam and Aoron "spake against Mases because of the Ethiopian woman whom he had married; for he had married an Ethiopian woman," and that the anger of the Lord was kindled against Miriam and Aoron. Num. Ch. 12 Nothing else is known of her. Was she white? Was she black? Did Moses marry her after the death of his Miduanite wife, the mother of his children? We do not know. We only know that she was an Ethiopian
- e An angel of the Lord caused Philip to Join a chariot in which an Ethiopian was returning from Jerusalem where he had gone to worship in the Jewish religion. He was reading from the prophet Isaieh Esaias! Beginning where the Ethiopian was reading Philip preached unto him Jesus. The Ethiopian believed They came to some water and Philip baptized him. Acts 8:26-39

#### 19 What does the Bible say of the different races of people?

Nothing. It discusses nations, what we call tribes and political nations, but it mentions no such groups as we call races. It mentions. Ethiopia and the Ethiopians. Libya and the Libyans. According to history most Libyans were black. Those who heard Peter preach on the day of Pentecost, being from "about Cyrene" (a Greek colony), were probably white but we do not know. Acts 2:10.

The words Lubim and Put (Phut) are sometimes translated as Libyans in the Douay (Roman Catholic) and some other versions of the Bible

#### 29 What do we learn of the race problems from the Bible?

We learn that God sees two kinds of people in the world those who serve Rim and those who do not

The Bible teaches us how to serve Him Matt. 28:19-20, and all of Christ's words.

"This is my commandment, "That ye love one another as I have loved you." John 15:12.

"All things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them" Matt. 7:12.

The following Resolutions were adopted at the meeting of the Executive Committee of the National Bar Association held at the Hotel New Yorker, on June 16th, 1956:

#### RESOLUTION NO. 1

WHEREAS, a bill has been introduced in the House of Representatives of the Congress which would prohibit the Supreme Court from reviewing any decision which has been in effect for fifty years or more without the specific permission from the Congress; and

WHEREAS, the said bill provides that it shall be retroactive to January, 1954; and

WHEREAS, the bill is admittedly designed to "wipe out" or nullify the Supreme Court ruling against segregation in the public schools; and

WHEREAS, it is the considered opinion of this body that the decision and opinion of the Supreme Court rendered in 1896 upholding the doctrine of "separate but equal" was wrong and erroneous in the first instance, and based upon the false premises of racial inferiority; and

WHEREAS, the doctrine of "separate but equal" in the middle of the twentieth century was outmoded in our American democracy and a dangerous legal anomaly in a democratic world:

NOW, therefore, be it resolved by the Executive Committee for and on behalf of the National Bar Association as follows:

 We condemn and denounce the aforesaid bill as a dangerous attempt to nullify a decision of the Supreme Court interpreting the Federal Constitution.

2. We likewise deplore this attempt to place curbs on the Supreme Court and other Federal Courts designed to prevent the proper performance of their function of interpreting the Federal Constitution and laws, and settling constitutional disputes under our Federal system of government.

#### RESOLUTION NO. 2

WHEREAS, a bill sponsored by twelve senators would in effect forbid the Supreme Court and other Federal Courts from holding that Acts of Congress dealing with matters of national Interest supersede state legislation on the same subject; and

WHEREAS, the result of such a bill would be to put in doubt many Federal Laws dealing with labor, health, safety, commerce, and many other matters that the courts have consistently ruled took precedence over State Laws in the same area; and

WHEREAS, the bill is retroactive and might apply to all past Acts of Congress that have failed expressly to state that exclusive jurisdiction was reserved to the Federal Government; and

WHERE 45 the said bill, if enacted into law, would cause unlimited confusion as to many subjects of legislation as between the Federal Government and the forty-eight states of the Union, and

WHEREAS the passage of such a bill is contraty to and denies the supremacy of the Federal Constitution and its laws, as well as the supremacy of the laws passed thereunder, as provided for in Article

VI of the Federal Constitution; and WHEREAS the passage of such a bill negates and denies the historic and constitutional position of the Supreme Court and other Federal Courts as the interpreter of the Federal Constitution and laws, and arbiter of disputes under our Federal Union between

Federal Government and states, and among the several states; NOW therefore, the Executive Committee of the National Bar Association respectfully urges the Congress to defeat said proposal

because the result of such legislation would cause great confusion and conflicts of law in respect to Federal Laws dealing with labor, health, safety, morals, interstate and foreign commerce, and many other matters including some dealt with in the Federal Constitution and its Amendments; and

(b) cause chaotic dislocation and maladjustments of the constitutional and other legal relations between the Federal Government and the forty-eight states; and

(c) produce a fractionalization and spilling of our nation into many local regional and sectional parts, and thus create a "throwback" to the situation of our country under the Articles of Confederation:

(d) change and destroy the historic constitution position of the Supreme Court and other Federal Courts as the interpreter of the Federal Constitution and laws, and arbiters of disputes between the Federal Government and the states, and among the several states.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL JUSTICE

Brother President and Members of the Convention;

We are very happy to bring to the altention of the convention those matters with regard to social justice that should receive our attention.

The decision of the Supreme Court outlawing segregation in the public schools has occupied our attention in the past, and is today a great concern by Negroes throughout this Nation. The National Baptist Convention of America has taken the position. The National Gaptist Convention of the teachings of the Scripture, and the spirit of Christ. In the ligh of this position, we called for participation on the part of Negro Baptists in community affairs that the implementation of the Supreme Court's decision might be carried out in a manner consistent with the teachings of the Christian Religion.

We believe that Negroes in America have put forth a special effort to achieve their rights under the law of the land in a peaceful and Christian manner. In spite of this effort on the part of Negroes to achieve their rights as set forth by the Supreme Court, they have met violent resistance in the ever increasing efforts of the White Citizen's Councils, and organizations of like manner. Our daily papers are filled with reports of mob action in many places in the South. The unlawful activity of many of our communities set before us a problem of grave concern. We have the task of meeting the violent action of our White brethren with the spirit of Christ.

Never before in the history of the Negro has he been faced with a greater challenge to show to the world that he has been with Jesus, and that he believes that victory in those things that are right and true can be accomplished in the devotion to the way of Christ.

We would like to raise this question, and address it to the National Christian Bodies of our Nation. How can the National Christian Bedies of our Nation speak with such clarity in support of integration as consistent with principles of the Christian faith, and yet, thurches belonging to such Bodies maintain silence in the face of mobaction on the local level? Can we depend upon Christians for sup-

port as we seek security for our homes and our children? These questions call for an examination of the effectiveness of our ministry WHAT SHALL WE RECOMMEND?

