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LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL.

To the Honorable the General Assembly—

I submit herewith the annual Pension Report of this office for the year 1902:

ARTIFICIAL LIMB FUND.

Under the Acts passed at the last session of your Honorable body, the duty was devolved on the Comptroller General of expending \$2,000 artificial limb fund for the benefit of those who had heretofore participated in similar appropriations. The amount expended for 87 approved applicants was \$1,999.26. For your information I print a list of the applicants with their statements, which gives reasons why they participated in this appropriation. An examination of the Act and the applications will at once reveal to you the difficulties under which an official labors in dealing with a matter of this kind. I construed the Act to mean that where a Confederate soldier had heretofore participated in such an appropriation, he was entitled to his pro rata share of the \$2,000 appropriated from the pension fund, and where they made affidavits that they had heretofore participated, I approved their applications.

I have attached under the head of No. 8, a list of those applying for the artificial limb fund who were disapproved, and the reasons why. Under the head of No. 9, I give a list of applicants for artificial limb fund, whose applications were received after the money was distributed. An examination of these papers leads me to believe that they are entitled to a sum equal to that paid to other approved applicants—\$22.98.

PENSIONS.

This department has experienced great difficulty in securing a proper classification of applicants. If this matter is given careful consideration by the various Pension Commissioners and County Pension Boards, I believe a proper classification can be secured. In order to do this, it will be necessary for each applicant to use the blank suited to his or her case. We have been confused very much by County Boards sending in applications approved, while at the same

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time the parties applying were on the pension roll of the preceding year. Where a slight difference in the name of the postoffice existed, the State Board was often at a loss what disposition to make of such application.

PENSION REPORT.

I realize that the reports of today are the recorded history of the future. Having that in mind, I have not spared time or pains in furnishing the fullest information possible. First, in this report, after the introductory, comes the rules issued for the guidance of County Pension Commissioners and County Boards. Next the copy of the pension laws now of force; next a table showing the total expenditure of funds, number of pensioners, and number of approved applicants for artificial limb fund, etc., etc., and statement of expenditure of stationery and stamp fund, etc. I give a table showing the number of pensioners in the county in 1901; number who have since died, who have removed from the State, those transferred to other counties, who have been dropped by the County Board, and those transferred to other classes. A statement of the new applicants, those transferred from other counties and those transferred from other classes, the balance showing the number and classes of the pensioners in that county for 1902. To this is attached a list of the names of those who have died, removed from the State, moved to other counties, dropped by County Board, or transferred to other classes. With this statement before the Pension Commissioners and County Boards, they will be able to do their work in a more satisfactory manner than possibly ever before.

PENSION FUNDS IN HANDS OF CLERKS OF COURT.

At this time there are remaining in the hands of some of the Clerks of Court in the State balances of pension funds. This arises from the fact that after the applications are passed on by the County Boards and sent to the State Board, and even after the lists are made up and the money sent to the Clerks of Court, approved applicants for pensions die. Where the deceased pensioner leaves a widow who is over 60 years of age, the State Board authorizes the payment of the same to the widow, but where the approved pensioner is a widow, there is no one to whom this Board can authorize the Clerk of Court to pay the same. In some instances it is claimed by the children; in other instances by the parties who wish the same to pay burial ex-

penses, for medicine and other supplies. The Board has acted under instructions from the Attorney General's office, and have declined to instruct the Clerks of Court to pay this money out other than as above stated.

I believe that South Carolina has a pension law that will compare favorably with that of any other State. The law is practically new and untried, and time and experience is the only test by which it can be properly judged. If, in your wisdom and judgment, you decide that changes and amendments are actually necessary, I ask that you do not entail on the Confederate soldiers and widows the burden of making new applications, where they are now on the pension roll. We have today on the roll names of a good many who applied in 1888, 1898 and 1900, and in the last instance they found it very difficult to make the necessary proof; in fact, parties heretofore on the pension roll who at that time could make proof, are today unable to secure witnesses as required by the law and rules of the State Board.

I wish to call your attention to the fact that the appropriation of \$120 for stationery and stamps is totally insufficient. An examination of any of the reports for the last eight or ten years will show that this expenditure has amounted to from three to five hundred dollars. Of course under that provision of the law which allows the State Board to draw on the pension fund for any necessary expenses in disbursing the same, a situation has been relieved which otherwise would stop this work entirely.

Since the last meeting of the State Pension Board, we have sustained a loss in the death of Capt. G. H. McMaster, one of our members, who was both painstaking and capable in his work, and while he gave careful scrutiny to all matters that came before him, he was liberal in dealing with his comrades or their widows of the Lost Cause.

RULES.

FOR THE GUIDANCE OF COUNTY PENSION COMMISSIONERS AND PENSION BOARDS AS AUTHORIZED BY THE CODE AND ACTS OF 1902.

Columbia, S. C., Oct. 21, 1902.

1st. The County Boards will meet and organize at once by electing one of their number County Pension Commissioner.

The Pension Commissioner of each county will attend in the County Auditor's office on each Saturday in January, 1903. This Commissioner is charged with the duty of preparing all pension papers in a condition to go before the County Board (which County Board meets on the first Monday in February.) The Pension Commissioner is cautioned to use in each instance the proper blank for the applicant.

Immediately after the adjournment of the County Board (the first Monday in February, 1903) the Pension Commissioner will proceed to make up a list of all the applications approved by the County Board for 1903, and those remaining on the roll for previous years as follows: Approved pensioners of 1901, 1902 and 1903.

He will also prepare a list of those who have died, who have removed from the State; those who have removed to other counties; those dropped by the County Board, with the reason therefor; those who have been transferred to other classes; state the class and year to which they belonged. If it is proposed to raise any pensioner from the class in which his name is now enrolled, it will be necessary to prepare a new application, setting forth the facts, and if approved by the County Pension Board send the same to the State Pension Board. In no instance must he send an application for a person who is already on the roll, except where it is proposed to raise said applicant to a higher class, and then the application must so state.

TRANSFERS.

A suitable blank will be furnished him, on which he can certify to other Commissioners and County Boards, that the party desiring to go to another county, is regularly on the pension list in his county. We do not want approved applications to come here from any county where the applicant is an approved pensioner in some other county.

COUNTY PENSION BOARDS.

The County Pension Boards elected this year under the pension law shall meet during this year, and elect one of their number County

Pension Commissioner, who shall perform the duties prescribed in the Act approved February 25th, 1902.

The County Pension Boards are instructed instead of meeting in January, 1903, to meet the 1st Monday in February, 1903; and pass on all the applications prepared and submitted to them by the Pension Commissioner, approving or disproving the same. They will meet again the first Monday in March, 1903, at which time they will examine and verify the lists submitted to them by the Pension Commissioner and sign and immediately forward the same to the Comptroller General. They are instructed to give due notice of the manner in which applications must be made under the law, as the State Pension Board will not consider applications for pensions except where they come in the regular way and time prescribed by law.

New blanks will be furnished the Pension Commissioners; please do not use old ones.

- 1. The attention of County Pension Boards and of the Pension Commissioner is directed to the certificate of the two witnesses, which requires that they shall not be on the pension roll.
 - 2. Do not send to this office disapproved applications for pensions.
- 3. Do not use old blanks, but those prepared under the latest law. They will be designated by "Applications under Code and Acts 1902."
- 4. Class A. Those who as a result of wounds received in the war are physically helpless, or who while in such service lost both arms, or both legs, or sight, or who are disabled by paralysis and are unable to make a living, and whose income or his wife's does not exceed \$150. This does not include soldiers whose disabilities arise from diseases and causes arising since the war.
- Class B. Those who have lost one arm or one leg and whose income or his wife's does not exceed \$150.
- Class C, No. 1. Those soldiers and sailors disabled by wounds received during the war, whose income or his wife's does not exceed \$75.
- Class C, No. 2. Those who have reached the age of sixty (60) years whose income or his wife's does not exceed \$75.
- Class C, No. 3. Widows of those who lost their lives while in the service of the State or Confederate States, and whose income does not exceed \$100. Where a widow of a Confederate soldier marries after the death of her second husband, she is entitled to apply and draw a pension on account of the services of her first husband, provided she is entitled under the other provisions of the pension law.

Such widow must apply in her own proper name, but at the same time state that she is asking for a pension as the widow of her dead husband, giving his name, company and regiment, etc., etc.

Class C, No. 4. Widows above the age of sixty (60) years whose income does not exceed \$100.

County boards cannot be too careful in these matters of "income" or "physical condition."

He is a very poor man whose gross income from labor, rent and other sources does not exceed \$75, or poor lands, if any, that will not produce this amount gross.

Property sufficient to produce \$75 in applicant's or his wife's name debars him.

Where soldiers or widows dispose of their property by giving or selling to their children, they are debarred.

Pensioners who move to another State are not entitled to a pension. The pension law provides that this fund shall be distributed April 1st; therefore, it is very important that you mail the pension lists, with the approved applications of your county, promptly on the first Monday in March.

Let County Boards act promptly and fairly, giving the State Board full information, with complete reports for each County, writing the names alphabetically, full and clear, beginning with Class A, and giving their reasons for approving.

In making reports to the State Board, the reports should be signed by each member of the County Pension Board.

PENSION LAWS.

No. 549, p. 1028, Acts 1902.

AN ACT CREATING A COUNTY PENSION COMMISSIONER, DEFINING HIS DUTIES, AND TO FURTHER DEFINE AND REGULATE THE DUTIES OF COUNTY PENSION BOARD HEREAFTER.

SECTION I. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina: That each County Pension Board of the respective counties in this State shall, at its first meeting in January, in each year, elect one of its members to the position of Pension Commissioner, whose duty it shall be to attend in the Auditor's office of his county every Saturday, during the month of January, in each year, for the purpose of meeting the pension applicants, and to arrange and fix up all pension papers in a condition to go before said Board, which said Board shall meet on the first Monday in February, of each year, to pass upon said applications. Said Commissioner shall be, and is hereby authorized and required to administer oaths. When said applications have been approved by said Board, said Commissioner shall write up the lists of same. *Said Board shall meet again on the first Monday in [February] in each year, to sign said lists, and immediately forward same to the Comptroller General. Said Pension Commissioner shall be allowed two dollars per day as pay for his services, but shall not be paid for more than ten days' service in one year.

*February written in brackets is an error in the Act, and should be first Monday in March.

PENSIONS.

Chapter 22, Code of 1902, as amended in 1902:

Section 1065. The sum of at least one hundred and fifty thousand dollars shall be annually appropriated to pay the pensions provided for by this Chapter, and in case the same, or such amount as shall be appropriated, shall be insufficient, then the amount so appropriated shall be distributed proportionately among those legally entitled to receive the same: *Provided*, That those pensioners described in Section 1066, as Class A, Class B, Class C, No. 1 and Class C, No. 3, shall have been first paid in full: *Provided*, further, In case the same, or such amount as shall be appropriated, shall be more than sufficient, then the amount so appropriated shall be distributed proportionately among those legally entitled to receive the same.

Sec. 1066. The applicant must have been a resident of the State for two years prior to the time of the application.

In order to obtain the benefits of this Chapter, the applicant qualified by residence, must also show:

(A) If a man:

1st. That he was a bona fide soldier or sailor in the service of the State or in the Confederate States in the War Between the States; and

2nd. Either (a) that while in such service he lost a leg or arm or sight or received other bodily injury whereby he has become disabled or that he is totally disabled by paralysis, and, further, that neither himself nor his wife has an income exceeding one hundred and fifty dollars per annum, nor property sufficient to produce such an income; or (b) that he has reached the age of sixty years, and that neither he nor his wife is receiving an annual income of seventy-five dollars from any source, nor possessed of property sufficient to produce such an income.

(B) If a woman:

1st. That she is the widow of a man who was a bona fide soldier or sailor in the service of the State or of the Confederate States in the War Between the States; and

2d. That she has never remarried, or, having remarried, is again a widow.

3rd. That either (a) she is sixty years of age or (b) that her husband lost his life in the service of the State or of the Confederate States in the War Between the States; and

4th. That she has not an income of one hundred dollars per annum nor property sufficient to produce the same.

5th. The classification of all pensioners shall be as follows:

Class A—Those who, as a result of wounds received in said war, are physically helpless, or who, while in such service, lost both arms or both legs, or sight; or who are disabled by paralysis and are unable to make a living, whose income, or his wife's, does not exceed \$150.

Class B—Those who while in such service lost one arm or one leg and whose income, or his wife's, does not exceed \$150 per annum.

Class C, No. I—Those soldiers and sailors disabled by wounds received during said war, whose income, or his wife's, does not exceed \$150 per annum.

Class C, No. 2—Those who have reached the age of sixty years, and whose income, or his wife's, does not exceed \$75 per annum.

Class C, No. 3—Widows of those who lost their lives while in such service of the State or of the Confederate States, and whose income does not exceed \$100 per annum.

Class C, No. 4—Widows above the age of sixty (60) years, whose income does not exceed \$100 per annum.

The persons described in the preceding sections shall be entitled to a pension upon complying with the other provisions of this Chapter and each pensioner of the several classes shall be paid the amounts hereinafter set forth, to wit:

Class A, eight dollars per month.

Class B, six dollars per month.

Class C, No. 1, four dollars per month.

Class C, No. 3, four dollars per month. -

Class C, No. 2, three dollars per month.

Class C, No. 4, three dollars per month.

Sec. 1068. Before any soldier or sailor shall receive any payment provided in this Act, he shall make an application, in writing, through the township representative, addressed to the County Pension Board, to be appointed as hereinafter directed for each county of the State, setting forth in detail the nature of the disabling wound, if any, the company and regiment or battalion in which he served, and the time and place of receiving the wound, and showing that neither he nor his wife is in receipt of the income as hereinafter specified, and showing, further, the time and place of residence within the State by the applicant. Such application shall be verified by the oath of the applicant, made before any officer in the State authorized to administer oaths, and shall be accompanied by the affidavit of one or more credible witnesses, stating that they knew the applicant was a soldier or sailor, or the wife of such, as the case may be, and believe the allegations made in the application to be true: Provided, That said application shall show that the applicant is not drawing a pension in any other State.

Sec. 1069. Such application shall be verified also by a certificate of the Auditor of the county in which the applicant resides, showing amount of tax return, and that his income does not exceed the amount stated, and that he is not possessed of sufficient property to produce such income; and it shall be the duty of the Auditor to furnish such certificates, if he shall so find the facts, without fee or charge.

Sec. 1070. In each county of the State the said application shall be submitted to a Board composed of four ex-Confederate soldiers or

sailors (to be chosen as hereinafter provided), who shall not be holders of or applicants for a pension, and a regular practicing physician to be selected by them, which said five persons shall constitute the County Pension Board. They shall meet on the third Monday in January of each year, and shall examine each applicant under rules and regulations prescribed by the State Board of Pensioners. After first being duly sworn fairly and impartially to discharge the duties of their office, and after said oaths are duly filed in the office of the Clerk of Court, the said County Pension Board shall proceed with the discharge of the duties imposed upon them, and shall certify their approval to the State Board of Pensions, giving in detail the reasons which influenced them to grant or oppose each application, accompanied by all the evidences upon which they made their decisions.

Sec. 1071. Four members of said Board shall constitute the quorum. A majority of the members of the Board present may determine any matter presented to them, subject, however, to a right of review of the State Board. As soon as such County Board completes its list as above, giving the names of the pensioners, their residences and amounts per month to which they are entitled, they shall certify the same to the State Board of Pensioners, to be reviewed by them. The compensation of the members of said Board shall be two dollars per day for each day's service, not exceeding, however, five days' service in any one year.

Sec. 1072. The State Board of Pensioners shall thereupon pass upon the names contained in said lists, and shall certify to the Clerks of Courts of the various counties the lists of the names and amounts approved by them, and said Clerks of Courts shall record the same in a book, and said roll so made up shall be designated "Approved Pension Rolls for 19—," and such persons shall constitute the pensioners entitled to receive the aid herein provided for the current year.

Sec. 1073. Every application approved by the County Board, with all papers upon which they act, shall be filed in the Comptroller General's office by the first day of February of each year, to be by him submitted to the State Board of Pensions for their review. In the examination of the applications of each person for a pension, the said Board shall inquire particularly into all the facts set forth in the application, and shall have the right to examine such witnesses and to take such evidence as to determine the right of such applicant to pension; and for the purpose of this chapter the Chairman

of each County Pension Board shall have the right to administer oaths. In making their report to the State Board of Pensions, they shall set forth, in concise and plain language, giving in detail (and separately) their findings upon each material allegation contained in the application.

Sec. 1074. Each of the said County Boards shall keep a book in which they shall make a list of the applicants for pensions, setting forth the approval and disapproval, which book shall be filed in the office of the Clerk of Court of Common Pleas for each county; and the Clerk shall from said book certify to the Comptroller General, on or before the first of February of each year, the number of pensioners who are still alive and entitled to the pension.

Sec. 1075. The State Board of Pensions shall have the authority, and it shall be their duty, to revise the list of pension claims allowed by each County Board, and to confirm or reject any pension claim allowed by such Board, as they may deem proper and right upon the facts presented by the said Board, or upon such additional facts connected therewith as they may procure; but shall have no right in any case to grant a pension unless the same has been regularly approved by the County Board of Pensions.

Sec. 1076. The County Board of Pensions shall be constituted as follows: On the first Saturday in August of each year the surviving soldiers and sailors of the State or the Confederate States in the late war between the States, in each township, shall meet at a time and place therein designated by the Chairman of the County Board, by two weeks' public notice, and having organized by electing a Chairman and Secretary, shall elect by ballot an ex-Confederate soldier or sailor, not a holder of nor an applicant for a pension, as the representative of the veterans of said township.

The representatives so elected shall meet at the County Court House on the first Monday of September following, and, having organized by electing a presiding officer and Secretary, shall elect from their own number four, who, having selected a competent physician and elected one of themselves as Chairman, shall constitute, together with such physician, the County Pension Board for one year, or until their successors are elected and qualified. In those townships where the veterans failed to select a representative as herein provided, the Chairman of the County Pension Board shall appoint some person otherwise qualified as representative until such election shall be had; and in those counties where the survivors failed to organize a County Board as herein provided, the State Board of Pensions may ap-

point four ex-Confederate soldiers or sailors otherwise qualified to organize and constitute said County Board.

Sec. 1077. In case there shall be in any township no person qualified to act as representative, then the veterans may elect, or in case of their failure so to do, the Chairman of the County Pension Board may appoint some properly qualified veteran residing elsewhere in said county.

Sec. 1078. The Comptroller General shall be Chairman of the State Board of Pensions, and he, with three ex-Confederate soldiers, not holders of nor applicants for pensions, to be selected by the United Confederate Veterans' Association at their annual meetings, together with a competent physician to be selected by them, shall constitute the said State Board of Pensions. That the Comptroller General shall appoint a suitable person to serve as Clerk of State Board of Pensions; said Clerk to receive a salary of six hundred dollars per annum for his services. In case of failure to select by the said Veterans' Association, the three members, properly qualified, shall be appointed by the Governor. The term of office of the elected members of said Board shall be for one year, and until their successors are elected or appointed and have qualified.

Sec. 1079. The compensation of the members of the County Pension Boards shall be two dollars per day, not to exceed five days, and the compensation of the State Board shall be two dollars per day, not to exceed five days, and the latter shall be allowed mileage at the rate of five cents per mile.

Sec. 1080. In counties where the survivors fail or refuse to comply with the provisions hereof, the State Board shall make such regulations for the distribution of the fund for such counties as they deem best.

Sec. 1081. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller General to issue on the first Monday in April of each year to the party entitled to receive a pension hereunder, his warrant for such sum as may be herein prescribed, so long as such name shall remain on the pension roll as above prescribed, or until informed of the death or removal from the State of such pensioner: *Provided*, That the Comptroller General shall forward the amount due the pensioners of each county to the Clerk of Court of the several counties of the State, to be paid out by said Clerk of Court without additional compensation.

Sec. 1082. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller General to prepare and cause to be printed forms in blank on which such applications, certificates and affidavits may be conveniently made, and he

shall cause the same to be distributed in the several counties of the State in such number and such manner as in his judgment may be necessary.

