The regional meeting for the ADS Midwest region will be held on Saturday, October 23, from 10 to 2, at the home of Regional Director Jill Griesse, 2640 North Street, Granville OH 43023. Telephone (513)-221-0981.

In addition to reports from the clubs in our region, there will be two informative sessions.

- Morning Session: Regional Director and world-class hybridizer Dr. John Reed will speak on "The Importance of Goals in Breeding Daffodils." Dr. Reed's newest introductions, such as 2009 National Best-in-Show, Millennium Perfection 1Y-Y, are the result of goals he set 35 years ago. Guy Wilson, Murray Evans and Grant Mitsch also had definite long-term goals which guided their hybridizing.
- Afternoon Session: Miniature Update, with former ADS Executive Director and Past-President Mary Lou Gripshover.

What to bring:

- A covered dish, salad, or dessert for the lunch.
- Bulbs for the bulb exchange. (Also feel free to bring any divisions or seeds from your perennial gardens.)

Directions:

From Columbus, Indianapolis, or Cincinnati: Granville is ENE of Columbus. Take I-70 east to Exit 126; then drive north on State Route 37 (Lancaster Road) towards Granville. Lancaster Road becomes State Route 661 at the interchange with State Route 16 just south of Granville. Stay on 661N (Lancaster Road, South Main, East Broadway, North Pearl, then North St.) through the town of Granville. The Griesse's home is about a mile north of town, on the right side of the road.

From the east: Take I-70 West towards Columbus. At Exit 126, follow the instructions above.

DAFFODIL RESCUE

I think I would consider the daffodil my favorite spring flower. The sunny yellow is always a cheering sight to view in the greening grass, after the tan bleakness or white snow of winter. As a gardener, I really appreciate the flower. It divides and spreads on its own, and critters do not eat daffodils.

As a runner, it's always been fun to look over at the side of the road, or out into the woods, and discover a patch of daffodils. Daffodils mean civilization. Daffodils growing in the woods mean someone planted them there. Usually, if you look closely, you will see the remains of a house, or a foundation.

Last week, as the greens started to show, I decided I would go on a daffodil scavenging hunt. These daffodils were planted by someone--probably long ago. How long? In some instances, where I scavenged, I would bet these houses have been gone for fifty years or longer. Who planted the daffodils? Some farm wife? Where did she get them? From her mother? her sister? Did a child bring home some bulbs from school?

My little mission started sooner than I thought. I was out for a trail run, when the yellow caught my eye. I immediately diverted off trail to investigate.

I found a little gem:



I was expecting the ubiquitous big yellow trumpet daffodil, and found this. It has kind of a split cup, almost like a double daffodil. I don't think this is that common of a daff--and this whole grove was made up of these!

I continued on my run, and sure enough, a few miles down the trail, another patch of yellow caught my eye. I had to look carefully, but I could find the old stones of the foundation.



It was a little difficult to dig a small clump of bulbs up-with my fingers and a stick. But I managed to get some bulbs and stuffed them into my running pack.



The next location was from the road. On one of my back country roads, I could see the old chimney from the road. I had even thought to myself, "There's daffodils down there".



A road cut to a natural gas well made it much easier to traverse through the multi-flower rose brambles, and I procured more bulbs. Although this time I had a trowel with me, it would have been far easier if I had brought a shove!!



The last location I checked was more of a hunch. As I run down this road, I can see the remains of the house-which, I think sometime later, was torched. I investigated, and sure enough! Daffodils!!



The daffodil bulbs have been planted in some pots, and have been moved to the front porch. Some have bloomed, so I know what type they are. There are others which are just like a newly purchased book-you aren't quite sure what is inside, but can't wait to find out!
