Paul Isley September's Speaker *Tillandsias*

Paul T. Isley III is a native Southern Californian who graduated from UCLA where he was first introduced to *Tillandsia* in the mid 1960s while a student, by one of his herpetology teaching assistants, Mark Dimmitt,.

Paul began Genus Tillandsia in 1974 and two years later it evolved into Rainforest Flora, Inc. Also in 1976 Jerry Robinson joined Paul and together they have built Rainforest Flora, Inc. into one of the world's premier Bromeliad nurseries

They have also introduced hundreds of exquisite bromeliad and Tillandsia species, cultivars, and hybrids to the marketplace. They were thrilled to learn how much Tillandsia hybrids exhibit great vigor, growing much larger with correspondingly larger blooms than either parent. Rainforest Flora distributes their "home grown" bromeliads and staghorn ferns to chain stores, nurseries and botanical gardens around the U.S. and the world. Public demand for Tillandsia is increasing significantly and the plants are becoming especially popular in Asia. Also, tillandsias are being used more and more by cutting edge interior landscapers and florists who are looking for special, modern looking plants that are easy to maintain.

Paul published Tillandsia in 1987 and this large format coffee table book has since become a collector's item, especially the luxurious leather-bound edition. In 2010, he came out with Tillandsia II that, among other things, has a new chapter devoted to Tillandsia hybrids that didn't exist back in the 1980s.

Talk topic: 44 Years of Growing Tillandsia, the Lilac Fire, and Rainforest Flora

Paul will spend a few minutes recapitulating and relating how he became interested in Tillandsia and how that evolved into the nation's largest nursery that specializes in this fascinating genus in the Bromeliad family.

Next, On December 7th, 2017 the Lilac Fire in North County San Diego destroyed Rainforest Flora's largest growing facility. Paul will talk about how it happened along with graphic photos that show how utterly destructive fire can be. Fortunately, and as a fascinating story in and of itself, many tillandsias are incredible resilient and the story and photos of what has transpired since the fire is almost miraculous.

Next, Paul will present eye-catching photos of some of the best Tillandsia species, cultivars and hybrids that have been grown and developed in recent years. It's the breath-taking beauty of so many Tillandsia in general and many of the hybrids in particular that have provided such a strong attraction and developed such a life-long passion for Paul over the years. Finally, he will show photos of their Torrance location that is replete with rockscape waterfalls and koi ponds—a destination for those who appreciate ornamental horticulture in and eye-opening setting.



Whipkey's Word September 2020 INFORMATION



Did you watch the weather on TV the other day? No, not the updates on Hurricane Laura, the out of sight heat index

(Can you say 111?), or that it would be 84° when you pick up your morning paper. I mean the really exciting news that we could get our first cold front in early September! Anytime the daytime high is below 90°, it will feel fine to me. The bad thing about getting our first cold front is that it will only be our FIRST cold front. Cold fronts are like ants. It seems like there is never just one; more always follow close behind.

Last November I talked about winterizing. Are you ready? I hope so. To properly winterize, you need to know information about your plants. Let us make information our word of the month for September.

In a past life, I taught math, physics, and computer science. All of these subjects at one time or another has to deal with data. Temperatures, ages, program run times, and so on. At that time, I defined information as data that had been made meaningful.

Let us define information as data that has been organized, interpreted, structured, or presented in a way that it has meaning and is useful.

What information do you keep about your plants? Last month I made some suggestions. If you don't remember them all, feel free to look them up. Did I miss something? Of course, I did. I neglected to suggest keeping cultural information about each plant. Let me tell you why that information is so important.

Every plant should be cultivated under ideal growing conditions. The light, water, potting medium, fertilizer, temperature, and air flow should be the best that you can provide. How can you do that if you don't know what conditions the plants like; you don't if you don't have that cultural information? Spring, summer, and fall are forgiving. Bromeliads are tropical plants. Most of them like our summer conditions. We can place our plants around the yard or patio and they will probably be happy. Oh, we might need to watch out for sunburn and adjust our watering, but our conditions are probably not that much different than the growing conditions where they originated. We know that in the summer temperatures are going to be hot, but we can control most of the other conditions. True, you might not be able to give your *Dyckias* the near full sun that they would prefer, but you can probably find a spot where they can get enough sun to be happy. They might not have the best color, but it should be good enough for state work. But come winter, all bets are off.

Cold weather usually means that we must move our plants into a protected area where they will not freeze. A little heat most can take, but freezing temperatures, not so much so. In winter storage they will probably be crowded, and receive far less light and tender loving care than they had been accustomed to the remainder of the year. This is when information about correct cultural conditions becomes critical. You need to know which plants need the warmest conditions that you can provide, and which ones need to have the most light that you can provide.

Hopefully you have researched your plants and collected data about your plants in previous years. That data, when interpreted should provide you with the information that you need to care for your plants no matter what the season.

Editor's Note:


Margo Racca resides in Iowa, Louisiana that was very heavily damaged by hurricane Laura. We are awaiting to see if she needs anything.






