Eules Marine cited for bravery

A 21 year old Eules Marine is doing his part in Vietnam to counteract the actions of "peace-niks" at home.

He is Sgt Robert M Soule Jr., whose duty in Southeast Asia has earned him two Purple Hearts and the Gallantry Cross with Silver Star, the second highest award given enlisted men by the South Vietnamese government.

His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Robert Soule, 1202 Woodridge Circle, Eules.

Sgt. Soule is with the Third Marine Division and has been in Vietnam since Jan. 2. He was awarded the Cross of Gallantry for skillfully commanding his forward observer team

to advance to the Demilitarized Zone and clear the road for military vehicles. The vehicles were subsequently able to move safely into an area considered inaccessible by the Viet Cong. The action was part of the Marine's "Operation Hickory."

Sgt. Soule was with a forward battalion of the Third Reconnaissance Co., and was frequently dropped with his three-man team behind enemy lines.

In letters home he has described similar close-shave experiences. Once he and his team stumbled onto a large "Charley" encampment, thinking it was deserted. The men observed numerous footprints leading into bunkers and caves and tunnels and discovered the area was still in use by the Cong. The Marines withdrew safely and led more troops to the spot later, but it had been hastily abandoned.

"The jungle covering which they had rigged up over the area's entrance was so dense that it would never have been spotted from the air," Sgt. Soule related.

His first honor, the Purple Heart, was awarded him after he sustained shrapnel wounds in his foot and leg when he attempted to dispose of a grenade that fell at his feet.

A second grenade struck him months later and he suffered injuries to his left arm. "I was put out to pasture then," he wrote home from a rest and recreation center in Da Nang, where he spent 20 days recuperating before again being recalled to active duty.

The young sergeant said his 21st birthday gift was particularly memorable. His company was in a "tough spot, things looked bad," he wrote his parents. But relief came with the timely arrival of helicopters to evacuate them — at the time they had been without water for three days.

"It was a wonderful Valentine's Day," said Soule who celebrated his 21st birthday Feb. 14.

The military life may be new in practice to the youthful Marine, but he has "lived it" much of his life. Father Robert Sr. retired from the Navy after 22 years. And now, brother Gary, 23, is in Quantico, Va., after joining the Corps Oct. 26.

Enemy camp

DONG HA — An eight-men patrol from the 3rd Reconnaissance Battalion, recently walked into the camp of nearly 500 North Vietnamese Army troops 10 miles northwest of Dong Ha.

The recon unit wasn't aware that the tunnel, caves and bunkers, capable of holding well over a battalion of troops, were still occupied.

"When our patrol first entered the base camp it looked empty," said patrol leader Sergeant Robert Soule.

"Our attention was immediately attracted to a stream of smoke rising from the nearby brush. We moved the brush and found a tunnel which led to an underground pit where a large quantity of rice was cooking," he said.

"This gave us our first indication that there were NVA still in the area, but when we searched more thoroughly we noticed that all footprints led into the caves," Soule said. He added the tree canopy covering the camp area was so dense artillery would have little effect on it.

The next morning the recon unit led "H" Co., Twenty-Sixth Regiment Marines back to the NVA base camp, which had been hastily evacuated during the night. Demolitions men worked the remainder of the day destroying the complex.

Eight days earlier the same team had uncovered a base camp of an estimated regiment of NVA.

For heroic or meritorious achievement or service, not involving aerial flight, in connection with operations against an opposing armed force. Bronze "V" worn to denote valor (Army-Air Force) or combat (Navy-Marine Corps-Coast Guard).

Soule Awarded Army Commendation Medal

LONG BINH, Vietnam — Army Master Sergeant Donald C. Soule, son of William N. Soule, South Attleboro, received the Army Commendation Medal Nov. 14 while serving with the 159th Engineer Group near Long Binh, Vietnam.

Sgt. Soule earned the award for meritorious service during his last assignment with the U.S. Army ROTC Instructor Group at Boston College, Chestnut Hill, Mass.

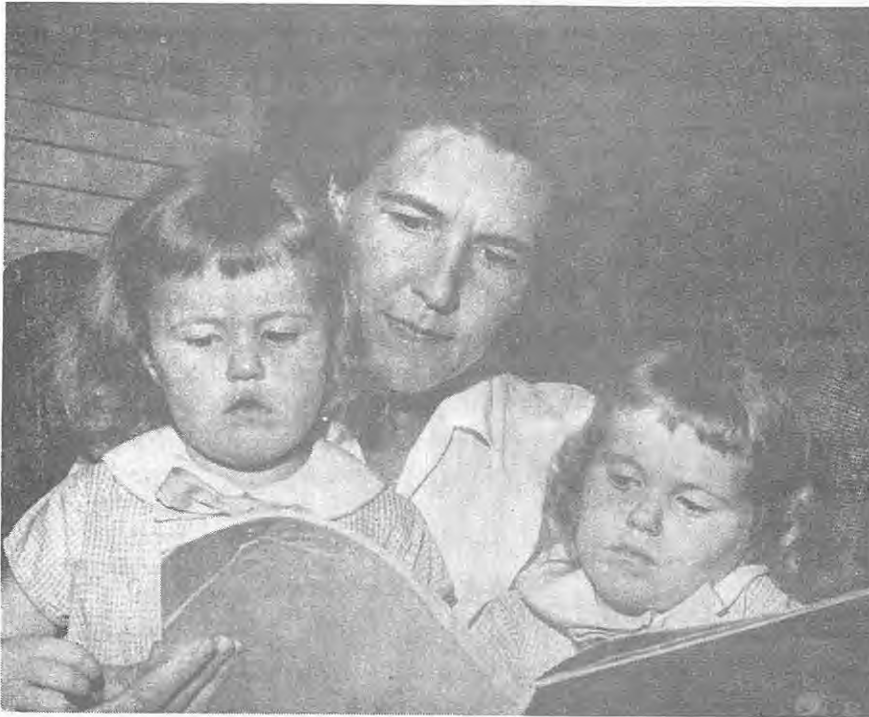
The Army Commendation Medal is awarded to personnel who while serving with the Army distinguish themselves by hero-

ism, meritorious achievement or meritorious service. The medal was established by the Secretary of War on Dec. 18, 1945.

