Street festival celebrates 35th anniversary of local theater

This Sunday, July 17, from noon to 6 p.m., The CM Noel S. Ruiz Theatre, will be hosting their first street festival in the parking lot directly in front of the venue.

“The summer after the pandemic first hit, CM had to get creative in order to keep providing entertainment, but safely. This resulted in a series of virtual streaming offers but also an outdoor entertainment series, utilizing a stage built outdoors in the parking lot,” said Brendan Noble, manager at the theatre.

When Long Island events started to move back to indoor gatherings, executive director Alyse Arpino wanted to once again provide an outdoor option as part of the theatre’s 35th anniversary.

The street festival is meant to reach out to a broader audience within the Oakdale and surrounding communities.

Popular food destination Island Empanada, which opened during the pandemic, will be at the street festival with a selection of eight empanada varieties, mac and cheese balls, churros, and French fries.

“We are so excited to be part of this event! It’s so great to be working together with another Oakdale establishment. We love being a part of this community,” said owner Danielle Pelaez.

Your local officials on protecting schools and gun laws

Ten-bill package signed into law

The New York SAFE Act prevents criminals and the dangerously mentally ill from buying guns, cracks down on illegal guns and bans only the most dangerous assault weapons. The legislation includes provisions that protect and

preserve law-abiding citizens' right to bear arms and does not restrict New Yorkers' ability to buy, sell, keep or use guns. Additionally, the act also protects the privacy of pistol license holders by permitting them to notify a county clerk that they do not wish for their information to be released publicly.

Several states have also considered legislation with regards to who can and cannot carry firearms on school grounds. Bill A1896, allows security guards licensed as armed security guards to possess high-capacity magazines, is currently in the Assembly committee. According to the National Conference of State Legislatures, New York State has a total of 131 school safety bills with 25 percent failed, 71 percent proposed and 3.1 percent enacted. Additionally, earlier this year, Gov. Kathy Hochul signed a comprehensive ten-bill package closing gun law loopholes exposed in the tragic Buffalo and Uvalde shootings. Signed into law less than one month after, the package will ban the sale of semiautomatic rifles to anyone under 21 by requiring a license; prohibit the purchase of body armor by anyone not engaged in an eligible profession; strengthen the Red Flag Law by expanding the list of people who can file for Extreme Risk Protection Orders (ERPOs) and requiring law enforcement to file ERPOs under a very specified set of circumstances; make threatening mass harm a crime; require microstamping for new semiautomatic handguns; enhance information sharing between state, local and federal agencies when guns are used in crimes and strengthen requirements for gun dealers related to record-keeping and safeguarding their inventory; close the "other gun" loophole by revising and widening the definition of a firearm; eliminate the grandfathering of large capacity feeding devices; and require social media platforms to provide a mechanism for users to report hateful conduct.

Raising the Age to Purchase Semiautomatic Rifles

Legislation S.9458/A.10503 requires individuals to obtain a license prior to purchasing a semiautomatic rifle. Under preexisting New York State law, individuals must be 21 years or older to acquire a gun license.

Banning Body Armor

Legislation S.9407-B/A.10497 makes it illegal to purchase and sell body vests for anyone who is not engaged in an eligible profession. Eligible professions include law enforcement officers and other professions, which will be designated by the Department of State in

consultation with other agencies. It also requires that all body vest sales are completed in-person.

Strengthening the Red Flag Law

Legislation S.9113-A/A.10502 expands who may file an Extreme Risk Protection Order (ERPO) petition to include health care practitioners who have examined an individual within the last six months.

It amends the firearm licensing statute to ensure that mental health practitioners' reports on potentially harmful individuals are considered closely when determining whether to issue a firearm license.

It also requires police and district attorneys to file ERPO petitions when they have acquired credible information that an individual is likely to engage in conduct that would result in serious harm—either to themselves or others.

It requires State Police and the Municipal Police Training Council to create and disseminate policies and procedures to identify when an ERPO petition may be warranted.

Microstamping

Legislation S.4116-A/A.7926-A requires the Division of Criminal Justice Services to certify or decline to certify that microstamping-enabled pistols are technologically viable and if certified as viable, to establish programs and processes for the implementation of such technology; and establishes the crime of the unlawful sale of a non-microstamping-enabled firearm.

Microstamping is an innovative ammunition-marking technique that marks bullets and cartridge cases with a unique fingerprint each time a firearm is discharged. This allows investigators to link bullets and casings recovered at crime scenes to a specific gun and potentially other crimes.