Sec. 1083. Whenever the name of any person who has been declared entitled to receive a pension under the laws of this State shall have been omitted, by any accident, from the proper lists, it shall be the duty of the State Board of Pensions to allow, and the duty of the Comptroller General to issue his warrant for the amount of the pension to which such person would have been entitled; said amount to be paid out of the next regular appropriation for pensions, after the fact of such accident or mistake shall have been determined by said State Board of Pensions, and said amounts shall be paid out of said appropriation before the same shall be apportioned among the persons entitled thereto.

Approved the 19th day of February, A. D. 1900.

No. 552.

An Act to Regulate County Aid to ex-Confederate Soldiers and Prevent their Disfranchisement.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina: That from and after the approval of this Act the County Board of Commissioners of the various counties of this State shall have the right, in their discretion, to extend county aid to indigent Confederate soldiers in their respective counties, at the home of such soldiers or at the home of some relative or friend: *Provided*, That it shall be established to the satisfaction of said Board that such soldier is deserving of aid and is physically unable to earn a support and that he does not obtain a sufficient pension from the State to support him.

Sec. 2. That no ex-Confederate soldier shall be disfranchised by reason of his having received, or receiving such aid as aforesaid.

APPROVED APPLICATIONS FOR ARTIFICIAL LIMB FUND.

AN ACT.

To Provide for the Repair of Artificial Limbs of Certain Citizens of This State Who Were Soldiers in the War Between the States, and to Pay Certain of Such Citizens Money in Lieu Thereof.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina: That the sum of \$2,000.00, if so much be necessary, be, and is hereby, appropriated to defray the expenses of the repair of artificial limbs heretofore donated to citizens of this State who lost a leg or arm, or who became permanently disabled in a leg or in an arm during the military service in the War Between the States.

SEC. 2. That the Comptroller General be, and is hereby, authorized and required to draw his warrant on the State Treasurer, and the State Treasurer pay the same, for a sum not exceeding \$25.00 in favor of any citizen of this State, upon the presentation to him by or on behalf of such citizens of a certificate under seal of the Clerk of Court of the county wherein such citizen resides, that such citizen lost a leg or an arm, or was permanently disabled in a leg or in an arm while in military service of this State, or of the Confederate States, in the War Between the States, and that such citizen received an artificial limb under the Act of 1879, or of the Act of 1881, or the amendments thereof, and that said artificial limb needs repairs, and that such citizen is not on the State Pension Roll, and also the estimate of the probable cost of such repair certified to by a reputable physician of the county wherein such citizen resides: Provided, That such citizen who is receiving a pension from the State shall not be entitled to receive anything under this appropriation: Provided, That the amount so appropriated shall be appropriated out of the pension fund: Provided, further. That in case any citizen received money instead of an artificial limb as provided under the Act of 1879, the Act of 1881, or the amendments thereof, that such person shall be allowed the sum of \$25.00 npon the presentation of a certificate under seal of the Clerk of Court of the county wherein such citizen resides, that he was entitled to receive such compensation instead of the artificial limb, as provided in said Act: Provided, further, That all persons desiring the benefits of this Act shall file their claim, as herein provided, within ninety days after the approval of this Act, and if the Comptroller General shall find that the amount of claims filed and approved exceed the sum of \$2,000.00, then he shall pro rate said sum among the claims approved by him.

BUSINESS DONE IN SOUTH CAROLINA.

The following statement shows that on business written in South Carolina by all the insurance companies \$2,890,789.47 was received as premiums, and upon which losses were paid amounting to \$1,337,448.66, making the ratio of losses paid to premiums received 46.27 per cent., as shown by annual statement:

A detailed statement of license fees, \$26,713.66, collected from companies authorized to do business in this State, will be found on another page of this report. Your attention is again called to the fact that the insurance laws of this State do not provide for the examination of companies organized in this State, or that they shall make annual statements or other returns to this department. We have no means of ascertaining their financial condition or standing. Our laws should be so amended as to require all companies organized in South Carolina to furnish this department with some evidence of their standing and reliability.

AGENTS OF INSURANCE COMPANIES.

Each agent or representative of an insurance company, before soliciting business, should be required to apply to the Comptroller General for a license. A small sum should be charged for this license—say, \$1.00.

ADDITIONAL LICENSE FEES.

Under the laws of this State, insurance companies are required to pay a tax of one-half of one per cent. to the State Treasurer of South Carolina. I suggest that you pass an Act, requiring in lieu of this tax of one-half of one per cent., and State, County and school taxes, to pay the State Treasurer two per cent. on gross premiums collected in South Carolina. The change will simplify the work of this department very much, and save the insurance companies trouble and annoyance, and will give as much revenue as received at present.

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GENERAL REPORT

AND

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General Report and Recommendations.

Columbia, S. C., Dec. 20, 1902.

To the General Assembly.

Gentlemen: The meeting of a newly elected Legislature is always a season of hope. The campaign has been full of promises. The contact with the people must have awakened a genuine patriotic desire to serve them. The great heart of the people—however uninstructed—beats for the right. A man with the intelligence and forcefulness to be chosen the representative of his fellow citizens as a lawmaker cannot be insensible to the hardships of the plain lives in the country and the benefits which might be wrought through humanitarian legislation. It is, therefore, with hope that I lay before the lawmakers of South Carolina, assembled after the first election in the twentieth century, harsh and disagreeable facts in regard to our school conditions—facts which good men will try to remedy.

REVIEW OF THE YEAR.

We have entered upon the second era of graded school building in the State. The town schools have outgrown the buildings in which the graded schools were inaugurated in the early '80's. After a few years of grievous crowding and delay, handsome new buildings have been erected or are in course of erection in Anderson, Spartanburg, Bennettsville, Darlington, Lancaster, Yorkville, and other towns.

The last Legislature passed several special acts authorizing certain small school districts to issue bonds to build school houses. The constitutionality is questionable. In any case, it would seem the wiser policy not to cumber the statute books with so many special laws, but to pass a general law enabling any district under proper restrictions to bond itself to build a school house.

There were passed at the last session several special acts permitting tuition charges in public schools, with remission to pupils who may be unable to pay. This again is contrary to the spirit if not the letter of the Constitution, and introduces an element of distinction in the condition of the children hurtful to the public schools and contrary to democratic ideals.

During the year twenty-two districts have voted the extra tax for school purposes. This is a gratifying showing. Some county superintendents have taken up the policy with enthusiasm and devotion. In thirty-eight counties (Beaufort and Marion not reported), of 1,521 school districts, 254 now have this local voluntary tax.

The summer schools have been as successful as heretofore. was the general opinion of the instructors that the work was better than ever. A larger proportion staved through the four weeks and stood the examinations. In State and County Schools 1,700 white teachers were enrolled, and 1,382 stayed through the four weeks and stood the examinations. In 1901, 1,729 were enrolled and 1,295 stood the examinations. In the State school the number standing the examinations this year was 90 9-10 per cent. of the enrolment; in 1001 the per cent. was 76 1-5. In the 10 summer schools held this year for negroes, 1,130 were enrolled and 828 stood the examinations. The instructors, white and negro, were urged to enroll none but teachers, those who had taught or were expecting to teach this year. In the four years the numbers enrolled and standing the examinations have aggregated: State School, 1,711 and 1,458; County Schools, 5,345 and 3,567; total white teachers, 7,056 and 5,025; negro teachers, 3,357 and 2,114. The per cent. standing the examinations in 1902 is, State 90, County 78, negro 72, as against 83, 63, and 57 for the three other years combined.

The Summer School Extension, or monthly instruction of teachers in Saturday meetings through the school year, was conducted with great success in several counties. The county board of Barnwell paid each of its teachers \$1.00 for each meeting attended, a policy for which County Superintendent Buist deserves credit. York, a large county, was divided into districts, with a corps of instructors for each, under the general supervision of County Superintendent Carroll. In Pickens, Marion, and other counties good work was done. In Richland regular courses of instruction were given by County Superintendent Wallace himself, assisted by Mr. H. C. Davis. Principal of the Columbia High School. Nearly all the white teachers of this county were present at every meeting. With the assistance of County Superintendent Rosborough of Fairfield and Mr. W. H. Witherow, Principal of the Mt. Zion School, I conducted the work with the teachers of that county in monthly meetings at Winnsboro.

The State has recently lost that veteran teacher, appreciated and loved throughout her borders, Mr. W. H. Witherow, of Winnsboro.

He deserves to be remembered for his long and faithful service as a teacher in this State for more than forty years. At Chester, in 1883, he conducted the first county teachers' institute ever held in the State, which suggested Superintendent Coward's recommendation for such county institutes generally.

Another veteran teacher, and a county superintendent of long service with a record of unusual fidelity and efficiency, Mr. W. W. F. Bright, of Pickens, died on the day before he would have been again reelected in the primary without opposition. In 1896 he and his county board had Pickens redistricted according to the provision of the new Constitution of 1895, "with a little trigonometry and a good deal of guessing," as he expressed it with his characteristic humor. In the election immediately following, he was defeated. But, as he was fond of telling, the good results of the innovation were soon manifest, and in 1898 he was elected again. The incident is worthy of mention, since some county superintendents frankly state that they have not attempted to redistrict their counties as commanded by the Constitution because of the opposition that would be exerted against them in the ensuing election.

Upon the death of Mr. Bright, the legislative delegation of Pickens County sent to the State Board of Education a request to fill the unexpired term by the appointment of Mr. James Stewart, who had consented to hold office with the understanding that Miss Janie Bright, a daughter of the deceased, who had assisted him in the office, should perform the duties and receive the compensation. The State Board, after proper enquiry, acceded to this request, and the members generally expressed the wish that the law permitted the direct appointment of the young woman who was expected to do the work. Of the thirty-eight county superintendents' reports made to this office, Miss Bright's is one of the two in which no error could be detected.

The errors in the county superintendents' reports almost destroy one's belief in the truth of statistics. In only a few cases were the errors of no consequence. Sometimes it took repeated efforts and extended correspondence to remove serious discrepancies and flagrant contradictions.

A creditable public school exhibit was made at the South Carolina Inter-State and West Indian Exposition, held at Charleston. The State Commission, presided over by the Governor, supplied the funds for the necessary expenses.

A significant organization recently effected should be mentioned

in this report. Its character and purpose are embodied in the following resolution:

- I. The representatives of the Boards of Trustees of the South Carolina College, the South Carolina Military Academy, Clemson College, Winthrop College, and the State Institution for the Deaf and the Blind, in conference assembled at Winthrop College, July 15, 1902, do hereby form the "Associated Conference of Trustees of State Colleges in South Carolina."
- 2. The Governor of the State shall be ex-officio Chairman, and the State Superintendent of Education ex-officio Secretary of this Conference.
- 3. The Chairman shall appoint a committee of three from each of the Boards of Trustees of the affiliated institutions, who shall meet at such time and place as may be appointed by the Secretary, for the purpose of discussing topics of general interest to the several institutions represented, and of reporting on the same to their respective Boards—the Chairman and the Secretary being also exofficio members of this committee.
- 4. The joint committee shall have power to appoint an Executive Committee, and to draw up by-laws for the Conference, subject to the acceptance of the several Boards, and especially to provide for the continuance and permanent organization of the Conference, whose leading object shall be cooperation for the general interest and welfare of the several State institutions, and in behalf of higher education at large in the State of South Carolina.

The "joint committee" of three from each institution was appointed and met in the office of the State Superintendent of Education on the 23d of November. The most important action appears in the following resolutions:

"That the Chairman at his leisure appoint a committee, consisting of one from each College represented, who with the Secretary exofficio shall constitute the Executive Committee and draw up a suitable constitution and by-laws, to be reported at a later meeting.

"That in the matter of the remission of tuition fees it is recommended to the several institutions that they carry out the law in spirit as well as in letter, and that the Executive Committee of this Conference ascertain the forms now in use in the different institutions and prepare a uniform blank to be submitted to the several boards for their approval and adoption, their action to be reported to this Conference.

"That the Executive Committee of this Conference memorialize

the Legislature to establish at least ten scholarships for post-graduate study in the South Carolina College, each to be of the annual value of \$100, the beneficiaries to be selected from their graduates by the respective faculties of the four State colleges and such other male colleges in the State as the General Assembly may determine.

"That the Conference meet at the call of the Executive Committee."

STATISTICS SHOWING NEED OF STATE APPROPRIA-TION TO WEAK SCHOOLS.

The length of school session is the most conspicuous fact by which the school work is judged. Each one feels satisfied with the school term as long as his own neighborhood school is doing well and the average for the State is no worse than last year. It cannot be too much impressed upon each legislator, however, that if his neighborhood school lasts nine months (or even six) it is an exception, and that the State "average," and even the county "average," charitably covers, as with a blanket, the nakedness of the backwoods country schools. Table one of the statistical part of this Report will show the length of session and many other facts for each school district in each county. An examination of these details would astonish men who have lulled themselves into believing that the schools in the State are satisfactory. Such an examination is not usually made. This is unfortunate. Surely the consciences of legislators would be aroused if the facts were brought home to their minds. averaging separately for the schools inside and those outside of incorporated towns we come nearer to an idea of the differences in schools within a county. Some averages are here presented:

TEACHERS' SALARIES.

The quality of the teacher is of more consequence than the number of weeks he teaches. No report can properly set forth the qualities of the teachers, but the salaries received for the session or year will afford some basis for judgment. I regret that I have not the data for separate averages of salaries for town and for country teachers in the State and in each county. In Table 2 the average in each district is given, but the schools of one district are not always exclusively in town or in country.

The average salary of teachers in each county and in each district may be seen in Table 2 of the Statistics. In Horry County white teachers averaged \$94.49; some received almost nothing. In Williamsburg the average was \$104.30. While the average in Chesterfield was \$126.11, there were five districts having 22 teachers whose average salary was less than \$70. In Saluda the average was \$130.42. District No. 26 had seven teachers averaging \$77.13. In Lexington the average salary was \$171.77; yet four teachers, each *38 out of 40 Countles.

in a district having but one white school, received less than \$100 each.

Even the counties that lead the State in average salaries, pay some individual teachers salaries which are entirely inadequate. Richland's white teachers were paid an average of \$314.91. But while in District No. 1 the average was \$456.85, in six districts with 27 teachers it was less than \$200; in No. 12, with nine teachers, it was \$142.35, and in No. 13, with four teachers, it was only \$115.99. In Spartanburg the salaries averaged \$239.81, but 13 districts had 53 teachers averaging less than \$100. In Orangeburg the average was \$229.16; but four districts had seven teachers averaging less than \$100.

Are we in earnest in educating? And is this the best we can do? . Will the Legislature, will the State of South Carolina, make no better provision for the children in the country? May not the Legislature appropriate to these schools as it appropriates to the colleges?

LOCAL TAX CANNOT SUFFICE.

A favorite defense against the demand for a legislative appropriation to the public schools is the specious argument that the extra tax which each district is permitted to vote is the way to good schools, and that each community should be left to apply this remedy for itself, levy a local tax.

This tax cannot be depended upon by the Legislature. It is voluntary, and, therefore, will not be levied until a community is alive to its own needs. The darkest places will remain in darkness until light comes in from without. Moreover, some school districts where the people are willing to make sacrifices for education are yet so poor that the heaviest tax permitted by the law still falls short of yielding the amount required for a good school. The list of districts with the voluntary local tax is an honor roll. South Carolina seems to lead all other Southern States in the proportion of such districts, to her total of districts. The truth is, however, that the richer community usually levies a moderate tax, which yields a large sum of money because of the corporate wealth in the town, while the poorer community is willing to pay largely of its means, but with an extra 3-mill tax, or even the maximum 4 mills, in addition to its regular revenues, such a district still has only an inadequate school fund. This may be examined in detail in the statistical part of this Report. The following illustrations must suffice here:

SCHOOL EXPENDITURES PER PUPIL.

The average cost of schooling per pupil is of great significance, if we should take as the basis of comparison the individual schools of certain country districts and of cities or prosperous towns. But there is considerable significance in the comparison of the averages for certain counties, and there is some interest in the comparison of the averages for the State in successive years.

All efforts to secure a State appropriation for the public schools have thus fair failed. The only form in which such a bill has passed the lower house has been to provide an additional county tax. Some of the representatives of richer counties are unwilling that their counties should pay toward the support of the schools of other counties. The idea seems to prevail that counties are distinct and separate in interest and responsibility. The old South Carolina doctrine is lost sight of, that the State is the sovereign. A more legitimate argument against such an appropriation is the just fear that it will be misspent.

CONDITIONS TO STATE AID.

Under present conditions there are serious obstacles to the policy of State aid to weak schools. This policy has been partially entered upon in the Act of 1899 to distribute State Dispensary profits first to bring up deficient schools to a minimum three months' term, or \$75 fund. With deficiencies of the preceding year as a basis, dispensary money has been for four years annually apportioned to bring up the schools to this minimum session, yet the foregoing statistics show that the law has failed to accomplish its purpose. The law does not require the trustees to apply the money to the schools that need it.

In my Report of 1899 I called attention to the need of safeguards against the unnecessary multiplying of schools to be thus aided by the State. Some districts support several schools and apply the funds in very different proportions to the different schools. The

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Constitutional provision that each county board should lay off its county into convenient school districts of not less than nine nor more than forty-nine square miles has been carried out in very few counties. Its spirit and purpose, though not its letter, was that each district should support but one school for the white and one for the negroes, each to be centrally located. In some counties the districts are still townships, so large that they must support several schools, some of which the trustees are not interested in and shamefully neglect, while some are entirely too near to others.

Moreover, a three months' school with a \$75 teacher can hardly be called a school. Necessarily the trustees have little choice of teachers. With the acquiescence of the county superintendents they sometimes employ teachers without certificates of qualification and unable to pass the required examinations. But in some counties there is an ample supply of incompetents holding the county certificate. Altogether, the trustees of short term schools are in the habit of employing very poor teachers, for whom it should not be the policy of the State to furnish longer sessions. Aid from the State should be granted not merely upon a showing of poverty, but upon the guarantee of proper location of the school and the employment of a thoroughly capable teacher. Better far to aid a few schools in this way than to aid many less effectively.

A Legislative appropriation to the schools should be based upon a general law with safeguards along these lines. The teacher whose salary is supplemented should be required to have a certificate of qualification from the State Board of Education (issued upon examination or upon the diploma of an approved college). The school should be in a district supporting but one school for each race, or the school should be not less than four miles from every other which the pupils might attend, and if its enrolment be less than 20 pupils its distance from every other school open to its children should be not less than five miles, or specially justified by swamps or other peculiar conditions (reported by the county board and approved by the State Board). The county board should furnish a list of its schools fulfilling the conditions in teacher, location, enrolment and financial inability, the latter fact being certified also by the county treasurer on March 15th, after the collection of taxes has been completed and the funds of the district for the current scholastic year are ascertained-and, in the case of the needy districts, exhausted. The names of the teachers and the amounts to be paid them should be certified to the State Treasurer by the State Superintendent of

Education on behalf of the State Board of Education. The State's aid should be sufficient to bring up the salaries to \$35 a month for six months.

At the beginning of this policy not many schools would be able to avail themselves of the proffered assistance. Under the strong inducement to conform to the conditions, trustees would be stirred from present indifference and errors. There would be a readjustment in the location of schools which would greatly strengthen others. In the end a comparatively small number would need the legislative bounty. The country school problem would be largely solved.

Of course these results could be much better realized with better county management of schools. State aid to weak schools would be for many reasons unwise without strong management and expert supervision in each county.

SOME REASONS FOR EDUCATING.

We do not seem really to believe in the education of the masses. Genuine belief could not permit such inaction, the best evidence of indifference. There is no faith without works.

Education is but training and enlightenment. Education in the school supplements that in the home. Its aim is to fix right personal and social habits during the time when habits will be formed to be all-powerful through life. It assists in giving one a knowledge of one's relation to the physical, social and spiritual world, and thus largely determines one's attitude towards life, the very essentials of one's being and doing. To educate is to strive, by all the means our knowledge affords, to aid in the natural development of the child to the best, as in the cultivation of a plant, or the training of a domestic animal, or the improvement of any species, through the closest attention to each individual, generation after generation. Thus education is a part of the Divine plan for the evolution of the race to higher things.

