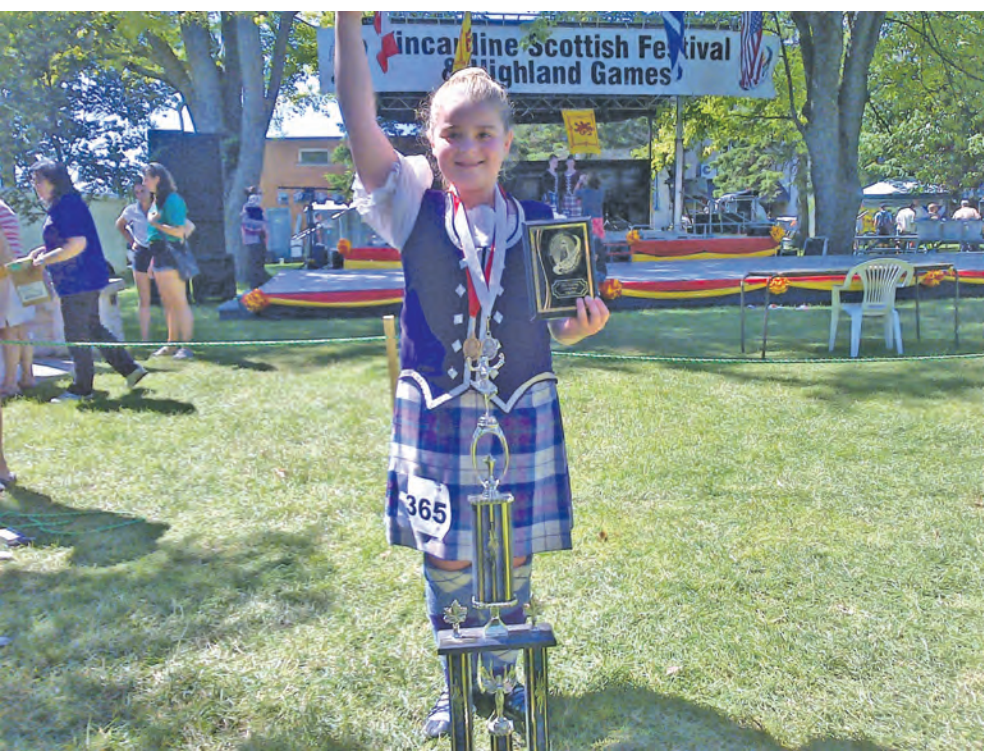


Not long after this picture was taken, we have to thank the two elderly ladies who had not stopped to enjoy or take a picture (as our neighbour thought), but instead dug them up.

2014 "I Scrubbed the Tub" Event: Full Bellies, a Tidy Village and \$1,350 Raised for the Food Bank

The second annual Scrub the Tub event happened in Tobermory on June 24. The event was organized and sponsored by the Crownsnest Pub, assisted by the Tobermory Chamber of Commerce. The underwater clean-up was organized and sponsored by Divers Den. Seventeen other businesses also sponsored the event. The sponsors all got their names on the back of the shirts. The event raised \$1,350 for Tobermory's Food Bank.



All Scrub the Tub volunteers got a fluorescent orange "I Scrubbed the Tub 2014" T-shirt with the names of all twenty sponsors on the back.

Despite the cool and rainy weather, somewhere over 125 people, including 13 divers, came out to put on an orange t-shirt and clean up the village of Tobermory. Altogether, they gathered 776 pounds of garbage (plus some glass and other materials that were collected or recycled).

The rain had stirred up the harbour so the divers had very limited visibility. Despite that, they brought an impressive array of junk and treasures to the surface again this year. A harbour bottom is something of a time capsule — every bottle, tire or bit of junk that was ever tossed or fumbled into the water will settle into the ooze on the bottom and wait patiently for somebody to dive down and pick it up. This year's crop of jetsam included a lot of pop bottles from before the days of twist-off tops and postal codes.

The after-party at the Crownsnest was amazing. The "scrubbers" went through 40 pizzas and a keg and a half of beer.

"The Season" got off to a grand beginning and the village starts off with a freshly scrubbed face.

