## Notes on Growing Bulbs in Pots

We are asked many questions about growing bulbs in pots. The following is our basic method for growing potted Autumn, Winter and Spring flowering bulbs.

1. Make sure the pot has good drainage holes.
2. Use good potting soil – be wary of commercial potting mixes. An ideal mix is  $\frac{1}{2}$  loam,  $\frac{1}{4}$  peat,  $\frac{1}{4}$  sharp sand.
3. Plant bulbs  $\frac{1}{2}$  way down in the pot.
4. Make sure you label your pots, and top with mulch.
5. Only water occasionally until bulbs show growth above ground, then a good watering twice a week while in full growth. Withhold all water once foliage dries off in early Summer.
6. Use large enough pots to let bulbs make full growth. Larger growing bulbs must have a large pot!
7. Bulbs require very little fertilizer – perhaps a little potash (we use wood-ash).

## NEW INTRODUCTIONS

BACKFLIP – Seedling No. 122/91 bred from TURNCOAT x N. cyclamineus. A fascinating addition to the cyclamineus hybrids. Fully swept-back white petals and longish corona which opens chrome-yellow and turns a brilliant tangerine-orange. The colour change is quite remarkable. This flower was much admired by Richard Ezell in September, '99 and is photographed on page 85 of the American Daffodil Society Journal, December '99 issue. Early-mid season flowering and beaut for garden and show. \$40.00

HATDANCE – Seedling No. 7/96 bred from QUICKSTEP x N. fernandesii. Prolific blooming with stems carrying four or five nicely shaped flowers. Perianth is white and corona lemon-yellow. Early-mid to late season. Good garden and show flower. Champion Div. 7 Hobart 1996. Also great for breeding. Sets seed easily. Our first seedlings from this cultivar crossed with pollen of HILLSTAR reached flowering size this spring. They are very exciting! \$40.00

OLUMBO – Seedling No. 22/90 bred from NYLON x N. bulbocodium conspicuus. This is a sibling to our earlier introduction MITIMOTO and is likely to prove of equal show and garden merit. Wonderful, wide bowl-shaped corona of bright lemon-yellow and neat perianth segments of white. Early-mid season flowering and a prolific bloomer once established. At Hobart Show 2001 this little flower won Champion Div. 10 and Champion Miniature, then it went on to be judged against the Standards and was awarded Best Bloom Divs. 5-13, Best Seedling in Show and Reserve Grand Champion Daffodil in Show. Probably the highest awards ever achieved by a Hoop Petticoat at any show, anywhere! \$35.00

### DIVISION 1

AH GEE - bred GOLDEN x RISTIN. Superbly smooth golden yellow trumpet. Mid-season flowering. Exceptionally consistent. One of our very finest. Australasian Champion at 1995 Launceston Show, also Champion Yellow Trumpet (exhibited by Ian Norman) Hobart 96. Champion 1Y-Y Claremont 96 and Hobart 97. \$40.00

COMIC – good quality flower in mid-late season. Great substance and has won Champion awards. White petals, lemon-yellow trumpet. \$9.00

GARGLEBLASTER – a really lovely, smooth yellow trumpet. Early-mid season. Large size and fine show flower. \$7.00

KARMA – bred from AKKAD x KOROMO. Exceptionally reliable and quite lovely large flower. Broad, smooth petals and slightly flanged trumpet, well frilled. We have won many show prizes with this. Early-mid season. \$10.00

MOPOKE – bred HERALDING x CHAOS. This sibling to SHINDIG comes from the most successful cross we have ever made. MOPOKE is a really large flower with smooth, broad white perianth segments tapering to pointed tips and long, slender, bright lemon-yellow trumpet. Mid season flowering and consistent. Champion 1W-Y Hobart 1989, and very prominent in our winning Radcliff Cup entry, Launceston 1995. \$25.00

WILD WOMEN - bred ANSETT x RISTIN. Only just medium size this flower has a wonderful, golden, overlapping perianth of thick texture and great smoothness. The trumpet is narrow, straight and tubular. This is a classy all-yellow with tall stem and early season flowering. Grand Champion Launceston 1984, Grand Champion Claremont 1985, Glover Trophy Westbury 1986, Webster Cup Team Tasvention 1988, Radcliff Trophy Team Hobart 1989, Fairbairn Trophy Team Kyneton 1990, also a Best Bloom Award, Canberra 90 and Hobart 92. Producing superb seedlings with outstanding show results. \$10.00