It is true that our schools fall far short of giving this education. For the realization of such ideals, the teachers are themselves too ignorant, relatively speaking, and too poorly paid to effect the needed self-improvement. Each teacher has to look after too many children, and in too many subjects, and under too unfavorable surroundings. Moreover, the teachers, and even many of the leading educators, as well as the people generally, are still in slavery to the errors of the past—the superstitions as to what constitutes an education. Radical change in the conception as well as the support of

the school must precede desired results. But, poor as are the schools and the teachers, compared to what they ought to be, they are doing a work which no ordinary child can miss without being the loser for it through life. Only by spending more on the schools, and affording greater facilities to teachers, can the better methods be discovered and applied. Hence, every criticism of the results of education as we now have it is but an argument for the expenditure of more money and more brain force in bringing our educational system to perfection. Hesitation to press forward with energy for the dissemination of true education to all is distrust of the possibilities of the elevation of the human race, is disbelief in the goodness of God, and of His natural laws under which He has placed us to work out the salvation of mankind.

WHO MUST PROVIDE THE MEANS OF EDUCATION?

Some people, while admitting that education is, of course, good, nevertheless maintain that it should be won by each for himself, or paid for by his parent for him, and not given by the State—by organized society. They argue that to make it free to all—a gift from the public—lessens its appreciation, and even works harm to the character of the intended beneficiary, destroying his self-reliance.

It is manifest that the child cannot, until he has reached some maturity, win for himself the opportunity of education. Neglect is not usually likely to give him aptitude and means for the best self-improvement. Indeed, the human young is the most helpless of all young, and the age for support and guidance, care and training, education in short, is necessarily longest here. It does not destroy one's independence and self-respect to be cared for by others during the years which nature has designed should be given to preparation for life's work.

EDUCATION AN INVESTMENT.

The domestic animal pays back for its training when it enters upon its life work. The beautiful rose rewards the husbandman who nurtured it into flowering. One of the first lessons of political economy is that labor for only immediate results is never well repaid. If the object be to receive large returns, there must be a long period of labor without appreciable reward. Thus, accumulated capital is no less necessary to educational than to industrial enterprises. The child is the raw material: others must furnish the

capital. Education cannot be self-sustaining in its immediate returns, but in its returns to society it is more than self-sustaining—it is self-uplifting.

THE STATE'S DUTY TO EDUCATE.

Superficially, all admit that it is the State's duty to educate, but deep down in their hearts few feel the force of this truth. Why is it the duty of the State? The State—society—is a perpetual being. which reaps what it sows. As the ocean is no less the child than the parent of the clouds, society lives by what it gives. Considered in its successive stages of growth, it is like a man from childhood to old age, in continuous change as to the parts of his physical and mental being, but with the essence of self preserved and perpetuated. however transformed. The State, therefore, looks to the future, as well as to the present—more than to the present. patriotism be real, be not an empty boast or a meaningless phrase. then the lover of his country is willing to make sacrifices for the future welfare of his State, the society of which he is a member, and whose protecting care has made life what it is to him. in the rarest cases is there need that he die for his country. the pagan this was sweet and honorable. Is the Christian less joyful in duty? The great need is that he live for his country as well as for himself; that he give a part of his earnings, and a part of his thoughts, and a part of his affections, to the education of the younger elements of society, as the older elements did for him, only in an increased degree, as his greater lights and his greater opportunities give him deeper understanding, broader views and greater means. The debt which the present owes to the past cannot be paid except through service to the future. All the ages look to posterity for a nearer realization of the ideals of the race. Though dead, we shall live on in institutions, in moral influence, in the thoughts and spirits of the men whom we have helped prepare to take up our journey to the promised land, who are, indeed, not merely our surviving comrades, but in a measure our very selves-through unity of origin, of thought and of inspired purpose. Thus it is that the progress of man is made.

"Through the ages one increasing purpose runs,

And the thoughts of men are widened with the process of the suns."

Society on its dead self rises to higher things. Our duty to posterity is taught by patriotism and Christianity alike. In saving the State we save men. Through education, the characters of men,

the opportunities of men, the efforts of men, are changed for the better. "Who saves himself, saves only himself, and all things living curse him; who saves the State saves all men, and all things living bless him."

Public education alone makes democracy true. Without it, the slogan "Equal rights to all and special privileges to none" is a mockery. Public education does not leave the humble man's descendants to walk forever in his footsteps, but it lifts them up, even if the parent be unable to help them, to the higher places of vantage in the world's struggles. It gives them ideals. It allows no stagnation. It promotes the general welfare and gives health to all the parts of the State. Education alone of all treatments will invigorate the constitution of the body politic. Education is to the State self-preservation, self-culture, self-adornment, self-perfection. Let others be indifferent to education if they will, but no man with "State" on his lips can refuse allegiance to this greatest agency for the advancement of the State. Thus education is the first care of the statesman.

The typical South Carolinian, as he stands out in history and in our imagination, deserves his fame and our admiration, as the soul of honor and truthfulness, of courtesy and chivalry, of delicate refinement and high courage, the self-sacrificing patriot and gentleman, the self-asserting man, scrupulous to serve and protect the weakest, fearless to resist the strongest. But do we meet him every day? Do we meet only him in our intercourse with the people of our State? Is he even the average? Can the value of such citizenship be measured by the money price? Who would hesitate to bear any burden of taxation if he realizes that it is being unerringly expended to make such citizenship general, and in the end universal, in South Carolina? Do we love South Carolina? Let us make the average South Carolinian of the future measure up to this high standard.

UNIVERSAL EDUCATION.

These results involve universal education. Yet there are influential people who deny the wisdom of education at all. They think there is drudgery always to be done, and we must have ignorant men to do it—others would be above doing it. Are you willing to do it? Are you willing for your loved ones to be compelled to drudge forever, without knowledge of anything beyond? Then to condemn others to this lot is to be no better than a tyrant king. To

this tyrant's view, the only requisite for wealth, for good government, for law and order and happiness, is knowledge and power and control for him and his friends, while the great masses of the people are in bondage to the existing order, because without the intelligence to use their great force to better their condition. some of the educated among us maintain that for good government we need not hope to educate all men to be fit to vote, but we need only to exclude from the suffrage the men who are unfit. This is a gospel of despair. Let them vote, and they will teach us not to neglect them, but to realize that they cannot safely be left ignorant. The great business men of Columbia, of Spartanburg, of Greenville, and of Charleston are anxious about the result of an election. votes of backwoods districts may determine great interests of the They would gladly spend thousands of dollars to prevent the dreaded result. How important then to realize in advance that we cannot afford to let back counties, with more people than money, remain in ignorance and prejudice! We cannot separate ourselves, our property or our children, from these fellow citizens in remote districts, or from the consequences of their intellectual and moral condition.

Only the least remunerative work can be done by the ignorant. The broadest development of the important industries so much needed in our State waits on educated laborers. It is ignorance that makes drudgery. Many labors that once meant drudgery are now done by machinery, guided by well-paid intelligence. Ignorance retards production while it retards invention, and retards the emancipation of common men from gross labors which should be done by the forces of nature harnessed by man's intelligence. pathetic picture of the man with the hoe excites our pity not because of the physical work he does, but because he has no intelligence. An educated gentleman often chooses as a pastime what others might call drudgery because he is interested, and his imagination and reflection, his cultivated mind, fill him with pleasure in the work. The time will come when one work will be as honorable as another and all work will be done with an intellectual zest, with heart in the work and with elation of spirit. If we are fearful of letting in the truth to free the bodies, as well as the souls, of all men, we doubt truth and we doubt God-we question His goodness and His wisdom in the creation and the direction of the forces of the universe.

The South, more than any other country, needs education, to re-

store the waste places, to retrieve the losses of war and misrule, of industrial and social revolution, and in a measure to compensate for the loss of the flower of manhood of the last generation by the death of her sons in battle. She needs to make the most of her sons by training them to do the best work. Moreover, a free education to them is the least that she can do in return for the sacrifices made by fathers who volunteered in the defence of their State in the War, trusting that "at home they would not be forgotten."

COMPULSORY EDUCATION.

If it is the duty of the State to educate, then children must not be permitted to neglect their opportunities. If they do not know the ruin they are bringing upon themselves and upon the State, if their parents are not alive to the importance to the children, or are cruelly indifferent, the State, the consensus of intelligent Christian opinion, must intervene to protect society and the children from the irresponsibility or cruelty of the parents. The children must not be sacrificed, and the future of the State must not be jeopardized.

Compulsory education is a duty to the taxpayer, who is taxed not merely to keep schools open, but to educate—and to educate all. It is not enough that a few children should attend school. The justification of the tax is that the country is to be made better by the education of all the people. The government has plighted its faith to accomplish the result—universal education, which experience has proved impossible without laws for compulsory attendance.

EFFICIENT SCHOOLS.

To compel attendance upon some schools in South Carolina is almost a crime. It is certainly a doubtful good. Possibly good would result in the fact that a larger number of people would be made to feel the worthlessness of these schools, and would be waked somewhat from present indifference. A compulsory education law might thus hasten the demand for better schools. This is an argument for the measure. But even without a compulsory education law, we should not permit the present inefficiency of our schools to continue. We are not honest—we are not honest with ourselves—if we admit our duty to educate and then claim that we are now fulfilling that duty in the opportunities which our schools provide. We need more money, but not to be expended so unwisely as is much of the present money expended. It must go to secure longer

terms and better teachers, not to multiply little weak schools with illiterate cousins and aunts to act as teachers "to keep the money at home." The money must be administered by efficient officers of high intelligence and character. These cannot provide good teachers and properly located schools unless they override, in many cases, the wishes of ignorant and selfish people of influence. Hence, these officers cannot do their duty in the great work unless their positions are beyond the immediate reach of popular disapproval. Nor will experts be usually chosen in a general election: in a political election men often lose their sense of personal responsibility.

COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Responsibility and intelligence are the great qualities to be desired in an efficient school management. After years of study of the subject in the light of the experience of our own State, as well as of the systems of other States, I am astonished at the prevalence of bad systems in other States and delighted that the evolution in our own State, when progressive communities have taken up the problem seriously, has given us, in our city school organizations, a model which needs only to be adopted by our counties, and then we shall have a system with the essential features most approved by students of the question in all the States. For progress, a county board of education, with long tenure and no material compensation, should have control of the public schools of the county. should be composed of such men as now compose the boards of trustees of our colleges or of our city schools. They would take that patriotic pride in perfecting their schools which is now felt in the management of these institutions. They would employ all necessary experts for the conduct of the work of the schools. First of all, there would be a superintendent or supervisor to serve as the agent of the board, and be to the public schools of the county what the president of a college is to the departments in his institu-Such a board, fully informed by the intelligent investigations of its expert superintendent, and not confined to the narrow view of one locality, would locate schools where they ought to be located, and prevent the uneconomical multiplying of schools. Such a board, acting through its superintendent, who would be a master teacher, would grant certificates to teach to none but persons with due qualifications. It could establish and enforce in teachers higher standards of scholarship and in pupils higher standards of attention and devotion to duty. Such a board, with permanence of policy, with

breadth of view and enlightenment of understanding, would finally establish relations with its teachers which would make the life of the teacher in South Carolina more attractive in every way. The county corps of teachers would be employed practically during good behavior, each teacher being assigned to work for which he is best fitted, considering the grade and the location. Chronic grumblers and kickers among the patrons, if not won over, would soon find themselves so powerless that their occupation would be gone. There would not be, as now, motives to magnify grievances and to cherish animosities against the election day.

If it be said that men of the highest standing in the community will not give their time and energy to this service, then we discount patriotism, we declare ourselves unfit for self-government, we publish our shame. How to select such a board may seem a difficult question, yet there are but two ways—election by the people or appointment. In my judgment, election by the people is the safest way in the long run, but it might be best in first establishing this system to name in the Legislative Act the members of the boards in the several counties, providing that as the term of each expires his successor shall be elected by the people at the general election. This policy was pursued by the city graded schools when first chartered.

No board should be very large. Five, or seven at the outside, should constitute this board, with a six or ten year tenure, one or two vacancies to occur every two years.

SUPERINTENDENT.

Such a board can be trusted to employ the right man as superintendent. However, the objection has been persistently made that the board would be elected by the manipulation of a candidate for the superintendency, and so would select an incompetent man just as readily as the people now do. The success of such scheming, even if permitted by public opinion, is rendered improbable by the provision of long terms to the members of the board, with only a minority elected every two years. Moreover, this objection is disproved by the experience of city and town graded schools. Yet it can be further disarmed by a provision that none can be chosen superintendent of schools except from an eligible list of persons who have been examined orally and in writing by the State Board of Education and given certificates of qualification to supervise schools. This certification, as a prerequisite to employment for expert work, is similar to the excellent civil service examinations of the United

States government, by which persons must first measure up to a standard before they are eligible to employment in certain lines of governmental service. It would weed out all notorious incompetents and restrict the choice to those able to do the work fairly well. Nobody's feelings could be hurt if he does not dare or does not choose to stand the examination to make himself a candidate for selection as school superintendent. Nobody's feelings should be hurt if he stands such examination before a reputable board and fails to prove the requisite grade of excellence. Men would be encouraged to make teaching their profession, and to study for excellence in the supervision of schools, if they were given the assurance that merit will be recognized, that efficiency is what the school management of South Carolina is looking for.

This principle introduced into our school organization would revolutionize it in all its bearings, in its educative results, in its hold upon the popular affection and confidence, and in its financial support.

EXPERT SUPERVISION.

The school interests must languish until each county system is provided with a capable directing head, a school man who knows his business and fearlessly does it. Almost every laborer, even the most skilled and conscientious, needs an inspector to spur him to his best efforts, to set a limit to his little neglects and procrastinations, to encourage him by intelligent appreciation of his attempts at improvement, to show him what to do and how to do it, and to bring him comfort and new hope and purpose. In only a few counties is this condition approximated, and there the school spirit, compared with that in some counties, is as light to darkness, though compared with what it ought to be, the efficiency of the schools is even there often most unsatisfactory. The system is fatally defective. The progressive county superintendents are handicapped by the prevailing disrepute of the office. The teachers will not readily look upon the county superintendents as qualified to give them helpful suggestions, or instruction. In many counties, the country teachers are like isolated workmen without an overseer, a condition of affairs that negatives all our pretence to having a State system of education. The economy of such management cannot be defended. Its senselessness is most apparent. Ignorance, the greatest of all foes, cannot be fought and overpowered without trained officers.

The remedy? It must be heroic. Half-way measures, diplomacy,

compromises with old-fogyism and incompetency, will bring no real benefit to the schools. Abolish the offices, as they now are, and provide for the employment of professional teachers of the highest quality to supervise the teaching. This requires that no one be eligible but the thoroughly educated and skilled teachers, and that the superintendents be paid in each county at least as much as the best paid teacher in that county. Even in Chesterfield, Williamsburg and Horry, where country teachers are paid only a pittance, the superintendent would be degraded and the desired result lost if the salary were less than \$600 a year. It would be a wise economy and an admirable investment if in even these counties the salaries should be at least \$1,000, so as to secure to these counties the benefit of the most inspiring and capable direction and leadership. Where there is the greatest need of improvement is just where there is work for the best man. The practice of getting cheap men in such places is due not to good business principles but to the backward state of public opinion, an illustration of the principle that the people will not provide for themselves a better government than their development causes them to demand.

For this reason, it is a dangerous policy for the Legislature, when legislating for the public school system, to acquiesce in a courtesy that each county delegation shall be a law unto itself as respects legislation for its own county. Let the State, and not the county, be primarily responsible for every school in the State. Where public opinion is not prepared for the improvement that is needed, and the delegates, therefore, are precluded from voting for such improvement, even though they personally approve it, it is all the more the duty of the Legislature of the State, as dominated by the members who represent the advanced thought of the more intelligent, prosperous and generally progressive sections, to do what is needed in order to remove the ignorance and apathy, the besotted self-satisfaction and self destructive false economy that make certain sections in the State a clog to the progress of the whole. History, as well as common sense, warrants our belief in State sovereignty. It is an anomaly, a perversion, a weak-minded concession to fallacious ideas of "home rule," to take the position that democratic institutions and popular government demand county sovereignty and neighborhood sovereignty. The slogan "the people have a right to elect their officers"; "the people will not give up their rights," etc., and the now prevailing disposition among representatives to subordinate their own judgment and knowledge of what would be good

for the country to the higher law of a supposed public opinion at home, is not genuine loyalty to the principles of democracy intelligently understood, but is a shirking of responsibilities. Nothing can be done for the good of the country if the lawfully constituted lawmakers will not exercise the authority which the Constitution intrusts to them, but defer to the supposed wishes of the masses of the people, whose immediate business is not to be statesmen.

If forty county superintendents of education, properly employed, and paid from one to two thousand dollars a year each, making a cost of sixty thousand dollars, were provided in this State, the benefit to the masses of the people would be greater than the benefit resulting from any other single expenditure of our State government, not excepting Winthrop College or Clemson College, the one of which costs as much, the other more. These forty educators, each one qualified to be a professor in the normal department of Winthrop College, would do for the more than five thousand teachers of South Carolina, many of them young and without a college education, very much what the Winthrop College faculty does for four hundred and fifty girls. Each county superintendent, if he were of this type of trained educator, could organize in his county a normal school, and raise the scholarship and the professional skill of all his teachers. Such work would reach, through the teachers, the children in the humblest homes, and would stimulate the thought and elevate the lives of more than two hundred thousand children. Can legislators be indifferent to this need, crying for their helping hand? Can the wisdom of such enactment and expenditure be doubted?

If it be impossible to break away from the custom of allowing a general law to be emasculated to suit the local preference of each county because of the varying standards of economy in the counties, then will not the Legislature provide this system at State expense? Indeed, but for the practice heretofore prevailing by which the county superintendent is paid by the county board of commissioners of his county, it seems that the rational plan is to make a State appropriation to provide these superintendents, without whom we can have no State system. With less cause the county treasurers have long been paid in part by the State. If the Legislature, the lower house of which has more than once manifested a desire to give one hundred thousand dollars to the public schools, will appropriate sixty thousand, or indeed, for the present, forty thousand dollars, to provide such heads to the school systems in the several

counties, it will be hailed throughout the country and proved by time to have been the most useful expenditure for public education yet undertaken.

INDUSTRIAL EDUCATION.

The great need of South Carolina today, as I see it, is practical industrial training, not as a fad for amateurs, nor as a learned profession to teach to others, but as a preparation for actual homely duties, an apprenticeship, as it were—a real education for the duties that lie at the foundation of our industrial and social life. Along with these are some of the most important habits of life. The ordinary school cannot attempt this training. The child in an ordinary family gets much of it at home, helping about the place; but the home is not always a good model. While young, but old enough to go off to school, boys and girls should be given a schooling that will fix habits and tastes for the intelligent and agreeable performance of the work that will be theirs in the world. The old time high school prepares for the exceptional life. There is little room for Latin and Greek and fancy learning in the system of education that looks to the future lives of the great body of bread-winners and home-builders. We must abandon the pleasing delusion that all go to school with the expectation of afterwards going to college. know that hardly one in a hundred will ever go to college.

We define education as a preparation for complete living. Have we not adapted our preparation to the unusual and the improbable life, and largely neglected preparing the average man for the duties almost certain to be upon him? We should recognize that complete living is a relative term, and that the complete life which is the ideal of the philosopher, and of the statesman as well, is not the complete life that can be realized at this stage of human development by any great number of our citizens. In holding up a high standard of education as the ultimate right of every citizen, let us not be so unmindful of the present as to deny to nearly all that education which could be given them to their great benefit and happiness.

What industrial education should be given to meet the needs of all?

Nature or custom has made a division between men and women by which the average woman will have domestic duties. As long as housekeeping and dinner preparing are necessary evils in our social life, and as long as these things are made woman's duty, the instruction of woman in the art of housekeeping and cooking should be regarded as a necessary part of her preparation for life.

