

ABSTRACT

The 1969-70 report on Indian education in the public schools of Minnesota presents data on finances; enrollment; attendance; dropouts; graduates; taxes; and costs of schooling, hot lunches, and transportation. Included in the report are discussions of such problems as the high dropout rate and low attendance rate of Indian children, especially at the secondary level; these problems are attributed to factors such as the unrelatedness of the educational program to the background and needs of Indian students, the critical shortage of Indian teachers, the movement of Indian families from reservation to met opolis and back, and the low level of Indian involvement in education. Federal and state programs designed to solve these and other problems are also described, including the operation of state and local Indian education advisory committees composed of Indians; the Indian scholarship, higher education, and guidance services program; inservice training of non-Indian teachers; the rewriting of instructional materials; the dissemination of materials relating to Indian life, history, and culture; and the reorganization of the State Department of Education, involving the creation of a full-time Director of Indian Education. Included among the 15 tables is the Johnson-C'Malley Annual Financial Report. (BO)

### DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The increased number of Indian education programs for the State of Minnesota necessitated a change in organization. The Director of Indian Education became a full time position in April, 1969. The nature of Indian education programs indicated a need to place organizationally the Director within the Administrative Division of the Minnesota Department of Education. This division is headed by the Deputy Commissioner of the Department, Mr. Farley Bright. Therefore, Indian Education, is a section within the Department and the Director is responsible to administer programs within that jurisdiction. In addition, the Director, organizationally has access to the Commission and State Board of Education. Indian education in Minnesota has become a high priority and organizationally, the Director of the Indian Education Section may request and obtain services from the total Department without unusual amount of organizational problems.

During the school year 1969-70, the Director of Indian Education administered the following programs.

The Minnesota Legislature by Statute created a Minnesota Indian Education Committee. Indian citizens from all reservations and urban centers with large Indian populations are represented on the committee (see p. 3). The committee meets monthly and is the major advisor to the Minnesota Department of Education. The committee's major responsibility is to be of service to the educational institutions who serve Indian people. After two years of activity, the Minnesota Indian Education Committee has played a strong and active role for improving educational opportunities for Indian citizens of Minnesota. For example, the committee has assisted school districts to plan and develop Human Relations Training Programs for school personnel. Reports of significant success by participating schools has been extremely good. Better understanding, respect and confidence by the public schools and Indian communities shows definite improvement, and in this respect the committee must be highly commended.

The excitement and enthusiasm generated in local Indian communities continues to grow. Indian parents and students are taking a greater interest in school affairs. School districts are responding with the same enthusiasm. It is reassuring to our staff to observe this new "era" of Indian education. Indian educators are emerging as leaders within the State with dedication and commitment. They are accepting the challenges and are meeting them, with aggressiveness and sound judgment. Much remains to be accomplished. However, Minnesota Indians have demonstrated the job can be done if they are given the opportunity to handle their affairs. The State of Minnesota and Indian people will continue to work cooperatively until all Indian children will experience and receive a meaningful education.



#### NARRATIVE REPORT

#### 1969 - <u>1</u>970

Since the year 1926, the Johnson O'Malley Program has assisted financially in supporting public school education for Indian students living on the Indian reservations located within the boundaries of the State of Minnesota. At the inception of this program, the major responsibility for its functioning revolved around the activities of the Supervisor of Indian Edu-The program has gradually expanded as increasing numbers of Indian cation. students continued through the elementary and secondary levels of education to the point where many large numbers are enrolled for post-secondary school instruction. This has necessitated, in recent years, special counseling services and the administration of a rapidly growing scholarship program. Other Federal and State aid programs have been initiated that have either specifically or incidentally been designed to support supplimentary programs to help improve the education of Indian children. These programs not only affect education on the elmentary and secondary levels, but include preschool and adult education instruction. The Indian Education Section of the Minnesota State Department of Education has recently added Adult Basic Education, administered from a central office in St. Paul and from area offices at Bemidji and Duluth. This expanded program now commands the full time attention of a Director of Indian Education, responsible for the entire overall program.

