## Middle School homework line a hot one

Jim White, Lowell Director of Instruction, said back in April that he'd wait to see how many calls come in through Homework Hotline before critiquing it.

If usage of the hotline is the barometer, than the mercury has blown right through the top.

In terms of number of teachers in the program and the number of calls, Lowell Middle School is on a recordsetting pace.