### DIVISION 2

DODGIE - bred VIXI x GOLDEN VINTAGE. Wonderful, very early garden flower of great durability on very tall stems. Neat, broad yellow perianth and mid-length ruffled yellow cup. \$4.00

GOGO DANCER – Seedling No. 96/90 bred from TAMBORA GOLD x GOFORIT. Parentage represents two of the finest flowers in Div. 2Y-R. This plant has an immaculate yellow perianth and lovely corona of rich orange-red. Fairly large size. Early-mid season flowering. Grand Champion and Champion 2Y-R, Ulverstone, 2000, shown by Des Tong. \$30.00

SARCENET - bred K.J. HAZELWOOD x SARN. A medium-large strong cultivar - probably more robust than the general breed of Tasmanian Pinks. (While both K.J.H. and SARN were Tasmanian-bred each of these has one Irish parent, hence the added vigour we think.) Broad, smooth white perianth segments and trumpet shaped corona of mid-pink. Just occasionally this flower will cockle one petal forward a bit. Mid to mid-late season flowering. Fine show record including Champion Pink and Raphael Cup, Hobart 1990 and Champion Pink and Grand Champion in Show, Sheffield 1996. \$25.00

### DIVISION 3

BOMBALURINA - bred from POLAR IMP x VERONA. Very large rounded white perianth and shallow crown which opens with a lemon rim but soon turns all-white. Shown in numerous winning entries including Fairbairn Cup Team, Kyneton '90 and Seedling Small Cup, Claremont '93. An exceptionally good 3W-W coming early-mid season. Highly recommended \$16.00

FAR CROONIN – Seedling no. 19/93 bred from SEA DREAM x MUTO. An outstanding all-white small cup (Div 3W-W). Large size and tall stems. Early-mid season flowering. Brilliant show record including Champion Seedling and Grand Champion, Hobart 1993, Champion 3W-W Australasian Championships, Launceston 1995 and Champion 3W-W Claremont 1996. Just a few to offer. \$45.00

MUTO – extremely valuable as a very early flower in this section. Wide white perianth and shallow crown which opens creamy-lemon quickly turning to white. Twice champion 3W-W at Hobart and importantly is the parent of two of our recent Grand Champion winners. \$15.00

POLKA DOTS – a very attractive early flowering small-cupped daffodil. Rounded perianth of clean white and shallow corona of orange with a red rim. \$7.00

RED HEN – a brilliant show flower on medium-tall stems. Flat, smooth yellow perianth and small corona of bright red. Early-mid season. Numerous top awards including best 3Y-R at the World Convention Show Hobart '88 and at the Australasian Championship Show, Launceston '95. Just a few bulbs to offer. \$30.00

THINK-O-ME - bred from SEA DREAM x FIDDLEDEE. An exceptionally fine quality all-white small cup daffodil of large size. Rounded white petals and very short, snowy-white frilly crown. Mid season. Champion 3W-W, Champion Seedling and T.D.C. Best New Seedling Trophy Ulverstone '88. Few only. \$10.00

YORE BRIDE – classy large flower on tall stems, mid-late season. A beautiful all-white for exhibiting. Champion Awards here. \$12.00

ZAPHOD – only medium size but of lovely quality. Satiny smooth white perianth and little corona of vibrant orange-red. Early-mid season. A good show flower. \$7.00

#### **DIVISION 4**

ACHUCKLE – Seedling No. 60/91 bred from CHILLION x AKORA. This flower represents the culmination of our efforts in breeding double daffodils. A very fine garden plant of great vigour and really superb, huge double flowers of rich golden-yellow. Early-mid season flowering. Champion Double Hobart 1993. Champion Double and Reserve Champion in Show Claremont 1995. Champion Double Claremont 1998. Grand Champion Claremont 1999. Champion Division 4 at Claremont 2000 & 2001. \$100.00

BRAGABOUT – a robust sibling to BOASTABOUT. Bright orange and white colouring and well-doubled. Mid season. Good for garden and show. \$8.00