The services of the Supervisor of Indian Education are available primarily to twenty-seven school districts that have within their boundary Federal tax exempt Indian allotments or tribal lands. Enrolled in the public schools of these districts during the 1969-70 school year were 2680 students of one quarter or more Indian ancestry, for which the school districts receive financial assistance from the Johnson O'Malley program. Seven of the school districts are classified as "budgeted" and operate elementary schools with predominently Indian enrollments. With the exception of Red Lake, the secondary students from these areas attend high schools in other school districts where they represent a minority group. In twenty of the school districts that receive Johnson O'Malley aid, the Indian students represent only a small percentage of the entire enrollment; and integration occurs on all grade levels. Considerably more time was spent with the budgeted schools where approximately fifty-five percent of the eligible Indian students attend.

The trend of Indian Education in Minnesota today is in the direction of increased Indian involvement and in the development of Indian oriented curriculum units and materials based on their past history and culture. General aid to school districts is being phased out, and emphasis is now being made to provide special services to help improve the educational program as it relates to Indian children. The approval of local Indian Education Committees are considered of major importance in judging the validity and need for any program submitted by school districts for programs that are proposed for the purpose of obtaining Johnson O'Malley financial aid. Consideration of all such proposals must also be dependent on the availability of these same services from other state or federal funds.





#### FINANCIAL SUPPORT

Determination of Johnson O'Malley payments to any eligible school district in Minnesota is based on budgetary needs related to the specific services considered, or as in the case of budgeted schools, the need for general operational financial support in addition to all other available receipts. Individual budget requests are determined for each school district on the basis of needs established from joint calculations of school district administrators and the Supervisor of Indian Education, and reviewed for approval by the Director of Indian Education. Guidance is provided frc... the office of the Director and the Supervisor to aid school districts to develop programs that reflect the special education needs of Indian students, that make full use of all other available state and federal funds, and to help phase out general aid funding wherever possible. Table 2 and 2-A will show a comparison of the amount of financial support provided from local, state, and federal sources.

The basic support for school maintenance in Minnesota is provided by the state's Foundation Aid Program. In the year 1969-70, the maximum amount of such aid any school district could receive was \$365 per pupil unit in average daily attendance. A kindergarten student was considered as onehalf a unit, an elementary student as a full unit, and a secondary student as one and one-half unit. Deducted from the amount of Foundation Aid calculated on this basis was an amount equal to a nineteen mill levy on the adjusted property valuation in the school district. The purpose of this is to provide more Foundation State Aid to school districts with low property valuation that can be taxed by the local district for school support. The application of this formula resulted in a Foundation Aid support range in

the twenty non-budgeted schools of from \$172.42 to \$305.62 per pupil unit in average daily attendance in 1969-70. Three of the budgeted school districts received \$364.06, \$364.07, and \$364.54 respectively per pupil unit. The median amount for all Johnson O'Malley aided schools was \$265.26. This will be considerably above the median for the entire state.

Financial reports are received from all school districts at the close of the fiscal school year, ending June 30 of each year. Actual Johnson O'Malley needs vary from budget estimates, and year-end balances or deficits are considered the following year. Because of this, the amount of Johnson O'Malley expenditures indicated on the financial report for any school district will vary from the amount shown as Johnson O'Malley receipts during the year.

#### JOHNSON O'MALLEY PROGRAMS

Approved programs and needs of school districts receiving Johnson O'Malley funds are initiated at the local school level. Representatives of the Indian communities are requested to express their wishes for the school program to duly elect school boards in each district. In four of the budgeted school districts, the school board members are all Indian; while in two others, they are in the majority.

During the current school year, a total of \$627,153 of Johnson O'Malley funds have been paid directly to public school districts in Minnesota to help finance their educational programs provided for Indian students. Of this amount, \$99,681 was paid to initiate a kindergarten program in three schools where it did not already exist, and to improve existing programs in five others. As a result of this special financial help; kindergarten



education has been provided for the first time for fifty-three Indian students living in sparsely settled areas and has helped improve the quality of such instruction for one hundred and forty-three more in other schools.