Finding Ways To Preserve Excellence In Education In Northern Bruce Peninsula

I attended a PACE (Peninsula Action Committee for Education) meeting on July 8th. It was held at the United Church in Lion's Head. Ten people came out; five from Tobermory and five from "Lion's Head" (an elastic designation which often turns out to include Stokes Bay, Pike Bay, Barrow Bay and Ferndale).

PACE was formed earlier this year when it became obvious that dwindling enrolment numbers could threaten Northern Bruce Peninsula's education system.

The immediate challenge seemed to be that smaller class sizes would bring reduced staffing, making it difficult to have enough specialists on staff to deliver a full secondary curriculum.

The idea was that PACE — unaffiliated with any school — could address broader issues and broader perspectives than the SCCs (School Community Committees) could. PACE would be part think-tank, part advocacy group, part community outreach — whatever was needed to maintain and improve the quality of education on the Bruce Peninsula.

The first thing you notice at a PACE meeting is that the committee members are passionate and knowledgeable about education. They understand the

importance of the High Skills Specialist program in Environmental Science; they understand the value of small schools close to home; they are reaching out to the Education Faculties at various universities for new ideas on delivering excellent curriculum to small numbers of students.

It quickly becomes obvious that this is not just about protecting our community schools; this is about preserving excellence in education. "Ask any graduate of the High Skills Major in the Environment what they thought of BPDS," one organizer points out. "We have got to be a lot less bashful about the things we do very, very well."

It all comes down to one central issue: what can we do to make our small schools viable?

Discussion around the table explores the overlap between economics, politics and education. The Ministry of Education allots the money; the Bluewater School Board decides how to spend it to deliver curriculum. The Board's consultant report recommends closing St Edmunds Elementary in Tobermory and busing all the children to Lion's Head, then closing

BPDS Secondary and busing all the Secondary children to Wiarton.

Quality of education is frustratingly absent from this equation.

The Accommodation Review process (by which Boards evaluate the future of underutilized school buildings) was discussed at length.

Alternative service models were discussed.

"Just think how things would change if they had to deliver a cost-effective service," one member commented. With policing, for example, if a municipality does not like the OPP proposal, they can establish their own police department or contract with another policing agency.

If a Board of Education had to justify its offering on a municipality-by-municipality basis, things would be very different. A proposal like the one we will face — offering elementary education in a single location only and busing all the secondary kids somewhere else — would never even be considered.

I tossed out my pet idea. Nearly a quarter of our property taxes goes to education. That is well over three million dollars for Northern Bruce Peninsula. That money ends up going to the Province, which then allots money to Bluewater District School Board.

If push comes to shove, I think we should demand to have our own school board — the Northern Bruce Peninsula School Board — and get the best education we can for that three million dollars. I'm sure we could do a lot better than a single elementary school and no high school.

The group then identified ten aspects of the education issue that need to be researched (see graphic, page 6) and assigned tasks to various members.

If you have an interest and want to work with PACE, their next meeting will be in the Board Room at the Tobermory Site for the Peninsula Family Health Team on Thursday July 24th at 6:30 P.M. Progress reports on the assigned research can be expected.

Letter: Northern Bruce Peninsula - Underground Economy? Regulations - By Laws Not Enforced - No Restrictions

After spending a lifetime working hard to build a motel in Tobermory, following all the requirements of our Municipality, we are now facing what seems like an underground economy.

Motels, commercial cottages and campgrounds are governed by regulations, for the safety and enjoyment of the traveling public. They adhere to the codes for building, fire, health and safety, and insurance. Commercial accommodators pay commercial taxes and support the Chamber of Commerce. They hire staff that helps support our local economy.

In 1997 the first B&B was established. This B&B was not permitted until the creation of the by-laws pertaining to B&Bs; the municipality developed a committee to write these by-laws.

Section 6.7 of the Official Comprehensive Plan for NBP. 6.11.1 through 6.11.10 describes the requirements of B&B establishments.

- 6.11.10 "All Bed and Breakfast establishments must be licensed by the corporation".

NBP has not issued a licence since the first B&B and admits they don't know how many B&Bs there are within NBP and there is no protocol for fire inspections.

The licensing issue was discussed at a council meeting and council concurred they will visit that issue as part of a comprehensive zoning bylaw update,

possibly in 2015.

