

March madness

The weather can be fickle at this time of the year, with one day having clear blue skies and the next wintry showers. Make the best of the good weather and crack on with tasks such as making seed beds for sowing hardy annuals outside. Do always bear n mind that we can still get sharp frosts, so don't be tempted to buy bedding plants starting to appear at garden centres unless you have a greenhouse or frost-free place in which to keep them until all danger of frost has passed. And don't be tempted to remove protection from those frost tender plants which were covered up over winter. Plants can be

uncovered during the day, but keep the protective material to hand in case frost is forecast at night..

Perennials

Cut down all growth left over winter. Even if seed heads and stems are still managing to look good, you need to get rid of them now to make way for new growth.

After a good tidy, if you didn't feed plants last month, you can dress the soil with a fertiliser now so that it is ready for a layer of mulch.

New shoots should be growing strongly from the crown of plants, and it is an ideal time to increase plants such as achillea, artemis, delphiniums, gypsophilia and lupins. It's very easy to take cuttings, when the shoots are about 3-4" high. Remove the shoots from as close as possible to the plant using a sharp knife. It's very like taking dahlia cuttings, except that the parent plant is in the ground.

Insert the cuttings into a pot containing a mix of equal parts peat free compost and perlite or vermiculite, cover with a polythene bag, and put on a shady windowsill or in a cold frame until they root in a few weeks' time.

Towards the end of the month split up polyanthus type primulas as the flowers go over. To divide them, dig up each clump with a fork. With large clumps you may

revitalising the soil with compost or manure, or plant them in row in the corner of the vegetable garden to grow through the summer and plant out again in the borders in the autumn. The plants will then give a terrific splash of colour in the spring.

Lift and divide overgrown clumps of summer flowering herbaceous perennials. Most can be lifted and divided in spring just as growth gets under way, and if the divisions are reasonably sized, they should flower later in the year.

Plants which need dividing are usually quite easy to see. As perennials age the clumps push outwards, with fresh young growth to the edge of the clump, and the centre dies out. This is the stage at which they should be divided. Lift each clump with a fork, and prise it apart; smaller pieces can be pulled apart by hand. Add organic matter and fertiliser to revitalise the soil, and plant the young divisions in groups of three, five and more, depending on the space you have. Water them in well if the soil is dry.

STILL WHINGING

Once upon a time when the council was asked if the minutes could be looked at it would answer that they are available to view at Boston library which is far from convenient for the residents of Fosdyke interested in what the parish council is doing. The council, though, appeared to be happy enough with what was in place.

But when Jon Tofts became a councillor he made sure that the minutes were available online. Since his resignation, and co-option of Terry Wright, postings to Fosdyke Parish Council's website have been sporadic.

The simple solution would be to put them on the noticeboard near the village hall. Far more convenient, friendlier and practical for Fosdyke residents. Sutterton Parish Council, for example, used to do just that.

Some villagers have commented to *Fosdyke Magazine* that the council is being awkward and secretive by not making the minutes accessible to all residents, as though it was frightened of revealing what it did. Having attended meetings we can see that that is not the case yet the council seems to make no concerted effort to be more informative.

So, our open question is, why aren't the minutes being posted on the noticeboard and on the website?





WILD TIMES Boxing Clever

Offered: Modern house. Popular area, with easy access to local facilities. Would suit couple looking to raise a family. No chain, enquire within.

Sounds like a pretty good property, doesn't it? But I'm not talking human habitation, but rather a nest box for birds. This time of year might seem rather dank and cold to us, but wildlife knows that spring is on the way. So they start to make preparations and, in the case of birds, that involves finding somewhere snug to raise their family.

Putting up a nest box can be a really great way to encourage a little slice of nature into your garden. And it isn't just good for the birds. Watching a pair of birds raising their chicks can provide hours of enjoyment. Some nest boxes these

days even come with cameras inside that can be attached to your TV or computer, so you can see everything that happens. Rather like your very own Springwatch. Keen gardeners too should be interested in providing a home for the birds. Hungry chicks need a lot of caterpillars and grubs to eat, so your garden will get some thorough pest control, free of charge! Someone once worked out that a family of great tits will chomp their way through 30,000 grubs and caterpillars in a year. That is some saving in bug spray!