GIDDYGERT – late season flowering. A large variety with broad white petals and lemon petaloids. Valuable for breeding lovely pink doubles. Few. \$7.00

GLENBROOK GIGGLER – bred from GIDDYGERT x Jackson Seedling 156/78. Robust, strong grower which stands up very well even in bad weather. Well-doubled white perianth interspersed with lovely pink petaloids. Mid season flowering. Champion Double and Reserve Champion in Show, Sheffield 1996. \$30.00

GLORY DAYS - bred GAY GLORIOUS x AKORA. A large flower of exceptional substance and beautifully arranged doubling. Rich yellow perianth segments and even deeper gold inner segments. Tall, powerful stem and great pose. Early-mid season. Champion Double Tasvention 1988, many winning exhibits since including Champion Double, Claremont '97. \$30.00

LOVELY LADIES - bred GOTCHA x ULSTER BRIDE. This is a ravishingly lovely double daffodil with large size, two layers of rounded, sparkling white petals and tiny inner segments of red. Stems are tall and perfume is delicious. A vigorous, healthy grower and here the flowers don't green on the back. Show exhibitors would (of course) want another row of petals! Mid season. Champion Double, Claremont '96. \$15.00

POLLYESTHER – a lovely, very full flower in mid-late season. Tall stems and good size. Symmetrical white petals and rich orange inner segments. \$8.00

RAGBAG - bred ANN OF CLEAVES x DIMITY. From two small parents comes this fine, large double. Smooth, rounded, creamy-white petals and inner segments of orange. Splendid garden and show flower. Champion Double, Westbury 1986, and in winning Webster Cup and Duncan Cup, Hobart 1988 and winning Radcliff, Oldham and Duncan entries, Hobart 1989. Superb performance in 1990 to win Australian Champion Double, Kyneton, Champion Award at Whitmore Show, also Grand Champion in Show Award at Blayney, N.S.W. and Champion Double, Canberra. Also Champion Double and Reserve Show Champion, Canberra '94. \$12.00

#### **DIVISION 5**

RIDDLE-DIDDLE - bred from FIDDLEDEE x N. triandrus (albus). Usually two, and often three exquisite white flowers per stem. Well-formed, gently reflexing perianths and shortish bowl-shaped crowns. Beautiful garden and exhibition plant. 1st Prize National Show, Kyneton 1990 and Best Division 5 Award, Hobart 1990. Early-mid season \$30.00

TILLY TITUS – bred from SPRIGHTLY x N. triandrus. This is a superb garden and show plant. Two or three beautifully formed snow-white flowers per stem. Early-mid season. Many, many recent Champion Awards in Tasmania. Few only. \$40.00

#### **DIVISION 6**

BEZZA-BABE – bred from BERYL x LITTLE BEAUTY. A very neat cyclamineus hybrid with broad, rounded, reflexed yellow petals and medium length, waisted, yellow goblet-crown. Smallish and on a short stem. This flower was Champion Miniature Daffodil at Tasvention 1988 but is consistently growing just a little bit too large to classify as a true Miniature – nevertheless a very good plant as a standard 6Y-Y. Early-mid season and long lasting. \$15.00

CHATTIN – bred from CHARITY MAY x TITANIA. An interesting second generation cyclamineus hybrid. Swayed-back white perianth and well-formed corona of creamy-white. Early-mid season. \$10.00

CINDY-LAU – bred from BERYL x DIMITY. Smooth, overlapping reflexed yellow perianth and shortish crown of vibrant orange. A good Div. 6Y-O with medium height stems. Early-mid season. \$8.00

GLENBROOK BELLE – Seedling no. 32/90 bred from BERYL x LITTLE BEAUTY. A high quality garden and show flower (Div. 6Y-Y) with well reflexed, smooth perianth segments and a bell-shaped corona. Clear yellow throughout. Early to mid season. In the new 7 bloom championship class at Claremont, 2000, this small flower was placed 1<sup>st</sup> of 18 outstanding entries. \$25.00

SLIP'RY - bred from FIRST FROST x N. cyclamineus. Our best Div. 6 to-date. Narrow reflexing white petals and straight, slender white crown. Lovely quality, early season Div. 6W-W. Great show record with champion awards Claremont 1987, '88, '89 and '91. First prizes in 1992 at Claremont, Hobart, Canberra and Westbury Shows. Heazlewood Trophy Claremont '93. \$15.00