Why has the municipality ignored this section of the By-law?

I learned that a private cottage rental had 18 people and 5 vehicles on the May Long weekend. This cottage is rented through one of the .com sites. The cottage advertises 3 bedrooms and 2 bathrooms that will accommodate 14-28 people. The cottage is not connected to town sewer, as most are not.

This Canada Day weekend, this cottage rental had 8+ cars and two groups of people (unknown to each other): a group of 14 and another group of at least 10 (these people are not visiting friends, they are paying customers).

There are more than 200 .com cottages rentals in NBP. This is a rapidly growing industry. People are buying cottages only for the revenue they can generate. Cottage owners are not visiting, dining, shopping, golfing and upgrading cottages, because of the revenue their cottage can generate.

Council does not feel this issue is important... wonder why... ? There are no regulations!

The Ontario Municipal Board had made a decision on Short Term Accommodation, in a report issued June 22, 2011. "Short Term Accommodation means a dwelling or any part thereof that

operates or offers three or more bedrooms as a place of temporary residence, lodging or occupancy by way of concession, permit, lease, license, rental agreement or similar commercial arrangement for any period of 30 consecutive calendar days or less throughout all or part of the calendar year. Short Term Accommodation shall not mean or include a motel, hotel, bed and breakfast establishments, hospital, or similar commercial or institutional uses.

The OMB states "that Short Term Accommodation units are distinct commercial entities with the goal of making a profit. They are often managed by a professional manager who uses a system of reservation, collects taxes and accepts credit cards from paying guests whose permanent residences are elsewhere and who have no right of renewal. Those premises are occupied by paying guests for a short span of time and for the purpose of allowing enjoyment of the recreational and tourist facilities in the area. This commercial entity has the potential to conflict with the character and stability of existing neighbourhoods

because of the constant turnover of people and the difficulty that turnover brings in controlling noise and other nuisances."

Since the Ontario Municipal Board ruling, other municipalities require Short Term Accommodation to follow guidelines and be licensed. The owner is responsible for ensuring compliance with all by-laws and other applicable regulations.

After writing letters to council, attending 2 council meetings, and many phone calls, I was given the big brush off, stating I was the only one with concerns.

I am not opposed to private cottage rentals and B&Bs, but feel strongly that the same rules should apply to anyone renting to the traveling public, for the safety of visitors, the integrity of our environment, the protection of commercial accommodators and loss of revenue for our township and Chamber of Commerce.

Letter: Let's Look For A More Reasoned Approach To Growth

There is no doubt, Tobermory has become a major tourist destination, and rightfully so. Nobody can dispute the incredible beauty the Bruce Peninsula provides not only to the many tourists but also the people who live here.

Although tourism has provided many opportunities for business and of course the jobs that go with it, it also has shown to have its down sides. By its very nature it is pretty well limited to the summer holiday season, but does take in most of

Tobermory, leaving the town deserted for most of the year.

This will not only discourage new people to make this their home, but it will mean we will lose services like schools, gas stations, daycare centers, golf courses, medical facilities etc. that would normally be required for a larger population.

Many of these services would provide employment well past the short summer months. One only has to look at Florida, a state that lives almost entirely on such services for snow birds and other retirees.

Furthermore the excessive influx of tourists in a very short time frame is beginning to fray the patience and good will of people who have made this their home since long before the explosive increase in tourism happened. This in turn will polarize opinions on whether business is good for this town or not. What we should ask ourselves is; how can we promote a healthy growth in population requiring more extensive services and have a reasonable tourist industry not interfering with the lives of people living here.

And our politicians should realize that the assessed value of many properties will decrease through excessive tourism thereby lowering the tax base. Most of the town's revenue comes from residential properties! Let's look for a more reasoned approach to growth.

Fresh Start Group: School Closures Threaten Community

Once again, the St. Edmunds School in Tobermory is threatened with closure. Ten years ago, the same threat was defeated and the school Board made a commitment to the community not to bus St. Edmunds' children in Kindergarten up to Grade 6. The Board soon reneged on this commitment and today the St. Edmunds School only offers JK to Grade 4. All others are bused to Lion's Head.