Other special programs for Indian students, made available from Johnson O'Malley funds, include three summer enrichment programs at the Fosston, Nett Lake, and Cass Lake schools, made possible by the expenditure of \$16,366. A resource library of audio-visual and other materials on Indian culture and history has been made available on a state-wide basis through a grant of \$333 to the Brainerd Public School, which distributes the materials upon request. Home visitors in seven school districts were financed through a grant of \$23,243. Free lunches for Indian students in Johnson O'Malley schools were made possible by subsidizing their school lunch programs with grants totaling \$80,955.10, and their transportation with grants totaling \$82,579.79.

General support for the school operations of budgeted schools has made it possible to maintain a considerably lower teacher-student ratio than that existing in most public schools, and thereby provide greater opportunity for individualized attention to student needs. An experimental program in grades 3-5 of individualized, programmed instruction, under the guidance of the Upper Mid-West Regional Laboratory, has been in operation at Red Lake during the current school year. The Nett Lake Elementary School has been reorganized as an ungraded school. A Chippewa Language program in grades 1-2 has been provided at the Vineland Elementary School for the past two years. A tutoring program, made possible through the cooperation of the Bemidji State College, provides a reinforcement program at the Cass Lake and Deer River schools. Library service has been furnished the two small elementary schools at Naytahwaush and White Earth. Enrichment and remedial instructions have been provided by summer school programs at Vineland and Red Lake. An adult education

program, designed for the needs of Indians, has been made possible on a statewide basis. Johnson O'Malley funds have also made it possible to conduct a two week workshop at Bemidji State College for 100 teachers of Indian students.

#### BASIC OBJECTIVES

In the Johnson O'Malley State Plan for the Education of Indian Children, approved by the Minnesota State Board of Education on June 9, 1969, the educational objectives were stated as follows:

"The Minnesota State Plan will provide a structure for the assessment, planning, development, operation and evaluation of special educational services and programs for Indian children, and youth. The Plan requires the involvement and participation of Indian youth and adults in all phases of program development and implementation, and approaches educational needs through the 'family unit' concept. The basis for the successful effectuation of the Plan is determinate upon the maximum utilization and coordination of existing resources and programs through a statewide design."

In the past, the efforts of educating Indian students in the public schools has been relatively unsuccessful. Efforts to improve the effectiveness of public school instruction, and to accomplish the objectives noted above, are being made. The Minnesota Indian Education Committee has been created to provide guidance for the State Board of Education and to local educational units throughout the state. Local committees, chosen by resident Indians, have been organized in school districts to serve in an advisory capacity on the problems of educating Indian children. A library program has provided many school districts with a liberal supply of carefully screened materials and books on Indian history and culture, and has trained a core of Librar, when the problem is as an effective resource area for the school and community.

#### PROBLEMS

The greatest problem in Indian education is perhaps that of making the educational program relate to the background and needs of Indian students. Progress in this direction is being made by efforts to rewrite instructional materials, and in obtaining more materials relating to Indian life, history, The supply of qualified Indian teachers is still critical, but and culture. efforts to provide effective teacher in-service training to non-Indian teachers The movement of Indian families from reservation areas have been accelerated. to metropolitan areas, as well as the reverse, handicaps effectiveness in Indian involvement in the educational program remains at an uninstruction. satisfactory low level. As a result of these problems the drop-out rate of Indian children remains at a high level, and attendance remains low, especially on the secondary level. Tables No. 3 and 3 indicate little difference in the enrollment and percent of attendance of Indian students during the past two years on either the elementary or secondary levels. Elementary attendance remains relatively better than that on the secondary level.

#### THE STATE LAW

#### STATE INDIAN SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Chapter 613---H.F. No. 838, Laws of 1955

An Act to provide scholarships for Indian students in accredited or approved colleges or business, technical or vocational schools; and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Section 1. Subdivision 1. For the purpose of this act the terms efined in this section shall have the meaning ascribed to them.