TADPOLE – a really choice plant of small size but great substance. Fully reflexed white perianth and lemon-yellow trumpet-cup of lovely form. Early-mid season. Few only. \$40.00

### DIVISION 7

DEUCED - bred from DEAR ME x N. fernandesii. A very fine, early flowering jonquil with usually three but sometimes four or even five flowers per stem. The well formed flowers have white petals and longish cups which open pale creamy-buff and mature all creamy-white. Early-mid season and prolific flowering. Champion Division 7, Claremont 1995. \$35.00

NIFTER – we can offer just three or four bulbs of this lovely small jonquil bred from N. fernandesii. The size is currently referred to as Intermediate. Two or three flowers per stem with rounded yellow perianths and dished crowns of deeper gold. Early-mid season. \$25.00

WEARY DEARIE – Seedling no. 61/93 bred from DEAR ME x N. fernandesii. This is our final introduction from this cross. A sibling to ENDEAR it is possibly an even better Show flower. Usually three beautiful flowers per stem. White perianth and good pink corona. Early-mid season. Champion Div. 7 at Launceston 1998, Claremont 1999, Wynyard & Hobart 2000 and Hobart 2001. \$45.00

### DIVISION 9

IKA JIKA – bred from HORACE x ACTAEA. A small poeticus with reflexing white perianth and small yellow crown with fine red rim and pale green eye. Not a world-beater but a good early flowering poet and a very nice garden plant. Champion Div. 9 (shown by K & M Crowe), Hobart 1995, Champion Award Hobart '98, and many Champion Awards since. \$12.00

RINGER - bred from YPSILANTE x BRIGHT ANGEL. A fine flower with glistening white, rounded petals. Tiny crown with green eye, yellow centre and fine red rim. Div. 9W-GYR. Mid season flowering. Champion poeticus Launceston 1988, Australian Champion Div. 5-12 at Kyneton 1990, prize winning poeticus Canberra 1992 and Grand Champion Late Show, N.S.W. 1993. Countless Champion Awards since. \$25.00

### INTERMEDIATES

GENTLEMAN JACK – Seedling no 1/97 bred from TITANIA x N. cyclamineus. A very good small bicour (Div. 2W-Y) ideal for the 'Intermediate class'. Flower is just 65mm diameter. Neat white perianth is flat and straight, at right angles to the elegant yellow corona. Early flowering. Very much like a bicour replica of THE LITTLE GENTLEMAN. \$20.00

IWANTA BLUSH - a beautifully pretty small flower on a rather willowy stem. Very fully doubled with white petals and rich pink inner segments. Few only Perfect size for the Intermediate class. \$10.00

NITE GAMES – late flowering and only medium size. Rounded white perianth and a virtually flat white crown with a clear pink rim. We have bred some very nice small cups from this flower. Blue Ribbon Intermediate, Columbus Ohio Show 2001, exhibited by Naomi Liggett. \$8.00

OH KAYE – a small flower of the highest quality. Four or five layers of well-formed white perianth segments and beautifully coloured inner-segments of rich apricot-pink. Very sweetly perfumed. Mid-late season flowering. Champion Intermediate, Launceston 2001 shown by David Pyke. Just a few available this year. \$20.00

### GLENBROOK RAISED MINIATURE DAFFODILS

ANGEL O' MUSIC - (Div. 5Y-Y) Seedling No. 20/89 bred from N. triandrus albus x N. fernandesii. A beautiful small Div. 5 plant with usually three, but sometimes four or more, slightly pendent lemon bell-flowers with reflexed perianths. Many show prizes including Champion Miniature, Hobart 1989, and Champion Miniature, Claremont 1994. Mid season. Champion Miniature Sheffield '99 and Launceston 2000 shown by Sue and Bob McFarlane, Champion Award Hobart 2000. \$25.00

ANGEL'S BREATH - (Div. 5Y-Y) Seedling No. 121/89 bred from N. triandrus albus x N. fernandesii. A sibling to ANGEL'S WHISPER this flowers a little later and the blooms are perhaps a tiny bit larger. Usually three neat, soft lemon bells per stem. Mid-late season. Champion Miniature, Launceston 1989, Champion Div. 5, Wynyard 2000, and Champion Miniature Ulverstone 2000, shown by Ann Scarfe. \$12.00