The reasons given for recommending the closure today are, as always, strictly financial. The Province funds the Board based on enrolment. As the enrolment falls, the cost of maintaining increasingly empty school buildings rises. The standard response is to close schools and ship the kids off to a larger facility elsewhere. The finance people in the Ministry of Education are

not concerned with issues like "quality of education" in spite of overwhelming evidence that children learn better in small schools. Nor are they concerned about the negative impacts of busing small children long distances. The lack of proper rest, boredom, negative behaviours, reduced attention spans, loss of extra-curricular activities, loss of family time and demonstrated lower education outcomes are all irrelevant to the financial brains.

Watson & Associates of Mississauga, a firm of consulting economists, have looked at the enrolment numbers in the NBP and have made three recommendations. The first is to close the Tobermory School and bus all the JK to Grade 4 children to Lion's Head. The second is to close the high school in Lions Head. The third is to build a new school for all the NBP elementary

students, presumably in Lion's Head. The consultants did not consider whether it might make sense to stop busing all the Grade 5 to 8 St. Edmunds kids to Lion's Head and educate them at the relatively new Tobermory School, thus making it more financially viable and reducing the cost of busing.

There are at least three reasons why the residents of the Municipality should be concerned about the closure of the St. Edmunds School. First are the negative impacts of putting children as young as four on a bus for three hours a day, which should concern all who care for the welfare of children. The second is the effect on Tobermory's ability to grow and prosper. Without a school, the possibility of attracting new families to Tobermory is almost zero. The third reason affects all taxpayers in the Municipality. Twenty three per

cent of property taxes go to education. As taxpayers we should expect that this money is used to provide quality education to all of our children. According to the research, putting our small children through a three hour daily bus trip under the supervision of a bus driver undermines their ability to learn. It will also ensure that the Bluewater District School Board does not meet its own stated objectives which are: providing a quality educational experience for every student in a safe and caring environment.

PACE Update: Quality Education Close to Home

Peninsula Action Committee for Education (PACE) held a planning meeting on July 8th. At this meeting, attended by interested parents and community members from throughout the Municipality, we confirmed our guiding principles and set out an ambitious agenda to meet the educational needs of students in our Municipality.

Our goal, simply put, is Quality Education Close to Home. All of our work supports the three schools - St. Edmunds Public School, the Bruce Peninsula District School Elementary and the Bruce Peninsula District School Secondary. In the early stages, our work will focus on identifying and researching the issues which present challenges for our schools and then sharing the results with students, parents and the community. We want to ensure that we are proposing solutions that reflect the needs of students, families and the community.

This committee assigns homework:

At its July 8 meeting, PACE identified a number of subjects it needs to research and issues it needs to address. The likelihood of a School Accommodation Review beginning in the fall adds urgency to the process.

We are looking at four broad areas; program viability; community sustainability; policy; and, health and safety. The topics shown in the graphic relate to one or more of these broad areas. Members of PACE have chosen the topics of most interest to them and have begun to gather information to share.

There are no quick fixes to this problem. With the release of the Watson report by the Bluewater District School Board in May, the threat of school closures looms large. This threat has given a new urgency to our work; we must be ready for an Accommodation Review (ARC), if and when it is called.

Our structure is collaborative. Our focus is on all our schools. Our agenda is ambitious. Our goal is a quality education program close to home. Please continue to follow us in the Bruce Peninsula Press and on our blog at <http://bpeducationmatters.wordpress.com>.

BPBO: Giving A Helping Hand To Our Local Birds

Some birds have it tough these days! As part of a three year study, the Bruce Peninsula Bird Observatory (BPBO) has been monitoring some bird species at risk, here on the upper Peninsula.

Big drops in population numbers have been noted in at least two groups of birds found locally. "Aerial insectivores", birds that catch insects while flying, have lost 80% to 95% of their numbers in the last few decades. Familiar birds, such as Barn and Tree Swallows, are much harder to find. Nighthawks, once actually a "common" nighttime bird on the Bruce, often heard calling overhead at dusk, are downright rare these days. If there is any good news, BPBO has found that Whip-poor-wills seem to be holding their own around here, at least for the time being.