Subd. 2. "Indian student" means any student who has one-fourth or ore Indian blood.

Subd. 3. "Eligible Indian student" means an Indian student who has le capabilities to profit from appropriate courses in approved schools.

Section 2. The State Board of Education may award scholarships to ay Indian student for advanced or specialized education in accredited or approved olleges or in business, technical or vocational schools. Scholarships shall be need to defray tuition, incidental fees and the cost of board and room and shall paid directly to the college or school concerned. The amount and type of each ch scholarship shall be determined through the advice and counsel of the nnesota Indian Scholarship Committee. No scholarship shall exceed \$800 to any dian student in any one school year. If a course of study is completed in less an 36 weeks, the scholarship shall be pro-rated accordingly.

When an Indian student satisfactorily completes the work required a certain college or school in a school year he is eligible for additional holarships, if additional training is necessary to reach his educational and cational objectives. Scholarships may not be given to any Indian student r more than four years of study.

Section 3. Any Indian student who receives a scholarship is pected to accept employment in the trade or profession for which trained and practice it.

Section 4. For the purposes specified in this act there is hereby propriated out of any money in the income tax fund not otherwise appropriated e sum of \$5,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1956, and the sum of ,500 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1957. At the close of each such scal year any unexpended balance of said sum shall revert to the income tax nd except so much thereof as is necessary to pay the balance of those scholarips which have been awarded and are not completed or terminated.

#### 1969 - 1970 Summary Report on Minnesota Indian Scholarships - Higher Education And Other Guidance Services

#### Indian Education Unit

Services: Field guidance and counseling service continued for the twelfth year to Indian high school seniors. There were 248 Indian graduates in 1970 from Minnesota high schools. There were also 331 college level students on the scholarship program and other programs of higher education (an increase of 27% over last year) who received this guidance service plus many parents who were visited on the reservations or called at the office. Visitations and counseling were extended to 81 public high schools within the state, to personnel of 6 state colleges working with Indian college students, to 18 junior colleges, to 17 private colleges, to 4 branches of the University of Minnesota, to 27 out of state colleges, and to 13 business, nursing and vocational schools within the state. Several visits or calls were made to these schools during the year to give maximum guidance services needed or requested.

Meetings: There were 11 scholarship meetings held during the year to assist students plus educational conferences and discussions to supply background information to cooperating agencies as the Indian Bureau, Vocational Rehabilitation, Welfare Agencies, Employment Offices, Public Health, Women's Clubs, Minne-CEP, Indian Commission, Youth Commissions, Tribal Councils, Church Organizations, Home School at Sauk Centre, CAP programs, Indian Education Committee, and others working with Indian projects.

Attendance Problems: Attendance problems during the year continue as in past years with little improvement. Home visits were taken over by attendance officers or guidance counselors. Special attendance officers at Cass Lake, Nett Lake, Vineland, Ponsford and White Earth aided in this area. One counselor was added at Cass Lake.

Counseling: High school and college counseling of Indian students plus visits continue to be a big job for one staff person. Indian students need more guidance services. Counselors are encouraging more students to continue their education. An increase of about 100 applications was noted this year which increased the program 27 per cent as 88 additional students were assisted over last year.

Financial Aids: During the 1969-70 year, \$60,000 was available for State Indian Scholarships and was given to 142 eligible Indian students for an average grant of \$422. Grants varied from \$50 to \$800. The Bureau of Indian Affairs assisted 171 students with \$118,212 for an average grant of \$691. A total of 237 eligible students were assisted with 76 assisted jointly by both state and federal grants. An additional 94 students (not eligible for state and federal grants) were assisted by tribal grants, by the Minnesota Indian Scholarship Committee, private organizations, parents, college grants, loan and work programs. The Minnesota Chippewa Tribe assisted 85students with \$8,500. The Bureau also assisted 16 in federal boarding vocational schools out of state for post high school training and 174 units in adult vocational training under their Employment Assistance program.