Sgt. Soule, a section engineer specialist with Headquarters Company of the group, entered the Army in September 1948 and completed basic training at Ft. Dix, N.J. He arrived overseas in October 1968.

He is a 1948 graduate of Attleboro High School and attended Northeastern University, Boston. The sergeant's wife, Evelyn, lives on Warren Street, Plainville.

U. S. LADY-OF- THE-YEAR DORTHA SOULE

THE sociologist who once declared "big families usually get the most fun out of life" might have had in mind ones like that of Dortha Soule, chosen "U. S. Lady-of-the-Year."

Eleven children, seven of her own and four adopted when her twin sister was killed in an auto accident six years ago, make up the busy and happy family of this outstanding mother. She is the wife of Cdr. Robert M. Soule, USN, Assistant Bureau of Naval Weapons Representative at the Chance Vought Aircraft plant in Dallas, Texas. Dortha was chosen as the No. 1 "Lady" by a committee composed of wives of the service secretaries and the Joint Chiefs of Staff—the first Navy wife to be so honored.

The Soules and their "stair steps" brood of lively youngsters, ranging from three to 18 years in age, reside in "Breezy Hill Manor," a three-story seven-bedroom house resembling the family dwelling in the movie, "Giant," with overtones of Mt. Vernon.

Dortha had three children of her own when her sister, Dorrie Peterson, was killed in an Arizona auto accident. Her husband had died two years earlier. She went to Arizona and brought back the four youngsters to live with her own and since then has added four more Soules, the last two being twins,

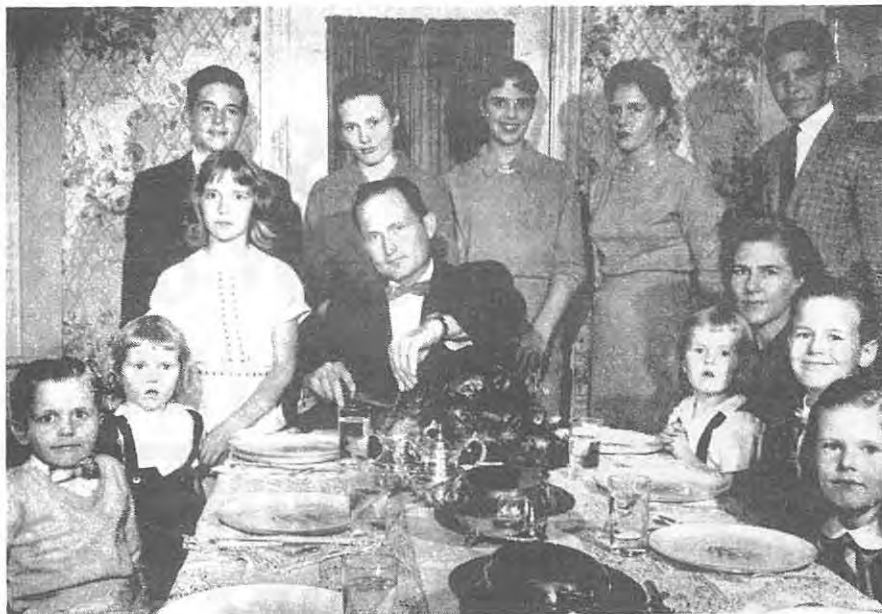
Debbie and Denise.

When Commander Soule was transferred to Dallas last July, the problem of finding a home large enough to house a family of 13 persons presented itself. A doctor's former residence atop a hill, with lots of space all around it, proved the answer. Three cars, three television sets, four horses, a lake to fish in and room for the youngsters to run in help solve transportation and recreation problems. The horses belong to others but the children get in plenty of riding on the Texas prairies.

The family includes Gayle, 18, Lynne, 17, Gary, 15, and Dee, 10, all children of the Peterson branch of the family, and Vicki, 16, Bobbie, 13, Ronnie, 9, Dorris, 6, Kent, 5, and the three-year-old twins.

Not only does Dortha find time to care for her large family but she has been active in PTA, church and Scouting groups and has won her 100-hour Navy Relief pin several times over. She goes bowling each week at the Naval Air Station and is one of the top scorers in her league.

Being a Navy wife, she has moved her family across the country several times and once to Adak, Alaska. Her big ambition is to take them overseas for duty but the Navy rule against transporting large families such dis-

tances has not made that possible as yet.

Sea duty being what it is in the Navy, with her husband commanding fighter squadrons aboard aircraft carriers in far-off waters, Dortha has had to do much of the rearing of her family herself. On one stretch, Bob was away from his family for 27 months, with only a three-months' break in the absence. Before coming to Texas, he was stationed in Newport, Rhode Island, while attending Naval War College. On arrival there the family lived out of suitcases for a month until their household effects arrived. "You get pretty tired of the same old clothes at a time like that," Dortha said.

When Bob transferred to Dallas, it was the first service duty change he had made that did not involve shipping his household effects and family all the way from one coast to the other. But even the transfer to Dallas produced a minor crisis.

Bob had come to Texas ahead of time to obtain housing for his family. When he returned to Rhode Island to bring another car and a couple of the boys back, he left the bus-like Goliath car at Amon Carter airport at Ft.

Worth. Dortha and nine youngsters flew down to Texas—but their plane landed instead at Dallas, 30 miles away. On top of that Dortha had lost the keys to the Goliath. Luckily, Bob had left a set of keys with an officer in the Navy office at Chance Vought and a phone call to him brought the needed wheels to Love Field in Dallas.

A few months after they had settled down in their new home another crisis arose. A cold wave hit Texas, sending temperatures down to 20 degrees. The family's huge house is heated by butane gas and the tank supply ran out at 10:30 p.m. The Soules bundled the smaller children into one room and tried to keep it warm with a small electric heater. The rest of the family just shivered through the long, cold night and into the next day until a new gas supply could be obtained.