Another group of birds that is struggling right now are grassland birds, such as Meadowlarks and Bobolinks. While numbers of these birds elsewhere in Ontario and Eastern Canada have dropped significantly, Grey/Bruce remains a relative stronghold for them. Reduction in suitable nesting habitat and possible changes in their insect forage base are likely causes for the falling populations of these agriculturally beneficial bird

species. When these birds are around, it is hard to miss their bold colours and beautiful songs, as they perch out where everyone can see them along fence lines and atop tall weeds. Many farmers appreciate having these birds around, ones that they have known all their lives, especially for insect pest control.

Originally nesting in grassland habitat before European settlement of the area, Bobolinks and Meadowlarks quickly took advantage of pastureland for nesting. However, with fewer horses being used in agriculture, and with the much reduced beef market, pastures make up less and less of the farmland on the Bruce Peninsula. These valuable birds have increasingly used hayfields as nesting habitat. This has landed them in a bit of trouble, since it is a gamble each year to get their young out of the nest and flying before the hay crop is removed. Unfortunately, there is only about a 5% survival rate for nestlings who have not made it out of the nest by haying time.

Some people are tempted to paint farmers as the "bad guys" in all this, but the demands of running a successful farm business are also critical, and must be considered in any solutions. Cutting hay at its nutritional peak makes real sense when it is depended on for winter feed. However, there may be a way to balance

the necessities of modern farming and the needs of our bird species at risk.

BPBO has taken the advice of experts (often farmers themselves) from across Ontario, including participating in the Ontario Grassland Bird Forum held at the University of Guelph this April. BPBO has passed along several suggestions to local farmers, through a recent mail box flyer program. While not always possible, leaving the hay up until July 15 gives Bobolinks, Meadowlarks, and other grassland bird species time to raise their young. Regardless of the date, cutting the outside of fields first (6 to 10 swaths with the mower), and leaving the center of the field for longer, is also very helpful, as grassland birds don't usually nest close to the edge of a field, especially along a roadway. If it is apparent where birds are nesting in a field, that area can be cut around and left for later. BPBO was taken up on its offer to locate grassland bird nesting areas for farmers before the first cut for hay this year. This free, no-strings-attached service will be offered again in June 2015.

BPBO would like to thank those farmers on the upper Bruce Peninsula who made some of these adjustments this June and July to help our grassland bird species at risk. It is this kind of positive

stewardship that can bring long term benefits to our shared environment and community, and especially our grassland bird species at risk.

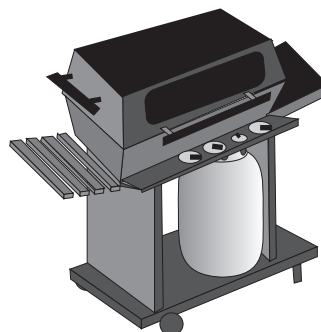

The Grey Bruce Health Services Board has been searching for a new CEO and President since the announcement that Maureen Solecki would retire late June. A recruitment committee was formed with membership from the Board, medical staff, support personal, senior staff, and members of the medical management teams from various hospital sites. The committee engaged the services of a large well known recruitment firm which specializes in the medical field. The committee spent several months approaching groups of staff at all six hospitals and holding focus groups for the various communities to have input into the criteria to be used for the hiring of a new CEO.

Over 30 applications were received from across Canada! The committee and senior staff reviewed these applicants for their appropriateness and chose nine to be considered thoroughly. After much debate the group decided to give first interviews to five of the nine applicants. Finally narrowing the field, the committee gave second interviews to the top three candidates and chose a leader at last! The process was long and thoughtful with much input and deliberation. SUCCESSFUL JOINT TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT INITIATIVE

In The Garden: Hints From A Mrs. Gardener Shade, Shade and Still More Shade

Shade loving plants are all about, size, colour variation and texture. Here are some more to think about that work for me.

HEUCHERA (coral bells) lots to chose from, try grouping them together to make a prettier impact.

HEUCHERELLA - foamy bells, tiny dainty flowers, pretty in the shady garden.

HIBISCUS - (rose mallow) I finally got one this year Copper King. Burgundy rust foliage. I have it caged until I find out if it's critter food. I HATE RABBITS.

HOSTA - the ultimate shade plant, hundreds to chose from, 8" - 5ft. Perfect plant for the shade, BUT the rabbits do eat on them. I HATE RABBITS.