Closing Loopholes

Legislation S.9456/A.10504 expands the definition of a "firearm" to include any weapon not defined in the Penal Law that is designed or may readily be converted to expel a projectile by action of an explosive. This is intended to capture firearms that have been modified to be shot from an arm brace, which are evading our current definitions of firearms and rifles.

Legislation S.9229-A/A.10428-A eliminates the grandfathering of large capacity ammunition feeding devices that were lawfully possessed prior to the enactment of the Safe Act or manufactured prior to 1994.

Legislation S.89-B/A.6716-A creates the crimes of making a threat of mass harm and aggravated making a threat of mass harm.

Enhancing Information Sharing

Legislation S.4970-A/A.1023-A requires enhanced reporting by law enforcement to the state and federal gun databases. Agencies must report seized or recovered guns to the criminal gun clearinghouse; participate in the ATF's collective data sharing program; and enter the make, model, caliber, and serial number of the gun into the national crime information center.

The law also requires gun dealers to enact uniform security and reporting standards. It prohibits those under 18 and not accompanied by a parent from

NY gun law struck down

Last week, the U.S. Supreme Court struck down a gun law requiring gun owners to prove danger to obtain a permit to carry a concealed firearm outside of the home. The decision stated the law violates the Fourteenth Amendment by preventing citizens with ordinary self-defense needs from exercising their Second Amendment right to keep and bear arms for public self-defense. The case was brought by the National Rifle Association after two gun owners sued the state after being denied a concealed-carry license by local licensing officials.

entering certain locations of a gun dealer's premises and requires training for all employees on conducting firearm, rifle, and shotgun transfers, including identification of and response to illegal purchases. It also requires State Police to conduct inspections of gun dealers every three years.

Improving Response and Reporting of Hateful and Threatening Social Media Content

Legislation S.4511-A/A.7865-A requires social media networks in New York to provide a clear and concise policy regarding how they would respond to incidents of hateful conduct on their platform and maintain easily accessible mechanisms for reporting hateful conduct on those platforms.

Legislation S.9465/A.10501 creates a new Task Force on social media and Violent Extremism. Housed in the Office of the Attorney General, the Task Force will study and investigate the role of social media companies in promoting and facilitating violent extremism and domestic terrorism online.

This robust set of new laws, designed to provide immediate enhanced protections and developed and approved in partnership with Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins and Speaker Carl Heastie, builds on two Executive Orders issued in the immediate wake of the Buffalo shooting.

Gov. Kathy Hochul (D):

"Gun violence is an epidemic that is tearing our country apart. Thoughts and prayers won't fix this, but taking strong action will. In New York, we're taking bold steps to protect the people of our state.

I am proud to sign a comprehensive bill package that prohibits the sale of semiautomatic weapons to people under 21, bans body armor sales outside of people in select professions, closes critical gun law loopholes and strengthens our red-flag law to keep guns away from dangerous people—new measures that I believe will save lives. I am thankful to majority leader Stewart-Cousins, speaker Heastie, and all our legislative partners for acting with the urgency and thoughtfulness that this issue demands. While we are taking expedient action to enhance New York State's nation-leading gun laws, we recognize that gun violence is a nationwide problem. I once again urge Congress to follow our lead and take immediate action to pass meaningful gun violence prevention

measures. Lives depend on it."

Congressman Lee Zeldin (R):

"The text of the Senate legislation has not been released yet. Once it is, we will review it. I support measures like the Stop II Act, which directs funding to programs that aid in the hiring of school resource officers. I'm

supportive of schools utilizing a single point of entry, and trained, armed school resources officers on site working closely with local law enforcement. Previously, I voted for the STOP School Violence Act to provide grants to local and state governments for enhancing safety measures at schools, such as the installation of metal detectors."



Assemblyman Joe DeStefano (R):

"Rather than impinge on the Second Amendment rights of legitimate gun owners, I believe we should focus on hardening our schools and protecting the students. Security must be improved to prevent entry

by unauthorized persons, and fully trained and vetted educators and security guards should be allowed to carry weapons to protect the classrooms. Assailants would think twice about entering a school with the intent to do harm if they knew there were people in that building who could fight back. Congress, politicians, and almost every area where people meet are protected by tight security and armed personnel. Why not our schools?"



Sen. Alexis Weik and congressman Andrew Garbarino declined to comment. ■

Connetquot Public Library: A conversation with Edith Gross

“A little kindness goes so far.” The words of Holocaust survivor and Connetquot resident Edith Gross are timeless. Gross visited Connetquot Public Library on Wednesday, June 8, to share her remarkable story of survival in occupied Czechoslovakia (now Ukraine), Auschwitz, and Stutthof concentration camps, and a death march. As the youngest of four, two brothers and one sister, she recalled the 1939 occupation by Hungary when war broke out. Through numerous occupations, Gross learned to speak several languages and watched anti-Semitism grow.