"We can laugh about it now, but it wasn't funny at the time," Dortha commented wryly.

"In spite of having an extra large family," she explains, "we try to treat each child as an individual. They have various kinds of amusements, parties and frequent overnight guests. I may be pretty busy, but not too busy to do

those things for them."

On the day "U. S. Lady" went out to take pictures of Dortha and her family they had, besides the 13 members of the group, another of Mrs. Soule's sisters and her small son, plus a visiting Navy ensign who was calling on one of the attractive daughters.

Since they live short of the boundary line where school buses will pick up their children, the Soules have a transportation problem that keeps both busy as chauffeurs. The parents run shuttle service to get their eight school-age youngsters back and forth to classes.

As is the case with most large families, the elder children are helpful in looking after the younger ones and as "assistants" doing household chores.

Both Bob and Dortha are natives of Arizona. They were high school sweethearts since the days when Bob was drum major for the school band and the twin sisters were majorettes. Besides his other affiliations, Bob is a member of the Society of Experimental Test Pilots, organized recently in the Dallas area. He is a graduate of the Navy's test pilot school at Patuxent River, Maryland. ***

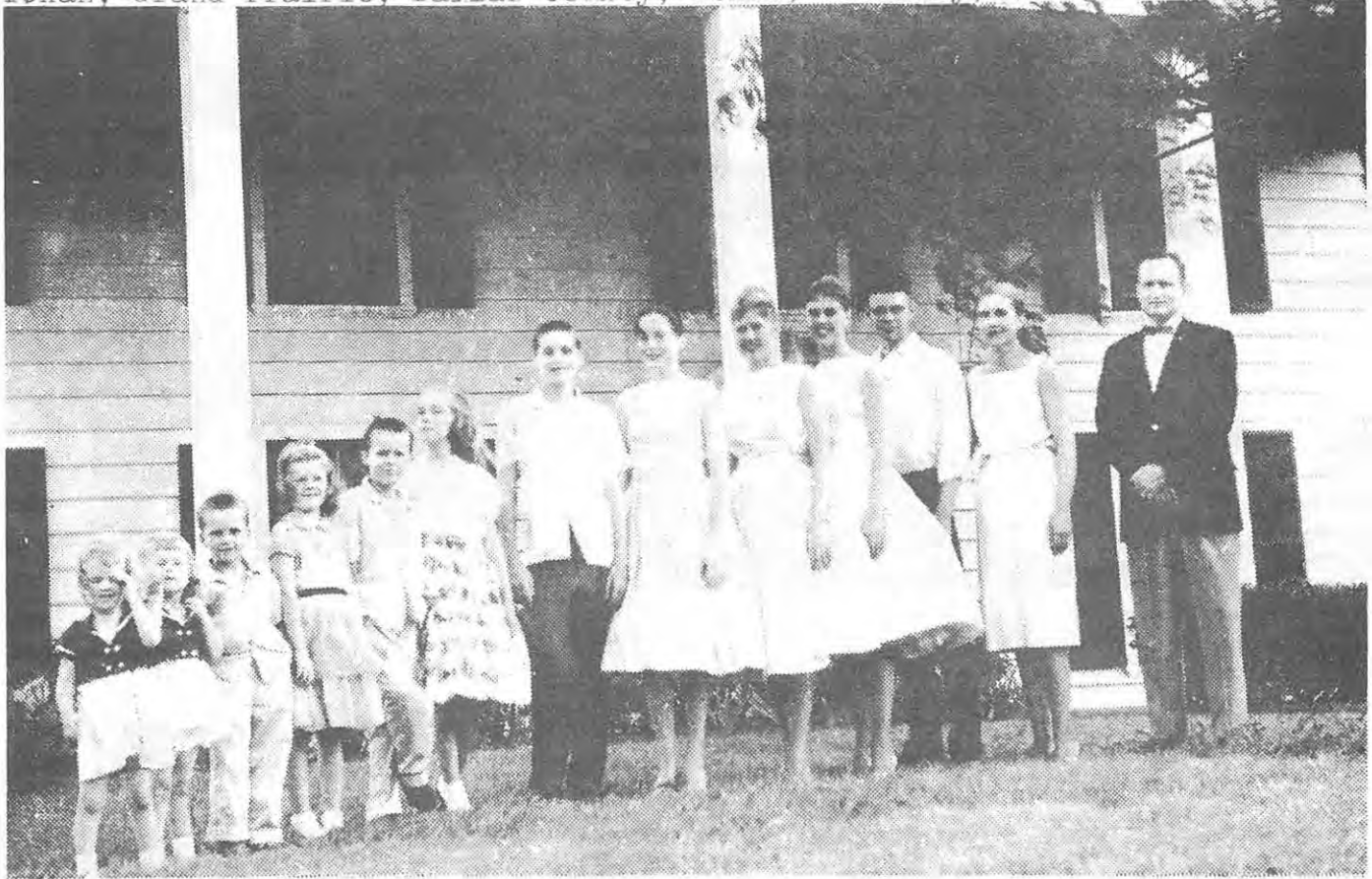

13 Soules at Breezy Hill

Navy Commander Robert Soule doesn't have much trouble with the income tax people.

He's got eleven deductions besides his wife, ranging in age from three to 18 years.

Commander and Mrs. Soule and their 4 boys and 7 girls have recently moved into the huge 16-room Breezy Hills Manor on Tarrant Road.

About 40 acres once considered as a country club site, goes with the house which allows the youngsters plenty of room to roam in. Also, the house has eight bedrooms and as many baths. It was last used by the Schwenkenberg Rest Home.

"If someone had told me I would have this many children when we got married, I'd have gone crazy," stated Soule, a Naval War College graduate

recently sent to this area from Rhode Island to help administer the Navy's aircraft contracts.

He and Mrs. Soule met in their native town of Phoenix, Ariz., and married shortly after they graduated from high school. He entered the Navy shortly afterward and is rounding out 20 years in the service.

Four of their children are adopted neices and nephews, children of Mrs. Soule's twin sister.