ANGEL'S WHISPER - (Div. 5Y-Y) Seedling No. 4/88 bred from N. triandrus albus x N. fernandesii. A really top-class little plant with elegant, lemon bell-flowers with reflexing petals. Usually four pendent blooms per stem. Blooms from early well into mid-late season. Superb for garden and show. Bjerring Trophy, Westbury '91, in 1992 a Champion Award Hobart and Bjerring Trophy, Westbury, also Gold Ribbon U.S.A. '92 and '94 and more since. \$12.00

COQ - (Div 12Y-Y) Seedling No. 15/89 bred from N. bulbocodium tenuifolius x N. cyclamineus. An enchanting novelty. Narrow based, flaring yellow corona and narrow, somewhat recurved perianth segments. Mid yellow throughout. Blooms from early till mid-late season. Sometimes has two flowers per stem. Slow increaser. \$30.00

EYE SPY – Seedling no. 8/90 bred from FYNO x JULIA JANE. A wonderful sparkling white Hoop petticoat (Div. 10W-W) with flattish, petunoid form. Flowers from early-mid winter through to late Winter, and like FYNO it increases well. Bulbs down 2 or 3 years produce many flower stems. Keep dry in Summer, so probably best grown in pots. \$15.00

FENBEN - (Div. 7Y-Y) Seedling No. 13/90 bred from *N. fernandesii* x *N. jonquilla* form. (Pollen parent supplied from U.K. as *N. j. henriquesii* but is more likely *N. cordubensis*.) An exquisite little golden yellow flower. Usually three, but occasionally more, flowers per stem. Early blooming and produces secondary stems to lengthen the season. Choice and perfumed. Champion Miniature, Sheffield 1994, Champion award, Hobart 1998. \$30.00

FERDIE - (Div. 6Y-Y) Seedling No. 46/88 bred from *N. rupicola* x *N. cyclamineus*. This is a tiny plant. Reflexing petals and tubular trumpet-cup, yellow throughout. Blooms from early-mid season to mid-late season. Always draws attention here. Champion Miniature, Westbury '92, Champion, Claremont '98. Very reliable. \$20.00

FYNO - Seedling No. 2/87 bred from *NYLON* x *cantabricus foliosus*. A nice little all-white Hoop Petticoat which flowers from late Autumn right through Winter. Will only produce one or two flowers per bulb first season, but second year planted it produces a phenomenal display. Rapid increaser. \$3.00

GADGET - Seedling No. 1/89 bred from *SMARPLE* x *N. bulbocodium citrinus*. Well formed yellow Hoop Petticoat which is profuse flowering and a good increaser. Blooms late Winter into early Spring so is ideal for Miniature Classes at Shows. \$8.00

**HAWERA** - (Thompson, N.Z.) one of the best miniatures in cultivation. An excellent little triandrus hybrid with 4 or 5 pendent bell-flowers per stem. Mid-late season. \$10.00

**JONQUILLA FLORE PLENO** - (origin uncertain) the ancient double-flowered jonquil with medium-height stems carrying several richly perfumed golden-yellow double blossoms per stem. Mid-late season. Very few. Rarely offered. \$15.00

**JOY BISHOP** - this is an outstanding clone of N. romieuxii collected by Jim Archibald in 1968 and registered by Kath Dryden in 1985. Excellent Winter flowers - flaring blooms of lemon-yellow. Few. \$8.00

**JULIA JANE** - this is the sensational form of Narcissus romieuxii collected by Jim Archibald. It has really large, petunia-like, frilly flowers of creamy-lemon. Late winter. Rare and fairly difficult but worth every effort to succeed with. Only a few bulbs to offer. \$20.00

**JUMBLIE** - (Gray, Eng.) one of the finest miniatures - a sibling to TETE-A-TETE. Jumbly has two or three flowers per stem. Yellow petals reflex sharply from orange-yellow trumpet-cups. Beautiful early-mid season variety. \$7.00

