We had a good year recording in 2018 but it was very disappointing on the Orchid monitoring front. The extremely warm and dry summer meant that a lot of Orchid species did not show or we saw just the occasional plant. We are hoping for better results in 2019.

The inputting of records is carrying on at a good rate. I am at last getting a lot of older records from the files put on to the BSBI Distribution Database.

Field Meetings 2018

v.c.65 now has quite a number of people who attend the Field Meetings and/or send in records. To Fal. Sarker and friends from the Darlington Natural History Society who send in an amazing amount of records, very many thanks.

A big thank you must go to Helen Proctor from Sussex who comes on holiday in the area and records solidly during her time here, she contributed more excellent records last year.

Last but definitely not least I must thank Deborah Millward who manages to join me for most Field Meetings, your botanical knowledge of the v.c. is invaluable. Sometimes she is accompanied by her daughter Rebecca, two for the price of one as they say

Recording

We record in monads (1x1km squares) but if we stray over the 1 km border into another monad in the same tetrad (2x2 km squares on the even numbered grid) we just record the extras. If however you cross the tetrad border into another tetrad you must make another complete list. That way if we ever decide to record at monad level for a finer resolution, the records are already in the correct format. The 2020 Atlas unlike previous versions, will be in Tetrads not Hectads (10x10 km squares) If you do send in records, a list on excel or

word will suffice, it needn't be in alphabetical order, even handwritten lists sent by post are fine. If you need recording cards just let me know, I can supply hard copies or email templates for you to print your own. Please remember to put in Recorders names, the date you recorded, GR of monad ie. NY81.11 or for notable plants perhaps an eight or ten figure GR. If you record Orchids could you send a picture too, this helps reduce erroneous records. We can supply lists of species for each hectad and lists of old records to re-find. We have produced an excel spreadsheet with all the tetrads and number of species recorded in each, if you would like a copy please ask me, it helps to highlight under-recorded tetrads.

Notable finds in 2018

Antirrhinum majus (Snapdragon) – Naturalised on the Castle walls and rocks below and was spotted on the New Year Plant Hunt on 31st December by Deborah Millward, Marie Saag and myself. This is the first record of this alien species in v.c.65. NZ17.00

Asperula cynanchica (Squinancywort)— Recorded by Deborah Millward at Redmire on a south facing calcareous bank on 6th September. This is the second v.c.65 record. SE05.90

Calendula officinalis (Pot Marigold) – Found by Tim Laurie and myself, naturalised by a path down to the Fishing Pond at Cleasby on 18th September. This was the third v.c.65 record for this species. NZ25.13.

Callitriche obtusangula (Blunt-fruited Water-starwort) – Almost certainly this species, though not been definitely identified yet due to lack of pollen. Found on 2nd September in Crakehall Mill Race by Deborah Millward and myself. SE24.90.

Carex divulsa subsp. leersii (Many-leaved Sedge) – Found by Deborah Millward beside the Packhorse Bridge below the falls at West Burton on 6th September. SE01.86.

Carex divulsa subsp. leersii (Many-leaved Sedge)— Another patch was found below Applegarth Scars above Richmond on 28th August by Yan Yee Lau, Chetan Padia and myself. NZ11.01

Chaenomeles japonica (Japanese Quince). This alien was found by Deborah Millward, Yan Yee Lau, Steve Gater, Jim

Parkin, Trevor Lowis and myself at Coverham by the road to Bird Ridding on 22 April, a first record for v.c.65. SE09.86

Cosmos bipinnatus (Mexican Aster) – This alien was found in an area sown with Wildflowers by the river in Crakehall, it was recorded on the 2nd September by Deborah Millward and myself.

Epipactis dunensis (Dune Helleborine) – One plant was recorded near the footpath on the riverbank below the old railway bridge near Easby Abbey by Deborah Millward, Rebecca Millward, Anne Luxmoore and myself on the 11th August. SE18.99

Erigeron karvinskianus (Mexican Fleabane)– This was found on the New Year Plant Hunt naturalised and flowering on a wall below the Castle at Richmond on 31st December by Deborah Millward, Marie Saag and myself. NZ17.00

Eschscholzia californica (Californian Poppy) – A few plants of this alien species were seen at Crakehall alongside a footpath on 2nd September by Deborah Millward and myself. SE24.90