There is one set of twins in the family, three-year-old Debbie and Denise, who are also the youngest.

The Soules, both 38, train their children early to take care of themselves as much as possible.

"Even the twins are independent," says Mrs. Soule. "Me help me dress," she

quotes the twins when she attempts to dress them.

"Of course, everyone does his share. They have to because there's so much to be done. The girls take over and prepare the meals when I'm not here," said Mrs. Soule.

Being a Navy man, Soule is moved about every two years and it's a problem finding a house large enough for his family at each new location.

He said he took a beating, cost-wise, on moving his furniture. The Navy pays for moving its personnel, but according to Soule, the system is set up to pay the cost of moving a three-member family and it doesn't take into consideration the amount of furniture required for 13 in a family.

The Soules are happy with the house they're in now,

which they leased from Attorney John Thorne. There is even a lake on the property, which of course, is a delight to the children.

The parents say they have no trouble in calling each child by the right name, even though there's Gayle and Lynne and Vickie and Gary and Bob and Dee and Ronald and Doris and Kent and Debbie and Denise.

Well-mannered, the children cause little trouble and a lot less noise than what anyone would expect from youngsters of their ages.

Seven will enter Grand Prairie public schools, and Gayle, the oldest, will enter Arlington State.

How does a Navy man's pay support such a large family?

"It isn't easy," stated Soules, "and there's not much left from the pay check."

A Baker's Dozen Meal Three Times Each Day

In talking with Mrs. Dortha Soule about her method of menu planning and shopping, I find that she shops two or three times a week, that menus are not planned too far ahead of time because there are always guests of one of the 11 young members of the family who will be dropping in.

She herself does all the cooking, but all of the girls are being trained to know how to manage their own homes. The one big difference will be that, instead of quantity cookery for 13, they will have to learn to cook for two.

Vickie, Gayle and Lynne pack the lunches now that school is in session again, and no more cold breakfasts for any of the young Soules. From now on, a hot breakfast is the order of the day, with fruit or fruit juice, bacon and eggs, toast, jam and milk. This year all but the 4-year-old twins will be in school. Although Gayle and Lynne will be attending Arlington State College, they will live at home and their home routine will be the same.

Bread and milk are delivered to the big white house on the hill, because the storage of milk for more than one or two days' supply would be a problem.

I asked if a freezer helped her in planning her meals ahead, and Mrs. Soule said, "not to any great extent. It is used for storage of meats, ice cream and vegetables, but there is never any 'leftover' problem at the Soule house." Here, of course, this household differs from the average one. Because most homemakers have to think of ways to use leftovers and make them into "planned overs" for a second meal.

All of the younger Soules have very definite

food likes, and dislikes; however, they all agree on one meal as being the family favorite, and that's a pot roast done with vegetables so that the meal is a one-dish entree, a big green salad and ice cream for dessert.

Casserole dishes are not too much in favor, although there is one called Johnnie Musetti, made with lasagne noodles, tomato soup, bell peppers, onions, ground meat, ripe olives and sharp Cheddar cheese. This is a main dish casserole that they love, and the pot is always cleaned.

I felt in talking with Dortha Soule that here was an opportunity to find out if a homemaker responsible for a minimum of 39 meals a day liked the new convenience foods, and she is most enthusiastic about them. Cake mixes, indeed yes; she uses them all the time and loves them. Canned spaghetti sauce, to which she adds her own ingenious touches and combines with meat balls, and the new dehydrated packaged foods are being used more and more often in the Soule kitchen.

She told an amusing story on herself about the new dehydrated sliced potatoes. She, like most of us, tried out this new food and didn't stop to read the instructions which say that the potatoes must be re-hydrated by boiling in water. This was a failure enjoyed by all the family because she used the potato slices as they came from the box, and turned up with a lovely dish of driedout nubbins of potatoes. Now she uses both the sliced potatoes and the whipped potatoes with great success.

Snacks in the afternoon at the Soule home are the same kind of snacks that you have at your house, only more of them. Peanut butter sandwiches are a great favorite. Milk and cookies, fresh fruit or jelly sandwiches—one

reason why the bread man stops by every day for delivery.

I was tremendously impressed with the ease and comfort and love in this wonderful home.

The co-operation of the whole family to make this homelife well-rounded and fun is something that every home needs whether children number one or 13. And Dortha Soule in a most offhand manner said, "Well, Julie, it's no more trouble to cook for 13 than for two; you just use a bigger pot."

Better Meals Build Better Families

In looking around for a typical family for this two weeks' emphasis on the nationwide theme of the food industry, we visited a big white Colonial home on the top of a wind-swept hill in the outskirts of Grand Prairie. We were delighted to have an opportunity to set up our color camera for a picture of the wonderful family of Comdr. and Mrs. Robert M. Soule.

He is a test pilot and an area representative for the Bureau of Naval Weapons, and Dortha, Mrs. Soule, was chosen U.S. Lady of the Year over all other American service wives by U. S. Lady Magazine, published for all service wives.

The minute you step on the front porch of this home you are greeted by puppies, children, friendly laughter and genuine hospitality. Commander Soule, last assigned to the Naval War College in Newport, R.I., brought his family to Texas last July. It was a problem finding a house large enough. But, in visiting with them, you would think they had been firmly entrenched and growing up in this rambling home with seven bedrooms and eight baths and two rumpus

rooms. There is a 5-acre lake that just seems to say, come on out and bring your fishing pole. There are four horses, a cool, shady picnic area and two grown Weimaraner dogs and eight puppies.

There is no hired help at Breezy Manor. Housework, as well as yard work, is handled as a co-operative family project.

This year with all of the Soules in school except Debbie and Denise, the twins who are going on four, Mrs. Soule hopes to get back into PTA and Scout work. However, Dortha Soule has many outside interests and projects. She is an ardent worker for the projects of the Officers' Wives Club at the Dallas Naval Air Station, owns a 100-hour Navy relief pin and is a primary school counselor in the Grand Prairie Ward, Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints (more often called Mormons).