1. We recommend that we shall meet the mob forces that seek to maintain segregation with devotion to Christ and his way.

 We recommend that we shall seek to express our views at the poll, and in every city, village, and hamlet, that churches of our Nation should lead in a crusade to encourage Negroes to qualify and vote.

3. We further recommend that Thanksgiving Day shall be regarded by American Negroes as a National Day of Prayer related to our concern for the achievement of our rightful place as citizens of this Nation.

Such gross expressions of persecution are not in evidence as much as the more subile methods. Those who are bent on opposing integration have formed groups that have as their purpose the use of conomic phessure against Negrous. These groups are generally referred to as Citizens Councils, and appear to have many of the qualities of the Klu Klux Klan. Although they advocate the prevention of White and Negro Classes in the Public School, "by all legal means," the methods used are designed to create fear among Negroes. Such methods are Un-American and Undemocratic. We must meet this resistance with courage, and an unwavering faith in the power of right. We must bring to the attention of our government what is happening in the South. We must seek every legal and inversal means for the protection of our people and the successful integration of our children in the public schools.

THE COMMISSION'S RECOMMENDATIONS

We appeal to this Convention to authorize a letter to U. S. Attorney General Herbert Brownell, of the Justice Department, calling for an investigation of the actions of such groups as the Citizens Councils being organized throughout the South. Such a letter should bring to the attention of United States Attorney General Brownell such groups appear to be formed to intimidate Negroes and thus create a state of fear and suffering in the South, We should appeal to him as United States Attorney General to use power of his office to insure the protection of Negroes under the Constitution of our Government.

## ORGANIZATIONS IN WHICH THE NATIONAL BAPTIST PUBLISHING BOARD HOLDS MEMBERSHIP

Because the National Baptist Publishing Board has always wanted to keep abreast with the times, and give to the Denomination the best in literature, information and inspiration we have maintained memberships in sectional and

national organizations. The cost of maintaining such memberships has been offtimes expensive but we have felt that nothing is too expensive for the National Baptist Publishing Board, if it would enable your Board to better serve your needs, thus we have kept our membership in the National Council of Churches of Christ in the United States; in the Protestant Church-owned Publishers Association and in other organizations too numerous to mention. Wherever meetings of these various organizations were held, we have sent representatives who would bring back to us, the information that would enable us to keep abreast with the trend of the times. We feel that it is very necessary to know what other organizations, state and national, are doing in a religious way.

# PROBLEMS WHICH EFFECT OUR WORKING CONDITIONS

One of the greatest problems which confront a printing concern like your publishing. House is the paper situation, which has not been good for several years. The cost of paper is constantly rising and this advancing in price creates a great problem regarding the cost of producing the quarterlies, books and other supplies that our customers need. We have tried to keep down the cost of our periodicals and books as much as possible, but we must compete with other publishers and must keep our prices within the same area as theirs.

We have been expecting a raise in the postage rate, and when this raise is made this too, will constitute a great problem for the National Baptist Publishing Board but we ask your cooperation in these changing prices and assure you that we will not add to the cost of a single periodical or book unless it is absolutely necessary to do so.

# WE SHALL CONTINUE TO HAVE BOYD MEMORIAL MONTH

March of each year has been observed as Boyd Memorial Month in memory of the late Richard Henry Boyd who was one of the tallest oaks in the Baptist forest, and who was the founder of the National Baptist Publishing Board. Because of the work done for the Baptists this leader is remembered, not only by his immediate family and the employees of the National Baptist Publishing Board, but by hundreds, of Sunday school work that the program held some foreign countries, with the program held some time during the month of March.

It is hoped that this practice will be continued by the Baptist leaders everywhere, because we as a race-are too prone to forget those leaders who have passed on, but who have laid the foundation for our religious and denominational life and work.

#### ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

Mrs. Zula Campfield, the chief bookkeeper of the National Baptist Publishing Board, has been and still is one of its most faithful employees. Her task has not been an easy one, because of the volume of business done by this your National Baptist Publishing Board, and the work entailed to keep its accounts accurately. The greatest problem that the bookkeeping department faces is that of checks that are given by the senders of orders to the National Baptist Publishing Board, who have failed to ascertain if the money to protect such checks was in their account at the bank at the time the checks were sent.

These returned checks have proven most embarrassing to the National Baptist Publishing Board, because the banks have charged an extra fee for the handling of these "No good checks." The bookkeeping department has written hundreds of letters trying to collect money on checks for materials already received by those persons who have sent these unpaid checks to us. We have tried in every way possible to extend courteous, prompt service, but the manner in which many of our leaders as well as workers in our various churches and Sunday schools handle their accounts places us in an awkward position, when no heed is paid to our letters asking that certified checks or money orders be sent rather than personal checks from organizations, where it is not certain that the money is in the bank to protect the check that is sent to the Publishing House.

The National Baptist Publishing Board is also asking its customers not to ask for C.O.D. shipments as this only increase the original cost of any order. We want to serve the public well, but we would like the public to serve us well also, in that when checks are sent to us, the sender will be sure that this check will be protected and paid. All checks and money orders intended for literature and supplies from this Plant are requested to be made payable to the National Baptist Publishing Board.

## THE HOME MISSION BOARD NOTE

Once again I wish to call to your attention the Note that

was given to the National Baptist Publishing Board by the Home Mission Board several years ago, when the said board took over the assets and liabilities of the Church Extension Board, then operated by the late Rev. D. C. Knox; this note remains unpaid. The Home Mission Board gave the National Baptist Publishing Board a note in 1935, at which time it was renewed for one year, same note being signed by Drs. J. H. L. Smith and Ira M. Hendon, chairman and secretary respectively. Several payments have been made on this note but the Home Mission Board has not made any disposition of this note for some time now, therefore in view of the action taken at the Executive Board held in Houston in 1955, when Dr. Prince referred the matter to a Committee of three who recommended that the National Baptist Convention of America assume the responsibility of the note, we ask that the Convention in session here in Richmond, Va., begin liquidating this note.

## HOUSTON, TEXAS WAS HOST

The 52nd Annual Session of the Sunday School Congress sometimes called the Summer School of Methods, which met June 6th through the 10th in Houston, Texas, with the Progressive New Hope Baptist Church as the entertaining church, and the Baptist Ministers' Association as Sponsor, was a great meeting. The sight of hundreds of Christians gathering from all points of this country, to spend five days of studying and planning how to improve their teaching methods and making plain the Word of God, was indeed gratifying to those of us who have striven through the years to make this an inspirational meeting.