Nestboxes come in various sizes and shapes, but the basic model is a



squarish box, with a round hole in the front. This will attract members of the tit family. Blue tits will like boxes with small holes, roughly 25 mm in diameter. If you increase the hole size up to 28 mm you get great tits. And a hole of 32 mm will be ideal for house sparrows. If instead of the round hole you have a large opening, you may attract a robin or a wren instead. This can be quite useful if you want to attract a variety of birds. Also, remember that for most birds they are territorial. Around an occupied nestbox there will an area of land which belongs to that bird, and from which it will try to drive all others of its own kind. So there is

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very little point in putting up two identical boxes, as often only one will get used. However, a great tit is not interested in blue tits, and vice versa. So by putting up different boxes you can get more birds. The exception to this are house sparrows, which actually like nesting alongside others of its own kind, and prefer it if there are more

Mind you, it isn't just garden birds that can be attracted to nestboxes. Local farmers have had a lot of success with barn owl boxes for example. And there is currently a lot of interest in providing boxes for swifts so they can nest under the eaves of tall buildings.


than one nestbox.

I am often asked where the best place to put a nest box is. Direction is quite important, with boxes facing between north and east doing best. South-facing they can get too hot and cook the chicks. West-facing the rain can come in and soak and chill the chicks. The amount of nearby cover and proximity to bird feeders are also matters to consider, as is height off the ground. Different species of birds prefer different things. For indepth advice, visit the RSPB web pages.

Nest boxes are now sold in most garden centres, or you could build one yourself. There are designs to follow on lots of websites, including the RSPB one. The important thing to check for any box though is that there is at least 12 cm gap between the bottom of the hole and the bottom of the box. Any shallower, and cats will be able to fish the nestlings out. Woodpeckers will sometimes enlarge the entry holes to eat eggs and chicks, as will squirrels. You can deter them from doing this by adding a steel plate around the hole, again available from most decent garden centres.

So this February, set yourself up a nestbox, and experience the joys of giving nature a home.

Liz Wallder's **Book Review**THE FEAR INDEX By Robert Harris



have read a couple of Robert Harris novels, the most famous of which is Fatherland, a fictional story set in a world where Hitler won the second world war. This book, like that one, is a gripping read.

It is set in the financial world where a rich, middle-aged maths genius is running a computer run hedge fund and starts with him being attacked in his own home by someone with an uncanny resemblance to a picture in a book that he had just anonymously received.

The story only covers about two days in time, but an awful lot happens in those 48 hours. We follow the anti-hero all over Geneva, getting more and more confused as more and more facts are presented. This hectic story didn't let up until the finish.

I found out far too much information about hedge funds and the financial market though and it was very complex and confusing at times. My eyes just ran over facts and figures and didn't take them in, that said, it in no way detracted

from the enjoyment of the book, which leads me to wonder why Harris had to include them all in the first place.

Apart from too much irrelevant information it is a well written and easy to read book and, in fact, difficult to put down, but I didn't enjoy it as much as Fatherland.


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

Dear Friends,

The words 'How can this be?' seem to me to be hovering in the air a great deal at the moment.

'How can this be' that we are so close to the date of leaving the EU and we don't know precisely what is happening yet? 'How can this be' that I've paid my stamp all these years and all I hear about is hospitals and schools under huge stress? 'How can this be' that every year the trees seem to burst into bud a few days earlier than they did last year, but that many people cannot accept the evidence that says that this is as a result of human impact on the climate?

These and so many other

versions of the question buzz around in my mind and heart – as do the very prosaic ones of human living that in different ways we each face – and in my case: 'How can this be' that my parents, who have been reasonably well physically to this point, suddenly seem now to be failing so rapidly?

'How can this be?'

These are big questions and real questions. They affect different parts of our lives. They require us to draw on deep sources of strength. They can depress us or energise us. They can encourage us to reach out to others for support, and they can also make us want to hide and to turn in on ourselves.

And where is God in it all?

I don't underestimate the impact of these words and of their underlying and related questions.

However, as the words and questions gather, in the month of March at least I am comforted by the fact that as the 25th approaches, I can draw strength from the example of one amazing woman who has trodden the human path before us. The 25th of March is the Feast of the Annunciation, which is the day on which Mary was told the news that she would bear a child who would be Son of God – and not surprisingly, she exclaimed 'How can this be?' (Luke 1.34)

If Mary asked this question, then I think I am in good company if, on occasion, I ask it myself as well.

'How can this be?'

And once it had been explained to Mary that if she said 'yes', she was to enact God's will, then Mary did indeed summon her strength and courage and love and obedience, and having expressed her incredulity, proceeded to bring about God's purpose for her and for the world. She could have said 'no'. However, she said 'let it be so', and thus a new chapter opened in the life of God's creation.

Can I echo Mary's words? Can

Can we, having faced the questions, place our trust in God and respond with similar strength, courage, love and obedience? Can



we draw strength from Mary's example?





Encountering the Holy – being scared of the sacred. Have you noticed the play on words – scared and sacred, simply swap two letters around and you change the meaning completely, scared and sacred.