Commander Soule leads Explorer Scouts and gets his relaxation in teaching a boys' soaring club. Hunting, archery, bow making, fishing and photography are among his interests.

Stops Pulled Out in Welcome As Wounded Marine Returns

Dave Andrew arrived home this weekend.

You may have heard the welcome if you live in the area of Morningside School in South Salem.

There was lots of noise.

That's because the neighbors turned out with bells and horns; their yards were plastered with "Welcome Home" and "Hi Dave" signs.

Dave is 21.

He's the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold E. Andrew Jr., 1323 Madrona Ave. SE.

He's a retired Marine corporal.

And he's a paraplegic.

Car Is Special

Homecoming was in his 1968 convertible with specially equipped hand controls.

Preparations for his arrival had included a brand new addition to the family home for his living quarters, and a 22-foot-long ramp so he can come and go as he pleases in his wheel chair.

Dave is a 1965 graduate of South Salem High School who attended Oregon State University before enlisting in the Marine Corps.

He had been in Vietnam about nine months when shrapnel from an enemy rocket partially severed his spinal cord at Khe San last Feb. 2.

His last visit home was 20 months ago.

No Definite Plans

He hasn't made any definite future plans although further schooling is a possibility.

In the meantime his regimen includes drinking quantities of cranberry juice and spending an hour a day in a standing frame — to prevent kidney stones.

He's entitled to a one-time \$1,600 car allowance and \$10,000 toward the purchase of a home, providing it meets design specifications for a paraplegic.

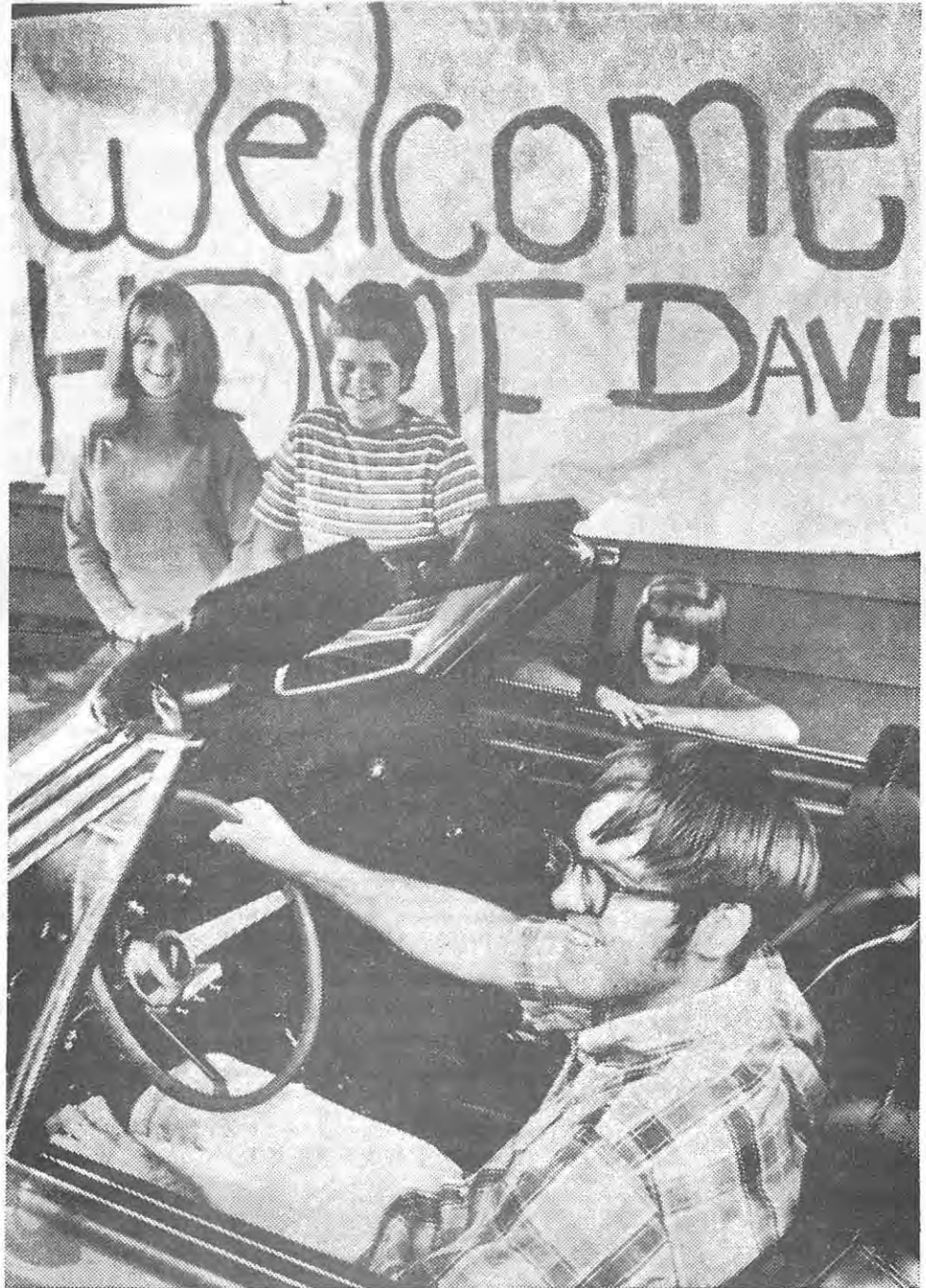
His full disability retirement pay amounts to \$850 a month tax free, and he must return

once a year to the VA hospital in Long Beach, Calif., for a checkup.

The president of the board of trustees of the Syracuse Public Library, Oscar F. Soule, 80, has resigned as a trustee, effective Jan. 1.

Soule of 2 Brattle Rd., has been a library trustee since March, 1932 and president of the board since 1952.

Soule Hits Drug Rehabilitation Group For Failure To Hold Meeting

Free Press Capitol Bureau
MONTPELIER — A resigning member of the Governor's Committee on Children and Youth scored the new Drug Rehabilitation Commission for its failure to hold a meeting.