In our State, agriculture is still the chief industry upon which most citizens depend for a livelihood. To neglect to prepare specially for this pursuit is to fail signally in providing a real education for our people—education, let us always keep it in mind, being a preparation for living. Let there be no misunderstanding. No one goes further than I in according to woman unbounded freedom for service in the world as her tastes and demands may draw her. No one more fully concedes or more gladly maintains the intellectual and spiritual equality of woman. Open wide to her the doors of the colleges and universities. Give her every opportunity that is afforded to man. Yet only a few will first venture beyond the sphere fixed by custom, and even for them a distinctly womanly education as a foundation is most desirable. For the average woman—for every woman, indeed—there should be provided, above all things else, a practical education in practical home-making.

Nor does any one more than I appreciate the value of the highest and best education for every man as a man and a citizen, regardless of his occupation or profession. The farmer, as well as the lawyer, should have a college or university education, where possible. But as a fact, as a present fact and as a calculable fact of the near future, the great majority of farmers will not be college bred men, and the few college men the State produces will usually turn from farming to other pursuits. When a boy from the country goes off to college, whether to a literary or to an agricultural college, count in the country thereafter one less young white man. Therefore, the practical problem is to provide an education within the reach of prospective farmers and adapted to cultivate the taste as well as the ability to farm.

This is no place to apply the college or university theory that the man needs to have a broad general education before he can choose his profession and enter upon special studies for it. It is only the rarely blessed that are privileged to choose a profession as an act of free will. To the great majority the occupation at maturity is an inevitable consequence of the surroundings of their early years. It is the aim of a perfect system of education to lift the humblest to the plane of broad opportunity and enable each to choose his life work more in conformity to native predilections and aptitude, cultivated and developed. But until the accumulated wealth of the State and the elevated standards of social duty suffice to pro-

vide adequate preparation for the complete education of all to this degree of individual power, of freedom and self-direction, our theories and our system of education are not practical while we provide professional education for only those who can attend college and let the thousands go into life's work before our eyes without instruction specially designed to aid them in their occupations. We need the colleges, and need them better supported. We must have the common schools, which reach every home and give instruction in the first elements of systematic learning. But between these extremes we need practical schools which shall train for the prevailing occupations of the people.

The town school should teach trades and business. There should be county high schools to give instruction in the business of the county, chief of which with us is farming, and for women homemaking. It so happens that these duties still prevalent in South Carolina are those for which the deepest instincts are implanted in the human race—agricultural and domestic labor having been fundamental in the evolution of the race and having left their impress everywhere and forever. Hence, considered merely for training, even with ultimate utilities out of view, these labors are unequaled in value for the development of mind and character-and thus most useful, whatever be the later occupation. If great preachers and physicians and lawyers and generals and statesmen have been country-reared boys, then we take no risks with our future manhood when we give to the high school, whether preparatory for college or for life, the environment of the country, with its varied appeals to the growing interests and energies. Thus we preserve the virility of the race and that common stock of simple experiences which so binds together the hearts of men. Therefore, the best school for the boys and girls who are to go on to college, as well as for those who are to labor in the fields, is a model country life, a farm school for boys and a home school for girls.

The chief features of these schools may be given in brief outline. I shall speak first and in greater detail of the home school for girls.

HOME SCHOOL FOR GIRLS.

This school should be located in the country, but within easy reach of a railway station, and thus of a market. The cost of plant and equipment should be less than \$10,000.00—a small farm with woodland and pastures, and orchards and garden, with the necessary dormitories and outbuildings. With an enrolment of about 50 girls, its

teaching force should consist of four industrial instructors or headworkmen and two teachers of what we are accustomed to regard as "school" subjects. The work of the home school may best be indicated by a brief account of the routine of daily life.

At about 6 o'clock in the morning all would rise and enter upon their several labors. A detail of girls, under the direction and leadership of the instructor in the cooking and housekeeping arts, would prepare breakfast. A second detail, under the like guidance, would clean up the rooms, wash and starch and iron—do every woman's work necessary to keep the house clean and in order.

A third detail of girls, under their instructor, who would understand by experience as well as by theory, the successful operation of a poultry and dairy farm, would go to the poultry yard and the cowpen, care for the young chickens and ducks and turkeys, bring in the eggs and set the hens, milk and feed the cows, churn the butter, feed the skimmed milk or the buttermilk to the calves and pigs, make curds and cheeses, give the proper attention to the bee-hives, and come in to breakfast with rosy cheeks and hearty appetites.

The fourth detail of girls, under the leadership of the expert gardener and fruit-grower (and probably only a man could now be secured with requisite skill), would go straight to the garden or the orchard, and with their own hands do the needed work. They would produce in all profusion every vegetable that could be profitably grown in its proper season from January to January; and for the first time in their lives many of them would learn what a good garden is, for there are country homes in South Carolina today where gardening is a lost art, where the families living upon fried meat and bolted meal furnished by a merchant on a lien, have no knowledge of the home-made luxuries once common. These girls would learn how to destroy the insects that prey upon the fruit trees. They would learn to graft and to bud, and would acquire the habit of looking upon fine fruit as an inseparable adjunct to country life. Now there are many farms on which an orchard is unknown, not even attempted or thought of.

After breakfast, which would interrupt the morning labors, "school" teaching proper would occupy all the girls for two hours, beginning at about nine. This school, under two skillful teachers, who could efficiently instruct fifty or sixty pupils, would resume its work for two hours in the afternoon from about two to four. Four hours a day for school room work would be sufficient. The instruction here should embrace the essentials of a modern rational

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education. First, there would be arithmetic and geometry, that each might have that knowledge of numbers and forms fundamentally necessary to progress in the conception of the physical world about us. Second, there should be instruction—theory never divorced from experiment-in the principles of physics, that no one might be ignorant of the fundamental facts of the physical laws about us, that there should be some realization of the indestructibility of force, of the permanence and transmutation and essential unity of things, of the universality of cause and effect, of the inevitableness of the consequences of deeds, so that there might be some clearer perception of the mystery and the grandeur of life and of God. There should be likewise some instruction in the most important facts of the organic life about us, nature study, that no one should be entirely a stranger in the plant and the animal kingdom, that each one should see something of the beautiful truths and utility of growth and development as illustrated in these constant companions of our daily lives. Third, there would be history and geography, that no one might be ignorant of the significance of our social, political and industrial institutions, and of the influences at work for the uplifting of mankind. We must know something of our past to understand something of our duty to the present and the future. Fourth, there should be instruction in the mother tongue, but more in its literature than in its grammar-language as an instrument of expression and as the vehicle of the thoughts of others should be a chief study. There should be reading and reading and reading. And oral reading should be taught, with a view to the expression of the sentiment and the thought in appropriate as well as in agreeable tones. The library should be used and appreciated. The habit of reading for pleasure and profit should be inculcated. Books would be valued for their contents as bringing us into mental and spiritual communion with the best thoughts of the best men that have lived in other times and places. Books would not be sealed to persons so educated to understand and enjoy them.

Nor should drawing and singing be neglected. Every one would be taught to draw freehand, and to sing by note. These forms of expression of aesthetic sensibilities latent in all would fairly complete a training designed to leave no worthy instinct undeveloped. Drawing would have its practical utility in many of the labors of life. Besides, there is practical utility in getting pleasure through a higher taste. Singing should be the first requisite to a woman's education. What is more attractive in the home than music? and what music is so beautiful as the music of the voice? A family may not afford a piano or an organ, or other instrument for music, but the voice is the sweetest as well as the cheapest of all musical instruments. In the humblest family circle, around the fireside on a winter night, or on the steps in the summer evening, it may form the center of happiness and of spiritual charm, bringing together the hearts of all in the sweetest domestic ties. Teach every woman to sing, to afford pleasure to her family and her visitors, to bring sleep to her baby. Who can think of a happy babyhood without singing? As long as it is the function of woman to bear babies every woman should be taught to sing.

From about half-past eleven to half-past three, a period for dinner and housework and rest would intervene between the two sessions of the "school" room. During this time the outdoor work in the yard and garden and orchard would be for the most part discontinued, especially in the hot seasons of the year; but sewing, mending of clothes, and laundrying, or canning vegetables and preserving, and many other duties in connection with the house and the kitchen, would fully occupy the girls who would not be required for the preparation of dinner. Later in the afternoon all would go from the school room to their several duties. There would be supper to be prepared, fruits and vegetables to be gathered or canned, work to be done in the poultry yard, in the dairy, in the garden, in the orchard. Busy hands would find something all the time to do. After supper there would be a few hours for study or for reading in the library, or for singing and dancing and playing games or other spontaneous enjoyment in the freedom of the home. At about nine o'clock all would be ready to go to rest, after the day's labors and pleasures, to rise in the morning with the sun.

Such a school, being but an ideal home, would be in session for twelve months in the year. At different seasons those who wished to visit parents for a short while would be given leaves of absence. If our present schools were not in large measure unnatural and our instruction and study imperfectly adapted to the needs of the growing life, there would be no reason for the long vacations now usual. There is no vacation in living. The life of the home goes on uninterrupted except by the variations of pleasant changes, and the life of a home school should go on in the same way.

In present conditions there should be practically no examination for admission to such a school. Any girl fourteen years of age or

over should be received. The object of the school is to fix habits of life, and as far as possible to instruct in literature and science. But habits of industry and deportment are of most consequence, and opportunity for their acquirement should not be denied to a young woman because she has been already denied opportunity for advancement in ordinary school subjects. The purpose should be to let no life be lost through neglect.

Such a school should be entirely free, costing its pupils nothing for board or clothing, as well as for tuition. Thus only will the poorest have the opportunity to profit by it, and they most of all need it. Moreover, the labor of fifty healthy, energetic, intelligently directed young women ought to suffice to support them. If not, then we should seriously question the success of the industrial management. The students are being fitted for self-support in after life; can they not support themselves now while working with all the advantages of combination and of skilled supervision? Here is the test to demonstrate the real practicableness of their teachers' theories. Thus would the results of intelligent labor be realized to the pupils and to the people of the State. The salaries of the instructors, the profits of their skill, should be paid by the public, and this should be the one running expense of the establishment. Six instructors paid at least eight hundred dollars each a year would cost four thousand eight hundred dollars. The annual cost of such a school would thus be about five thousand dollars.

Nor should this school have much equipment in the way of machinery. The conditions must be such as may be reproduced in a simple country home, otherwise the instruction is not practical, and the pupils will be led to excuse themselves from following it up, believing that only with expensive equipment and elaborate cooperation can such results be accomplished. In this home school every girl would be taught practically every work by change of details or squads from time to time. Each girl would become skilled in each kind of work taught by each instructor, and thus would go forth from the school not only practically accustomed to the excellent results of skillful industry in the management of a home, but herself practiced in doing with pleasure the work which to the uninstructed, without the cultivated taste, would seem drudgery.

Each instructor in this school, let us keep in mind, would be not merely a skilled worker, but, above all else, a perfect woman. In the kitchen, in the laundry, in the dairy, in the garden, as well as in

the school rooms proper, the girls would be in contact with a woman of the highest culture, strongest and sweetest character, broadest and tenderest sympathies, motherly interest in their welfare, and strong-minded realization of what is best for them, a woman of magnetic personality and clear-headed control, whose every association would be a constant refining influence and inspiration to higher thoughts and sentiments, a benediction in the lives of growing young women. The girls that come from homes with ignorant and illiterate mothers, whose mental and moral vision is bounded by the narrowness and the poverty of their humble lives, would through this association for four years be lifted to a plane of thought and feeling and life which otherwise could not be reached through generations of gradual improvement wrought by the ordinary schools and by the experiences of life; it is the province of education thus to hasten the evolution of society.

The usual period of life in this school should be about four years—from fourteen to eighteen. A young woman would then go forth with willingness to work, with appreciation of the joy of intelligent work, with the highest ideals of a comfortable and thrifty and cheerful and beautiful home. The neglect and cheerlessness, the discomfort and poor cooking to which they had been accustomed in earlier life, would no longer be borne without strenuous struggle for improvement. There would at least be unwonted rebellion against spending their lives a prey to bedbugs, which many a housekeeper regards as simply inevitable. These young women would go home and change things, giving their old fathers in these later years a taste of home happiness no less delightful because so new.

FARM SCHOOL FOR BOYS.

Similarly situated at another point in the county there should be a farm school for boys. Here, besides garden and orchard, there should be fields of grain and hay and other valuable products. The boys would do the farm work and would learn to take worthy pride in good plowing and good hoeing and good work of every kind required on the farm. They would be excused from the cooking and the canning and preserving. They would raise poultry, however, and honey, and look after the cows and the dairy. They would learn, too, to work with wood and iron. There would be shops in which they would do all carpentering and blacksmith work needed for the plantation—building and repairing houses, making plowstocks and hoehandles, sharpening plow shovels,

shoeing horses, etc. They would attend for four hours in the day "school rooms" in which the course of instruction would be practically the same as in the home school for girls.

The character of the instructors, men of culture as well as of industrial skill, men of heart as well as of brain, would impress upon the boys the right sort of feeling toward work and toward life, reinforcing the lessons of the school room and of the outdoor work.

If by natural affinity or other circumstances a farm school boy should marry a home school girl, they could buy a few acres of land and, almost by their own direct labors, build and furnish a house, and surround themselves with comforts and attractions of home that might well be the envy of princes. Ten acres of land would yield a bountiful support to the skillful industry of such a master and mistress. With such homes multiplying in South Carolina the country would be regenerated. Prosperity would become general and there would be a strength of citizenship unequaled in the history of nations.

Such schools should be supplied in sufficient numbers to provide this education for every boy and girl from fourteen years of age to eighteen, but the final ideal is not soon realized, and we need not now advocate establishing more than one such school for each sex in each county. Indeed, could but one county in the State initiate this movement, and establish a home school for white girls, we should have entered upon a new era of education in South Carolina; and with the one experiment the future development along these lines would be safely worked out. The Legislature should pass a general law permitting any county to vote upon itself ten thousand dollars in bonds to build such a school, and a tax for its annual support. It would be well if the Legislature would appropriate ten thousand dollars to supply the plant to the county that first votes upon itself the tax to support the school. Thus the establishment of the pioneer school could be insured for an early date.

SCHOLARSHIPS FOR TEACHERS.

It is an accepted principle that the support of a public school system carries with it an obligation to provide schools for the special training of teachers. There is a growing tendency, moreover, to provide in such schools supporting scholarships to encourage teachers to pursue professional study and thus to fit themselves for better service to the State in the public schools. This policy is no less

incumbent on the modern state than the policy of the nation in supporting the Military and the Naval Academy and supporting young men to study there for the future defence of the nation.

South Carolina has entered upon this policy in the establishment of Winthrop Normal and Industrial College with one hundred and twenty-four scholarships for girls, paying them forty-four dollars a year each, in addition to the remission of tuition charges, and in the establishment of the Normal Department in South Carolina College with direction to the trustees to admit "as normal students, without fees for tuition or matriculation, two young men from each county." The State did thus much for teacher-training when far less able than now. Then she was expending thousands annually upon college buildings. With these extraordinary expenses off her hands, and her wealth greatly increased in recent years, she would now be relaxing her efforts for education, and especially for teachertraining, unless she enlarge her provision to enable young men and young women to avail themselves of these two State colleges for teachers. The applications that have been made to me for the few scholarships provided for South Carolina in the Peabody Normal College at Nashville have touched my heart, bringing home vividly in various details the struggles of young women and young men in South Carolina to fit themselves for teaching, which they are pursuing in necessity with consciousness of unfitness. It impresses upon me the inadequacy of the State's present provision for teacherscholarships.

The Winthrop scholarships are not what they should be. In the early days of the Winthrop Training School in Columbia, the Legislature provided two scholarships to a county, both carrying free tuition and one paying \$150 a year besides, thus enabling the winner to take the course although entirely without personal means. Now these scholarships, although increased in numbers, do not afford the means of education to a girl who is really indigent. I have knowledge of instances where young women teachers have won these scholarships and been forced to surrender them for want of the additional money necessary to use them. Nor is there any requirement of law that the scholarships shall be competed for by only the needy. The \$5,456 which the State annually appropriates for scholarships in Winthrop doubtless goes largely to young women who would attend college, and probably Winthrop, without such aid. At the same time there are hundreds of bright and ambitious young women in our State forced to spend their lives without college training.

eager to avail themselves of the tantalizing partial aid offered by the State beyond their reach. Surely it is a mistake to aid indiscriminately when so much better results could be accomplished by applying the same money with discernment. In addition to the present scholarships paying part of the necessary expense of attending the college, the Legislature should provide one scholarship from each county paying the entire expense, or at least \$100. In the award of all these teacher-scholarships, preference should be given to young women who have taught, even though they fail on examination to secure as high a mark as the young girl fresh from the town graded school. Ambitious young women in the country would thus be encouraged to compete for these scholarships.

The South Carolina College scholarships are even more inadequate, and are not even sought after by men already in attendance on the College. They restrict the holder to taking the teacher's course, but they carry no money consideration except an exemption from fees, an exemption not peculiar to the scholarship, but granted in all the State colleges to students unable to pay. Thus the State is providing practically no scholarships for men teachers.

Following up what has been done, profiting by the observations of experience, and planning with a larger view, more in accord with present means and ideals, the present Legislature has the opportunity further to develop the policy of teacher-scholarships so as profoundly to affect the progress of education in our State.

Men teachers are notably few. Their lack is pointed to as a weakness in our schools. Such men teachers as we have are for the most part entirely untrained in teaching as a profession. Skilled and ambitious professional women teachers must often serve under principals and even superintendents who know less of the art and science of teaching than those whom they supervise. The real responsibility for the work of the schools rests upon the shoulders of untrained novices, a condition of affairs not encouraging to continuous efforts for improvement on the part of the subordinate women teachers, nor promising school development in those lines specially intrusted to the superintendents or principals. Moreover, just as man and woman together make up the sum total of humanity, and as each has a special strength and line of greatest usefulness, the work of the school cannot reach the highest efficiency without the joint supplementary and cooperative thoughts, sentiments and efforts of man and woman. Neither is all-sufficient for the education of youth.

If we are earnestly taking up the problem of providing complete

education for the people of South Carolina, we cannot neglect to train men teachers to do their part of this great and necessary work. Since the Legislature is now supporting in the South Carolina College a professor of pedagogy (Prof. Patterson Wardlaw, whose work as teacher, principal and superintendent before he was called to his present professorship placed him at the head of the inspiring and successful teachers of South Carolina), the natural policy would be to provide a free support there of at least one young man teacher from each county to pursue the normal course. The law should require the beneficiary in this course to be an actual teacher, not merely a prospective teacher. Thus only is there assurance that he is drawn to teaching rather than to the opportunity of a free education for himself. It is a misfortune to buy into the teaching profession temporarily persons who by nature have no call to teach. Moreover, those who have already taught in the public schools have thus committed themselves to this line of work, for some time at least. Here is a young man who is going to teach badly if he is not now aided to learn how to teach well. His readiness to suspend money-making in order to pursue studies looking to greater efficiency as a teacher indicates some appreciation of the requirements of his profession and gives good promise that the State's expenditure upon him will not fail to reach through him the schools. When an ignorant but determined teacher is taken and fitted for the work, not only is good teaching provided, but mischievous teaching is stopped.

No scholarship should impose a pledge to teach. Instead of this arbitrary compulsion—unjustifiable in principle and harmful in practice—there should be such a rational selection as well as instruction of the beneficiaries as to make it probable that they will prefer to teach. Fit them for teaching as a life work, and their taste and aptitude are the best compulsion. Choose for this fitting process those who have already, even with poor lights and poor opportunities for the development of taste and aptitude, selected this profession, and we may have natural aptitude deserving of cultivation. Moreover, such beneficiaries will be almost certainly in financial need, being teachers, and having reached some maturity without finishing at college. Such scholarships would be doubly justifiable as public benefactions: they would offer to the brainy poor the means of higher education, while insuring to children in crowded schools the boon of better elementary training.

POST-GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIPS.