I often feel that many people in today's modern secular world, Christians included are afraid or scared of the sacred. Why should this be, possibly because the sacred takes us out of selves, out of our comfort zone and even suggests that we lose control and give that control to God, a higher power. One of the other reasons for being scared of the sacred is that entering into the sacred leads us beyond

ourselves and our own powers to actually doing something about the sacred action is required, and here is where it gets unnerving. We lament the decline in mission and evangelistic fervor in today's Church. We lament the decline in worship attendance and heartfelt worship. Perhaps haven't we understood how these problems are related. We've isolated

the

problems. We have tried to inspire mission and vevangelism alarming ourselves and others with an unbalanced emphasis on sin and judgment. Churches have tried often in often in panic mode to manage worship and increase attendance with an unbalanced emphasis on obligation and procedure. These attempts are unbalanced because both are missing the same thing: A vision and experience of God's holy presence and the good news of his kingdom rule. This leads to being scared of sacred.

Good worship is about all about awe, not strategy. Worship happens when people become aware that they are in the presence of the living God. This happened when Moses realized he was standing on holy ground. This isn't the same as being afraid of God. That will drive us away from Him. It isn't the same as feeling sentimental about God either. That reduces God to what some spiritual writers call "the heavenly sweetheart." If we are afraid of God, then how can we

ever know him and how can his news be good; if God's only purpose is to make us happy then how can we call him Lord? These reductions of God's presence and his good news diminish God and approach him as a force to be manipulated. But when we are in awe of God we are aware of His power and goodness and we are compelled to worship.

Some years ago staying with a priest friend of mine in Minnesota USA I came across the writings of Annie Dillard, and she has some fascinating things to say about all this.

Annie Dillard in her book, "Teaching a Stone to Talk" 1982, describes awe: "Does anyone have the foggiest idea what sort of power we so blithely invoke? Or as I suspect, does no one believe a word of it? The churches are children playing on the floor with their chemistry sets, mixing up a batch of TNT to kill a Sunday morning. It is madness to wear ladies straw hats and velvet hats to church; we should all be wearing

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crash helmets. Ushers should issue life preservers and signal flares; they should lash us to our pews. For the sleeping god may wake someday and take offence; or the waking god may draw us out to where we can never return."

Awe should not be reduced to a single emotion. Awe includes many emotions. For instance, we can be in awe of beauty or majesty. We can be in awe of power and strength. We can be in awe of talent and artistry. We can be in awe of mystery and wonder. Likewise, reverence should not be reduced to a single emotion. It does not simply mean sedate. For instance, we show reverence of marriage at a wedding and it is proper to be joyous. We show reverence for life and loved ones at a funeral and we feel grief and sadness but also may recall happy memories. Awe and reverence involve many moods and styles but they have one thing in common - response! Maybe it is the response element that makes us scared of sacred.

Awe and reverence are about

more than "shock and awe" demonstrations of force. Do you recall how around this time a few years ago many people were moved by the movie by Mel Gibson "The Passion of the Christ?" Very few people watched that movie in sedate. reflective calm, atmosphere. People were moved with grief and sorrow. They were, in the words of Scripture, cut to the quick. I remember at the end when the risen Christ leaves the tomb someone shouted "YES!" applause broke out. This wasn't exhibitionism. It was awe and reverence! The film also convicted Some responded changing their lives. I recall coming out of a movie theater and watching how people were almost bowing to screen as if an altar in Church. This is what happens in worship: God's presence and his actions are revealed and we must respond.

Our Response to God involves elements that we can speak of separately, but we must be careful not to break these down and

separate them completely. On the one hand we have the substance of worship: these are things like the preaching of God's word, praise, the Lord's Supper, baptism, prayer, the public reading of the word, confession, and thanksgiving. We include all the actions, forms, and traditions that God's people have always used to participate in worship and encounter God's presence. On the other hand, there is the experience of the worshipper and the worshipping church. This involves current events, language, issues, problems, feeling, style, style of church music. When a local congregation experiences tragedy, perhaps a sudden death of a beloved member or leader, their worship that Sunday is going to be different than the congregation that on the same Sunday celebrates because people they have been praying for respond to the gospel. Each church participates in the same substance of worship, but their experience is different. That's biblical; the psalms are a collection of Israel's worship songs. Not every song comes from the same experience. Sometimes the psalmist is angry, confused, sad, thankful, reflective. joyous, or experience can also vary because of culture.

When the substance of worship and the experience of the worshipper combine, worth is ascribed to God. That is the core dynamic of our response to God's presence and his mighty acts. Combined, these elements represent our way of participating together in our worshipful response to God.

When you break out of the ordinary, the well worn ways of worship, when you dare to take off your shoes, you will find that you are indeed standing on Holy Ground – and what a difference it makes. Today think outside your normal Church of England worship box, let the silence, the lack of familiar words and postures speak to you of a deeper encounter with God.