LAMIUM - yellow archangel is a favorite of mine just keep it away from a garden, it will take over very quickly.

LIATRIS (gay feather) native plant, purple, real pretty in part shade, but the rabbits

eat them to the ground. I HATE RABBITS.

LIGULARIA - from the burgundy foliage of Dentata to the feathery green of the Rocket with its tall yellow spikes, this plant stands out in any part shade garden.

PENSTEMON (beard tongue) quite a few to chose but most tolerate a part shade spot in the mix.

BALLOON FLOWERS - very late to appear in the spring so I mark their spot in the fall. Pretty unusual flowers, worth waiting for.

JACOBS LADDER - I had a pretty variegated one with blue flowers but it did not survive last winter's cold.

SOLOMON'S SEAL - tall 4-5 ft. Very majestic in the shade, plant these against a wall for support, very striking.

PRIMULA - again so many to chose from but I think my favorite is still the old fashioned cowslip.

PULMONARIA (lung wort) pink and blue flowers in early spring. Cut back after blooming and it will come right back

resembling a polka dot hosta.

RODGERSIA - Love this in the garden very tall very stately. Rabbits don't eat it. I HATE RABBITS.

RUDBECKIA - black eyed susan, easy to grow, very nice cottage garden flower, goldsturm will spread out.

LAMB'S EARS - I really like the foliage on this plant, grey and fuzzy. I don't let it flower, I just like it for its foliage.

TIARELLA (foam flower) early bloomer, tiny, tiny, light pink flowers, dainty appearance.

TRADESCANTIA (spiderwort) Cut this guy right back after he blooms and he will keep rewarding you all summer.

VIOLETS (viola) Love the foliage, love the flowers, love the name (my Mom's), perfect for a woodland setting.

There are so many plants with pretty flowers but even prettier foliage for the shade, so many different textures. It is a big challenge in a shade garden but so rewarding.

But I HATE RABBITS.

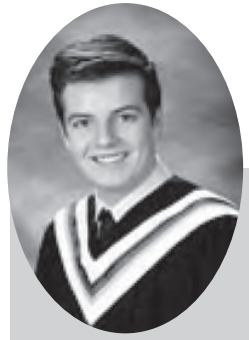

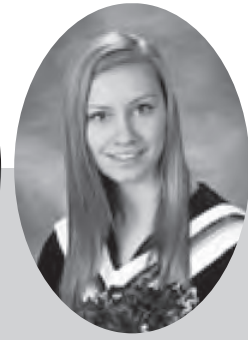

Climate Comment For June 2014: The Year Is Gradually Returning To "Normal" – As Are Lake Levels

After a procession of much colder months than usual, May got close to normal and June actually reached normal. Even so, the first three-quarters

of the month were relatively cool and it was only the last five days that warmed up enough to give us a real feel of summer.

The mean temperature was 14.4C with a low of 5.5C on the 15th and a high

of 28.3C on the 29th. Winds were quite calm; several days so absolutely still that the lake became a mirror. The predominant wind direction was from the south and the highest wind speed was 43.5 km/hr on the 30th, though it was much windier on the Lake Huron shore than it was in Big Tub Harbour.

There were only five rainy days, giving us a total of 52 mm. The long-term mean is 66 mm so June was little drier than usual, though pretty much normal for my 18 year old station. As is generally true for our area in the summer, most of the rain fell in just two storms, on the 17th and the 24th.

Most remarkable is the speed at which lake levels have risen. Since June of 2013 levels have risen 40 cm, or roughly 15 inches. This is an enormous change in the course of just one year; it is perhaps best appreciated in the two photos attached. Whereas last year one could walk to the tug at Lee's Fishery without getting one's feet wet, this year hip waders will be required!

