Engineers are politicians and businessmen the same as all of us are-and when terms of "smallness" creep into discussion with whom they're to do business-their reactions are going to be small too!

There's no other community in the world greater, there's no other community in the world that has the assets the Sanford community possesses, and there's no friendlier community in the world! That's FACT-and it's truth-for there are those who believe ft and live by it!

It matters not what the project might be-Docks and Terminals, or any other project, such as streets, water system, expansion and growth, commercial activitywe should think in terms of being BIG, the very biggest.

Even though, in the category of financing, we know that there is a limitationbut at the same time we want as much as we can get, to be as BIG as possible-within the budget to which we must ascribe. The negative approach - such as has been heard-is to get as little as we can in order to stay within a budget.

Unexpended Balance Problem

Senator Barry S. Byrd, probably the most well versed senator on the financial structure of the nation, outlined a budget-cutting guide to a Top Strategy Meeting on Economy of the United States Chamber of Commerce. His remarks today begin with "The Problem of Unexpended Balances."

We have unexpended appropriation balancen as of this date of \$60 billion. If the present appropriation bill is passed, as of July 1, we will have \$145 billion that, technically, are available for expenditures. The only thing that could prevent their expenditure would be limitation on the debt. The money is there to be spent, providing the funds can be obtained with which to pay for the expenditures.

Last year, for example, the Congress after a long debate, cut the foreign aid bill by \$1 billion. Yet the Administration took a billion dollars out of unexpended balances and used it for foreign aid.

The House Education Commit ce voted favorably on both bills. last week, leaving it up to the House Appropriations Committee to decide which one should go to the floor in conjunction with other heavy demands for appropriations. The \$1,100 raise would cost the state approximately 60 million dollars in the next two years; the governor's proposal, about 30 mil-

ion dollars. Sen. Wilson Carraway of Tallahaving has given notice he opposes the FEA sponsored pay raise as too costly. He said he believes teachers are entitled to a (Continued on Page 10)