Students Assisted: Since 1955, over 500 eligible Indian students were assisted on the scholarship program. Of these 167 will continue in college this fall. There are now over 125 degree graduates and about one half go into teaching. Over 15 have Master's degrees and 36 are working toward the advanced degree. There were 48 students or 15% of 331 college students that withdrew or failed during the year. (Only 10% failed and the other 5% withdrew for other reasons).



Other Agencies Assisting: The State Nursing Program, Vocational Rehabilitation, Manpower Development Training (MDT), Minne-CEP, and the New Careers Program also assist in the training of our Indian youth and accounts for 25 to 50 additional students trained and employed each year. Applications, referrals, and counseling services were extended also to these students.

<u>Coordinating Scholarship Committee</u>: This committee has been in existence since 1951 and meets once a month. It is composed of 13 members at the present time (see page 3) with two areas left to appoint a representative. There will then be a total of 15 members, and all reservation areas of Minnesota and the Twin Cities will be represented. The committee coordinates the funds available from all sources and makes recommendations to each source including the State, Bureau, Tribes, colleges, and other private organizations or individual sponsors. The committee members investigate and counsel many students in their areas and report back at each meeting.

The Bureau of Indian Affairs office in Minneapolis and the Area Director of Education work closely with the State Department of Education, the tribes, and the scholarship committee to help coordinate all our efforts in assisting as many students as possible.

<u>Progress:</u> There were over 248 Indian high school graduates in 1970. This compares with 8 in 1945, 26 in 1950, 53 in 1955, 105 in 1960, and 157 in 1965. Per cent of attendance stays at about 90 per cent with elementary attendance near 95 per cent and the high school attendance at about 87 per cent. A continued and expanded drop-out prevention program is in progress along with an adult basic program which should improve attendance. There was a sharp increase in college bound applicants the last two years with over 450 making applications this year. This is an increase of over 33 per cent.

Twelfth Annual Senior Orientation Excursion: This was held from October 12-15, 1969 and sponsored by Labor's Committee for Indian Youth and the Jewish Labor Committee. There were 43 Indian seniors and 4 counselor chaperones who spent 3 days visiting colleges, vocational schools, industrial plants and other places of interest to aid students in making vocational choices. All expenses were paid by the sponsors and is a very worthwhile project.

Special College Meetings: Special efforts are continuing each year to organize American Indian Clubs at each college and university as a means of self-improvement. Special programs were sponsored by these groups which were open to all college students. Some college Indian students are also visiting high schools and encouraging other Indian seniors to take advantage of advanced education programs. Our Indian students in Minnesota have not been active in any campus disturbances and we are proud they seek counsel and advice on their needs. A special effort has been made to visit all Indian groups in each college.

Orientation meetings were held at Bemidji, St. Cloud and Moorhead State Colleges, several junior colleges, private colleges, University of Minnesota, Morris and Duluth. The personnel department, academic dean, business and financial aids office, and other college personnel were contacted to give them a better understanding of the Indian student, scholarship policies, and the need for early counseling to limit the number of college drop-outs among our Indian students.



Special Meetings on Drop-Outs: Special efforts are continuing each year to encourage high school Indian seniors, in regular counseling sessions, to stay in school and graduate and to improve their attendance record. Indian student Clubs are being organized and college Indian students are aiding in this effort.

Employment of Graduates: Extra time was devoted again this past year to get our college graduates into good jobs. Many lists and references have been sent to employers who request them. Many high level jobs have been given to our college graduates with abilities again the past year. The demand for Indian Teachers exceeds the supply because most go into better paying jobs outside of teaching.

#### STUDENT HIGHLIGHTS

Will Antell, Director of Indian Education for Minnesota, was elected President of the National Indian Education Association newly organized the fall of 1970.

Jack Blackwell of Grand Marais graduated from the University of Minnesota on March 21, 1970, in Forestry and is employed with the U.S. Forestry Service.

Ramona Childs of Welch, a 1962 graduate of Winona State College, completed a Master's degree at Northeastern University in Chicago and is teaching there in the Indian Studies program.