Texas, being one of the greatest church-states in the Union, gave the National Sunday School Congress a great reception. Rev. N. S. Brown, the host pastor, and the Ministers' Association, of which Rev. L. H. Simpson is the president, gave the Congress every possible courtesy, and the committees that had been appointed by both the host-church and the Association, worked untiringly to have everything ready when the first messengers arrived.

Many persons who attended this 52nd Annual Session of the Congress have written saying this was the most spiritual session they have attended in a long time; others have said that each year, the spiritual fervor increases, which draws those back who have attended before, and makes those who have never attended anxious for the next meeting so they can be counted among this religious group, and enjoy the spiritual atmosphere, and the wonderful fellowship that pervades every session.

It is the general concensus of opinion that this 1956 session of the Sunday School Congress will be recorded as second to none in the Congress history.

## Houston, Texas, June 6, 1956 WEDNESDAY-Morning Session

We have the "Book of the Month Club" in which one book in one reason or other takes precedence over the others and for a white become a popular seller, but it is soon superseded by another ad

Not so with the Bible, it is not only the Book of the Mont or year, but the Book of the Ages It is "The Contemporary Book" "It is the world's best seller," and the sale is increasing daily,

The great Eastern religions also have their Sacred writingswhich to a greater or lesser degree claim to be divine revelations viz. "The Sacred Tablets of the Babylonians," "The Egyptian Book of the dead" "The Vedas of the Hindus," "The Chinese Classics," "The Avesta- of Zoroaster." 'The Illiad and Theogeny of Greece," "The Tripitka and Buddah and the Koran of Mohammed." These book have frequently been magnified beyond reason, the inference has been drawn that there is really not much difference between them and the Bible.

Difference between the Bible and Sacred Books-The very natur and content of the Bible differ from and surpasses these writings Buddhism with its gloom. Hinduism with its principle of self-help Mohammedanism without a Saviour together with numerous system are lacking the ideas of the Fatherhood of God, the religious fact d the divine sacrifice, the never failing hope of th ebeliever, be radical transformation of human wrecks rebuilt. Disciples are made not by the conquest of force but by the power of love. Then to the Bible rises above the non-Christian writings in the presenttion of the personality of Christ. His great influence is acknowledged by all men and is attested in the lives of men and women it all walks of life, who have endured tortures and death for His sake Finally, the religion which the Bible presents is adaptable to a sorts and conditions of men. It is a universal religion. It contain a revelation of God, and thereby becomes the means of grate whereas these other books at their best, are able to present only system of Ethics far inferior to that presented in the Bible nol 1 mention the fundamental differences mentioned above. It become thus the source book of the only true religion-Christianity basel on the great facts of revelation-not originating in the mind of man

but in the Divine mind, being beyond human reason in many of its aspects.

BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

REVELATIONS-God has revealed Himself to all men, in nature, in creation, in the lives of individuals, and nations. He has made Himself known, Rom. 1:19-20; Acts 17:26-28. At the same time He has implanted in man the faculty to know God through His conscience. Rom. 2:14 The Revelation-Naturalis is partly external and partly internal. As external, nature and history declare the glory of God. As internal, its the still small voice within the breast of man bears witness to the Creator.

Through man's own development he should have reached the state of religious-moral perfection and with it the accomplishment of his divine destiny; however through sin - which is opposition to the will and nature of God-such development was made impossible. In this sense we claim inspiration for the writers of the sixty-six books. 2. Tim. 3:16. All scripture is given by inspiration of God. Lit God-breathed Theophustos, and is profitable for doctrine for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness. We all accept the fact but have we stopped to really prove whether or not the Bible is divinely inspired by a Creator? Would you be able scientifically to prove whether or not this world's best seller and most read book is an actual revelation from the Supreme Creator of mankind?

Here is a Book-The Holy Bible-that dares to write out the future history of this world in advance, that dares to prophesy what is actually going to happen. You know we have gone away from believing that the Bible means what it says. We may not be atheists. We may not ridicule the Holy Bible. But we are living now in an age of skeptleism. We are living in an age of doubt. Very few people have stopped to prove whether or not to Bible is really the inspired Word of God. Very few people trembs before what it says or regard it as having real authority. Mog highly educated people and men of science assume that the Bible not the infallible revelation of a super natural God and the assume this without the scientific proof that they demand on natural questions.

But the skeptic has had no prayer answered, so he does not believe that anyone else has. There is however one source of irrefutable Proof! The Bible itself purports to be the infallible Ruler of the entire universe. In your Bible one is quoted saying or claiming that He isy God, speaking in the first person saying that He can make and unmake nations, that He can carry out His judgments over milleminiums of time, claiming that he can foretell infallibly the future of cities and empires, but that no other one can

TAUNTING THE SKEPTICS-Who is this, quoted as saying am God and there is none like mo, declaring the end from the beginning, and from ancient times, that are not yet done, saying counsel shall stand. Isa 46:9-10. Skeptics say, the Bible is merely the religious writing of a small ancient Jewish race, grouping in the darkness of human ignorance and superstition trying to develop a concept of God. THE CITY THAT CONFOUNDS THE SKEPTICS-More than 2500 years ago there existed a great city that already then was more than 1500 years old. This city was mistress of the seas-of the world of its day, the commercial center. It was beautiful, rich and stable. This city was ancient. Tyre on the Mediterranean, located on the Eastern coast of Phoenicia. In the year 604, B. C., Judah was invaded by the Chaldeans under Nebuchadnezzar of the Chaldean Empire. The Jews were conquered and taken captive in a series of sieges between 604-580 B. C. The people of Tyre were looking with greedy eyes on Judah and they were laying plans to go down to take part of the spoil, now that their rival king had invaded and conquered it. Read Ez. 26:1-3. In the 11th year of the first day of the month, B. C. 585, this word from God came to me. Son of man since Tyre has gloated over Jerusalem, this door into the nation is broken down. It lies open to me. I shall prosper, now she is laid waste. Therefore the Lord, the Eternal utters this sentence, Tyre I am against thee. I will bring many nations against you as the sea brings many a wave. God almighty is pronouncing this fate against the commercial metropolis, the New York of the ancient world, this proud mighty city, of Tyre, because of its evils and because it was threatening to take a spoil of this Kingdom of Judah.

