

Our Director, Robert McDuffie, Retires!

On January 1, 2017, Robert McDuffie retired from Virginia Tech after serving in the Department of Horticulture for over 38 years. During his final two years, he was also Director of the Hahn Horticulture Garden. Robert's involvement with the Hahn Garden began some 30 years ago when he—along with Bob Lyons and Richard Johnson--founded the garden. Over the course of his career, his classes designed and built many of the constructed features at the Hahn. As Director, he worked with the garden staff to re-design the garden website, construct new walkways, design and build new gardens, establish new bulb and annual beds on Washington Street and Duckpond Drive, and raise nearly a half million dollars in new gifts. He also established a travel program, organizing and leading two trips to North Carolina gardens in Raleigh, Durham, Chapel Hill and Asheville.

While on faculty in Horticulture, Robert designed the undergraduate Landscape Contracting curriculum, one of the first of its kind in the U.S. In 1997, with other faculty, he organized a student team to compete in the National Collegiate Landscape Competition, sponsored by the National Association of Landscape Professionals. With few exceptions, the Department of Horticulture has fielded a team for this event every year since.

Four years into his career at Tech, he took 43 students on what turned out to be the first of over 50 four-day field trips to visit horticultural sites around the country. In 1998, he initiated the first Department of Horticulture group study abroad program, taking 16 students to England for a two-week adventure. Eventually the program would grow and blossom, taking nearly 1000 students, faculty, horticulture professionals, and garden lovers to visit hundreds of gardens in 20 countries on 4 continents.

In recognition of outstanding teaching, Robert received several teaching awards, including the CALS Certificate of Teaching Excellence, the



Gamma Sigma Delta Faculty Teaching Award, the University William E. Wine Award for Teaching Excellence, and in 2008 was inducted into the University Academy of Teaching Excellence.



Trend Setters at the Spring Plant Sale

Gardeners as artists are individualist, driven mostly by our own visions as we organize and develop gardens according to what inspires us. Plants are our media used to create the picture, and inspiration often comes as new plants are introduced and made available at our local garden centers. We are not only artists but scientists who must know a plant's environmental requirements such as hardiness, soil pH, moisture and nutrients, and that plant's physiology which determines ultimate size, growth rate, habit, and bloom time. That's a lot to think about before the buying and the hole digging begins.

When thinking about plants for garden renovations or additions, it is more mentally manageable to group and to categorize. I begin selecting plants for a developing landscape plan by listing plants according to type and in order of ultimate size. Plan and plant from big to small. From high canopy or shade trees, to smaller ornamental trees, to shrubs, then perennials, groundcovers, annuals, and finally bulbs, I select according to the vision within site parameters and artistic style. Trees will give you a sense of overall structure and scale to your garden with shrubs following for volume, diversity and layering.

According to a recent article in *Garden Design* magazine, one of the top garden trends for 2017 is the use of dwarf shrubs in our gardens. Providing beauty with less effort than their larger parents, dwarf shrubs are easily maintained and versatile. They can be used effectively in containers as well as in the landscape.

The Horticulture Club and the Hahn Garden Plant Sale, April 20 – 22nd, will have many dwarf shrubs offered for sale in addition to the best selection of trees, perennials and annuals in the New River Valley. Following are just a few that I'm really excited about. Quantities have been sacrificed for greater variety this year so come to our Plant Sale Preview at noon on Wednesday, April 19th, to plan your buying strategy.

Aronia melanocarpa Low Scape® Mound

Developed at the University of Connecticut, this Chokeberry like its parent is tough and deer resistant yet grows only 1-2' high. Plants are covered with white flowers in spring, followed by black, edible fruit in summer, and spectacular red foliage in fall. Great as a spiller in containers, planted on slopes, as a lawn substitute or tucked anywhere in your garden, Low Scape* Mound is an irresistible addition to any garden.

Buddleia Humdinger™ 'Little Nuggett' PPAF

Impressive golden foliage with beautifully contrasting magenta flowers, this Butterfly Bush blooms weeks before typical varieties and grows in sun to only 3' tall by 4' wide. Flowers are slightly fragrant, butterfly magnets and plants are deer resistant.

Deutzia x rosea 'Nikko Blush'

From the National Arboretum's plant breeding program, 'Nikko Blush' was selected as a pink flowering dwarf that is relatively fast growing to a height of 3'. Flowers appear

in late April through May, are slightly fragrant and attract hummingbirds. Again, another deer resistant shrub that can be used as a groundcover, on slopes and in containers.

Hydrangea paniculata Bobo®

Large white flowers in late summer fading to pink into fall on a small, compact hydrangea - what more could you ask for? Mike Hildebrand, owner of James River Nurseries outside Richmond, says Bobo* is the best landscape hydrangea he's seen in years. Blooming on new growth, flowers are held upright and plants grow to 3' high, thriving in full sun to part shade. A great container plant as well.

Physocarpus opulifolius Little Devil™

A dwarf Ninebark is a wonderful thing! From the breeding program at the University of Wisconsin-River Falls, Little Devil™ reaches 3-4' high with blush pink spring flowers held against rich, dark foliage. A powdery mildew resistant variety, this plant makes a great substitute for the invasive barberry.

Viburnum obovatum 'Mrs. Schiller's Delight'

'Mrs. Schiller's Delight' is a Viburnum that doesn't look like a Viburnum. Cloaked in small white flowers in April, habit is tight, leaves are small and semi-evergreen in our climate. Flowers are followed by red berries changing to black, and are enjoyed by birds. Mature height is 2-3' with similar spread. It is best grown in moist soil with ample sun.

If you are space challenged, want a cool container plant or seek a reduction in pruning chores, in addition to the plants described here, there will be many more dwarfs and unusually shaped plants available at The Plant Sale. Here are just a few:

- *Carpinus betulus* 'Franz Fontiane' columnar form; vertical accent
- Cotoneaster procumbens Little Dipper™ dense, low habit; deer resistant
- *Hydrangea paniculata* Little Lime® a dwarf Limelight; blooms on new wood
- Rubus BrazelBerries® Raspberry Shortcake™ - dwarf and thornless
- Spiraea Double Play® Gold long blooming; golden foliage; deer resistant
- Styrax japonica Marleys Pink® a weeper with pink blooms
- Vaccinium BrazelBerries® Peach Sorbet™
 beautiful spring & fall foliage

Lunchtime Learning: Community Food Forests

with Catherine Bukowski April 12, 12:00—1:00 p.m.

Community food forests are food production systems that mimic a forest ecosystem by organizing edible perennial vegetation in similar layers to a young woodland. Fruit and nut trees form the canopy, berry bushes are placed in the understory and herbs and low-growing plants such as strawberries and oregano cover the ground. She has visited and documented twenty four sites across the country and continues to work on establishing a local one at the Hale-Y community garden with the support of VT Engage. She will discuss and show various examples of what she has seen in the development of the sites as well as their ability to transform underutilized urban areas into abundant landscapes that serve various community functions.