When Gross was 3 years old, her father came to America, and at age 10, she lost her mother, leaving her older siblings to work and care for one another. With the United States entering the war, all contact with her father and his financial support ceased. Under German occupation in 1944, all Jews were required to wear a yellow star. Friends quickly became enemies.

After some time in the ghetto, Gross and her family were loaded into cattle cars on the last transport to Auschwitz. Upon reaching the camp, Josef Mengele chose who was healthy enough to work and who would die. When it seemed that she and her only sister would be separated, Gross’s gut-wrenching response helped them remain together. Her sis-

ter’s poems provided hope and a will to survive.

When they reached Lithuania, they were given clothes, a place to sleep, and just enough food to survive and work as seamstresses or bootmakers. The only day she was not hungry was her 16th birthday, when she was given additional food—boiled potatoes and two slices of regular bread and butter—which she shared.

When the Russians were closing in,

they were again moved to Stutthof under inhumane conditions, where the atrocities continued. Her sister became gravely ill and entered the hospital, where she probably died. As the Russians advanced, the death marches began. Food and water were scarce, and death was everywhere. The Germans destroyed the remnants of the camp and ran away.

Liberation brought food, hospitals, care, and hope. Later, Gross traveled from city to city by rail, returning to

Czechoslovakia to find her childhood home destroyed, but also discovering two uncles who survived on forged papers. Again, she traveled from city to city, reaching Athens with the hope of boarding a ship to Palestine. Through the Red Cross, her father, now an American citizen, made contact and instructed her to go to the American Consulate.

After one year, Gross was issued a visa and came to New York. With the support of her family, she learned English quickly and adapted to life in the States, enjoying Broadway, restaurants, and working. Here, Gross did not feel anti-Semitism and did not discuss her experiences for many years. She met her first husband, Boris, a businessman smuggled out of Romania by his wealthy parents, through her father. Since he spoke several languages, the United States drafted Boris, sent him to a base in Missouri, granted him American citizenship, and sent him back to Europe. Married for seventeen years, they had two sons.

While her children were in school, Gross began a rewarding career at a hospital, where she found professional success and eventually became a supervisor for a cancer detection unit. Gross worked three jobs after her husband’s death to support her family. Seven years later, encouraged by her son, she traveled to a local resort and met her second husband, Seymour. After one day, he proposed, and she accepted. In their 40-plus years, they traveled to Israel, socialized with friends, and shared a wonderful life in Oakdale until his death.

Suffering from survivor’s guilt, the blending of their families to include great-grandchildren reminded Gross that this would not exist without her. In 1976, she began writing about her sister, the memories resurfaced, and she began to share her story. She speaks to numerous organizations and has been interviewed by newspapers and television. Her greatest audience, however, is the schoolchildren who listen to her experiences and an entire class who wrote heartfelt letters.

The site was originally to host a QuickCheck, a New Jersey-based gas station, and would be over 6,000 square feet.

The proposal for the QuickCheck was initially made in 2013, and residents of Bayport and the surrounding communities made their issues known, with the possible traffic of 300 cars per hour.

The Town of Islip rejected QuickCheck in 2015 after acquiescing to the community’s concern, but QuickCheck sued and received support from the New York State Supreme Court.

In June 2019, with a 5-0 vote, QuickCheck was approved for the Montauk Highway site.

Bohler Engineering, who developed the proposal for the 7-Eleven, was contacted for comment, but did not reply by time of print.

Balloons pose a hazard

Tips from PSEG:

Shiny, metallic Mylar balloons are a mainstay of graduations, weddings, Father's Day, and religious occasions that happen during the next few months. While they are festive, they can also become hazards. PSEG Long Island is reminding customers that balloons released into the air can become entangled in overhead electric equipment and cause a host of problems.

"Though they're festive, fun, and look nice, we want the public to be aware that metallic balloons also conduct electricity. If they get loose and come into contact with a power line or other electrical equipment, that could lead to power outages, fire, and possibly, injuries," said Michael Sullivan, PSEG Long Island's vice president of transmission and distribution. "The safety of our customers and employees is PSEG Long Island's No. 1 priority. We want our customers to know the risks and take steps to ensure their celebrations are a success."