WHAT GOD SAID WOULD HAPPEN-Ez. 26:3-5. Therefore thus saith the Lord God. Behold I am against thee O Tyre, and I will cause many nations to come up against thee as the sea causeth the waves to come up, and they shall destroy the walls of Tyre and break down her towers. I will scrape her dust from her and make her like the top of a rock. It shall be a place for the spreading of nets-fishers nots, in the midst of the sea, for I have spoken, saith the Lord, and it shall become a spoil to the nations. Let us note some of the points made. Many nations will come up against Tyre and attack her. But how are they to come? Like the waves of the sea. Now the waves of the sea come one after the other not all together. They would destroy the walls, break down the towers and demolish the buildings of the city. They would scrape the stone: the timber of the demolished buildings and even the top soil into the Mediterranean Sea. He said his city would become like the top of a rock; and it would become a spoil for the nations, more than one nation. For over 1500 years Tyre was attacked by the armed forces of other cities, and nations but never had an army batter down her walls or actually invate the city. God said, it would be battered down. Ez. 26:7-11. For thus saith the Lord. Behold I will bring upon Tyrus Nebuchadnezzar the king of Babylon. This becomes quite a specific prophecy. It tells distinctly the name of the king and the nation that God is going to bring against Tyre, a king of kings, with horses and chariots, and with horsemen and companions, and with much people. He shall slay with the sword thy daughters in the field. He shall set engines of war against the walls and with axes he shall break down thy towers. He shall enter into thy gates, and with the hoofs of his horses shall he tread down all thy streets. He shall slay the people by the sword and the strong Garrisons shall go down to the ground. This is what Nebuchadnezzar shall do. Others would have a hand. Ez 26:12-14. They shall make spoil of thy riches, and make a prey of thy merchandise, and shall break down thy walls and destroy (by pleasant houses. They shall lay thy stones and by timbers and thy dust in the midst of the water. Then God also say I will eause the noise of thy songs to cease, and the sound of the harp shall be no more heard and I will make ther like the top of a rock, and thou shalt be a place to spread nets upon. Thou shalt be built no more. For I the Lord have spoken it saith the Lord God Job says Tyre is to be completely destroyed and built no more. Here is the challenge to tell whether or not the Bible is inspired. For over 1500 years, Tyre defied all of her enemies. Not one succeeded For thirteen years, Nobuchadnezar besteget II, conquered it, demoished it and it has never been rebuilt. The people fled and built a new city on an island one half mile away off shore from old Tyre.

WHAT HISTORIANS ADMIT-In the Encylopedia Britanneis Vol. 22 under the article on Tyre" we read, Tyre the mistress of the seas in the 6th century B C, endured a thirteen year siege from Nebuchadnezzar. During this siege it was demolished and destroyed but did not remove the stones. After 25 years Alexander the Great came down in a swift march conquering everything before him We read Encyclopedia Britannica - The siege of Tyre by Alexander the Great 332 B. C. Alexander had won a battle at Issus his first great battle in conquering the Persian Empire in 333 at Issus. New Tyre was built on an island one half mile from Old Tyre. He took the debris, built a mole 200 feet, in breadth across the strait and turned the island into a Peninsula and became a part of the mainland. Alexander scaled the city walls and after a siege of 7 munths the city was taken, 8000 of the citizens were slaughtered. 2,000 later on were executed and 30,000 sold into slavery. New Tyre was rebuilt and later the Ruman Empire at the height of World power attempted to rebuild Old Tyre, but after constructing a costly Amphitheater and two or three large buildings on the site of Old Tyre the Romans were forced to abandon the effort, and those buildings lie in desolate ruins today, mute testimony of the inspiration of the Bible. Not even the might of Rome at its height of ancient glory could break the sentence made by Jah to Ezekiel in Chapter 26. Today Old Tyre is like the top of a rock There is no top soil. though there is rich soil surrounding it. Ample water is there You can go there and see the fishermen's net spread out to dry. Today a small new town erroneously called Tyre, whose real name is Sur is prospering but Old Tyre has never been rebuilt

# THE MAN OF SIN-ANTICHRIST

"Let no man deceive you by any means: for that day (the day of the Lords shall not come, except there come a falling away first and that man of sin be revealed, the son of perdition." 2 Thess. 2:3. See also Rev. 13:11, 13, 16-18; John 17:12; John 6:70; Rev. 20:18;

Christ is the incarnation of God Himself and is called the true and faithful witness. The devil, the enemy of Christ and God. will also produce a falsewitness, who will be the incarnation of Satan, just as Jesus was the incarnation of God. This false Christ, this man of sin, this incarnation of Satan, is called in Scripture the Antichrist, the son of perdition, the deceitful and bloody man and

We can trade his slimy trial from Genesis to Revelation, for he is mentioned first in Gen. 3:15, where he is called the "seed of the serpent," just as Christ is called the "seed of the woman."

Throughout the Old Testament we see him in type and shadow. Nimrod, the rebel, mentioned in Gen. 11 and 12, was an early type. Pharaoh, the persecutors of Israel, and Haman, the hater of the Jews.

was another type of this coming superman and religious dictator. Judas Iscariot was Satan's first attempt to produce this superman at the first coming of Jesus, but he failed. In the end-time, just before the second coming of Christ, Satan will make his great and final attempt to set up this superman in opposition to the true Christ of God. As there was a first and second coming of Christ, so there are two comings of the Antichrist: Judas and the

# WAS JUDAS THE ANTICHRIST?

There is much evidence that Judas Iscariot was Satan's first attempt to produce a personal Antichrist to destroy the Lord Jesus.

Whether you agree with this interpretation or not, I am sure that you will see the striking similarity between the man of sin, the ruler of the earth in the end of the age, and Judas, the false disciple of Christ. If Judas was not the Antichrist, he is certainly a distinc type Carefully consider the following Scripture references: John 17:12: Those that thou gavest me I have kept, and none of them is lost but the son of perdition; that the Scripture might be fulfilled." Notice what Paul says in 2 Thess. 2:3-"Let no man deceive you by any means: for that day (the day of the Lord) shall not come. except there come a falling away first, and that man of sin be revealed, the son of perdition."

Notice that I have quoted the only two passages in the Word of God in which the name "son of perdition" is used. In the first instance it is applied to Judas Iscariot and in the second it is applied to the man of sin, the Antichrist. Surely, here, is a close association. They are the same. They are called the same.

Then entered Satan into Judas surnamed Iscariot, being of the number of the twelve." Luke 22;3. This is the only passage which states than Satan entered into a man. We have many passages which tell of demons who took up their abode in men and women, but this speaks of Satan personally as the prince of demons, taking up his temporary abode in Judas.

But the argument is made still more conclusive by the statement in the Gospel according to John: "Jesus answered them, Have I not chosen you twelve, and one of you is (a) devil." John 6:70 Judas is called "devil" not "a devil." In the Original the verse is translated "one of you is devil (diabolis). The term "Diaalis" refers to the devil and Satan.

He does not say that Judas is a demon, but is devil, in another passage. Acts 1:25, we read these words concerning Judas . . . , that he "might go to his own place." When we consider who he was we can understand that it was the devil's own place (the place prepared for the devil and his angels).