The Conference of Trustees of the South Carolina College, the Citadel, Clemson, and Winthrop asks the Legislature to establish ten post-graduate scholarships, of \$100 a year each, for two years' study at the South Carolina College by a graduate from each of these colleges and from each of the male colleges in the State of like standing. the beneficiaries to be selected by the respective faculties. the reasons for this policy may be briefly stated. There are so few applicants for post-graduate work in institutions in South Carolina that no single college is justified in making a specialty of this work. This further deters students. If any college in our State is to make this a specialty, so as to offer really attractive advantages, only one should attempt it. Now we are dependent upon other sections for higher learning. Higher learning in the State is necessary to her independence. This is a day when, without the semblance of political connection, one country may nevertheless be subject to another through the dominance of ideas. We are not a free people if the "authorities" on great questions of trade and life, industry and government, are all in other states and other countries. If we are ever to stand abreast with other States in this regard, we should make a beginning, and the simplest beginning is a concentration at a central State institution with such aid to a few students as will make it worth while to them to do post-graduate work in this State notwithstanding the fact that the opportunities afforded, and the recognition which the world will accord to the degree received, will not be as great as if the time had been spent in such institutions as Johns Hopkins, or Harvard, or the University of Virginia, or even the University of North Carolina. The scholarships would be prizes to stimulate the ambition and efforts of students in all our colleges, and the nucleus of picked students pursuing higher learning in Columbia would rouse professors to renewed aspirations and create an atmosphere which would attract other students to the work.

The small expenditure of \$1,000 might thus inaugurate within the borders of South Carolina distinctly university work, with its manifold benefits, not least among which would be a harmony of policy, a union of forces, among all the colleges and educational interests in our State.

APPROPRIATIONS TO THIS OFFICE.

I am glad to be able to speak of the needs of this office without personal interest. The Legislature has, during my term, done much

to strengthen the hands of the State Superintendent of Education in the administration of his duties, but so long had this department been neglected that the Legislature could not all at once realize how inadequate accustomed appropriations had been and how largely they should be increased.

STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The appropriation for the expenses of the State Board of Education has each year been so limited as to minimize the importance of this Board, created by the Constitution and charged with large powers and responsibilities. The appropriation scarcely admits of three meetings a year. The general school law restricts the pay of the members to twenty days, but the appropriation does not take this maximum into account. At least five hundred dollars should be appropriated for the expenses of the State Board of Education every year.

PRINTING.

The State Superintendent of Education can, by letting things alone, fill his term and draw his salary without much printing or other expenditure. But the law makes it his duty to furnish school officers and teachers with all necessary forms, blanks, etc., for records and reports. All this, if carried out, requires money. Each teacher needs to have, each season, one register. Each board of trustees needs to have a record book, with duplicate warrants and stubs, to keep accurate accounts with itself and the county treasurer and the county superintendents of education. There should be furnished to teachers programs for special day exercises. There should be sent to school trustees printed circulars of instruction and suggestion, to inform and stimulate them in the discharge of their duties. Moreover, the statute requires the Superintendent to edit and publish the School Law in pamphlet form from time to time, incorporating all amendments. There are requests for copies of the School Law from numerous persons besides officers and teachers. This office has never been able to supply the demand. The teachers must also be provided with copies of the course of study in pamphlet form. A college spends upon its catalogue five or six hundred dollars a year. Upon their printing the colleges of the State spend more than the public schools have been permitted to spend. At least fifteen hundred dollars ought to be provided for printing, "if so much be necessarv."

STATIONERY.

The distribution of the Annual Reports to the State Superintendents of Education, and to our county and town superintendents, to colleges, to progressive teachers and others in our State, and students of education elsewhere who write requesting this Report, requires a large expenditure for stamps. The correspondence of the office is necessarily large, but is capable of almost indefinite increase through efforts to arouse and influence county superintendents, trustees and teachers in matters of school interest. Numerous circulars should be distributed for the instruction of the nearly five thousand school trustees and more than five thousand school teachers. Altogether, the stamp fund of this office should be larger than that of any other office. It has not been sufficient.

OFFICERS' ESTIMATES.

When a State officer, in response to the request of the Ways and Means Committee, makes an estimate of the necessary expenses of his office in the matter of stationery, printing, etc., it should be based upon detailed information of the requirements for efficient service, and should be accepted by the Legislature as conclusive. The tendency to cut all estimates, and the necessity of getting along with the reduced appropriation, but, of course, with reduced efficiency, breeds the idea that estimates are always made with a view to being cut, and that State officers are not expected to use strictly business methods in reporting in a business way the needs of their departments. It seems to me that this is an unfortunate tendency, and that it may be proper for me to mention it, since I have seen how it cripples the public service.

RENT OF OFFICE.

During this year this office has been provided with well lighted and agreeable rooms, suited for good work, in The Ballydon building, on Main street, near the State House. The appropriation for this purpose, however, directs the Secretary of State "to provide in the State House, by the beginning of the next fiscal year, for the State Superintendent of Education." In justice to my successor, I wish to impress the importance of suitable quarters for this office outside of the State House if, as heretofore, they cannot be provided in the State House.

CLERK'S SALARY.

For the last two years the Legislature has appropriated twelve hundred dollars for the salary of the clerk of this office, although the general school law still fixes the amount at nine hundred dollars. I am grateful for what has been done, but it is an invidious distinction to pay this clerk only twelve hundred dollars when the salaries of the other chief clerks in the State House are fourteen or fifteen hundred dollars. I am grateful, too, for the provision during the last three years for a stenographer, at a salary of four hundred dollars. This should be continued, and it would be entirely just that the salary should be increased, if the work in the future is as great as it has been. I speak without interest, as I am informed that new clerks will come in with the new State Superintendent.

ADDITIONAL AIDS TO THE SUPERINTENDENT.

With a view to the enlarged usefulness of this department, and the best interests of the public school system, I have heretofore suggested to the Legislature that the State Superintendent ought to be provided with assistants, or supervisors, under his direction, to look after phases of educational work which need to be specially encouraged or developed in our State. A few experts thus provided could do detailed work in the instruction of teachers and in the inspection of schools that would be far-reaching in its effect upon efficiency.

The subject of drawing is now interesting many teachers, and has been introduced in a large number of schools. The city schools of Charleston have been able to employ a supervisor for the six schools of the city. If the State Superintendent of Education were provided with a supervisor of drawing to look after this work for the State, she could greatly aid smaller schools in efforts to prepare their teachers to introduce this subject, and she could extend into the country this teaching at the same time that she insures its improvement and quality everywhere.

Singing by note is another subject that is being more generally introduced, although still looked upon by many as strange and difficult. The city schools of Spartanburg have supervisors of singing, as have the city schools of Charleston and Anderson. A State supervisor of this subject could give special attention to schools struggling to introduce it, without the funds to provide an expert supervisor for themselves. Judiciously choosing the points at which to work longest, the State Supervisor could greatly accelerate the spread of this instruction while increasing its efficiency wherever

attempted, toning up the purposes and the efforts of all. She might instruct the teachers of a county for a fortnight or more.

Manual training likewise is being introduced into a few of our city schools and a few specially progressive country schools whose teachers have learned it at the summer schools. The provision of a special supervisor to promote this subject in the schools of the State would be productive of desirable results.

Above all is there needed a supervisor of primary methods—and a supervisor of primary methods for every county indeed. present instruction in this subject in most of the schools of the State is a slaughter of the innocents. In selecting Miss Withers to the clerkship vacated by the resignation of Mr. McGhee, I asked her to give, as far as the clerical duties of her position permitted, some attention to the condition of primary work in the schools of the State. Being a skilled primary teacher, and having taught this subject in the summer schools, State and county, she was already known to all the teachers by reputation, and to many by personal experience, as an authority in this subject, whose suggestions must prove helpful to them. She visited a few schools in several counties and in many cases found teachers whom she had instructed at the summer schools using her methods and eager to consult with her upon difficulties that had presented themselves. They would draw forth their note books, containing the notes taken at the summer school, and would show every evidence of diligence in trying to accomplish results through intelligent methods. My judgment is confirmed that the work of the schools in the primary grades can be radically reformed by continuous instruction in summer schools, followed up by expert inspection through the sessions. The little time that could be afforded for this work from the exacting duties of a clerkship in this office could not in one year admit of more than an experimental investigation of the primary work and the means of its improvement. If, however, the State Superintendent of Education could be provided with a primary supervisor, to have charge of this work and promote it in every way possible for twelve months in the year, the necessary expenditure would be an admirable investment. All the better if four such supervisors could be provided; one in a district of ten counties could give a month to each county. In this time she could inspect sufficiently closely and instruct sufficiently definitely and systematically to accomplish excellent results.

All these subjects, until recently little known to our teachers, have been taught in the summer schools, State and county, to many teachers who are interested in the subjects and eager to carry them into their schools. They would be encouraged in such innovations if there were some authoritatively provided expert adviser to whom they could look for aid.

SUMMARY OF RECOMMENDATIONS.

The recommendations urged in the foregoing Report may be thus summarized:

- I. To provide efficient organization and management of each county system by legislation as follows:
- I. The office of County Superintendent of Education should be abolished and the entire management of the schools of each county placed under the control of a county board of five members, one or two elected every two years, for a term of six years, the original board being appointed in the Legislative Act, or by the State Board, or by the Governor.
- 2. Each county board should be required to employ at least one expert superintendent of schools from those holding certificates of qualification granted by the State Board of Education upon oral and written examination as to (1) scholarship, (2) pedagogical knowledge and skill, and (3) personal aptitude.
- 3. The Act should provide for an annual appropriation of \$41,000, \$1,000 to each county, in aid of the salary of the expert superintendent, to be paid monthly upon the warrant of the secretary of the county board, provided the warrant be approved by the State Superintendent of Education, with the endorsement that lawful duties have not to his knowledge been neglected.
- II. To provide for encouraging teachers to take courses in normal colleges:
- 1. An appropriation of \$4,100 per year should be made for one young man from each county to pursue a normal course at the South Carolina College.
- 2. The Legislature should give the preference of the Winthrop scholarships to women who have taught, and should appropriate additionally \$4,100 annually to make for each county another series of Winthrop scholarships, these paying the holder \$100.
- III. To encourage higher learning by providing an annual appropriation of \$1,000 for post-graduate scholarships in the South Carolina College, to be awarded to a graduate of each one of the four State colleges, and of the other male colleges of like standing in the State.

- IV. To permit a county to vote upon itself a tax not exceeding two mills for the support of industrial schools. It would be well for the Legislature to donate a \$10,000 plant to the county first voting this tax.
- V. To provide efficient teachers in impoverished school districts by appropriating \$25,000 annually to bring up each salary to \$35 a month for 6 months' session, upon proper conditions.

All these benefactions to the country schools and to the cause of sound learning generally could be provided by a legislative appropriation of less than \$100,000—less than the State pays through the fertilizer tax to a year's college instruction of the boys at Clemson, and less than the appropriation that will be made by this Legislature to the other State colleges for 700 or 800 students. The colleges should have all that they need, and they ask for no more, but the public school system, the foundation of all, should not be longer neglected.

CONCLUSION.

During the four years that I have had the privilege of filling this office I have striven with all my power to improve educational conditions. My purpose has been to help the State to a perfect system. Let us build wisely. Let us not waste public money. Let us not sacrifice this generation. Let us not postpone the day of intelligent, conscientious public opinion and of safe popular suffrage, making possible great social reforms.

I wish to put on record my appreciation of the assistance rendered me by the majority of the teachers and by many other friends of education. Some of the college professors, in State and denominational colleges alike, have my lasting gratitude for their sympathetic counsel and aid. The association with these pure spirits in engrossing and inspiring work has been to me a joy the memory of which will sweeten my life. My work has been an unceasing pleasure, the fullest living.

PEDAGOGICAL PSYCHOLOGY.

The following is the report of my work as instructor in Pedagogical Psychology at the Summer School of 1902:

The course that I gave was the outcome of two very strong convictions:

- I. That teaching forms no exception to the rule that all high arts require, for their best attainment, an understanding of the principles that underlie them.
- 2. That, by excluding irrelevant technicalities, theoretical fine distinctions, and questions of merely controversial, metaphysical, or philosophical interest, and by considering the plain facts of every-day experience, and rising from these to those general laws of the mental life which constitute the principles of the art of education; the study of psychology can be made simple enough and practical enough to richly repay the efforts of all intelligent teachers.

Of course, in the short time at our disposal, a general view of the subject, the most important conceptions, a hunger for more, and eyes to see more were all that could be hoped for.

In accordance with these views the following topics were studied: Relations of mind and body.

The "Stream of Consciousness"—fundamental laws.

The point of view-action or contemplation?

Relation of impression and reaction.

Relation of native and acquired reactions.

Spontaneous actions, reflexes, instincts.

Habit and association.

Interest and attention.

Remembering.

The getting of ideas.

Willing.

The work was conducted by means of a text-book (James's "Talks to Teachers"); reading of references in investigation of questions; discussions either in class or at a stated conference, or with individuals; students' exercises, either assigned or voluntary; and problems propounded by the instructor. The continual effort was to open the eyes of the students to the psychological principles unceasingly illustrated in their daily experience, and to applications of these in education. (See copy of my examination questions appended.)

It has never been my privilege to conduct a class more admirable in its interest, industry, zeal, loyalty and spirit than my class at this session. In the inclosed list of students who stood the examination not one name is marked unsatisfactory. The two that were compelled to leave before examination had given promise of not being exceptions.

SCHOOL SUPERVISION.

TWO COURSES.

The elementary course was similar to the one given the previous year at the State Summer School, but not identical with it. However, a fairly adequate idea can be formed of the work by reference to the report made last year.

The advanced course covered altogether different ground. The teachers of this class made a week's study of the educational conditions in South Carolina. Next, a week was given to a study of the educational conditions in Massachusetts and Michigan. Still another week was devoted to a brief insight into the conditions in England, France, and Germany. With this light before us, we spent the fourth week in a study of our opportunities and our limitations with special reference to education.

It will be readily seen that such a course of work must be based upon a study of the institutional life of each State and country. There are five distinct but not independent lines of growth in the history of any people: the social, the political, the industrial, the educational, and the religious. These great lines of national life and growth are coordinate and interdependent. The health and growth of any one of them depend upon the health and growth of all the others. A distinct and radical growth in the political life of a people cannot take place independent of the social and industrial life of that people. No more can the educational life of a people be segregated from the social, political, industrial, and religious life of that people. If all this is kept in mind, it is not at all difficult to understand why it is that South Carolina, Massachusetts, and Michigan each has taken a different view of both public and private education.

In making a study of the conditions in our own State, the subjects appended were investigated as fully as the limited time would allow.

- The Wealth of the State. Resources. Taxation and Disbursements.

KINDERGARTEN PRINCIPLES.

THEIR RELATION TO PRIMARY WORK.

(Reprinted from the Announcement.)

MISS MACFEAT.

Text-book used: Froebel's Educational Laws-Hughes.

"The principles upon which the Kindergarten processes are based are fundamental principles that should guide the teacher in the work of teaching and training the child throughout its school course."

The course to be offered will consist of the study of some of these principles. The following are some of the subjects that will be studied and discussed:

Self-activity.

The harmony between control and spontaneity.

Play as an educational factor.

Children's interests.

Stories for children.

Importance of child-study.

A new feature of the work this year will be the Kindergarten itself, which will be conducted during the session. This will give to the primary teachers an opportunity to become acquainted with such phases of the kindergarten as will be especially helpful to them in their work. It will also give to those taking the course the opportunity for observing the application of the educational principles studied.

EXAMINATION QUESTIONS.

- 1. What is child study? Why important for all teachers? What should we observe and how should we observe this?
- 2. Define self-activity. What practical application of this principle can be made in the regular work of the school?
- 3. What is Froebel's theory with regard to stages of development? To what errors in teaching does the violation of this theory lead?
- 4. What suggestions with regard to discipline do you get from the study of "Harmony Between Control and Spontaneity"?
- 5. Why should play instinct be utilized in early education of children? State some of the mental, moral and physical advantages of play.

OBSERVATION AND PRACTICE WORK.

(Reprinted from the Announcement.)

MISS BONHAM.

This course will consist of actual school-room work, with classes of pupils in primary and grammar grades.

Several grades will be in the class-room at the same time, as it is desired to adapt the work to the needs of those who teach more than one grade.

All branches usually taught in the grades mentioned will be brought into this work, although some branches will be emphasized more than others.

After each period of work the student teachers will, with the instructor, discuss the teaching done at that period.

On Saturdays, the two sections will meet together for general criticism and for the mutual help that results from interchange of ideas.

REPORT.

The work in this department was practical school-room work with children. The intention was carried out to keep several grades or classes occupied at once, since this is what must be done by the average teacher.

No expensive material was used in connection with this work, as it was designed to meet, as far as possible, the conditions of our rural schools.

All subjects taught from the first through the sixth year were given illustration.

Lessons were given by the students themselves, and these lessons were afterwards reviewed and criticized by the class.

It is to be regretted that more such lessons could not have been given, but this was impossible on account of the large number of students.

It is not exaggeration to say with regard to the spirit of the students, that, in my experience in training teachers, I have never taught a class where the interest in work was greater.

This interest was distinctly evinced when, afternoon after afternoon, the teachers voluntarily met for consultation on those details of the individual work which, for want of time, we could not take up at the morning hour.

METHODS IN ELEMENTARY ARITHMETIC.

Numeration, Notation, Addition, Subtraction, Multiplication, Division, Decimals, Factors, Multiples, and Common Fractions were presented as to children. In each subject the presentation was followed by some drill, and several times by written exercises, which were corrected and returned. Each teacher provided herself with a box of toothpicks, five cents' worth of rubber bands, and a number of circles, half-circles, quarter-circles, etc., which were used throughout the course for purposes of illustration. It is hoped that this material and some objective teaching will make their way into the school-rooms of at least a few who took the course.

METHODS IN GRAMMAR SCHOOL ARITHMETIC.

The text-books of the State adoption, Wentworth's Practical Arithmetic, and Brooks's Mental Arithmetic, were made the basis for regular class work. These books were reviewed through "applications of percentage."

Special stress was given to Mental Arithmetic, half of every period being devoted to work in oral analysis, in which all teachers participated. The aim of the course throughout was to emancipate the teacher from mechanical rules which arrest mental development.

The first week of the month was given to a broad view of arithmetical principles, in which Olney's "Science of Arithmetic" was made the basis.

The enrolment in the two sections was 52.

All worked conscientiously and enthusiastically. The examination average is unusually high. W. K. TATE,

GEOMETRY.

This class, consisting of six members, completed two books of Bowser's Plane Geometry. A large part of the time was devoted to the study of miscellaneous exercises, special attention being given to the analysis of problems.

ALGEBRA.

COURSE I.—In this class there were nineteen members. Wentworth's New School Algebra was used as the basis of instruction, the course extending as far as quadratic equations.

Course II.—This class, consisting of five members, completed Wentworth's New School Algebra.

In all these classes the work was of a high grade. I desire to commend all the students that came under my instruction for their faithful and enthusiastic work. One of the most gratifying features of the work was the fact that all my students remained to the last and presented themselves for examination.

METHODS IN LANGUAGE TRAINING.

In this department fifty-two students enrolled and were taught in two sections. Forty-two took the examination at the close of the course.

It was at first intended to divide the sections to some extent according to the kind of work in which the teachers were engaged, and to give more attention to advanced language methods in one section than in the other. But it was found that most of the teachers were directly interested in the work of the intermediate grades, and

it therefore seemed most practicable to confine the work largely to this part of the school course.

The range of language teaching from the fourth to the sixth grade was made the basis of instruction; but it was also shown how the beginnings of this work must be laid in earlier grades, and how the same lines of teaching must reach on into high school and college courses.

The language teaching of the intermediate grades was considered under three heads: The formal or structural study of language (with grammar as the central subject), literature, and practical composition. The material found in the text of Wheeler's Graded Studies was used largely in the class-room exercises; but it was also shown how this material must be supplemented from other sources in order to give adequate language training.

Class-room exercises were prepared by the student-teachers illustrating the different kinds of language lessons needed in a school course.

The students entered into the work heartily, and while the results of class-room exercises varied considerably according to the experience and previous training of the student-teachers, it is believed that all gained many ideas which will be helpful in practical school-room work.

LITERATURE IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

COURSE I .- THIRD, THROUGH SIXTH GRADE.