To mitigate these risks, PSEG Long Island encourages the public to follow these safety guidelines:

- Metallic balloons and other decorations should be kept clear of overhead power lines and equipment, and never purposely released into the air.
- All balloons with helium should be secured to weights that prevent them from floating away.
- To properly dispose of a Mylar balloon, safely puncture it in several places to release the helium, and discard it in the trash.
- Never touch a power line. Do not attempt to retrieve a balloon, toy or anything caught in an overhead power line. Report it by contacting PSEG Long Island at 800-490-0075 so a specially trained crew can safely address the issue.

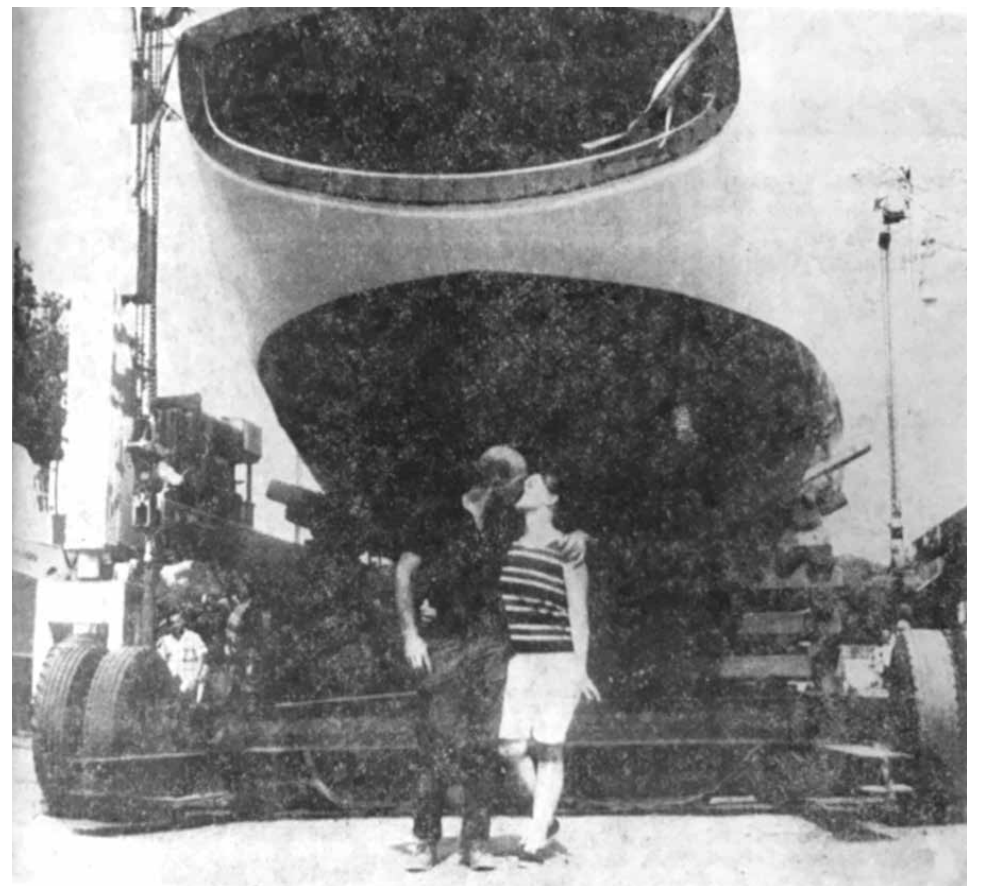

Local park gets a second life

Kay Porter Park cleaned up and revitalized for community

Reclaiming and revitalizing Kay Porter Bicycle Park on Railroad Avenue in time for the namesake's 100 birthday this year, the Greater Sayville Chamber of Commerce pulled in the community to regain this treasure that had gone by the wayside in recent times.

An international peace pole was installed earlier in June by Lauren Minasian, a Girl Scout from GSCC 1106, who was fulfilling her Gold Award project. Hand-painting the pole, Lauren selected English, Chinese, Spanish, and Hindi as the four languages inscribed on pole, each saying, "May Peace Prevail on Earth."

"It was a pleasure to be able to contribute to the beautification of my home town. During these times, the world needs a reminder of how much peace and kindness truly matter and I hope that my project will continue to remind people of that long after I've graduated," said Lauren.

Lauren's brother, Aidan Minasian, a Boy Scout from BSA 184, decided to help by devoting a Life Project to rebuilding the wooden benches in the park.

Aidan cut and stained the new wooden slats to replace the rotted ones in two benches at the entrance of the park.