Judas then -will be the Antichrist. The spirit of the Antichrist (when the Spirit of God which now hindereth, will be taken away) will enter once more into mankind and cause to appear another freak, half man and half devil, who will be the incarnation of the devil, when we remember that the Antichrist will attempt to simulate the true Christ in every detail, we see more and more the subtlety of

Since the Antichrist will be the imitation of the true Christ, he will claim to come in fulfillment of prophecy. Since the true Christ was to die and rise again according to Scripture, the devil will try to produce an Antichrist who, too, died and was raised again. Judas died and went to his own place.

After the true Church is gone. Salan will, as part of his wicked deception, raise Judas from the dead and set him up as the true Christ. Whether you agree with this interpretation or not, it is a fact that the man of sin of the time will be an incarnation of the devil in his last great effort to destroy the seed of the woman.

### SATAN'S DOOM

For three and one hall years the Antichrist will continue his reign of terror. Note the resemblance of Judah to the description of the man of sin of the end-time. Notice how Judas typifies the Antichrist The Antichrist will preside over the worship of the false Kingdom Judas was one of Christ's disciples and treasurer of the company but Satan entered him and he became a devil's son, so, too the Antichrist will come with a message of peace, but betray his

Judas served with Christ three and one-half years Judas as an apostle performed wonders and miracles; so will the Antichris when he comes. Judas was an idolater and the Antichrist will be a great idplater. Judas gave a sign to those who followed him by which they might know Jesus in the garden Matt. 26:40. The Antichrist will institute the mark'of the beast, compelling men to cam this sign on their hands and foreheads or be killed. Surely this similarity is striking, and many more resemblances could be added.

After three and one-half years when the nations of the earth decrived by Satan, will be gathered together for the great battle of Armageddon, the heavens will suddenly open. Rev. 19:11, and the true King, the King of kings and the Lord of Lords will descend and destroy those armies, and the beast and the false prophets will be cast into the lake of fire.

Satan who indwelt the man of sin will be east into the pit. After a thousand years Satan will be loosed for a little season and given one more opportunity to deceive the nations, to prove the utter depravity of unregenerate human nature, the eternal incoribility of the devil and the absolute righteousness and justice of God in condemning the devil and all his followers to the lake of fire frewe. We read therefore:

"And the devil that deceived them was cast into the lake of fire and brimstone, where the beast and the false prophet are, and shall be formented day and night for ever and ever." Rev. 20:10.

The description in Revelation 13 is in perfect harmony with this. In Rev. 13:11 we read that this beast was from the land and had two horns like a lamb but spoke as a dragon. The expression "the land" refers to the ancient land where Christ was born, and where He died. The horns like a lamb imitate the true Lamb of God.

See how clever his description is! He prises in the same land where the prophets had announced that the Christ should be born. There is every reason to believe that this Antichrist will be of the tribe of Dan, Gen. 49:16, 17. The twelfth verse of Rev. 13 tells us of his league with the political head of the end time world-federation of nations.

The next verse tells of his supernatural powers. Verse 14 describes his deception when in the midst of the Tribulation he will set up an image of the first beast, the political dictator, in the holy Temple at Jerusalem. This refers to the "desolution of abomination" spoken of in Daniel and again in Matt. 24. Here are Jesus prophet words:

"When ye therefore shall see the abomination of desolation, spoken by Daniel the Prophet, stand in the holy place. (whoso readeth, let him understand.) then let them which be in Juden flee into the mountains: let him which is on the housetop not come down to take anything out of the house; neither let him which is in the field return to take his clothes. And woe to them that are with child, and to them that give suck in those days! But pray ye that your flight be not in the winter, neither on the Sabbath Day for then shall be great tribulation, such as was not since the beginning of the world to this time, nor ever shall be." Matt. 24:15-21.

Let us compare Scripture with Scripture and let the Word of God speak for itself. We must not allow our preconceived and biased interpretations to confuse us. Notice, too, the further deception of Antichrist. He doeth wonders and causeth fire to come down from heaven as an imitation of Christ's two witnesses in Revelation 11.

#### THE MARK OF THE BEAST

The beast's deception will be greatest when he causes the image of the beast (the abomination of desolation) to become alive and to speak. After he has gained the confidence of the deceived peoples of the world who are left after the rapture, he will inaugurate his satame program by forming the ultra-exclusive society of his own.,

Every one who pledges obedience to the beast will receive a mark in his right hand or on his forehead. This mark will identify hi sam belonging to the beast's organization. Every one who refuses this mark will be persecuted and put to death by the dictator. As you know, there will be those who have another mark, the mark of the true Christ, sealed by God in their hands and foreheads.

These will be the special object of Satan's hatred and were it not for the protection of the Lord, all of them would be put to death by the beast. What this mark of the beast will be we may not know now. Hundred of answers have been suggested, but I do not believe these are Scriptural. Men have tried to identify this Antichrist, and there have been hundreds of guesses concerning his identity, but all of them have been wrong. Anyone throughout the centuries who hated anyone else has been branded that enemy as the Antichrist. The Church has been called the Antichrist, Nero, Napoleon, Kaiser, Hitler and Mussolini have also been suggested as possibilities by foolish and misguided souls, who have forgotten that the true identity of the Antichrist will not be known until the Church

This is definitely stated in 2 Thess, 2:2, where we are told that the man of sin will not be revealed until after the Church is gone, It is foolish therefore to speculate concerning his identity. The same

is true of the mark of the beast. What the mark will be we do not know. There can be no doubt, however, that there are already movements in the world which anticipate this mark of the beast and preparing the world for it. Food and gasoline rationing which we remember, and union cards are not the mark of the beast, but they make the world mark-minded. During a certain war we observed many instances when one could not buy or sell unless he had books or tickets. Our point is this: these are preparing us for a system whereby the mark of the beast will be easily imposed upon the people.

And he causeth all, both small and great, rich and poor, free and bound to receive a mark in their right hand, or in their foreheads: and that no man might buy or sell, save he that hath the mark, or the name of the beast, or the number of his name." Rev. 13: 16-17.

## THE NUMBER OF HIS NAME

There are many who believe that the mark will consist of number 666 tattooed upon the forehead and hands of the followers of the heast. Be that as it may, the Bible tell us that the number of the beast will be 666. Here again we encounter many and ludicrous guesses, chiefly the result of bigotry and ignorance. The number 666 and the same

This man of sin will reach the peak of his power and wisdom but he will still be merely man. The warning is given undoubtedly for those who will live during the tribulation. So mighty will be the wonders, so great the wisdom of this superman that man will believe that he is God and the Messiah. God warns us, however, "Remember that in spite of deception, he is still only a man, do not follow him. Do not believe him. This the meaning of Revelation 13:18:

Here is wisdom. Let him that hath understanding count the number of the beast: for it is the number of a man." Rev. 13:18

As a result of this warning we believe that a great multitude will not be deceived, but will be faithful to the Lord and refuse to bow before the Antichrist and receive his number and his name. The next Chapter of Revelation speaks of this great multitude who will refuse to worship the beast because they understand that his number is the number of a man. May God help us to heed His call and be ready for His coming!