It is uncertain whether this is a trend towards the average levels of the last century (another 20 cm higher than today) or just a short-term recovery. There are those that believe the fluctuations we've been experiencing are simply a natural phenomenon and that all is OK, and there are those that believe that climate change is causing a secular trend downwards and that today's levels are a temporary blip. One thing is certain – the sheer volume of water we've added in the last year is incredible. It is about as much as would be needed to cover Nova Scotia with nearly three feet of water!

selling Demeter flour at the farmers' market. 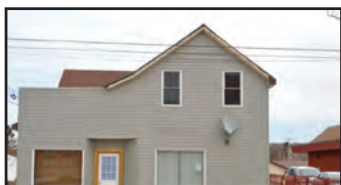

Tour Launches Bruce Peninsula's Conservation And Stewardship Plan

We carefully climbed the rugged rocks at Greig's Caves while glancing up at the cavernous dolostone looming overhead. Our guides Sean Lipere, Program Manager for the Bruce Peninsula Biosphere Association and Jenna McGuire, naturalist at the Bruce Peninsula National Park, excitedly pointed upwards to the old white cedar growing out of the cliff. Over a century ago fires had decimated so many of the Peninsula's ancient forests it was possible to see the waters of Georgian Bay then turn and look at Lake Huron.

We were on a day-long Biodiversity Tour June 23, sponsored by the Bruce Peninsula Biosphere Association, to celebrate the launch of the Bruce Peninsula Conservation and Stewardship Plan. The plan is a community action initiative to protect, maintain and restore the rich diversity of the Peninsula's plant, fish and wildlife through

land and water conservation.

About 40 of us, comfortably ensconced on a school bus, experienced the unique ecological environments of the Bruce Peninsula from the islands off Tobermory to Chief's Point on the Lake Huron coast, and to Cape Croker on the Georgian Bay coast. Forests, open lands, alvars, inland waters, Great Lakes shorelines, coastal wetlands and nearshore waters distinguish the Bruce Peninsula for its abundance of rare and endangered species.

Fortified with cookies, apples and oranges provided by Sean and Jenna, we toured six ecological sites while learning about First Nations' tales of historic low water levels (backed by science); how the design of the Lady Slipper orchid guides insects to capture pollen, and studied photos of flora and insects on an iPad.

One of the highlights was a visit to the Six Streams initiative, an alternative livestock watering site in upper Stokes River funded by the EcoAction Program and Ontario Trillium Foundation.

This project, managed by Neils Munk, works with farmers on the Stokes River and Old Woman's River to provide stream side fencing and solar-powered pumped water troughs so cattle do not enter streams to drink. When the project is completed, a reduction of phosphorus will be achieved. Judges Creek will eventually be a part of this initiative.

Returning to the Lion's Head Arena, we were feted with gourmet appetizers prepared by the Ferndale and Lion's Head Lionesses, followed by congratulatory remarks from Councillor Tom Boyle, Municipality of Northern Bruce Peninsula; John Close, Mayor, Town of South Bruce Peninsula and Warden of Bruce County; Milt McIver, Mayor of the Municipality of Northern Bruce Peninsula and MPP Bill Walker. Music was provided by local musician Bobby Dean Blackburn.

Successful funding for the Bruce Peninsula Biosphere Association results from the hard work of chair Elizabeth Thorn. Major funding for the Conservation and Stewardship Plan was contributed by the Friends of the Greenbelt Foundation.

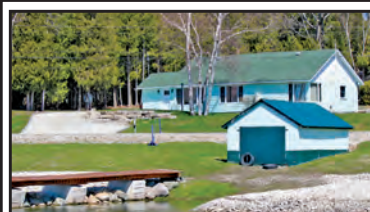

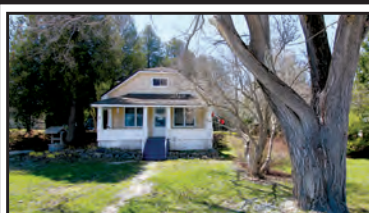

We Did It! BPDS Is An EcoSchool!

Staff and students at Bruce Peninsula District School have worked hard in the past to become a unique UNESCO school (following the 4 pillars of the United Nations) and a Transition School (which brought the great school garden). Over the course of the past school year, they were back at it. Everyone worked steadily from September till June to become an accredited EcoSchool.

Ontario EcoSchools is an environmental education and certification program for grades K-12 that helps school communities develop both ecological literacy and environmental practices to become environmentally responsible citizens and reduce the environmental footprint of schools.

The key areas of focus and achievement are: Teamwork & Leadership, Energy Conservation, Waste Minimization, School Ground Greening and Curriculum, and Environmental Stewardship.