"I'm grateful that I was able to restore the wooden benches at Kay Porter Park. By doing so, It gave me a sense of pride,

knowing that I did my part to make my

community better place for everyone," said Aidan.

"This project meant a lot to our chamber, as Kay Porter has always been a pioneer for volunteerism and community service at its utmost capacity. Rededicating and renovating the park during Kay's 100th birthday felt like the perfect time to also add the peace pole as a new addition, to add tranquility and a place where people can feel at peace during their day," said Eileen Tyznar, president of the Sayville Chamber, adding, "Having so many organizations such as the Girl and Boy Scouts and people of faith in our community ban together to make

this happen made for a feeling of inclusivity, which is always the goal when it comes to a community project."

At the base of the peace pole are decorated rocks that all expand on the theme of "peace" and is open for anyone to add their artwork. Local artist-in-training workshop, Mini-Monet, even held a rock painting event to add to the community's contribution to the restoration of the park.

The chamber, which provided all financial funding for the restoration, also saw its members roll up their sleeves and physically clean out the park and power wash the original brick that the peace pole is installed upon.

Chamber board member Chris Olsen, who was responsible for trimming the large bushes and trees and power washing, said, "It felt great being a part of helping to beautify the park and at the same time, help the scouts accomplish their goals. I hope we continue to do more projects like this in the future to help the town look its best."

Plants were purchased from the owner of The Farm on Lakeland, Mary Hammerle, who also generously donated her horticultural knowledge in the placement of the greenery. Tyznar, who was responsible for the pruning and planting, selected a host of annuals and perennials to round out the inviting ambiance of the renovated park.

Mulch was donated by Elite Landscaping.

The revitalized park now has multiple usable seating areas and has been hosting mothers with young children during the day.

"We want people to be able to come to the park and sit and take a moment in," said Tyznar.

The park's entrance is locked at dusk to prevent loitering and littering, which had been a problem in the past.

Legis. Anthony Piccirillo (R-8th District) was in attendance for the rededication and said, "The peace pole dedication at Kay Porter Park was a wonderful tribute to the spirit of Kay. The chamber did a wonderful job fixing up the park with beautiful landscaping and flowers. I'm so happy that Lauren did her Girl Scout Gold project there. Peace is a powerful message that should be heard by all." ■

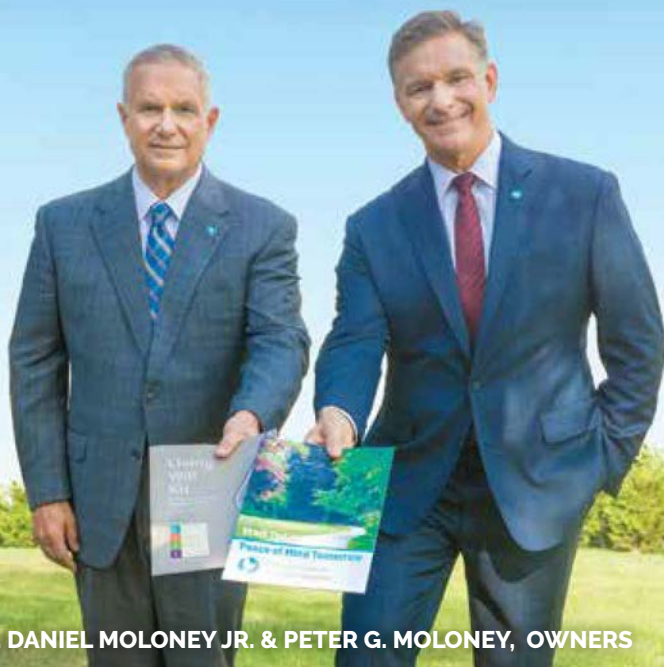

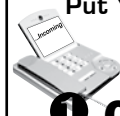

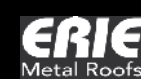

Annual cross bay swim set for this week

The Maggie Fischer Memorial Great South Bay Swim will be held on Thursday, July 14, with a rain date of Friday, July 15. The 5.5-mile open-water swim begins at the Fire Island Lighthouse and concludes at Gilbert Park in Brightwaters. According to the organization's website, the swim was first established in 1927. In 1999, the event was renamed for Maggie Fischer, who was registered to swim that year but tragically died before the event.

According to the event's website, "Today the event is limited to about 130 participants who come from around the country to be in a friendly but serious competition, considered one of the safest and best-run events of its kind."

In 2021, the swim raised funds to distribute \$94,000 to Hospice Children and Family Bereavement Services and \$20,000 to the Maggie Fischer Scholarship at St. Anthony's High School.