### RELIGIOUS HOMES

Home existed before church houses were built. God's first organization of human society was the home. The first place in which He was worshipped was the home. The home was God's first lemple and nearly half of the whole time from Adam to Moses, according to Bishop Usser's Chronology, there was not a church house in the world. Enoch was never in a public meeting so far as we know The only religious training was in a home that knew God. Abraham never saw a revival meeting or a preaching occasion such as we have now Isaac never attended a revival, neither did Jacob. Moses never saw a revival until he went back to Egypt to carry God's message to the people. In fact, Moses and Aaron went into the homes of the people while they were slaves in Egypt and talked personally to them in their homes until the revival broke out. They did not have public meetings until they were in the wilderness and the first place of public worship recorded in the Bible was the tabernacle (tent) which was made in the wilderness and carried on the backs of the people as they journeyed toward the promised land.

What is a Bible Home? It is a place where the father sincerely loves and worships God. It is a place where the mother is a God fearing woman and worships Him. It is a place where chilies are regarded as gifts from God to be trained for this world and the world to come. In such a home there is planted day by day the truth of God in the minds and hearts of all members of the family. In such a home there is a constant duty to do God's will, to please Him and in promote everything that He loves. The ice boxes, refrigerators and depot recers would not be filled with begr and liquor. You would not send your children to package houses to buy anything. Your children would not run wild in the streets. Carry them to Sunday School and church and not send them to see a wild west movie but would seek to let them see the best which would teach them morel and spiritual culture.

Our children shall be as cornerstones polished after the similitude of a palace. There is beginning to be a little light in the sky, whether the sun is ever to break through depends upon your constancy, courage, and wisdom. The future development of this paramount work is in your hands, it is you who produce and mold the future.

Our ideal is to have Girls Auxiliary, Shepherd Boys League, and Children's Starlight and Sunshine Bands, such equality is very natural and reasonable. #### EDUCATION

Education must go side by side with all effective missionary endeavors. Missionary activities cannot save the world without education. Experience on home and foreign fields has taught that evangelization without education is largely a failure. This is perfectly natural, because evangelization had education have the same author. This author who had just unnounced that all power in heave and earth was given to Him commissioned the church to "Go". This going implies an age-old task of redeeming the world from sin and ignorance through the process of education.

The great commission Matt 28:19, 20) might be termed the Magna Charta of Christian Education. In this commission the Baptist program is plainly laid out. It consist in making disciples, baptizing and

teaching to observe "the all thing commanded"

Baptist in common with other people pay taxes for the support of secular education as carried on by the State. Baptist are authors of democracy, and hold that enlightment of the masses is essential to good government. While the state schools must be supported and encouraged, they cannot do all that must be done for the uplift of the people and for the selvation of the world. Since they cannot teach religion, it follows that they cannot do the things essential to the highest good of the individual and to society.

Christian education differs from other education in that it hat to do with the things of the heart and soul as well as things of the mind and hands. The person with a keen and trained mind, but an autouched heart is likely to make a dangerous person. An intelectual bad person is infinitely more dangerous and harmful in a community than a bad fool Christian education is, therefore, the only complete education. It stands for service, service to God and service to mankind. From the very nature of the acquiring, it usually makes one willing to serve and to "give God his best." It reduces selfishness to a minimum and enables it possessor to proceed through life on the idea not of that he may get something out of the world but that the world may get something out of the world but

We do share our best when we give to youth of our denomination modern, scientific Christian coucation. In a recent arricle, Will Durant says that religion is the most powerful known agent for reinforcing that part of our character formation which we term moral and chical. It is the formation of these elements with which Christian education is most concerned. Unfortunately in this great wonderful land of America archigion has been divorced from education. We have secularized education, We have succeeded in setting up a system of education which from primary schools to the post-graduate departments of our state universities, is chiefly concerned with imparting of physical skills and the subject-matter of education

Christian education is chiefly concerned with building of character. While not letting described high standards of scholastic work to the Christian educator the imparting skills and of subject-matter is important only as they serve the development of a moral and ethical character, giving to that character the instruments of effective self-expression. When we view the problems that are warrying the minds

of the nations, we find them in essence problems of human relationships Whether in America, Africa, or elsewhere our chief problem is that created by the break-down of character under temptation. It is through Christian education that we accomplish one phase of the sharing of our best.

Christian education means training and development in prinriples and doctrines of its author, Jesus, It goes beyond the merely intellectual. It is not enough to train our youths in the sciences, it is not caough to train them in the languages, it is not sufficient that they should know how old the earth is, how far the stars are apart, or the forces that repel and attract each other. There is something more important that our youths should know-it is to know how to live Life is a great problem. Christian education best fits one for a life of sacrifice and service. It is so complete that the whole man is reached, every fiber of his bring, every cord and sensibility of his pature will respond in loving obedience to the call of the Master, both in beautiful living and noblest giving-giving of time, giving of taient, giving of means. ### HUMAN RELATIONS The Concept Hace Helations Is Outmoded

Race relations, a popular term, long used to suggest the scheme by which different racial groups lived, is no longer appropriate It is too limited in scope. Emphasis on race in itself is indicative of provirial thirlaing - a questionable luxury that persons living today can ill afford.

The position of Negroes in American society has been so weak that they have constantly been on the defensive. The techniques of survival employed by them have been many and varied. One of the more widely used techniques had been withdrawn from and avoidance of contacts in which insult and injury might be experienced. One of the chief results of such a practice has been the fact that graceful contacts across racial and cultural lines have been made with difficulty. Another result has been the fact that the isolation thus created has given rise to the much circulated notion the Negroes prefer to remain to themselves. Spress must be placed on notion that all human beings have intrinsic worth and dignity. Confidence in this notion makes all contacts occasions where each is confident that he may not only profit from contracts with another, but that he may contribute to the growth of his fellow man as well. None should think that in noter-racial contacts they come as "empty piteners before a full fountain." Of equal importance should be an ever improving standard of performance making it practical and profitable, as well as morally proper, for men to meet and treat each other as equals.