Donna Englehart of Milwaukee graduated from Alverno College in Wisconsin with a 4-year degree in nursing and is employed at the Trinity Hospital in Cudahy, Wisc.

Douglas Fabre of Waubun graduated from Moorhead State College with a B. S. degree in elementary education in March, 1970. He continued on his master's degree and is now teaching at the Naytahwaush Elementary School near Mahnomen.

Patricia Goodwin of Mahnomen, a 1966 graduate of St. Cloud State College, is completing a Master's degree in Sociology and Social Work in Washington, D. C.

Bonnie Halvorson of Wadena, a 1968 graduate of Bemidji State College, taught at Seymore, Connecticut in 1968-69 and is now teaching at Pequot Lakes in the field of English and senior social studies.

Robert Halvorson of Wadena, a 1970 graduate of Bemidji State College, is employed by Geo. A. Hormel Company as a Production Management Trainee in their plants.

Carl Metoxen of Oneida, Wisconsin, a 1964 graduate of Bemidji State College, has taught two years at Baudette High School and three years at Centennial High School in Circle Pines. He is also working on his Master's degree.

Larry Smith of Two Harbors, a 1970 graduate of University of Minnesota, Duluth, with an accounting major, has been employed at Milwaukee, Wisconsin, as a special auditor - auditing the accounts of banks and loan companies.

Richard Smith of Two Harbors, a 1969 graduate of University of Minnesota, Duluth, with a B. S. degree, is teaching business education and coaching at Two Harbors High School this past year.

#### Recommendations:

- 1. Costs during the 1970-71 school year to attend State Junior Colleges (\$1500), State Colleges (\$1550), and State Universities (\$1800) will increase \$150 to \$200 per student for the 1971-72 school year. The State Legislature increased State funds from \$60,000 to \$75,000 for State Indian Scholarship grants for the 1970-71 school year, but this amount fell short due to increased costs and increased enrollments.
- 2. Indian students attending colleges have nearly doubled in the last two years, and scholarship funds have not kept pace. The Minnesota Indian Scholarship Committee has recommended to the State Board of Education that State Indian Scholarship funds be increased to \$150,000 for each year of the 1971-73 biennium for a total of \$300,000.
- 3. Recommended that the Bureau of Indian Affairs increase their scholarship fund for <u>eligible Minnesota Indian students</u> to at least \$250,000 or \$300,000 for the <u>1971-72</u> school year as there were over 90 additional applicants in 1969-70 and 115 in 1970-71 for a total of over 300 eligible students. A total of 400 are expected in 1971-72.
- Justification: There were 237 eligible Indian students assisted during the Λ. 1969-70 school year with a total of \$178,000 from both State and Federal Indian scholarship funds for an average grant per student of about \$751 as compared to \$701 last year. Increased costs per student will average about \$150 to \$200 each for the 1971-72 school year and many students are budgeted only for 50 per cent of their school costs. The balance of these costs must be made up from other college grants, personal and private sources, work and loan pro-There were 248 Indian high school graduates in June, 1970, and these grams. were screened by the Guidance Consultant and school counselors, principals, and the Minnesota Indian Scholarship Committee for college and vocational training under State and Federal programs for the year 1970-71. About \$105,000 additional was needed to properly fund applicants on file. College bound students are increasing at the rate of 25 to 30 per cent each year reflecting the increased number of high school graduates and others desiring a college education.
- 5. Consultant guidance services to all high schools in the State and the expanded program of higher education is too burdensome for one State staff person. Indian students need the maximum guidance and counseling services available. Counselors in all our high schools were not available again the past year. Frequent visits and encouragement during the student's <u>senior high school</u> year and during their college and vocational training period is very necessary for their continued success in advanced educational programs. The <u>expanded</u> program of higher education is a full time job alone. The processing of over 400 to 500 applications and preparing recommendations for twelve scholar-ship meetings requires much time also. The employment of <u>an additional counselor</u> or counselor aide is strongly recommended.