**KEHELLAND** - (Gray, Eng.) our stock of this was sent to us by the late Alice Wray Taylor of Tennessee. A fancy full yellow double - small, but hardly miniature as it grows here. Interesting! Few only. \$8.00

**LITTLE SENTRY** - (Gray, Eng.) a terrific little flower to end the daffodil season. Very late flowering. Well-formed, rounded lemon petals and shallow yellow cup. Few only. \$7.00

**MINNOW** - (Gray, Eng.) very small, nicely formed white and yellow tazetta. Mid-season. Few only. \$3.00

**NYLON** - (Blanchard, Eng.) a really beautiful hybrid Hoop Petticoat of creamy-white. Winter flowering. \$3.00

**PANGO** - (Gray, Eng.) this neatly formed tazetta has settled in very well at Glenbrook and now often produces stems of 2,3 or 4 medium sized white flowers with yellow corona. Mid season. \$8.00

**PIXIES SISTER** - (Mitsch, U.S.A.) really delightful little flowers of bright yellow with shallow gold crowns and sweet perfume. Late season flowering, usually two blooms per stem. \$7.00

**PLEDGE** - (Jefferson-Brown, Eng.) very rare offering of this small white trumpet sent here in 1989 by the late Alice Wray Taylor of Tennessee. Neat form and flowers early-mid season. Few only. \$25.00

**STOCKEN** - (of uncertain origin) we have previously listed this as Narcissus wilkommii (?). A gorgeous little jonquil with thread-like foliage and small yellow flowers of lovely form. Early-mid season. \$9.00

**SUNDIAL** - (Gray, Eng.) excellent miniature jonquil. Yellow perianth and shallow gold crown. Usually two flowers per stem. Early. \$4.00

**SUN DISC** - (Gray, Eng.) an excellent late season plant. Small rounded flowers with disc-cup. Rich yellow throughout and slightly green eye. An end of season favourite. \$7.00

**TAFFETA** - (Blanchard, Eng.) fairly large, flaring white Hoop Petticoat which flowers mid-late Winter here. Quite lovely. Rare and few. \$6.00

**TARLATAN** - (Blanchard, Eng.) a superb Hoop Petticoat producing a prolific display of well-flared refined cream flowers. Winter to early Spring. A real favourite. \$6.00

**TETE-A-TETE** - (Gray, Eng.) a famous and lovely miniature daffodil hybrid. One, two and sometimes three blooms per stem. Early. \$3.00

**XIT** - (Gray, Eng.) superb quality miniature with rounded, snow-white perianth and delightful shallow white crown. Top-class show flower and a beauty in the garden. Mid-season. Few only. \$6.00

# ***NEWS FROM GLENBROOK, 2001***

What an extraordinary year 2001 has been. In preparing this Summer's Bulb List we feel like we are putting together a Catalogue for despatch into the Great Unknown.

We are aware that some sectors of "The Global Economy" are performing very well indeed, while elsewhere other entities struggle to keep their heads above rapidly changing waters.

Here at GBF we like to think we are about 100 years behind "The Times". Nevertheless we have made a concession to the "Here-and-Now" by fragmenting our Bulb Lists this year. Our aim is, of course, to direct only relevant material to you. If we have got this wrong please don't hesitate to let us know!

## **SEEDS OF CONTENT**

Our Flower Show year for GBF started with the Southern Tasmanian Lily Show in January 2001. Glenbrook was greatly honoured, for the third year in succession, to win the Grand Champion Bloom in Show. Our own major interests in Lily growing are based around Species and Trumpets/Aurelians. The latter mentioned are widely undervalued but sensationally good garden plants in Southern Australian gardens. Over the past few years we have been distributing (to customers buying from our Winter Catalogue) small portions of free seed from our very best Trumpet/Aurelian crosses. Within 2 more years we expect to start hearing about some brilliant results.

## **TITTER TITTER**

Every bulb and plant we cultivate at GBF is grown organically. Our stock is never touched by dips or sprays, or artificial fertilisers. As for weed-killers – these still look remarkably like a mattock and a flat-hoe. Hence we believe we can offer healthy, hardy stock able to be grown reasonably well, with a minimum of attention, in any cool-climate garden.