# The Christian Church Is an Integrating Guidepost

The job of integrating the behavior of individuals dround the guidepost set forth above can hardly, with justice, be completely delegated to any one contemporary social institution. In fact, to expect that any one institution should assume the responsibility is too much to ask in a society as complex as that in which we live. Yet, the very nature of the commitment to which the Christian church is heir, makes it imperative that it be willing and able to go the "extra mite."

It has been said that the eleven o'clock hour on Sunday finds segregation at its height in American society. This allegation perhops contains an uncomforting degree of truth. In no event can we afford to allow men with un-Christian attitudes to divert the Christian church from these principles for personal or group convenience, surely not to preserve the ephemeral. The church must meet the problems of the hour.

The Congregational Christians Churches held a Convention in Omaha. Nebraska, filed suit against the local post of the American Legion for discriminating Negro delegate Refused to permit him to occupy its accommodations. He is a member of the American Legion and was from Chicago, Congregational Christian delegates not only authorized a court action but contributed \$500 toward the expenses of the suit and individuals are still contributing, to continue to push the

The most outstanding members, both men and women of the Southern Baplist Convention, signed the following resolutions on Human Relations:

God created man in His own image,

2. Christ died for all men.

3. God is no respecter of persons,

4. Christ said, "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself."

5. Christian love, as exemplified by Christ, is the supreme law for all human relations.

6. All true Christians are brothers in Christ and children of God.

7. Every person is accountable to God.

# DISCHIMINATORY ACTION OF SOME CHRISTIAN WOMEN

You will notice that very little is ever said in the paper about the Senior Women's Convention, yet we help to pay all the bills, Women you can change this attitude, get hold to your husbands brothers, fathers and pastors, it is up to you.

Women, you must remember that no race can rise higher than its women. You must appreciate womanhood before we will rise in the estimation of other races and nations. We are often neglected by our men I contribute this cause to you because you do not demand the proper respect. We are jealous and envious of each other, much more than men. For instance: It does not make any difference how many good deeds in a life time a woman does if she makes one mistak, you magnify it above all her good deeds. We must learn to appreciate each other in a telling way. We are too sympathetic in the wrong direction and too easily led off by a contrary wind We go on too much of the likes and dislikes; whether you like a person or not, if she is WRONG tell her and if you dislike a person and she is RIGHT, tell her so. We cannot hope to build a great Women's Convention in America, Africa, Bermuda, Panama, Bahama, and Jamaica on likes; we must build it on a solid foundation by doing the thing that will make it go for the denomination and not for any INDIVIDUAL.

#### COOPERATION

The church which really functions must cooperate with other churches in widening circles to do the things which no church can do alone. It is true of churches, missionary organizations as of individuals: "God hath set the solitary in families." As God said of man to be mucht have said of a clarich, mussionary rock to Dirrict

and State Conventions: It is not good for a church, missionary sociaty District and State Convention to become alone.

When Paul established a few struggling churches he banded them together in a joint movement to gather an offering and send relief to the poor saints in Jerusalem. Thus through the ages the churches have found blessing for themselves and extended usefulness in cooperative effort. If a church should by any mischance find itself with a pastor who is lax and indifferent toward the larger interests of the denomination it may well pray that God will give the pastor a new heart or else that God will give the church a new pastor. This may be applied also to the officers of missionary societies, District Conventions. State Conventions and national bodies. If a thurch is indifferent to the programs of its denomination the pasfor can usually by a patient campaign of information and suggestion enlist the sympathy of the church in the movements which are beyond its own bounds. This is also true of the local society president, our District Convention president and State Convention presi-

Church organization is in some real measure a fine intangible something which is more spirit than substance. It bases itself back in a spirit of cooperation, of loving sympathy and of mutual helpfulness. If these be lacking there can be no effective church organization. If these be present we have the essentials which in some par: assure that co-ordination of effort which is the heart of church organization. That which counts with our churches is no; so much the form of organization as its spirit. The spirit must produce the form. Inspiring leadership, consecrated strategy, the will to win, these will themselves grow the forms of organization which will be most effective.

In 1939, the Alliance wanted us to become a member but our President refused. The same thing happened in Copenhagen, Denmark But in Cleveland, Ohio, Dr. P. S. Wilkinson offered a motion that the Women's Auxiliary of the National Baptist Convention become a member. The vote was unanimous, President Johnson stated, Mrs. Fuller was due to be elected years ago.

The Women's National Convention awes a lot to Dr. P. S. Wilkinson, for which we should show our appreciation. You very fine women would not have been known around the world, had it not

been for Dr. Wilkinson's vision. I was happy to have so many of our workers to attend the North American Women's Union of the Baptist World Alliance here in Columbus, Ohio. This same meeting will be held in Toronto, Canada, November 5-6, 1957, I do wan; a large delegation to attend. The constitution committee it the Bantist World Alliance in

## HISTORICAL GLIMPSES OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY OF THE NATIONAL BAPTIST CONVENTION OF AMERICA

I bring you Christian Greetings and I thank God and you for this privilege of serving as your Historian.

Today as I review the History of our Convention. I look back some years and see its background. We recall the organizers who blazed the way. All of their names we cannot mention, but their deeds live on. It was in Chicago, Illinois in the year 1915 our history records, that a division brought about this present-day convention and gave the women of this body an opportunity to develop deep spiritual and intellectual experiences for the enlistment of other ers and for the enrichment of their spiritual life. Many who had not studied the life and suffering and death of our thorned-crowned, crucified Savious and Redeemer, as told in the four Gospels, have now a better understanding of the deeper meanings of service, and we can better sacrifice with a new appreciation. Some of us with good will can forgive, as we go through life with heartaches as His followers. Our missionary task is helping to build worthwhile character as we minister to the sick and needy, offering our help, though small, to those in trouble We recognize that we need more quierness of soul, more private devotions if we would endure, die and triumph as our Master did. The calling of our conventions to meet together should mean the offering, first, of ourselves in consecrated service to meet the challenge of these times; secondly, we should prove to those who know not our Christ that there is joy in Christian fellowship; and thirdly, the measure of our blessings depends up n how much we can give to this sinful world of Christ's life teachings.

In the beginning, as now, we were blessed with men and women of vision. We can never forger their contributions to this cause. As we, look in Nashville, Tennessee, at 523 2nd Avenue North and Locus Street, in the window of the Adminstration Building "looking East, there we find a six-foot, three-inch broaze statue of the late Honorable Dr. Richard Henry Boyd. He shall be remembered as long as Baptists live. When Dr. R. H. Boyd passed, his mantle fell on the shoulders of his illustrious son, Dr. Henry Allen Boyd, and he has carried high the banner of service in his own right. History of the Baptists cannot be written correctly and his name left out. He is known for his work as a Baptist statwart, the tallest tree of the Baptist Forest, the globetrotter. He is the Secretary of the National Baptist Publishing Board, the President of the first Negro Bank in Nashville, Tennessee, Secretary of the National Bantist Sunday School Congress, and he is the head of many organizations that are uplifting that were born from his fertile brain and inspiration. He is our greatest known leader of his day.