William H. Soule, a professor at Vermont College here, told Gov. Hoff in his letter of resignation he understood the Commission appointed last summer by Hoff has never met.

Soule said, "I think this commission could provide the leadership needed, but it must accept the role."

Soule said the subcommittee on drug abuse in youth appointed by the Governor's Committee on Children and Youth made a

significant contribution to the state and its youth through a recent study of the drug problem.

He said he hopes the recommendations of the subcommittee would not be ignored by the legislature and the state agencies involved.

Soule said the greatest problem in organizing to solve the drug problem in Vermont appears to be a coordination of the state agencies so they can work together instead of duplicating each other's services or working at cross purposes.

Soule said, "The result of any study should not merely be a printed document. Unless some leadership is shown, the various state agencies will continue to

work independently of each other or to ignore their responsibility in regard to the drug problem in Vermont."

He suggested the recommendations in the drug study done by the subcommittee be implemented under the leadership of the Drug Rehabilitation Commission.

He said the subcommittee will meet with commissioners of agencies named in the report Nov. 12 and will ask those commissioners what their plans of action are.

Soule resigned from the Governor's Committee because of additional duties and responsibilities he has at Vermont College.

When the Soule House at Plimoth Plantation was completed a year or so ago the question of furnishings arose, and it was the feeling of this writer (Exhibits Director for Plimoth Plantation) that these should not be antiques but newly made, as they must have been in the 1620s. Since the village houses are reproductions based on historical research, so should the furniture be. Mr. Horace Soule concurred in this idea and gave money to have furniture made. Several reproductions have been produced in the exhibits workshop--a table, two benches and a joined stool. A six-board chest is presently under construction. All these items of furniture will be in the Soule House when Plimoth Plantation opens April 1, 1969. In addition, various articles of daily living will be placed on shelves--wooden plates, some pewter and some drinking vessels of leather and horn. The fireplace will be furnished with trammel hooks, pots and pans and other hearth furnishings. Since certain houses in the village are strategically located for crowd dispersal, they are used for certain specific exhibits--cooking, lighting, cooperage, etc. The Soule House will house a representative collection of ceramic ware of the 17th century with a hostess to explain the house, furnishings and ceramics. In time we hope to furnish all the houses with reproduction furnishings. The antiques presently in some of the houses will eventually be placed in the museum hall which is planned for the future.

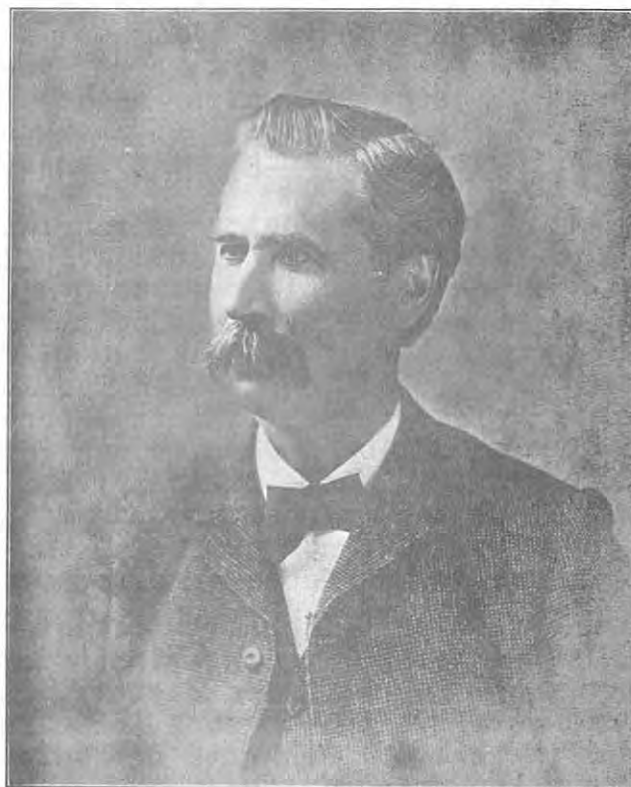

LEANDER⁷ SOULE (James⁶, John⁵, James⁴, John³⁻², George¹), son of Deacon James (1795-1877) and Leah (Bennett) Soule (1796-1865) was born at South Abington (Whitman since 3 May 1886), Plymouth County, Mass. on 12 Jan 1831 (Abington VR), was baptized 2 Sep 1832 (Abington VR) and died at Holbrook, Massachusetts on 22 Feb 1915 (Mass VR 7:84). He is buried in Mt. Pleasant Cemetery in Taunton, Massachusetts.

Leander Soule (he disliked his given name and always wrote it firmly "L. Soule") went to Taunton when he was 20 and made that his home city for most of his life although he lived in Brockton during his later years. In 1968 his grandchildren recall him as a tall man, rugged and powerful of frame, massive of head and chest, and a white moustache adding distinction.

Shortly after arriving in Taunton, young Soule became a superintendent for A. Field & Sons Tack Works which later merged into the Atlas Tack Company, the largest manufacturer in the United States of nails, tacks, and similar products. His versatile and ambitious mind devised many improvements in manufacturing methods. Five of these inventions were patented. He was a persistent promoter of products of the company and by his own estimate he brought over \$100,000 into the company treasury and increased the demand for nails and tacks by \$60,000 to \$100,000 per year.

Branching out into business ventures of his own, he founded "L.Soule & Co., Piano & Organ Dealers" with an office at 24 City Square, Taunton. He was also Manager in Taunton of the "Soule Piano & Organ Investment Company" in Taunton. The advertisements of these companies are strikingly original and trenchant. A little book called "Soule's Diagram for Facilitating the Selection of Pianos and Organs" shows that his inventiveness was constantly at work in practical ways. Forward looking beyond most men of his time, he became agent for the New England Wireless Telegraph Company in 1901 and expresses himself as "sanguine of the success of the manufacture of these instruments" and cited numerous examples of the satisfactory usage of wireless telegraphy. In letters to his children, he often apprised them enthusiastically of what he considered wonderful, though often speculative, opportunities for investment.