In September, 2001, Rod had the distinction of a visit by two knowledgeable femmes (with University degrees) who marvelled at the obvious vigour and health of our GBF plants. When Rod commented that growing bulbs "hard" and letting birds (in our case chooks, ducks, peacocks, etc.) roam among them "keeps health up and pests down" these intellectuals had nothing better to do than giggle. One of them tittered to the other "Well who would believe that at Uni?"

## **THE NAME ON THE TRAY**

Claremont Spring Flower Show was held the first weekend in September. An early season produced a Hall full of classy exhibits. We were able to produce enough good flowers to win Champion Double with ACHUCKLE, Champion Div. 1W-Y, and Champion Div. 11.

In the very important S.F. Richardson Class (3 Miniatures), which we regard as the State Miniature Championship, there were many, many outstanding entries. But still, after 5 years competition, the only name inscribed on the gilt-edged Silver Tray is Glenbrook Bulb Farm – winning this year with a vase of GADGET, ORCLUS and SMARPLE. Readers should not be deceived, however, by our unbeaten status in the Richardson Trophy. This class is virtually a lottery. There are so many good entries. Particularly noteworthy among 'contestants' this year were some wonderful coloured Miniatures raised by Geoff Temple-Smith and some exquisite things from Kevin Crowe. I reckon we'd better start bribing the judges soon.

Hobart Show was held six days after Claremont Show. Good rains from early-mid August produced the largest flowers we have ever exhibited. Many named cultivars grew so much bigger than normal that it was hard to recognise them! We had tremendous success at Hobart Show winning Champion Div. 2Y-Y, Champion Div. 7 – WEARY DEARIE, Champion Div. 9, and then, with a sibling to MITIMOTO, Champion Div. 10, Champion Miniature, Champion Divs. 5-13, Champion Seedling and Reserve Grand Champion in Show. In the team trophy classes we were able to bench winners of the TDC Glover Trophy (Seedlings), American Daffodil Society Red, White and Blue, Victorian D.S. Brumley (12 Whites), HHS Maddock (Large Cups) and HHS Nat Little (12 Distinct).

## **HELL'S BELLS AND THE MAGIC TOUCH**

Launceston Show followed a week after Hobart. With a death in our own family on the weekend of Hobart Show our collective GBF minds were pretty much elsewhere at the time of Launceston Show but Helen Blowfield took a few blooms North on our behalf.

Helen is a skilled exhibitor who has been showing for many years and 2001 has certainly been just brilliant for her. This year, at both Claremont and Hobart, Helen won Grand Champion in Show – a stellar performance. At Launceston she benched our few exhibits to win Champion Trumpet, Champion Seedling and Grand Champion in Show with 46/92 (DREAM PRINCE x AH GEE). Also our flower of FLORENCE JOY won Champion Div. 2 and Reserve Champion in Show. And a beautiful 1W-W sent to us only last Summer by Don Bulman was chosen as Champion of the Open Section.

When you've got the magic – it shines. Thanks Helen.

## **AND CHAMPION GROWERS AND ALL AND ALL**

For us it is more important for others to do well with GBF raised flowers than it is for us to 'perform' with them. Not all 2001 Tasmanian Show Results are yet to hand but we are delighted to report that at Claremont Show Pat Hallam won Champion Div. 5 with ANGEL'S BREATH and John and June Gibson won the Show Committee's Trophy (Div. 10) with SMARPLE.

At Wynyard Show David Pyke won Champion Div. 7 with SIGHING, Ann Scarfe had Champion Div. 9 with RINGER and we won Champion Div. 11 with a seedling sent on the bus.

At Ulverstone Show David Pyke had a Champion Small Cup Award with BOMBALURINA, and Ann Scarfe had Champion 3W-W with BY GUMMO and Champion Div. 9 with RINGER. For some unmentionable reason Ann wanted this flower to be called "RING IN". At

Launceston Show David Pyke won Champion Intermediate with OH KAYE and Champion Div. 9 with RINGER. Ann Scarfe won Champion Rimmed with MESHACH and Sue and Bob McFarlane won Champion Div. 10 with MITIMOTO.

At the time of writing these notes the results of Westbury and Sheffield Shows have not yet been published.

### **HEY, BUT WHAT ABOUT THIS?**

We guess 2001 could possibly count as a record year for success of GBF raised bulbs at Tasmanian Shows – but earlier in the year there was more than the odd sparkle by Glenbrook progeny at shows in the land of Stars and Stripes.