The literature courses in the State Summer School were so arranged that those who wished so to do could go over representative portions of the literature taught in all the grades of the public schools from the third through the ninth. I had charge of the work for grades third and sixth inclusive. The literature of these grades was studied with care, the instructor insisting always that the first duty of the teacher is to know the subject that he is trying to teach. Methods of presenting literature to children, the importance of beginning early to interest them in the subject, and other topics were discussed by the instructor and the members of the class.

As much of the subject matter was of a very elementary character, the instructor was somewhat afraid at first that the members might think it childish. His fear was, however, soon removed. All those who took the course showed from the beginning that they wished to make the most of it. We all tried to get once more in touch with the world of fable and romance as children see it, and genuine enjoyment was apparent, if the enthusiasm shown by the members is a criterion.

It is hoped that some good will come from the emphasis that was placed on the importance of literature in the lower as well as in the higher grades of the public school course.

COURSE II .- A NORMAL COURSE FOR HIGHER GRADES.

A typical book from the literature required in the seventh, eighth, and ninth grades was taken as the basis for the four weeks' work, and the aim kept steadily in view was to acquire a thorough knowledge of the text, to appreciate its literary quality, to inspire interest in the study of literature, and to suggest practical methods of teaching it. The texts used were Lowell's "Vision of Sir Launfal," Irving's "Rip Van Winkle" and "The Legend of Sleepy Hollow," and Shakespeare's "Merchant of Venice."

Both of these courses were largely attended, and the final examinations showed that much careful and appreciative work had been done on the part of students. The instructor wishes to record his appreciation of their intelligent and unfailing interest.

ENGLISH GRAMMAR.

SECTION B.

About sixty-five took the course in Grammar. The members of the class were divided into two sections, in order to suit the convenience of those who wished to take conflicting courses. During the first ten days of the school I heard both sections, but during the remainder of the time Dr. Kinard very generously relieved me of part of the work, and he will report what was done in Section A.

In Section B there were about forty students. Some of these were college graduates or teachers who had studied Grammar already for years, while others had not had the advantage of thorough training. Naturally, therefore, the grade of work varied with different members of the class. All, however, were regular in attendance, earnest in their efforts to learn, and most courteous to the instructor.

The course covered most of Buehler's Grammar. In addition to the work done on the subject matter in the book, the instructor discussed with the class proper methods of presenting Grammar, the value of Grammar study, and various other topics that should be of interest to those whose business it is to teach their own language in J. I. McCain, our schools.

ENGLISH COMPOSITION.

I think the course in English Composition was successful. The teacher-pupils felt the need of such work, and applied themselves faithfully and earnestly. The course seemed to arouse in those who took it a desire to do more for their pupils in this all-important part of a child's education. Each teacher wrote thirteen themes-eleven one-page themes and two longer ones-all of which were either revised or corrected according to the direction of the instructor.

DRAWING.

It gives me pleasure to report regarding the Department of Art in the Summer School as follows:

Inasmuch as the entire Summer School has not been as large this year as last, the department of art study also included fewer students than at some other times. However, those who did give their attention to this study proved to be earnest, enthusiastic and talented in a surprising degree. The group of students was divided into four divisions, making classes fully as large as could be properly cared for by myself and the three assistant teachers supplied. In other years it has been impossible to do justice to the overflowing classes.

I have been enabled this year to conduct a class in water color painting which has accomplished far more than any previous class in this medium since the Summer Schools commenced.

- . There are two matters in this connection which give me, the one pleasure, and the other discontent.
- (I) A very large number of my former students meet me with smiling enthusiasm and report the satisfaction they have had in using their little skill in their regular school work; also their success in inducing their pupils to draw. If I mistake not, the matter of drawing in the public schools of South Carolina is already an actuality, and it is a keen pleasure to me to feel that possibly I have been instrumental in bringing about this desirable condition.
- (2) The number of old pupils in my department has been only about 7½ per cent. There seems to be an impression that the little course of one month (giving a good smattering) should answer. Probably this will correct itself in time. The proportion of the students who worked in the art department is about the same as in former sessions of the school, and the progress of these has been remarkable. There is much less latent talent in South Carolina.

Each of these students has been obliged to work one hour in the class-room with the teachers, from some object set before the class, and in addition has been obliged to work one hour (at least) outside the class, selecting his own model (always a natural object—no copying allowed) and make a drawing of it as best he could all by himself. The object of this arrangement is to throw all students on their own resources from the commencement. This plan has worked admirably. We may be sure that what they claim to be able to do, they can actually accomplish, and that from their own initiative.

One hundred and thirty-eight students reported for art study.

On the last day of regular work, III were in their places. When we consider the number who were obliged to go home before the close of the session, the number indisposed or otherwise subject to accidental interruptions, this is a capital showing.

Every one of the students still in the school at the end attended to the examination. Such faithfulness has never occurred before.

An unusual proportion of the students were men (some of them gray-headed), though this is vulgarly supposed to be a study fit only for women. Those who worked in this department will bear me out in the statement that the director did not make this an easy affair, intended to amuse and simply adorn the enthusiasts; there was serious work undertaken.

Before closing, I wish to express my satisfaction regarding the aid given me by the assistants in my department, Misses Lucas, Graham and Hill. They have made themselves sincerely liked by the students and by the director; have worked constantly, enthusiastically and skillfully. All the details of the department were attended to at their hands, leaving the director at liberty to give all his strength to teaching.

HISTORY.

- I. UNITED STATES.
- II. SOUTH CAROLINA.

At your request two courses were conducted by me in History, one based on Lee's History of the United States, the other on Chapman's History of South Carolina. Thirty-six members were enrolled in the one and twenty-three in the other, all of whom, except a few who received honorable dismissal, completed the course with credit, and most of them with honors. After two hours in the lecture room I went to the library to direct and assist the students in parallel reading. Winthrop library, though new, is well supplied with valuable works on the history of South Carolina, and the students showed so much interest in reading and taking notes that I was generally kept busy aiding them till the dinner hour arrived. I have never seen anywhere more earnest, intelligent and enthusiastic students, and the amount of study done by a number of them was a surprise. With great ease they passed the not difficult examination set for them, and a number presented books filled with copious and intelligent notes. It is impossible to reduce to a mathematical

computation the work and the inspiration, but the effect will be seen in the school-room next year.

The Summer School as a whole was the best I have ever attended since the first in 1880. The faculty were exceptionally strong and the teachers exceptionally industrious and intelligent.

 - 4. Events occurring in South Carolina during the War of Secession.
 - 5. Describe the negro rule in South Carolina.
 - 6. What outside reading have you done?

FRYE'S GEOGRAPHY.

The importance of home Geography was stressed at first, the idea being to bring the pupil in direct contact with the things he is about to study, that he may develop his powers of observation. By studying the hills and valleys, the streams and ponds of his own neighborhood, to teach the child to construct images of the Appalachians and Rockies, the Santee and Mississippi, the Great Lakes and the ocean. This knowledge can be used as a basis of comparison in studying the Geography of other places.

How to read the maps, use the globe, and interpret the wind and rain charts were explained. "What does the physical map say?" is a question that was frequently asked and discussed.

Toward the latter part of the session there was given to the class

an imaginary country to describe, providing them with information about its latitude, surroundings and general surface, and requiring them to deduce its climate, rivers, productions, cities, etc.

Many of them did this work successfully.

Total enrolled, 74; number examined, 65.

- 6. Compare South Africa with southern South America in products and importance. Why the difference?
- 7. In general, which is the continent of tribes? of absolute monarchies? of limited monarchies? of republics?

GEOGRAPHY REPRESENTATION.

Two weeks, beginning July 10th.

In the two sections, as will be seen, thirty-eight were enrolled; and of this number thirty did satisfactory work, thirteen making ninety and above. The remaining eight took part in the work and learned how to do it; but failed on the whole or in part to do sufficient work to be regarded as satisfactory, chiefly because they already had as much other work as there was time for. In addition to the thirty-eight reported, three others began the course but stopped on account of sickness.

On the whole, results were more satisfactory than for any previous year. The time was devoted mainly to map drawing and globe making. For examination each pupil was required to submit maps of both hemispheres, and five continents and a State map. This counted for half, and a completed globe with all land areas, surface and drainage features, correctly drawn, clearly indicated and colored, made the rest of the work required. Instruction and suggestions were given with reference to the teaching of real geography, for which the foregoing is a very helpful—almost necessary—preparation. Each pupil carried maps and globe home, so that each has

not only the ideas taught but a bit of working apparatus ready for use.

The interest in the course was very gratifying and the possibilities of objective geography teaching as a stimulus to the mental work involved in the study impressed every one.

Experience leads me to believe that, with the development possible in this line of work, it is likely to reach a high degree of usefulness and popularity, and South Carolina teachers who so diligently and enthusiastically have taken hold of it in its immature stages will have much of the credit if it shall prove to be a method of real value.

PHYSICS.

(From the Announcement.)

PROFESSOR HAMMEL

Course I.—In this course special attention will be given to the construction of simple and inexpensive apparatus, illustrating experiments in air, liquids, and heat.

This course is especially planned to give all teachers an opportunity to construct apparatus for use in their own class-rooms and to be able to use the apparatus intelligently. Among a few of the pieces may be mentioned suction pump, barometer, Hero's fountain, intermittent spring, distillery, and others.

Course 2.—This course is intended for students who have taken Course I. Special attention will be given to the subjects of Magnetism and Electricity. All experiments will be illustrated by apparatus and drawings, and, whenever possible, students will construct apparatus for use in their own schools.

EDUCATIONAL MANUAL TRAINING.

(From the Announcement.)

Course I. Paper Folding and Cardboard Construction.—This course will consist of lessons in paper folding and construction in cardboard of type solids, and models based upon them. A series of models will be made by the students and outlines for additional models will be furnished. All models made by the student will become his property. This work is especially adapted to follow the kindergarten grades.

Course 2. Elementary and Advanced Knife Work.—This

course will be a continuation of Course I. Lessons will be given in Elementary and Advanced Knife Work in wood. Students make models, and enough work will be given to enable them to carry on knife work in their schools for a year at least, at very small expense.

Course 3. Bench Work in Wood.—This course is planned to follow Course 2, and is especially adapted for use in the higher grades. Various wood-working tools are used to make more difficult and complex models from a number of different kinds of wood.

The system of manual training used presents a course beginning in the third year with paper folding, followed by cardboard construction in the fourth year, elementary knife work in the fifth year, advanced knife work in the sixth year and wood sloyd in the seventh, eighth and ninth years.

MISS CARRIE P. McMAKIN.

COURSE I. This course consists of the work to be done in the first, second and third grades. The following elementary forms will first be presented to the class as to infants:

Course II. (Open to those who have finished Course I, or who successfully stand the examination for entrance.)

This course consists of all the work to be done in the fourth, fifth and sixth grades.

Sight reading, with reviews of exercises of Course I.

Dictation, as in Course I, with more difficult forms.

Songs, to be written from memory; melodies and songs to be transposed into various keys.

The subjects for discussion will be:

The child voice as found in the fourth and fifth grades.

Monotones. Falling from pitch; singing in tune.

Part songs, and part singing.

Some hints on chorus singing and conducting.

LATIN AND GREEK.

I. Beginners' Latin.—(Bain's First Latin Book.)—Forms, with translation and exercises down to the subjunctive mood. Special attention was given to the thorough knowledge and understanding of forms and the formation and to the acquirement of a vocabulary. The declensions of nouns, and adjectives and pronouns, comparisons of adjectives and adverbs, and the indicative mood, active and passive, of all conjugations save the 4th were carefully studied.

- II. SECOND YEAR LATIN.—(Collar & Daniell's First Year Latin.)—The work in Second Year Latin and in Cæsar was highly satisfactory. The teachers were earnest, interested, and showed in most instances a decided improvement. Not more than one or two at any time neglected the work. These had undertaken to carry too many courses of study. In some cases I felt called upon to advise against overwork.

In the Second Year Latin the number enrolled was ten. Of these nine stood the examination.

The work in this class was seriously interfered with by the delay of nearly a week in obtaining books.

After a rapid review through lesson XLVI in First Year Latin, the class took up the more careful study of the remaining lessons.

In connection with this there was a daily lesson in the selections for reading, beginning on page 171. Attention was paid to pronunciation, to common rules, and more obvious means of securing accurate and idiomatic translation, and to the application of principles already learned. Owing to delay above mentioned the class could not complete the selections but read to the section on Fables.

III. CAESAR AND LATIN COMPOSITION.—Text-books: New Cæsar with Vocabulary, Allen & Greenough (Ginn & Co.), or any recent edition.

Grammar: Allen & Greenough (Ginn & Co.), or Gildersleeve-Lodge (University Publishing Co.).

Jones's Latin Prose Composition, revised by Drake (Scott, Foresman & Co., Chicago).

In Cæsar the number enrolled was eleven. Of these, nine stood the examination.

The class read the Helvetian Episode of Book I. Much attention was given accurate, idiomatic translation. This involved a constant comparison of English and Latin idiom and word order.

All questions that arose were considered from the twofold view-point of teacher and student.

Pronunciation and a systematic study of principles of syntax accompanied the reading.

Owing to delay in getting book, two weeks had passed before the class took up the systematic study of composition. Meantime there was daily practice in the comparison of idiomatic English expressions with the Latin, and their translation into Latin equivalent.

The study was not restricted to translation and construction. Attention was called to the increased interest that might be aroused by a study of the life of Cæsar, of the history, geography and characteristics of the peoples and countries, of their connection with modern history, and of various points in classical antiquities. A brief Bibliography for teachers and school library was given.

Positions of words and their effect, scansion and reading in the original formed the daily work. Lectures were given on the essential characteristics of good Latin, and the differences of idiom in the two languages, with copious exercises.

COURSE OF TALKS ON TIMES AND PEOPLE OF SOUTH CAROLINA.

Began on Friday, 27th June. Over a hundred persons came in.

The talk was on the first settlement of South Carolina. The character of the emigrants and the introduction of rice by Landgrave Smith, his character and his services to South Carolina.

The introduction of indigo by Eliza Lucas; her character, marriage to Judge Pinckney, and of the character of the services of her two sons, Charles Cotesworth and Thomas Pinckney, to the nation.

Second talk on Saturday, 28th June. Subjects: Christopher Gadsden, prime mover of the Revolution. Liberty Tree. Battle of Fort Moultrie.

Quite an addition to the audience, seemed doubled.

Third talk on Tuesday, July 1st. Subjects: Women of South Carolina; Examples. Women of the Revolution; Martha Laurens Ramsey, the period after Revolution. Pamela Cunningham, before Secession, in connection with her great work of restoring Mt. Vernon.

Mrs. Snowden. Confederate Home. Calhoun Monument. Ship School.

Fourth talk on Wednesday, July 2d. Subjects: Lowndes, Cheves, Calhoun. War of 1812. National Bank. Nullification. Annexation of Texas. West Point. Ashburton Treaty.

Fifth talk on Thursday, July 3d. Subjects: Men of the Times of Nullification. Hayne, Preston, Legare, Harper, McDuffie, Perry.

Sixth talk on Friday, July 4th. Pageants of South Carolina. Subjects: Washington, Lafayette, Palmetto Regiment. Calhoun's burial. Recapitulation of progressive thought evinced by South Carolina in all branches.

Attendance full; intense interest evinced a hunger for South Carolina History. Many intelligent questions asked outside of classroom by at least fifty different teachers, men and women.

The "Talks on South Carolina" were confined to outlines of the lives of the men and women who were elements in forming, building, and sustaining the United States. As South Carolina is only a part of the whole, it was desirable to emphasize the fact that our State had been no mean factor.

The attendance was optional on the part of the teachers. In spite of three hours of obligatory work preceding the hour of the "talks," the Curry Hall, at Winthrop, was usually full. More than a hundred were always present.

The questions asked outside of the hour by the teachers, and the idea they expressed that the personal element introduced in the "talks" would be of service to them in teaching State history, was most gratifying. The interest shown was surprising as well as pleasing.

LECTURES.

- Dr. F. Simpson, a South Carolinian, now a distinguished specialist in Pittsburg, Penn., gave to men teachers six lectures dealing with the germ diseases spread by vice, and the problem of the chaste life for boys and young men.

Superintendent Lawton B. Evans, of Augusta, Ga., gave a lecture to the classes in Supervision and an evening lecture to the School.

Dr. B. F. Wilson, affectionately remembered by the teachers who attended the Summer School session at Converse last year, preached to the School on the morning and evening of the first Sunday after the opening.

COUNTY SUMMER SCHOOLS

For White Teachers.

EXTRACTS FROM REPORTS OF INSTRUCTORS.

J. D. Rast, Aiken.

It appears quite clear to us that, first of all, the sending of one man to conduct this County School for several years has done much good. The teachers came in promptly, they attended regularly, and were ready to do anything asked of them. Again, they had found out that this is a real school, and they promptly supplied themselves with the necessary books, marked their lessons each day, and prepared them before coming back the following morning. It sometimes happens that much time has to be put into teaching these things. In class, we called freely upon the oldest or the youngest teacher present to answer any question, or explain any difficulty on the board, and they responded as promptly as the best trained pupils, so far as * * * * * Hawthorne's "Wonder Book" they were able. was used in Literature, and we spent most of our time developing the thought of the writer and reproducing the story. The interest kindled in this class, especially in stories of this character, was very gratifying, and it will bear fruit this winter, for some of the teachers are already buying books for their pupils to read. Miss Graham persuaded everybody to take Drawing, and the class was soon delighted with the work.

Miss Leonora Hubbard, Anderson.

PRIMARY METHODS.—The ground covered has been as follows: First lessons in Reading, Phonics, and Writing, were given to a class of very young children who had never been to school. After each lesson discussion of the same was had. With a class of children who had completed the first grade, the first year's work was shown, giving lessons in Reading, Spelling with special attention to diacritical marks, Numbers, Geography, with lessons from Nature and Sand Moulding, Paper-folding and Primary Drawing, Writing and lessons in English. The class enrolled 49 teachers.

Miss Frances Wideman, Anderson.

Vocal Music.—The class enrolled 26 teachers. Most of my pupils did splendid work. They accomplished more than I believed possible, in a month. We studied thoroughly five keys, two of which were a review to some of the pupils. They did a great deal of individual work as well as in concert. They handed in a large amount of written music. We paid special attention to "tone quality" of voice, and to time in music. We did three hours' work in two-part Music. The class stood written examination at close.

J. Arthur Wiggins, Bamberg.

Manual Training.—Misses Florrie Brabham, Annie Riley and Kitty Hooten will teach Manual Training in this county. Miss Stella Rosborough will teach it in Fairfield County, and Mr. J. Crum Smoak in Orangeburg County. Manual Training won the entire attention of the class and all did the work required with considerable enthusiasm.

LITERATURE.—"Evangeline," "Arabian Nights," "Sketch Book," and "Wonder Book" were used. Biographical sketches and historical topics were required and a close study of the subject matter in detail was exacted. The study of these four pamphlets seems to have created a desire on the part of the class to learn more of the Literature of their country. Fine work was done by all.

Certificates should be given for one year only, and the very teachers that need Summer School training most would be forced to attend. The country schools of this county need good, energetic teachers.

L. T. Baker, Barnwell.

Owing to the interest of the County Superintendent in his campaign and in work as pastor of one or two churches, he did not take as active a part in the school as desirable.

J. Preston Allan, Berkeley.

Grammar and Composition.—There was constant daily practice on parsing and analysis, and a composition from each teacher twice a week. In addition to this, Wheeler's Graded Studies, pages 1-60, was taught in the class-room by the teacher-pupils themselves.

Ernest Cooper, Berkeley.

In teaching the Geography the comparative method was used. Each continent was compared in every particular with those previously studied. The analytic method was used in Arithmetic. Oral and written analysis was required. Explicit explanations were insisted upon.

W. H. Hand, Charleston.

Since those who attend the Summer Schools belong to the higher order of teachers of the respective counties, it seems to me that these men and women are now ready to do more advanced study. It was entirely proper that the past four years should be devoted to the study of elementary branches, but now the teachers should be encouraged to go higher. However loyal and progressive a set of teachers may be, they dislike to be carried over the same work year after year.

D. D. Wallace, Charleston.

The character of work done by the teachers in Charleston was much above the average. It was much superior to the work done for me in Grammar there two years ago.