Although of necessity a conscientious businessman - and a progressive one - Leander Soule's real devotion was to music. His family recalls that he had a big baritone voice, loved to sing, and it was tradition that he could play any band instrument. He was only 24 when he was elected Chorister of the Winslow Church (Orthodox Congregational) choir in Taunton, a position he held for 25 years. He formed a chorus choir of fifty voices to assist in the services of Cedar Street Chapel and many of them followed when he was called to the Broadway Church (Trinitarian Congregational, Orthodox) to take charge of that choir. At the age of 27 he was induced to open a singing school. The choir of Grace M.E. Church, Taunton, was "under the direction of Mr. Leander Soule" in 1893. Someway, he found time to teach.

The Taunton National Band achieved high reputation under Leander Soule's leadership, which began about 1865. In 1869 he was chosen director of the Beethoven Society, which at that time had an average attendance of fifty but soon increased to 125 under his able management. "A vote of thanks to L. Soule" was recorded "for the able manner in which he conducted the arrangements and carried through to a successful issue the concert of the Beethoven Society in 1870." Always interested in individual people and always throwing himself with energy into whatever he undertook, Mr. Soule was highly successful in drilling the chorus for the Jubilees of 1869-1872, for which he received the compliments of the musical public. It was through his persistent efforts that the Music Festival Association was established in 1879. For this he was presented a \$500 testimonial.

The records of the United States Navy in the National Archives disclose that he enlisted 28 May 1884 as a "Singing Master" on board the U.S. Flag Ship "New Hampshire" while that vessel was in port at Newport, R.I. A muster roll dated 30 Jun 1884 correctly reflects his birth place and age and gives his occupation as music teacher. He was honorably discharged from this service 24 Jul 1884.

Many programs found crammed into a little trunk used as a file box reflected other notable musical performances by Mr. Soule. He was secretary of the Southeastern Massachusetts Music Association and conducted their annual concerts in 1888, 1889, and 1890; the New Bedford Choral Association at the Grand Opera House 26-27 Apr 1892 and the Old

Stoughton Musical Society. Perhaps his greatest pride was in the latter, which he conducted for six years and took "100 singers and 40 accompanying to the World's Fair in Chicago for ten days in 1893." He hastened from Chicago to conduct the great "Oratorio of Emmanuel" (written by J. Eliot Trowbridge of Newton) at an enormous camp meeting on Martha's Vineyard. Trowbridge's "Oratorio of Emmanuel" was first performed in 1887 and was the main work at the 250th Anniversary exercises commemorating the founding of Taunton at the Music Hall in June 1889 led by Leander Soule and, to quote from news reports of the time, "the very able chorus work" under his direction attested to "his abilities as a conductor and a disciplinarian." At the 100th anniversary of the founding of Bristol Academy, Taunton, on Jun 1892, the "Ode on Science" and "Strike the Cymbal" were sung by a choir "led by the veteran chorister, Mr. Leander Soule."

As if business, teaching and choir directing were not sufficient activity for one man, Mr. Soule also participated in civic activities. He is listed as a Common Councilman for Taunton in 1867 and an Alderman in 1868.

Leander Soule was married at East Bridgewater, Plymouth County, Massachusetts, on 3 Aug 1854 (given by some family records, 1855 by other family records and Massachusetts vital records) to Caroline Luninda Graham, who was born at Rumford, Oxford County, Maine, on 1 Feb 1836 and died at Taunton, Bristol County, Massachusetts, on 13 Sep 1897 (Mass. VR 472:383) She was the daughter of Asa and Lucinda (Farnum) Graham (Massachusetts VR 472:383) and was also buried in Mt. Pleasant Cemetery, Taunton, Massachusetts.

Leander Soule and his wife "Lu" were always deep in church work, particularly the Orthodox Congregational denomination. They experienced a deep sense of "conversion" in 1858; a joint letter from father Deacon James and mother Leah rejoices at the fact and congratulates them. Leander's letters state that he was Precentor at two State Sunday School conventions and a New England Chautauqua Convention. Letters to his children speak conviction that he was "on the Lord's work." His children and grandchildren remember him fondly as the loving head of a devoted family.

Children, all born at Taunton, Bristol County, Massachusetts (family records, Ridlon P.557 and Massachusetts VR):

- i. Annie Maria⁸ Soule was born 13 Jul 1856 and died at Winchester, Massachusetts on 5 Dec 1939 (Mass. VR 90:311). She was married at Taunton, Bristol County, Massachusetts on 29 Aug 1878 (Mass VR 298:136) to Fred. H. Lewis (Frederie or Frederick Henry Lewis), born at Manchester, New Hampshire, 1856 and died in Woburn, Massachusetts, 9 Sep 1898 (Woburn VR). She and her husband were both talented graduates of the New England Conservatory of Music. After her husband's death, she taught piano for the rest of her life with brilliant ingenuity in teaching methods and recitals of considerable style. Her children:

The absence of a complete four digit "Soule File" number indicates doubt concerning the birth dates or any other dependable data upon which to establish a proper sequence of the family members in that group. The symbol - ? - indicates that to date we have been unable to determine the name of an individual or whether or not in fact a spouse or lack of marriage should be indicated. There are a few other annotations concerning lack of specific information. Needless to say, we would certainly welcome a critical review by all of our readers and the submission of any additions or corrections to improve the accuracy or completeness of our listings.

The publication of the descendants of John Soule leaves for early future issues of the SOULE NEWSLETTER listings of the descendants of two daughters of George Soule of the Mayflower - Elizabeth Soule and her husband FRANCIS WALKER and Patience Soule and her husband JOH HASKELL. We also must correct and up-date to the extent practicable all of the previously published lineages. The listing of the descendants of another daughter, Susanna Soule and her husband FRANCIS WEST, published in the January 1968 issue was in particularly sketchy outline. Once again, your family historian solicits and will welcome any and all help in this tedious correcting and updating all Five Generation Families in the Soule descent.

Home Of The Brave

Since the Revolutionary War, 38,000,000 men have served in the Armed Forces, of which 1,000,000 have died in service. Beginning as far back as prerevolutionary days, veterans' benefits have been granted to those who have served in defense of this nation.