In the dark days of late winter, the students conducted a surprise garbage audit

of the school. While everyone thought the recycling and composting programs were well established and successful, students discovered there was room for improvement. Suggestions rolled in and changes were made: garbage cans became the smallest container in all locations, some garbage cans were removed from the cafeteria and more compost and recycling bins were added, and signage was improved throughout the building. All students and staff have taken ownership of the waste diversion program and great gains were made in a very short time.

Some secondary students conducted a thorough energy audit and it was discovered that with lights turning off automatically and an established awareness about energy use, the school group was doing a pretty good job of conserving energy.

In an ongoing effort to "green" the school yard, the grade 2's established a maple tree nursery of first year saplings that will be replanted to a permanent home when the students are in grade 6. The school garden was planted this spring and is being maintained over the summer by volunteer families and community supporters.

BPDS is known for its successful Ideas and Science fairs. Curriculum from kindergarten to grade 12 reflects a strong leaning to inspire, engage and empower today's youth to make a difference while developing active citizenship skills and ecological literacy by responding to the increasingly urgent issue of climate change.

Congratulations to the students, staff and community supporters on this latest feather in the school's cap.

Remembering Larkwhistle: New Bench at Lion's Head Library

Last year (2013), after 38 seasons of delighting countless visitors with the magic of their garden, Patrick Lima and John Scanlan decided the time had come to close Larkwhistle to the public. As a group, BPEG wanted to find a way to honour Larkwhistle Garden – a reminder of the pleasure, beauty and education that this special

place has brought to so many. A number of ideas were tossed about and it was agreed that BPEG would install a 'Remembering Larkwhistle' bench in a public space for this purpose. With Patrick & John's enthusiastic 'okay', BPEG began to look both for a co-sponsor and a place where such a bench would be appreciated.

Since Patrick and John often walk the woodland and cliff-side trails of the

Peninsula, we thought first of The Bruce Trail Association, but it seemed they already had their quota of benches. The local Peninsula Bruce Trail Club, on the other hand, liked the idea and offered to contribute to the cost. Enter Suzanne Dyke, who volunteers to take care of the gardens at the Lion's Head Library, and had been trying for years to have a bench placed under the tree in front of the library. This seemed a perfect spot, especially given the books that Patrick and John have put out over the years.

There's always red tape, but eventually the necessary permissions fell into place. The next step was to build a one-of-kind bench, preferably with recycled and sustainable local materials, as well as local skills. Jim Kuellmer designed the bench, milled the hornbeam (ironwood) boards (from a fallen tree), and then engaged Bill Loghrin to shape the metal supports.

In his workshop Jim put the pieces together - and the result is a beauty.

On June 21, 2014 – fittingly, the Summer Solstice, a time when many people used to visit Larkwhistle to see its colourful flowers at their height – the new bench was installed in front of the library, thanks to the helpful hands of Jim, Suzanne and Don McIlraith. Now there is a shady place to sit by the library – other than the concrete steps!

Library staff are very excited. Library Supervisor, Kristina Porr says "The bench is beautiful and makes a lovely spot for people to read or use the free library wifi. We really appreciate all the effort put into bringing this bench here."

We hope that many folks will take time to enjoy the bench and, as you do, remember the gifts and inspiration of Larkwhistle.

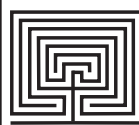

Peninsula Family Health Team News: What Is A Locum?

Have you recently called the Peninsula Family Health Team to book an appointment and been told that your doctor is away but a locum is covering and wondered, what is a locum?

A locum is a visiting doctor who temporarily takes the place of one of our four doctors when they are away from the clinic either on vacation, attending meetings or participating in professional training.

The locum doctor helps the Peninsula Family Health Team ensure that regular clinic hours are not disrupted even when one of the regular doctors is away.

Family health team patients who require a medical appointment when their regular practitioner is not in the office are encouraged to book with locums. If you choose not to take an available appointment with a locum doctor, you may experience a delay in booking an appointment to see your doctor when they return to the clinic.

Locum doctors are fully registered with the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario and can assist you with your medical needs in the same manner as if you were seeing your regular family doctor.
