PLANTS FOR TENNESSEE LANDSCAPES:

SEED GROWN FLOWERS FOR THE HOME GARDEN

Introduction

Growing ornamental plants by seed is a tradition cherished by many Tennessee gardeners. These plants passed along by friends and family hold a special place in the home garden and in our memories. This list strives to include as many of these treasured heirloom pass-a-long plants as possible along with garden standards. As improved varieties and cultivars come along, this list will evolve and grow over time.



Centaurea cyanus, a cool season annual commonly called Bachelor Button or Cornflower, is easily grown by direct seeding in TN home gardens. The seed can be broadcast in fall through winter and will produce blooms the following spring.

Seed vs. Transplant

Some of the plants in this list are not commonly found as transplants in the trade warranting them separation from the plant list in publication **W874-A Plants for TN Landscapes- Annuals.** That publication focuses on annual garden plants that perform well in TN and are easily sourced at garden centers. Many of them are difficult to germinate without controlled environment conditions, and some are even reproduced strictly through vegetative propagation. In this publication, we share plants that are easily propagated from seed in the TN home garden.

Many of these plants are not generally found in garden centers. They are relatively common, but are not

particularly appealing as young plants in cell packs or do not transplant well. Understandably, garden centers invest in the more marketable and faster moving plants. The easily seed grown plants in this list are exquisite performers certainly worthy of attention as colorful and inexpensive additions to the landscape.

Seeds can be sourced from seed catalogues, garden centers, or friends and family who are eager to share. Some of the harder to find cultivars might require a search for companies or social media groups that specialize in heirlooms, new market arrivals, and specialty niches.

Finally, do not underestimate fellow gardeners' willingness to share!

About the list

The list is predominately composed of annuals easily grown from seed, but some biennials and perennials are also included and are noted in the comments column. Growing requirements, plant attributes, and common uses are also referenced in the comments.

Plants are organized in alphabetical order by scientific name, and common names are also listed.

Many of these plants are easily grown by direct sowing in a prepared garden site, or naturally re-seed themselves from year to year. Those plants are identified with an X in the Direct Sow column. Those plants whose seed are naturally reseed will lay in wait throughout the winter until growing conditions are suitable for their germination. Others including select cool season plants, biennials, and some perennials actually require a cold and moist period, called stratification, to initiate germination. Specific notes on some of these requirements are in the comments.

Other plants may germinate best by starting indoors and then transplanting into the garden. Every plant has its own requirements for success including soil temperature, lighting, scarification, and stratification, but the list focuses on easy plants to grow from seed in the TN home garden.