W. G. Blake, Cherokee.

In Geography I emphasized the necessity of careful preparation of each lesson on the part of teachers before appearing before their classes. Occasionally I had some teacher take charge of the class and conduct the lesson for a part of the hour. This gave variety, revealed individuality, carried with it useful suggestion, and was instructive to all. I tried to stress the importance of illustration by object lessons from material at hand, and the value of an occasional walk with pupils into the country for the purpose of making real and tangible their work, and of developing their observational faculties.

S. W. Reaves, Chester.

The Summer School opened in the Chester Graded School building with 20 pupils in attendance. The next day the number was increased to 27 and in a few days to 35. On the third day of school it was found that the class was too large to be taught in one section. By this time I knew the pupils well enough to pick out those that

were best prepared. The school was accordingly divided into two sections of equal sizes, the better prepared pupils being kept together.

This division into sections, which, after all, was only grading the school, proved of the greatest advantage. The average member of Section A would have been unable to keep up with the work of Section B, while the average member of Section B would have been greatly bored by the slow progress and careful drilling which characterized the work of Section A.

Mr. Verner required themes or compositions of the class almost daily, and afterwards went over the exercises with the class, pointing out the errors. I think the teachers here have done more than the usual amount of composition work, and in a very satisfactory manner.

W. H. Verner, Chester.

With some students the work in Literature and Composition was far better than that in Grammar; but in the majority of cases the Grammar work was the more satisfactory of the two. This I attribute to the fact that most of the students had never studied Literature and Composition as such; and hence I am led to the conclusion that there is no more important and better way of teaching English than by abundance of written work, and constant reading and studying our best writers.

Mrs. Ellen Stanley Watkins, Chesterfield.

LITERATURE.—"Aladdin" was the first story read. Primarily the reading was for vocal expression; however, finding that the class knew but little of the history of the East, we spent a short while in discussing the religions of China, Chaldea, India, Egypt and Arabia, and studying the growth and influence of Mohammedanism. Oral reproduction of the story was the main feature of the study. The second book was Hawthorne's "Wonder Book." The life of Hawthorne was taken up first, and it was found necessary to study many words used in the biographical sketch. Incidentally some of the events of his life were connected with periods and events in the history of the United States. The mythology underlying these stories was thoroughly discussed, for many of the characters alluded to were

unknown to the majority of the class. A sketch was written on "The Three Golden Apples," and an outline of the story made.

Longfellow's "Evangeline" being taken up, a careful and thorough study was made of this story; words, references, allusions were looked up; figures, comparisons, strange scenes and customs, life studies, historical events were discussed; beautiful thoughts and lessons noted, and lovely passages memorized; besides compositions, consisting of narrative and description, written. A suggestive course for actual use in the school room was carefully prepared and a copy given each teacher-pupil. The class was taught something of meter and given practice in scanning.

Manual Training.—The entire course in Paper Folding and Cardboard Construction was completed, each pupil making the full set, besides many supplementary and several original models. The drill in this work was just what the pupils themselves needed, accuracy and neatness being insisted upon.

The teacher-pupils were for the most part enthusiastic over their work and hoped to make use of the training received in their own school rooms.

Many of the original models showed taste and skill by the way they were constructed from those given in the regular course, each one being designed to serve some practical purpose.

If for any cause a pupil was absent from the class, the work was made up in the afternoon.

G. T. Pugh, Clarendon.

To show one phase of the value of the training received in the Summer School, we wish to call attention to the fact that two promising teachers, who had been teaching for three or four years on second grade certificates, determined, by hard work at the Summer School, to get ready for first grade certificates, and had the good fortune to see their efforts meet with success.

Miss Callie C. Simons, Colleton.

Part I, Wheeler's Graded Studies in English. Required teachers to do the written work.

Also gave few outlines for celebrating birthdays of great Americans, American authors, particularly Southern authors.

SIGHT SINGING.—Scale as a song. Syllables. Scale with syllables. Practice on ear training and breathing. Two-, three- and four-part measures. Simple songs with numbers. Whole of Chart Series A (Ripley & Tapper). Simple dictation work.

H. A. C. Walker, Dorchester.

In Arithmetic I found that very few had ever studied the subject as a science—they had used mechanical methods and rules.

The result was indeed gratifying, as shown in examination papers. In Grammar, we studied Wheeler entirely from the teacher's standpoint—how to present the subject to children. Composition work was included. This was a success.

The Literature work was delightful. The teachers manifested great interest and seemed to enjoy the course thoroughly. We studied "Legend of Sleepy Hollow," "Christmas Carol," selections from Longfellow, "Wonder Book." After a careful study of each piece of literature—which included search for all historical or literary allusions, thought, images, descriptions, characters—the life and work of the author were discussed, teachers consulting all possible sources for information.

In addition, the general subject of teaching Reading in the schools was discussed, with the end in view of making intelligent, appreciative readers of pupils and creating a love for good literature.

In conclusion, we discussed in an informal manner some practical school questions—keeping of registers, arranging of classes, course of study, and improvement of school buildings.

All the teachers, with one or two exceptions, did earnest, faithful work and showed marked growth. It was indeed gratifying to see the improvement in teachers who have been attending Summer Schools for the last few years. The good results are apparent to a most casual observer.

E. C. Coker, Edgefield.

As a means of teaching the correct keeping of school registers, each teacher was supplied with a register, in which he was required to enter the names of all the attendants. Absences and tardies and excuses were noted and recorded every day by each teacher just as in the public schools. These registers were examined from time to time by the instructor, errors marked and teachers required to correct them. At the end of the first 20 days, the teachers made out re-

ports on blanks for teachers' monthly reports. These were handed in with the registers and looked over by the instructor.

One period was devoted to a discussion of grading and the use of the Course of Study outlined by the State Board of Education.

In English Grammar, Part I of Buehler's Grammar was completed. Nearly every sentence in the exercises was discussed in class. Several written exercises were required. Two compositions were handed in, carefully corrected, returned to teachers, and thoroughly discussed in class. The results of the composition work were good, though more practice should have been given.

The classics used in the Literature course were "Evangeline," "Wonder Book," "Arabian Nights," "Sketch Book." "Evangeline" and the "Sketch Book" received most attention. Outlines of parts of "Evangeline" were made and of several of the Sketches from Irving. Two written reviews were held. Pupils read orally every day, and faulty pronunciation was corrected.

E. L. Hughes, Greenville.

This place was selected with a view to getting a larger attendance of country teachers. The result looked for was secured so far as the teachers of the upper section of the county were concerned. Very few from the lower part of the county attended. The attendance was quite good, however, in point of numbers and personnel, and the work done was highly encouraging. The school was remarkable for the large proportion of earnest, intelligent young men in attendance. The North Greenville High School found excellent material here to work upon and has developed it to a commendable degree.

* * * * * * * * * * *

Besides the regular work, several interesting features such as characterize a well conducted school were put into the daily program; and evening lectures and entertainments were given twice a week, which were well attended by the teachers and the people of the community.

* * * * * * * * * * * *

The school was delighted with Miss Withers's course in Primary Methods and much benefited likewise. Prof. Wauchope's English course was just what was needed. He did excellent, practical work in an inspiring and suggestive way.

G. A. Wauchope, Greenville.

English.—Several talks supplementary to Miss Withers's work on methods of teaching language in the lower grades were given. I found the class, with a few exceptions, surprisingly well informed in Grammar. This was explained when I learned that several had been in college and most of the others had attended the North Greenville High School, which is doing a great work educationally for that whole section of country.

LITERATURE.—Thirty-seven teachers did the work assigned in Literature, 30 standing the examination. At first the majority showed a positive ignorance of the subject and indifference to it, also an unwillingness to provide themselves with the necessary texts. During the last two weeks, however, a gratifying interest, amounting in some cases to enthusiasm, was manifested. I had the satisfaction of seeing a love of Literature and an appreciation of its beauty and value awakened in many of the teachers. Methods of teaching Reading, with reference to Johnson's Fourth and Fifth Readers, were discussed for a few days. Then about a week each was spent in the study, by topical analysis, of Longfellow's "Courtship of Miles Standish," Emerson's "American Scholar," and Shakespeare's "Merchant of Venice." I would urge that more attention be given by instructors to this important subject in the Summer Schools. There is need to impress upon our teachers the necessity of having good libraries in their schools, and of instilling into the children a genuine love of good books, which, if accomplished, will alone insure a considerable degree of culture.

Composition.—This work was emphasized, about half an hour daily being occupied in reading and criticizing the themes. Forty-two took the course and a daily theme was required of each. These were carefully corrected with blue pencil and returned. The work included observation themes, sketches of character, reproductions, themes of reflection and short stories. Several themes were read in class each day, and grammatical and rhetorical errors commented on. The quality of the work improved rapidly, and the interest was most encouraging.

E. C. Coker, Greenwood.

Objects were freely used as a means of gaining a clear grasp of the meaning of fractions and of fractional processes. The class was persistently drilled in analysis of problems involving fractions.

In English Grammar, attention was confined to Part I of Buehler's Grammar. All the sentences given in the exercises were carefully examined in class. Frequent written exercises were required.

Four compositions were handed in by the teacher-pupils. These were looked over, mistakes were marked and pupils asked to correct them in class.

Harriet S. Goldsmith, Greenwood.

LITERATURE.—As the art of reading has been much neglected, I stressed reading aloud, with correct enunciation, pronunciation and expression; we made a study of character, style, language and plot. Excellent papers were prepared, and the discussions in class were helpful and inspiring.

Manual Training.—With an enrolment of 31 and an average attendance of about 20, the class in Manual Training has completed the prescribed courses in Paper Folding and in Cardboard Construction. They have done excellent work and have shown marked intelligence. The models compare favorably with those of Prof. Hammel's pupils at the State Summer School, and some of them cannot be improved on. The teachers have been industrious, enthusiastic and painstaking. On the last day of school there was a creditable exhibit of models and note-books. I cannot commend these teachers too highly, as a class, for their faithful work.

Ernest Wiggins, Hampton.

In Geography the class was given a course in map-drawing in addition to the regular text-books used. Three large relief maps were made with the help of the class; besides, each teacher made a relief map of South Carolina. This gave them a more vivid conception of what we taught in Slopes, Drainage, Soils, Climate and Productions.

ARITHMETIC.—The introduction of this study was a very wise one, for in such simple parts as notation, common and decimal fractions, the knowledge of the teachers seemed vague. Most of the teachers had been taught to "figure," and not to solve examples by successive steps of logic, of reasoning.

Miss Sarah I. Grant, Hampton.

Wheeler's Graded Lessons in English was studied through modifications of the noun. Most of the instruction given had to be of the same character as that given to a class of children, for several members of the class had scarcely any previous knowledge of the subject. It would have been possible to have done more but for these backward ones.

LITERATURE.—Hawthorne's "Wonder Book," Longfellow's "Evangeline," and Dickens's "Christmas Carol" were studied. To most of the class these three books were entirely new. It is hoped that interest enough was aroused to make them read and study other works by these authors.

H. A. C. Walker, Horry.

As is usual in Horry County, the large majority of the teacherpupils were men. A good number of these were men with families and with other interests—carrying teaching as a side line. Consequently, our work was considerably interrupted by the absence of such members, especially on Saturdays, who were compelled to be at home once a week to look after their domestic affairs.

Miss Elizabeth W. McLean, Horry.

A great effort was made to interest the teachers in reading, and in school libraries. It is probable that the members of the County Teachers' Association will, during the coming year, establish a small circulating library for their own use and that of their pupils, and they intend also to pursue a definite course of study.

L. T. Baker, Lancaster.

Instruction on the use of the Course of Study, keeping of records, making reports, etc., was given.

The County Board of Education assisted each teacher of the county to the extent of defraying expenses of board and lodging.

B. L. Jones, Laurens.

GEOGRAPHY.—We believe some good was accomplished in teaching how Frye's Geographies are to be used.

CONSTRUCTIVE GEOGRAPHY.—This was optional with the class, but a large number took the course. "Hughes's Complete Course" was followed, and maps galore, relief maps and globes followed. The class worked faithfully both an hour before and an hour after the regular session.

Miss Elizabeth W. McLean, Laurens.

In Primary Methods the subjects taken up were Reading, Number, Language, Spelling, Geography, Literature, and Nature Study.

Thos. A. Sharpe, Marlboro.

A considerable portion of the time was given to practice work in teaching, with criticisms of the same, and the result of this was a very decided improvement in the methods employed by the teachers. By requiring the students to do actual teaching they also gained a much more thorough knowledge of the subjects taught than could have been acquired by the ordinary methods of instruction.

There is a very noticeable improvement in the class of teachers now attending the Summer Schools, and I believe that a few more years of this work will completely revolutionize the teaching force of the State. The Summer School system is certainly doing more to solve the problem of incompetent teachers than any other agency heretofore employed.

D. D. Wallace, Newberry.

HIGHER WORK.—Allow me to suggest that the work in the County Schools might now be made more progressive towards a higher scholarship. A number of teachers have now for several years received instruction upon the school text-books. More advanced courses in Literature, Grammar, History, Mathematics, might be provided for these teachers, and the more elementary work continued for new or ill-prepared attendants. It cannot be doubted that the great body of our teachers need a wider intellectual outlook, a fuller mental equipment, and a firmer grasp upon educational material. To provide themselves with these qualifications is particularly their duty towards the older boys and girls of the State. Only so can teachers become strong enough to impart inspiration to vigorous young minds and so secure the interest and attendance of mature boys and girls.

TRUSTEE DAY.—We advertised the third Monday of the school as Trustee Day, and urged all trustees and patrons to attend. Seven trustees responded. Regular classwork was continued, to show the visitors the nature (and, possibly, in a gentle way, the need) of the work we were doing. An hour was devoted especially to the trustees. The principal gave a talk explaining the work, and designed in part to meet some objections and doubts which have been expressed regarding Summer Schools. The trustees joined in the informal discussion of some questions, and explained some difficulties they have to deal with. Some of those who came critical declared that they went away pleased. With proper preparation, Trustee Day can, I believe, be productive of much good, with practically no loss of time from recitations.

South Carolina History.—The instructor gave a course of lectures upon South Carolina History in some of its industrial, political and social phases, and gave also a practical course in the drawing of maps of the State illustrating its history. The class were taught, from models on the board, to draw an Indian map; a map of the first judicial districts (1769); of the division of the State into counties (1785); of the parishes and districts of 1860.

H. B. Dominick, Pickens.

Doubtless the largest and perhaps the most successful Summer School for Teachers ever held in Pickens County has just closed. Fifty-one teacher-pupils were enrolled and 34 remained through the session and stood the examinations. Several others would have stayed until the close if their school trustees had not required them to begin work. The success of this school should not be attributed to the instructors alone; for they feel that they have reaped a harvest from seed which was sown by abler and more worthy instructors and diligently cultivated by the efficient County Superintendent and his "Summer School Extension." The interest and enthusiasm manifested by the leading teachers of the county is evidence of the growing popularity of the County Summer School. Several teachers in this county have been attending the Summer School every year.

In order to better enable this school to supply the demands of the teachers of the county, round-table talks were held on Tuesdays and Fridays of each week from 4 to 5 o'clock. Almost every teacher was present at every round-table talk, although attendance was not com-

pulsory. At these meetings the "keeping of registers," and "making of reports" to County and State Superintendents of Education, were illustrated, discussed and emphasized. Many practical questions pertaining to the schools of the county were informally discussed, common faults and mistakes in teaching and disciplining a school, were pointed out, and efforts were made to impress the teacher-pupils with the many advantages of good methods in teaching and school management.

The trouble in Algebra is due to the fact that many teachers have never had an opportunity to do thorough work in Algebra as they have received their preparation in the common schools of the county. This difficulty in Algebra explains why so many teachers in this county hold Second Grade certificates.

E. B. Wallace, Richland.

A good many had not secured positions up to the time the Summer School met, but nearly all of them secured schools before it closed, which fact shows the value of such training in the minds of the public.

This county has taken the position that all teachers should be assisted in preparing themselves for the very difficult work of teaching, and, therefore, helps to pay their expenses at Summer Schools.

E. C. McCants, Saluda.

Frye's Introductory Geography was completed. Teachers made many complaints as to the "unteachableness" of the book, due, no doubt, to lack of knowledge of the modern methods of teaching Geography. As far as he was able the instructor made suggestions as to the manner of presenting the work to children, and he hopes that some, at least, of the seed may have fallen on "good ground."

Miss M. Elizabeth Falls, Saluda.

English.—Suggestions were given the teachers as to how to use the available literature, in the readers, how to use that given in Wheeler, and also how to correlate the Literature and Compositionwriting with the other school work.

PRIMARY METHODS.—According to instructions, I secured a class

of children on the first day and kept them through the school, except for the last few days. I prepared a class of beginners for the book. Quite a number of illustrative lessons were given in number, ranging from the first through the third grade.

Illustrated lessons in Language were given to show preparation in lower grades for Wheeler.

Suggestions about grading the schools were made; especially were the teachers advised to group the classes in some of the work.

Frank Evans, Spartanburg.

It is suggested that next year the County Summer School be held at Landrum, where the climate is delightful and good board can be had cheap.

A. G. Rembert, Spartanburg.

LITERATURE.—Whenever possible attention was called to the close relation of Literature to life, of its possible and varied influence upon the ideals and life of a person and a community, and of the power for good in the reading habit. In this connection, the teachers were urged to encourage in every way the forming of libraries in the school and the individual home.

In short, while the chief object of the course was kept ever in view, no opportunity was lost to magnify and emphasize the responsibility and opportunity of the teacher as the culture-leader of the country community.

S. H. Edmunds, Sumter.

I wish to emphasize that by means of a printed circular issued a month before school began, giving an outline of the work and the text-books required, very much time was saved, so that within an hour after the period of opening on the first day, the school was engaged in actual class-room work.

SINGING.—The teaching was purely practical, theory being only touched upon in so far as was necessary. As the result of the work done in this department most of the teachers will be able to conduct classes of sight-singing in their schools next year.

In conclusion it is but just that I should acknowledge that much of the success of the school is due to the active and intelligent cooperation of the County Superintendent of Education, Mr. W. P. Baskin.

John E. Carroll, York.

Twenty-four had not secured positions at the time Summer School opened, but before the close they had almost without exception been located for the next session.

To one who has been closely associated with the Summer School in this county for the past three years it is a source of gratification to note the greatly increased efficiency of our teaching force as a whole. The result to our teachers is a unity of purpose and method, an increase in intelligence and enthusiasm, and a general uplifting of the professional standard which augurs well for the future of our educational interests.

John C. Daniel, York.

The students were required to write five compositions each, making a total of 215. These were all carefully corrected and criticized, and handed back to the writers. These were based on Wheeler's Graded Studies in English. Talks were given on correct composition writing, and its importance to the schools.

From one county the principal reports:

We found a sad state of ignorance existing among the teachers as a whole—although a large part of the members of the school were young people wanting to teach, with no previous experience. More than half of those in attendance would find it hard work to keep up in the fifth or sixth grade of our average graded schools.

There were teachers, however, holding certificates, who were densely ignorant, as you may judge for yourself by examining the enclosed section of an examination paper by such a person. The door to the teaching profession must be more carefully guarded by our County Boards and other proper authorities. No wonder the profession is looked down upon and people neglect opportunities of education, when they see such a specimen and take him as a type!

May I give you a sample? A teacher "declined" the noun "wo-man" thus: Nominative, woman; possessive, lady; objective, women! I "waived him down" here, and am glad to say there were

many others in the class who blushed for him and made the proper corrections.

We used our most earnest efforts to discourage all such from attempting to teach at present; we urged them all to study and grow, and received the assurance from several worthy young men that they had finally determined to work their way through college. We tried to kill out the pernicious motive of teaching for money simply, and tried earnestly to inspire all with nobler conceptions of the work and loftier aspirations in life. I hope and believe that in some measure we succeeded in this.

One encouraging fact I am glad to be able to report: The members, almost without an exception, appreciated the opportunity and tried to make good use of it. They attended, not simply to get certificates renewed, but because they were hungry for more knowledge. I have never seen a body of teachers who seemed to value more highly the efforts put forth for their benefit. They actually were talking of running the school a second month next year by private subscriptions. This shows their earnestness.

