





those wild greens since they are young and tender at that period, later becoming dry, yellowed or later becoming dry, yellowed or woody. They are deservedly class-ed among the protective foods since they contain large amounts of iron and Vitamin A and considerable amounts of Vitamins C, G and The thiamin component of B-1. They are also rich in calcium and other minerals. They also contribute rough-age to the diet which is essential for good elimination. Thorough washing is the firs step in preparing the greens for the table. Warm water facilitates washing away the dirt particles, but if the leaves are to be served raw, the final waters should be cold. The greens should not be allowed to stand in water. stand in water.

In cooking, just enough water that will cling to the leaves should be used, and any liquid residue should be saved and served with the dish since this contains an appreciable amount of vitamins and minerals. As an alternative, the water from the greens may be erved in soups or gravies.

served in soups or gravies.

To reduce the loss of vitamins from heat, the cooking time should not exceed five to ten minutes. Salt may be added as desired. If the cover is removed from the vessel as soon as the greens are wilted, the natural color will be preserved.

As seasoning, besides the salt rad pepper, cooked greens are served with butter or other fat, with bacon, salt pork fried crisp, or with sliced, hard-boiled eggs. Mildly flavored greens are garnished with finely-chopped onions or green peppers.

Favored in some parts of the country is a combination made of several kinds of raw greens chopped and served with a dressing of oil, vinegar, salt and peppst. To this dressing there may also be added, according to fancy, bits of bacon, sliced, hard-boiled egg, or chopped sweet pickle.

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