Galinsoga parviflora (Gallant Soldier) – This was found on 2nd September alongside a track to Green Gate Farm, just outside Crakehall by Deborah Millward and myself. It was in a fenced off piece of verge where pigs had been kept and was growing with Chenopodium rubrum. It is the second v.c.65 record. SE24.90

Genista tinctoria (Dyer's Greenweed) – Trevor Lowis thought he had spotted this in flower on a coast to coast walk, he reported it to me but at the time didn't have time to investigate. Yan Yee Lau, Chetan Padia and myself went to check it out and we confirmed the record on 25th August. This is only the second post 2000 record. NZ11.01

Glebionis segetum (Corn Marigold)– This was found alongside a footpath on a field margin to Langthorn from Crakehall by Deborah Millward and myself on 2nd September. SE24.90

Gymnadenia densiflora (Marsh Fragrant Orchid) – This was spotted on Marsett Rigg by me on 26th June and confirmed by Alan Gendle. SD89.86

Helleborus x hybridus (Garden Hellebore) – This probable garden escape was beside the path into Abbey Wood, Richmond and recorded by Deborah Millward, Rebecca Millward, Anne Luxmoore and myself on 11th August. SE18.99

Helminthotheca echioides (Bristly Oxtongue) – This mainly southern species was found on the shore of the lagoon at the new extension to Nosterfield Reserve by Jim Parkin and myself during a Survey on 18th July. SE27.80

Hieracium bakeranum (Baker's Hawkweed) – Two plants had flowered and seeded on the riverside above Wynch Bridge when visited on the 1st October. There were three plants last year and this year's two plants are probably the last ones on the Planet. I did a thorough search of the cliffs and river edge and may have found a few more plants but we need to wait till later this year to get this confirmed.NY89.28

Hordelymus europaeus (Wood Barley) – Found by Tim Laurie and myself on the 7th September on the riverside footpath below Egglestone Abbey, two different sites both in the same monad. NZ06.14

Hymenophyllum wilsonii (Wilson's Filmy-fern) – Judith Allinson turned up one of the best finds of the year on 27th June, under a huge riverside boulder on the edge of the River Rawthey below Uldale House. SD72.96

Juncus subnodulosus (Blunt-flowered Rush) – This uncommon Rush was seen by Deborah Millward below Combe Scar in Dentdale on 7th July. SD67.87

Lathraea clandestina (Purple Toothwort) – This alien species (see above right) was spotted by Brian Burrow on the bank of the Ure above Boroughbridge on 5th May, quite a large patch (c. 1m diameter) growing on the roots of a Crack Willow, another 4 smaller patches were then spotted by myself and Brian Burrow a few metres upstream. This is a first record for v.c.65. SE37.66

Limosella aquatica (Mudwort) – This was spotted by Deborah Millward on the 4th August, on the northern edge of a very dried up Semerwater during the hot, dry summer. Also seen later when pieces were washed up on the shore after substantial rainfall. SD92.86

Linum grandiflorum (Red Flax) – Seen amongst planted wildflowers on the edge of the river in Crakehall on 2nd September by Deborah Millward and myself. A first record of this species in v.c.65. SE24.90

Lysimachia nummularium (Creeping Jenny) – Ths was seen on the 4th August the edge of Semerwater by Deborah Millward and myself, it had been washed up on the shore but had been seen earlier in flower on the south shore by Deborah.SD92.86

Malva x clementii (Garden Tree-mallow) – This garden Mallow was spotted on the riverbank just upstream from Easby Abbey on the 11th August by Deborah Millward, Rebecca Millward, Anne Luxmoore and myself. It was on an area of bank restoration and was a first record for v.c.65. NZ18.00

Myosotis secunda x stolonifera (Myosotis x bollandica) - The elongated sterile stem of this hybrid was spotted by me in the White Springs area on Arkengarthdale Moor on 21st August. NY95.06

Nigella damascena (Love-in-a-mist)— This garden plant was planted amongst other 'supposedly' Wildflowers on

the seeded area on the bank of the river in Crakehall, it was spotted by Deborah Millward and myself. SE24.90

Omphalodes verna (Blue-eyed-Mary) – This garden escape was spotted along the disused railway line from the old Station in Richmond by Deborah Millward, Rebecca Millward, Anne Luxmoore and myself on 11th August. NZ18.00

Phacelia tanacetifolia ((Phacelia) – This alien was found along a footpath from Crakehall to Langthorne by Deborah Millward and myself on 2nd September.