We turn our view, now, to the Woman of the Hour, our President. Dr. M. A. B. Fuller, who has so wonderfully led us in deneminational work the world over. In the Baptist World's Alliance her name is indelibly written with love. At nome she is honored, She is known as the best organizer and supervisor of constructive Chrislian work in this nation; she has few equals and no superiors of women leaders. In 1916 she was elected Corresponding Secretary of the Woman's National Baptist Convention of America; in 1928 the

President of this Convention; in 1939 she represented us in Atlanta. Georgia, at the World's Baptist Alliance; in 1947 in Copenhagen Denmark; and she still attends every meeting of importance of the World's Baptist Alliance. She expects to attend one this November (1957) in Canada.

Our Convention is organized Into workshops and councils for the petruction of "The How for All Occasions in Missions". Some of the nuncils are as follows: Official Staff, Field Missionaries, State Presisents, Vice Presidents, Home Mission Presidents, Foreign Mission Presidents, District Presidents Sub-District Presidents, Deacons' Wives, Ushers, Education, Bible Bands, Nurse Aides, Ministers' Wives, Mothers' Union, Baptist Congress Union, Art Booth, Business Women Temperance: Executive Board, Personal Service, Gleaners, Tracts, Courtesy, Music, Bible Teachers, Tithers, Annual Members, Matrons, President Night Council. For the young women and the children we also have graded workshops.

Each missionary organization should have a library. Are you milding one?

The spiritual work of this group of Christian leaders stands out with their contribution to our many efforts. This Convention helps to support the colleges that are endorsed by the parent body. We are going forward with the help of God in doing our Home and Foreign Mission Work. There is still a vast need of finance to support our work. Will you send to the headquarters the offerings lifted each Surday for our missionaries for Home and Foreign Mission work? Those pennies make dollars.

We should order our Missionary Helps and books of all kind for religious services at once from 523 2nd Avenue North. Kashville Tennussee.

If you would write us about your convention work, we could make a greater History Will you do that, please?

When we supply all of our churches with a library with books from our own publishing board, we will prepare our young people with the proper tools to work with and they can go forward with much enthusiasm.

There have been thousands of dollars raised by these women all over this nation. Souls have been saved; women and men have been educated; the Boards-Educational, Home and Foreign Mission, Evangelical-have received financial support. The Gospel has been sent abroad as well as helped a crying need at home. Women have dedicated their lives and sacrifice to attend these conventions to the fullest measure. Fixed and clothes have been given in our flooded districts; doors have been opened to shelter the homeless; the blind have always received needed help. Yet, there is room to do more. We must do more as God makes it possible for us to prosper,

And now, may I close by saying that even though I suffered a tiroke last year, God is good. I am better and out and around, I praise Him and Love Him because he first Loved me. Continue to pray for me. Let there be none idly saying, "There is nothing I can do," while the souls of men are dying and the Master calls for you.

#### Report of Juvenile Delinquency Committee;

Brother President, Officers and members of the National Baptist Brotherhood assembled:

We your Committee on Juvenile Delinquency stand in the presence of God and this assembly to give an account of our stewardship. We, as a committee, must thank God for His leadership, protection and mercy. As a committee, we are fully aware of this all important task which has been thrust upon us.

Seemingly, Juvenile Delinquency is on the increase as an ever rising tide; it hangs over us as an inescapable nightmare. It has claimed the attention of the highest executive of our country; the judges on the beach, the educator, the rich and the poor. This evil seems to blight the very fragrance that floats upon the breeze of a Christian country, "America,"

There is a cause for this evil, the problem does exist,

but there is also a solution for it. Statistics tell us that by 1960 the increase of Juvenile Delinquency will reach an undesirable peak unless something is done, Thousands of dollars are being spent to curb it, committees are being formed to discuss means and ways to combat it. Many reasons are being given as to the cause of it . . . . Some good is being done, but not enough,

The Courts can't handle it, Sunday schools and churches. recreational centers, clubs and what nots do well but not enough. My friends, why beat around the bush? Why not face facts? The trouble is not in the beer taverns. in the movies, on the television, nor in comic books. The trouble is in the adults. The trouble is in the adult and not in the child. When the child is born in the world. he or she looks in the face of their parents for guidance.

Why be so stupid? God placed this world in the hands of matured people and not children. Adam and Eve were created as full grown adults. The authority to rule was placed in the hands of Adam and Evc. Where did Juvenile Delinquency start, in Cain and Abel? No, it started in Eve and Adam. Eve and Adam were the first to disobey God and not their children. If the adults in America go straight the children will follow. One of our main troubles is: we want to disobey God and do as we please and expect our children to obey us; it will not be. If as grownups, we will walk before the Lord and obey His Commandments, 99% of juvenile delinquency will vanish. . . . Get the parents in the home straight and the grownups who are not parents in their places and we will see a change among our young people which will startle the world.

Friends, we cannot by pass our Creator and succeed: As a committee we have received some valuable information from experts who are giving their lives in the study of our youth problem, but most of their conclusions are means to an end and not the end. The end is God and His Word. We still believe that the Bible holds the key to the situation. As a committee we still believe in the scripture: Prov. 22:6-- Train us a child in the way he should go; and when he is old he will not depart from it." Deut. 4:40 reads thus: "Thou shalt keep therefore his statutes and his commandments, which I command thee this day, that it may go well with thee, and with thy children after thee, and that thou mayest prolong the days upon the earth, which the Lord thy God giveth thee,

forever."

Psalms 128:1-3: "Blessed is every one that feareth the Lord: that walketh in his ways. For thou shalt eat the labour of thing hands: happy thou shalt be, and it shall be well with thee. Thy wife shall be as fruitful vines by the sides of thine house; thy children like olive plants round about thy table."

As a committee, we recommend the following:

- That every man who is a member of the Brotherhood Union will maintain and establish a family after in his home.
- 2. That he will encourage early salvation for young people.
- That men will read, study and meditate on God's word at least once a day and encourage others to do so.
- That wherever young people are found and can be approached members of the brotherhood will do their best to help them out of this condition.
- 5. That we will publish the good things young people are doing.
- 6. That we will encourage delinquents to attend church, Sunday school and other religious activities. Invite them to your social features where they can see how good boys and girls enjoy' themselves.


