# **Executive Director's Report by Steve Hootman**

It was a tremendous spring season here in the garden with record-breaking attendance at most of our major events and probably the most income in terms of overall plant sales that we have ever recorded. The unusually dry and warm weather had a great deal to do with our success this spring but the efforts of Britt and the rest of the staff definitely contributed to a very good start to the year. Now, with our busy spring behind us, we begin the summer season of watering, weeding and propagation. We were forced to begin watering in the garden much earlier than normal this year due to the month of May going down as both the driest and warmest on record for our region. So, we now enter our long maritime-Mediterranean dry season with the ground already quite dry! It looks like we are in for a very long summer.


We welcome our new intern Alison Sulham who started with us in May. Alison has considerable experience in greenhouse production and nursery work and has been a great addition to the team.

Earlier this spring the entire staff had a field trip to the newly opened Amazon Spheres in downtown Seattle where we were given a personal tour by the lead horticulturists. The Spheres are three geodesic domes joined together and planted with cloud forest plants including some quite large trees. It is used by Amazon employees as work and meeting space. Many of the plants growing in this new conservatory originated at the RSBG including numerous *Rhododendron* species, *Agapetes*, etc. and some large tree ferns which had grown too large for our own Rutherford Conservatory.

*Woodland Gardening*, the beautifully illustrated new book by Ken Cox, is selling well and I urge you to visit our website for further information. It has received rave reviews and is only available from the RSBG here in North America.

I was quite happy to spend a great deal of time with many of you during the recent International *Rhododendron* conference in Bremen, Germany. We saw many fine gardens and plants and the whole event was extremely well-organized and enjoyable.

I also had a very successful trip to Virginia in April for the Botanic Gardens Conservation International meeting on conservation of the genus *Rhododendron*. A great deal of planning and evaluation took place with representatives from most of the major *Rhododendron* gardens and collections in attendance.

### Summer Bloomer: Rhododendron auriculatum by Atsuko Gibson

If you have a large garden, *R. auriculatum* is a must have. Its handsome foliage can be up to 12 inches long, but the true treasure of this plant is when the highly fragrant flowers are borne in summer (late July to early August for us in the PNW). Our plantings of *R. auriculatum*, along the main road, are among the original plantings still left in the garden from 43 years ago. When they bloom, especially on a warm day, the mouthwatering sweet fragrance travels far and surprises visitors walking through the garden. The flowers are

funnel-shaped and typically white with green-yellow blotches, but we have the rare rose-pink flowered form in the collection as well.

Underneath our large specimens of *R. auriculatum*, we recently planted the ground-cover *Asarum caudatum* and the wildflower *Disporum smithii*, both native to the PNW. Once they fill in, there will be a solid green carpet of *Asarum* with the lovely Fairy Bells arching above with white bell-shaped flowers. Recent new collections of *R. auriculatum* are planted out in our nursery beds, waiting to be placed in the garden. We need to do tree work before we can plant them in the garden but



this should be done in the next year or two. In fact, some of the newest collections of *R. auriculatum* will bloom for the first time this year! We are hoping some of them will be pink ones. We'll see!

The species name comes from the auriculate leaf base (ear-lobed). It was introduced into cultivation in 1899 by Ernest Wilson. This heat-tolerant species grows well with afternoon shade and is hardy to -5F. It is native to SW China and can attain over 30 feet in height in the wild.

# Woodland Gardening by Kenneth Cox