The benefits encompass veterans and dependents from the Indian Wars (1817-1898), Civil War (1861-1865), Spanish-American War (1898-1902), WW I (1917-1918), WW II (1940-1947), Korean War (1950-1955) and the Vietnam War, which dates from the Gulf of Tonkin incident, 5 Aug 1964, until the President declares it ended.

Gilbert Harry¹⁰ Doane and the World Conference on Records

Rev. Gilbert H. Doane, Editor of the *New England Historical & Genealogical Register* and author of the widely known text *Searching For Your Ancestors*, found Doane names in the file he

was unaware of. Rev. Doane is a member of the United States & Canada section of the Program Committee.

The August-September Special issue of the GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY OBSERVER, which is published monthly by the Genealogical Society of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, Inc., was devoted to a pictorial report of the 5-7 Aug 1968 announcement activities kicking-off plans for the "World Conference on Records" scheduled for Salt Lake City, Utah on 5-8 Aug 1969. Above is the best of no less than six different pictures in that issue in which distinguished Soule cousin GILBERT HARRY DOANE can be seen. He heads the United States and Canada Committee for the World Conference.

The Reverend Doctor Doane was born at Fairfield, Franklin County, Vermont on 28 Jan 1897 and is of the 10th Generation from George Soule of the Mayflower through two lines on his mother's side (Soule Kindred No. 535114 and 535181). He is also the 11th Generation from Thomas Rogers of the Mayflower on his father's side.

The authoritative "Who's Who in America" calls him an "archivist" but we know him best for his early but very scholarly article entitled "Joseph Soule of Fairfield, Vermont and Some of His Descendants" which appeared in the April 1922 issue of The New England Historical and Genealogical Register (NEH&GR 76:85-101) and "Searching for Your Ancestors". The latter is a small book originally published in 1937 which we invariably recommend as the one essential reference text to be acquired by every beginner in genealogical research. He has always been interested in and helpful to our Soule research program.

Director of University Libraries, University of Wisconsin for many years, our cousin has also found time to write and edit extensively in the genealogical and historical fields as well as acquire an LL.D degree and be ordained as a priest of the Episcopal Church. Militarily, he qualified as a "retread" having served with the U. S. Navy in World War I and was back again in World War II as an army officer. Dr. Doane moved effective 1 Sep 1968 from his long-time home at Madison, Wisconsin to Newport, Rhode Island. Of course, this will simplify necessary trips to Boston in his present

capacity as Editor of the very fine, also very venerable, New England Historical and Genealogical Register which is nearing the quarter mark in it's second century of publication.

The 1969 World Conference on Records has scheduled two programs. "Records Protection in an Uncertain World" provides a special session for archivists, librarians and historians involving a technical presentation of sophisticated record-keeping procedures. A "World Convention & Seminar on Genealogy" is planned for genealogists and record searchers. The latter is described as "an interchange of knowledge and technology by persons concerned with the preservation of mankind's ancestry".

- Q. Can anyone provide information on the parentage of ELEANOR (SOULE) KETCHAM who was born possibly Dutchess County, New York, circa 1763-4 and died Hebron, Washington County, New York, on 8 Feb 1853 per tombstone in Glasier Hill Yard, Granville, Washington County, New York?
- A. As you know, we've suggested several possibilities including ROWLAND & MARY (IRISH) SOULE, NATHANIEL & MARY (- ? -) SOULE and you have added two prospects - one THOMAS SOULE and the other a SAMUEL SOULE. As this is written, your problem, along with several others involving Dutchess County families, is definitely on "dead-center". Like other big problems in clearing ancestral lines, this must be placed on "back burner" by your Historian until the Mayflower Five Generation Project is completed. In the interim, can any reader help on this?
- Q. Can you help to put me in touch with descendants of ROWLAND & MARY (IRISH) SOULE?
- A. Not really - simply because no one at this time really knows for certain who is actually of this line. All that we really know is that ROWLAND³ SOULE (George⁴, William³, George², George¹) was born at Dartmouth, Bristol County, Massachusetts, on 5 Nov 1733 (Dartmouth VR), that he was the son of George & Lydia (Howland) Soule, and that he was married at the Oblong Friends Meeting, Dutchess County, New York on 24 Dec 1761 to Mary Irish, daughter of Jesse & Mary (- ? -) Irish. One Rowland Soule was enumerated in the 1790 Census at St. Albans, then Chittenden, now Franklin County, Vermont without family. One Rowland was concurrently enumerated at Washington, Dutchess County, New York with a family of two males under sixteen and four females. Since the taking of the 1790 Census was spread over an extended period, it is possible that these two enumerations are reporting on one man although it seems probable to us that two men are involved. Neither of these have been identified as the husband of Mary Irish. Ridlon glibly identifies quite a number of individuals as children of Rowland & Mary (Irish) Soule and the Society of Mayflower Descendants has accepted two of these as their descendants based solely on Ridlon's identification. Due to illogical and unexplained discrepancies in dates, we have serious reservations concerning the validity of any of these Ridlon identifications. Dutchess County research in depth is now underway and we hope eventually to have some real answers concerning this family.
- Q. On page 125 of the October 1968 SOULE NEWSLETTER is a picture of a car with a SOULE license plate. The caption says it belongs to our Family Historian. As a bearer of the Soule name, a member of SOULE KINDRED and the Automobile License Plate Collectors Association, which has over 900 members, may I have one of your old license plates for my collection?
- A. We have had the same tags since October 1964 although on two different cars. Upon payment of the customary annual registration fee we have received validating paper stickers of different color each year to be affixed to the plates. Memorandum of instructions accompanying our original SOULE tags state "These personalized plates have been constructed of heavy aluminum and long life reflective sheeting representing an additional cost to the District and so we expect that they will last you a minimum of five years. Please take good care of them." As a consequence, we do not as yet have any old ones. However, your name is literally on the plates and also figuratively to receive them if and when they become available. We are flattered that they are in demand as a collectors item.