The American Daffodil Society Journal for September, 2001, includes results of 42 major U.S. Shows this year.

At the National Show at Louisville, Kentucky, April 5-6, in a heavyweight “field” of famous name exhibitors the Lavender Ribbon (for a Collection of 5 Miniatures) was won by Suzy Wert. Three of Suzy’s five flowers MICKEY, MINNIE and MORTIE were bred at Glenbrook. Well done Suzy. What a performance! You’d better be ready to be showered by a bottle of bubbly if ever we meet.

Of the 38 winning Lavender Ribbon Collections nationwide in the U.S. there were 14 benched (by 14 different exhibitors) with GBF-raised bulbs included in the winning teams. That is nice.

The Roberta Watrous Award for a Collection of 12 Miniatures was won at 23 different U.S. Shows. 18 of the 23 winning exhibits included some GBF raised flowers. These 18 winning teams were benched by 14 separate exhibitors, with the dynamic Suzy Wert winning twice, and legendary greats Delia Bankhead securing two wins (with GBF flowers in her teams) and Naomi Liggett three wins. But, of course, we expect nothing less from Naomi.

The A.D.S. Miniature White Ribbon is for a vase of 3 stems of one Miniature. At Chillicothe, Ohio, Naomi Liggett won the Mini-White with SPOIROT, then at Clinton, MS, Larry Force won with FERDIE, at Conway AR, Larry Force won again, with FERDIE, and at Hernando, MS Larry Force won yet again – this time with ANGEL’S BREATH.

### **A FORCE TO BE RECKONED WITH?**

In the U.S.A., the equal top Show award is the Miniature Gold – for Best Miniature Daffodil in Show.

At Clinton, MS, the Mini Gold went to FERDIE, exhibited by Larry Force. And at Conway AR, the Mini Gold went to MITIMOTO exhibited by Larry Force.

Great moves Larry... What a guy!... What a talent!

At Gloucester, VA, Mini Gold went to ANGEL’S WHISPER exhibited by Diane Spence. At Chillicothe, OH, Mini Gold went to MORTIE exhibited by Tag Bourne. At Wheaton, MD, Mini Gold went to SWAGGER exhibited by Olivia Weibourn.

What a glittering performance, Five Miniature Golds to Glenbrook-raised cultivars. May the force be with y’all.

### **FACT AND FICTION**

Since the early 1990’s the number of Daffodil ‘crosses’ we have attempted at GBF is very small indeed. And, given that the style of the crosses we indulge in is usually rather radical, nature has rationalised the number of seeds we sow each year. We have mentioned before our interest in Hoop Petticoat Daffodils and along with the introduction of OLUMBO, this year, we have another three absolutely outstanding Hoop Petticoats in the pipeline. One is a N. romicuxii seedling of voluptuous form and proportion, while another, bred from a sibling to SMARPLE, is an exquisite, pleated golden flower. The third one, bred from SPOIROT x JULIA JANE, is something very special indeed. With the eventual introduction of these flowers, along with the current fine show performances of MITIMOTO, SMARPLE and SPOIROT and to a lesser extent ORCLUS, KHOLMES, GADGET, etc., we think the division 10 classes at shows could soon be full of interest.

But in Tasmania thinking on this issue is not quick. One of our outstanding newer Daffodil judges was able to report this year that when approaching the Division 10 class the Senior Judge said “Just choose anything – they’re not really Daffodils”.

### **WHO’S BETTER’N BACKHOUSE... TEE HEE, TEE HEE**

Every year we receive directly (or sometimes indirectly) many delectable comments about our Glenbrook performances. We hinted earlier in our Notes that, even in the relatively quiet backwater of Claremont, Tasmania, GBF represents an eccentric anachronism. We do also delight in the absurd.

At the Hobart Daffodil Show in September, 2000, the officer-in-charge of a government department was evidently less than favourably impressed by Rod’s enthusiasm. Next day it was reported in the office that “Barwick was out of his tree at the Daffodil Show”. Tasmanian walls, obviously, all have ears. The only surprise to us was that anyone ever thought Rod was in his tree.

But, the best was still to come.