Polypodium x mantoniae – Found by Bruce Brown on 28th March, on Kidstone Scar, Bishopdale. SD94.81

Samolus valerandii (Brookweed) – On 18th July this was seen by Jim Parkin and myself in two new monads on the shore of a lagoon in the new extension to Nosterfield Reserve. This was the first new record since 1969. SE27.80 and SE28.80

Spiraea douglasii subsp. *menziesii* (Steeplebush) – This garden shrub is well established on a verge on Skelton Moor, this was recorded on 11th September by myself. NZ07.01

Urtica dioica subsp. *galeopsifolia* (Stingless Nettle) – An excellent record from Fal Sarker, a good patch found on Hayberries Nature Reserve in Teesdale on 2nd September, a first record for v.c.65. NY99.22

Viburnum lantana (Wayfaring Tree) – Planted in a new Woodland near Crakehall on the footpath from Green Gate Farm to Langthorne. Only the fourth record in v.c.65 and spotted by Deborah Millward and myself on the 2nd September. SE24.91

Recording plans for the future

This year we are trying to tie up any loose ends in readiness for the forthcoming 2020 Atlas and the Field Meetings reflect this The Check List is underway and hopefully will be published in the next year or so. The Rare Plants Register too is getting compiled as we now have quite a good coverage of the County. Currently this includes the 126 native and archaeophyte taxa listed below:-

Some of these species are long extinct (e.g. *Cypripedium calceolus*, *Eriophorum gracile*, *Scheuchzeria palustris*, *Woodsia ilvensis*), a couple of these have been reintroduced recently and some like *Vicia orobus* only present at one site near Sedbergh have been seen post 2000 but now appear to be extinct. Others are relatively common in VC65 (e.g. *Minuartia verna*, *Primula farinosa*, *Sesleria caerulea*).

Tuesday 9th April – Wensley Bridge downstream, checking riverside vegetation and possible late Gagea lutea. Meet at Wensley Bridge, south side of Ure at SE091.894

Saturday 27th April - Spring walk by Barney Beck below Calver Hill, meet near footpath to the west of Hilltop and Brockma Gill at SD997.993.

Wednesday 8th May - Gunnerside, check and update decade records Meet in Gunnerside village and park where you can near SD950.981

Sunday 19th May – Keld, Swinnergill to check out possible record of *Polygala amarella*. Meet in the farm car park down in Keld village. SD892.011

Tuesday 4th June – Bishopdale, checking in Low Wood for old *Actea spicata* record. Meet near Causeway Moss, Gilbert Lane End @ SD943.803

Saturday 8th June – Burnt Orchid hunt from Masham Bridge upstream. . Meet in car park near bridge @ SE226.811

Tuesday 11th June – Cotherstone Moor to check the old 1844 record of *Crepis mollis* in monad NY94.16. Meet at the parking place at Clove Lodge. NY935.177

Saturday 22nd & Sunday 23rd June – Cronkley Scars – these have never been properly surveyed for quite a few years, we will be helping John O'Reilly check out old

records and hopefully find some new in his survey work for the new Teesdale Trust. Meet at the lay-by near Hanging Shaw at 10.00am. NY867.298

Saturday 29th June - – Hannah's Meadow, Baldersdale to search for Frog Orchids and *Alchemilla acutiloba*, Meet at entrance to Birk Hat @ NY932.190

Tuesday 2nd July – Holwick Fell, looking for the first 1882 Backhouse record of *Pyrola media* in monad NY87.27. Meet in Holwick near the start of the bridleway below Holwick Scars @ NY903.270

Wednesday 24th July – Hurst, to check the mining area and look for old record of *Gentianella campestris*. Meet in Hurst near the phone box @ NZ051.026

Wednesday 31st **July** - Langwith, near Carthorpe, to find old record of *Carex elongata*, (records and specimens from the 1800's held in the British Museum). Meet at the end of the track to Oak Tree Farm. SE279.819.

Friday 10th August – Pilmoor Carr near Blois Hall Farm. Park near Hutton Conyers at the end of the track @ SE331.731

Saturday 17th August – Search to refind *Trientalis europaea* on High Ash Moor above Leighton Reservoir. Meet at the Cattle Grid @ SE119.754

Wednesday 28th August – Hunt to see if *Rumex* pseudoalpinus is still around near Howgill Head, meet on the roadside near '212' on the 2½ inch map at SD629.981.