The teachers took a lively interest in the literature work and seemed really delighted with it. Very few had any acquaintance with authors or books. I urged them to read more and to do so in a systematic manner, giving them some idea as to what to read, where it can be bought, and at what price. I also tried to show how the regular work of reading in the school readers should be conducted, so as to interest pupils, introduce them to literature, and create a love and desire for good reading. It is a well proven fact that the poor progress and apparent lack of brains of so many pupils in the higher grades is due altogether to their inability to understand and comprehend the ideas represented in the printed page; and this, in turn, is due to poor training in reading in the lower grades.

The assistant says:

In this county, as in many others, numbers of the teachers lack even a common school education. Several have expressed their determination to go off to school in the near future. * * *

The teacher of Literature and Composition in another County School reports:

The class was somewhat deficient in general knowledge, and, in some instances, slow to take advantage of this opportunity for improvement. The spelling was very poor and logical arrangement in the composition work of many was sadly wanting.

COUNTY SUMMER SCHOOLS

For Negro Teachers.

EXTRACTS FROM REPORTS OF INSTRUCTORS.

F. A. Peters, Aiken.

We are sorry to say that we find in this part of the State what is found in other parts and what we regard as being a bad thing—the "sub-trustee system." In many places the selecting of teachers for colored schools is largely left in the hands of a set of sub-trustees,† or people who are least fit of all people to select teachers.

I think that if the trustees in their meetings would select their teachers from a point of fitness and qualification, they would largely do away with one of the worst evils now connected with many colored schools.

W. H. Stinson, Beaufort.

When the Superintendent first announced the books to be taught in the Summer Schools this year, I was very much disappointed, because I felt the books entirely too elementary for our teachers here, at least. But soon after the school had begun, I found that a better selection and assignment could not have been made and I soon proved it to all the teachers placed under me.

Sentences, with such grammatical errors as were made every day in recitation, at recess, or in daily conversation, were gathered and written on the board each day, by me, for correction, that the teachers might become more careful of their language.

Nature Study or Farming.—At recess, I taught a small class in Nature Study or Farming.

While we had the class only two weeks, and I cannot say that the study was matured in the slightest degree, I feel that many lasting seeds for intelligent farming were planted.

I found the school in Beaufort far superior to the Brunson school. The results of last summer and winter can be seen here; besides, many of the teachers here have had better advantages.

W. F. Holmes, Charleston.

Compositions were regularly required to be handed in for correction; the papers were then returned to the teachers and required to be rewritten. As a part of the examination in English, each teacher was required to write a paper on the subject: "Our Summer School."

During the session Professor Hand of Chester and Professor Wallace of Wofford College delivered excellent addresses to the teachers. Too much cannot be said of the interest taken in the school by County Superintendent Milligan.

Talks on school management, proper keeping of records, features of the school law, were made from time to time.

Many complaints were made by teachers as to the uncertainty of their tenure. Several said they could not feel sure of having a school until they have actually commenced to teach. Much of this trouble grows out of the reprehensible practice some teachers have of applying for, and offering to teach for less money, schools which they know others to have taught the previous term. In most cases the school is "knocked down to the lowest bidder."

Mrs. Mary Deas Mancebo, Charleston.

Johnson's Reader was used as a text-book, but as the majority of the students were high school graduates† it was possible to require them to do much work outside of the text.

The Geography work was most helpful to the teachers, as they all said that they had failed in their work the preceding year because they did not know how to teach Frye's Geography. Under the circumstances the choice of the primary book was particularly wise, as it is the only text-book used in the county‡ schools.

A weather record for the month was kept, and each teacher made a set of pulp relief maps. The teachers took pride in making these because they wished to use them in their schools during the coming year. Indeed, they seemed anxious to do well everything undertaken in the Summer School for the improvement of their schools the next year.

J. L. Cain, Darlington.

By an experiment I found that best results are to be obtained by supplying the pupils of the Summer School with regular common school registers, and have them keep data for Summer School much as they do for a regular school, and make out reports from these data—the instructor explaining the work and supervising the keeping of registers and the preparation of reports from them.

THE COURSE AND GRADING.—Directions along this line were followed. We explained why it was best in the lower grades to use Reading as a test for classification, taking in Arithmetic as we advance in grades. It might be well to prepare registers so that pupils can be enrolled by grades, and a place where teachers might enter the point reached by each grade in any text at close of school year.

J. E. Wallace, Georgetown.

At Georgetown there were but 15 men enrolled. Heretofore the males enrolled made a better showing. The falling off is due to the low salaries and short terms. With the exception of the teachers in the Georgetown City School the brightest young men are quitting the work of the teacher and are going into the trades or other business more profitable and more secure. In the great lumber mills at Georgetown they can make from \$1.50 to \$2.50 a day, six days in the week and almost every week in the year. Unless the school work is to be given over entirely to the women, compensation for the men must be increased and schools for six or seven months assured. The same conditions obtained at the Richland School, where but 13 men were enrolled out of an enrolment of 72. Are the schools to be for the women teachers only? So long as our boys are to be trained, should not their training in the more advanced work be under the supervision of thoroughly competent men? Can the services of the proper men be secured at such a wretched pittance as is given in most of our schools?

* * * * * * * * * *

Many teachers failed to attend on account of a diffidence to mingle with brighter minds. It is the opinion of all the Summer School instructors that the best equipped and most intelligent teachers attend most promptly and regularly the sessions of the school. They participate in all discussions and are especially helpful to the instructors. It is to be hoped that the authorities will show their appreciation of the services of these teachers when the time comes for the distribution of the schools.

J. B. Beck, Greenwood.

We gave talks on "school grading" and were glad to find that most of the teachers had, in a measure, graded their schools.

At the suggestion of Superintendent Coker, of the Greenwood City Schools, I had about 20 registers kept by the different teachers, which proved an excellent drill on the subject of keeping registers. In addition to this we had a blackboard drill on "keeping roll" and making monthly reports.

I distributed among the teachers 20 copies of the Course of Study, these being all I could secure at the time.

I have never witnessed more real interest than was shown by these teachers. Many came five and ten miles daily, and were present regularly and punctually.

W. H. Stinson, Hampton.

The school was very much smaller than I expected. After being there two weeks or more I learned what I call a reason for it. The white people there, I understand, oppose Summer Schools and Teachers' Institutes among themselves, as well as among the colored; hence, tell the colored teachers they need not attend Summer Schools to get a school to teach. And, as it is much easier to get a thing without working for it than by working for it, a large percentage stay away. Again, while many of the teachers I met in Brunson say they have attended some college or high school, they show, as a whole, that they have been very poorly prepared, and some of them show no preparation at all.

Much stress was laid upon the teacher's thoroughly preparing himself on the lessons that he might not be stumbling, but rather be an inspiration to his pupils.

C. C. Scott, Kershaw.

The total enrolment was 65. I dropped from the roll those who attended but a few days and quit, those who attended indifferently, and those who were not teachers and did not intend to teach.

Dozier W. Davis, Lancaster.

The subjects selected were the right ones, and well suited to that class of teachers who usually attend the County Normals.

Thos. Sanders, Laurens.

If such were possible, it would be a blessing to my race, as well as the State generally, if the money to be expended in the public schools for the colored children of Laurens County the ensuing year could be spent upon the colored teachers, by having them in just such a school as we have had for the past month, for an entire session of nine months. It is true, the pupils of the county would be deprived of a school for one session, but it would be far better thus than to be dragged along, year in and year out, by incompetent teachers. Then, too, I think there would be nothing amiss if there were a negro agent, or commissioner (under the supervision of the State Superintendent, of course) appointed to visit the colored schools of the State (I mean the rural schools, most especially), and to see just the status of the work that is actually being done by us, and to assist in the work by giving ideas and other necessary information to such of us as may need it. This may seem to be idle talk, and while such a scheme is impossible now, it will truly cost us nothing much to think the matter over. I am very much encouraged at the manner in which our teachers attended the school, as fully twothirds of them went and came daily a distance of from five to fifteen miles, and were not five minutes late. We opened at 9 a. m. strictly, and closed at 1.15 p. m., with 15 minutes intermission daily.

Thos. Sanders, Oconee.

Our mode of instruction was by question and answer as you advised, and by asking each teacher to teach the class the lesson just as he or she would teach the pupils in school. We used this method throughout each recitation. By such method we could very easily judge the teacher's methods of explanation, etc., etc., in the school-room. Such a method caused all to take especial pains in preparing recitations at home, as we could see the improvement made as the work progressed from day to day.

* * * * * * * * * * *

These schools are, too, much better tests of a teacher's ability and methods than a county examination. When a teacher is asked, in

a Summer School, to teach such and such problem, etc., etc., he has no chance to copy,† but must face the issue or fail.

* * * * * * * * * * *

We had teachers in our school whose ages ranged all the way from 18 to 60 years, and from the oldest to the youngest, they labored as though for a wager.

I have excused all absences and tardies, for the simple reason that the parties lived from two and one-half to five miles and went and came each day. Several, too, begged to stop at least two or three days to finish their crops, not having means to hire it done.

W. T. Andrews, Orangeburg.

I found the same deficiency‡ in analytical work in Arithmetic and gave special attention to that feature, and was pleased to observe that the teachers were eager to drop the former method of memorizing rules and rely upon their reasoning power. The class advanced through percentage.

J. E. Wallace, Richland.

Talks on school organization and management were given as often as the time would permit. The "ideal teacher" was constantly held up to their vision. They were counseled not only to know thoroughly what they would be required to teach, but to know well the parents and patrons, the community—to mingle frequently with the people—to know them and to be known by them; their influence to be felt for the good of the school.

To School Officers, Teachers and Children:

The women of the Southern Memorial Association are raising money to build at Richmond a monument to Jefferson Davis, the President of the Confederate States of America. This will be a monument not only to the dead statesman but also to the Lost Cause, for which the South so bravely fought, and which she will ever hold in sacred memory. It is a fitting sentiment that the children of the South, and especially of South Carolina, should aid in the building of this monument. For this reason each will wish to give something, if but 5 cents or 1 cent. The object is not to raise much money from the children, but to let them have a share and an interest in the monument.

In this connection the children should be instructed in the story of the Confederacy and of the men who fought her battles and made her undying glory. Poems and songs of the war, showing the spirit of the South, should be taught to the children and by them presented to the public. These will wake in us ennobling emotions of pleasure and pride in the worth of our fathers and a deeper sense of our duty to be noble ourselves and to preserve the high honor of the South as did the noble men who have gone before us. As much of the material that should be used is now, unfortunately, little known and not readily accessible in books, a full program is here published. This pamphlet should be kept and its contents taught to the children each year. These songs and verses should be made familiar to every child in South Carolina, and with variations in other parts of the program should be used for a public occasion every year. South Carolina would not be South Carolina if we let these memories die. To neglect this instruction is a wrong not only to the past but to the future. The children have a right to know and enjoy the riches of their heritage of patriotism and heroism. Fill their young minds with such thoughts and their lives will be nobler and the future of the State will be secure.

The women of South Carolina many years ago erected a monument to the Confederate dead of our State and put on it the promise that our children shall not forget these men. Every child in South Carolina should know these words and do his part to keep them true:

"This monument perpetuates the memory of those who, true to the instincts of their birth, faithful to the teachings of their fathers, constant in their love for the State, died in the performance of their duty; who have glorified a fallen cause by the simple manhood of their lives, the patient endurance of suffering, and the heroism of death, and who, in the dark hours of imprisonment, in the hopelessness of the hospital, in the short, sharp agony of the field, found support and consolation in the belief that at home they would not be forgotten.

"Let the South Carolinian of another generation remember that the State taught them how to live and how to die, and that from her broken fortunes she has preserved for her children the priceless treasure of their memories, teaching all who may claim the same birthright that truth, courage and patriotism endure forever."

Each school will choose for itself the time for these exercises. Many schools may select their closing day. The day suggested for town schools and others that will still be in session is Memorial Day, the 10th of May, or the 9th of May, as the 10th this year will be Saturday.

Schools that have already closed or will not have time now to prepare for these exercises this session should have them next session and take up contributions then. It is hoped that during this spring and next fall every school for white children in the State, whether public or private, will give its pupils an opportunity to make an offering for the Davis monument and to live for a while in the company of the heroes of the Southern Confederacy.

JEFFERSON DAVIS.

On June 3, 1808, in Todd County, Kentucky, was
Youth. born Jefferson Davis. It is a remarkable coincidence
that Jefferson Davis and Abraham Lincoln were born
in the same State. Davis's parents, however, moved to Mississippi when
he was very young, and this is the State he served when he became a
man.

FIRST
MARRIAGE.

After graduating at West Point he did good service
as a lieutenant in the Black Hawk war. It was
during this war that he mer the daughter of Gen.
Zachary Taylor, whom he afterwards married without her father's consent. He incurred Gen. Taylor's displeasure by daring to vote against
him in a council, and for several years the general refused to speak to

him. The two were reconciled, however, not very long after the death of Mr. Davis's young wife, and during the Mexican War became fast friends.

As a PLANTER.

Upon his marriage, Mr. Davis resigned his position in the army, and returned to Mississippi to become a cotton planter. At Briarfield, his plantation, he was very happy, improving his land, raising fine horses and cows, building, planting trees and roses, and caring for his servants. He was a kind master, and was much beloved by his slaves, many of whom were faithful in affection until his death. Mr. Davis devoted much of his time during this period of his life to reading and study, and when he came out of his retirement he was well equipped for public life. Few men had his broad culture and were so well versed in political history and economy.

As a Mr. Davis was several times in Congress. He reCONGRESSMAN signed once to enter the Mexican War, having been
AND SENATOR. elected colonel of the Mississippi Volunteers, once
to become a candidate for Governor of Mississippi, and again when his
State seceded from the Union. When he made his first speech in Congress, John Quincy Adams said of him: "That young man is no ordinary man. He will make his mark yet, mind me." Upon Davis fell
the mantle of Calhoun, and from 1850 to 1861 he stands out as the leader
of his party in its struggle for State rights.

Mr. Davis was a handsome man, with a piercing but kindly eye and a distinguished bearing—a typical representative of the chivalry of the South.

IN THE MEXICAN WAR.

After the battle of Monterey, in the Mexican War, Gen. Taylor, who was in command of the Americans, commended Davis for gallantry in battle, and appointed him one of the commissioners to arrange for the surrender of the city.

At Buena Vista the Americans were about to be overcome by the Mexican cavalry, when Col. Davis threw his Mississippi Rifles into the form of a V, with the opening toward the enemy. As the Mexicans advanced the Mississippians poured a covering cross-fire upon them, and saved the day. Though seriously wounded in his right foot, Col. Davis remained on the field all day. It was reported that he was mortally wounded. Gen. Taylor was much distressed; he went to Davis's tent that night, and expressed the warmest admiration for his conduct in battle and the deepest regret at his suffering. The wound was painful for many years. For his coolness and gallantry, President Polk appointed him brigadier-general. This office he declined, saying that according to the constitution only a State had a right to appoint a general of volunteers. This incident illustrates Davis's loyalty to the principle of State Rights.

As Secretary of War. To the War Department was assigned the work of bringing a supply of water to the city of Washington. A few miles out from the city stands a stone aqueduct called "Cabin-John Bridge," which was built during his term of office. It has a span of 220 feet, at one time the longest in the world. Upon its arch, cut deeply in the rock, was the name of Jefferson Davis. During the Confederate War the Secretary of War or the Secretary of the Interior caused the name to be erased. But the erasure is more conspicuous than was the name. Always exciting the curiosity of visitors, it but adds to the fame of the builder.

As President When Mississippi seceded in 1861, Davis resigned his of the Confederate seat in the Senate and was made commander-in-chief at States. of the army of his State. He preferred to be a general and share in the dangers of battle, but he submitted to the will of the Confederate Congress, which unanimously elected him President of the Confederate States. He was at home on his plantation when the news of his election was received. He left immediately for Montgomery to be inaugurated. His journey was a continuous ovation. When the capital of the Confederacy was changed from Montgomery to Richmond, the people of Richmond bought one of the handsomest houses in the city and placed it at the disposal of Mr. Davis. It is now used as a museum for Confederate relics.

Early in the War President Lincoln declared that the crews of Confederate privateers should be hanged as pirates. Fourteen prisoners had been taken already. President Davis immediately ordered fourteen Union prisoners, selected by lot, to be held as hostages for the safety of these Confederates. The government of the United States soon arranged to treat all such captives as prisoners of war.

As A PRISONER.

Just before the surrender of Richmond, in April, 1865, President Davis left with his cabinet. He was overtaken and captured near Irwinsville, Georgia, May 10. His enemies have told many stories of his being disguised as a woman when he was captured, but these are untrue. He was taken to Fortress Monroe and imprisoned there for two years. His sufferings there as the "nation's prisoner" did more than all his services to endear him to his people. He thus described his treatment by Gen. Miles:

"I was, when brought to the fortress, not only strictly confined in a casemate, which was little more than a dungeon, but I was heavily ironed. As I had been a submissive prisoner, and was in a strong fortress, I thought that chains were unnecessary and that I ought not to be subjected to them. I resisted being shackled, but resistance was vain. I was thrown violently upon the floor, and heavily fettered. This was not all: the casemate in which I was confined was kept constantly and brilliantly lighted, and I was never relieved of the presence of a couple

of soldiers. My eyes were weak and sensitive. I suffered keenly from the light, and you can judge how my sufferings were aggravated by not being permitted for months to have one moment by myself."

All this, and much more, he bore with a patience that was marvelous. The murder of Lincoln was made the excuse for his tortures. He never asked for pardon, but expressed a wish to be brought to trial. The United States government knew that he was no more guilty than thousands of others in the Confederacy, and he was at last released on bail. Later they dropped prosecution, without even requiring him to take the oath of allegiance.

AFTER THE WAR.

Jefferson Davis passed the remainder of his life in dignified retirement with his wife and daughter on his plantation in Mississippi. Not many years before everywhere along his journey the people crowded to see him and show him marks of honor.

President Davis wrote a history of the Confederacy, in which he eloquently defended the principles for which the South had fought. He did not wish to keep alive the bitterness of the past, but he believed that the truth, the whole truth, should be known, and that the South had done nothing for which she should apologize. He hoped that the North might yet come to be fair to the South, and that the Union, resting on brotherly love, might live forever.

When he died, the Legislatures of the Southern States sent delegations to his funeral and held exercises in their halls, appointing distinguished generals to speak on his life and character. He is buried at Richmond, the former capital of the Confederate States. It is there that our people will erect a great monument to him. His name and his fame stand for the Confederacy and belong to the whole South.

HISTORY OF THE BATTLE FLAG.

The first Confederate flag was modeled upon the United States flag—having thirteen stars upon a blue field and bars of red and white. Each star was to represent a State, just as the thirteen stars of the first United States flag had represented the thirteen original States. There were only eleven States in the Confederacy, but it was thought then that Kentucky and Missouri would secede, and again thirteen little States would fight for liberty. The flag should remind us of our history!

But this flag was so like the United States flag that it was difficult to distinguish one from the other. At the first battle of Manassas, General Beauregard's signal officer sent him a dispatch saying he had sighted some advancing troops, but that he could not tell whether they were friends or enemies. The general was anxiously expecting re-enforcements. He raised his glass again and again, trying to decide what colors the troops were carrying. The other officers looked too, but it was impossible to tell. No breeze was blowing, and the flag hung drooping on the staff. For a while, fearing to meet the enemy without re-enforcements, General Beauregard thought of retreating. He believed the battle would be lost if help did not come, but he finally resolved to try to hold his ground. Just then a puff of wind spread the colors to the breeze, and the Confederate flag was recognized. It was the Stars and Bars, and not the Stars and Stripes. Gen. Beauregard immediately ordered an advance, and in one hour not an enemy was to be seen south of Bull Run.

While suffering so much anxiety on the field of battle, General Beauregard determined that the Confederate soldier must have a flag so distinct that no such doubt should ever again endanger his cause. Soon afterwards he wrote to Col. William Porcher Miles, of South Carolina (afterwards President of the South Carolina College) asking him to suggest a suitable battle flag. In this letter General Beauregard suggested that there should be a blue field, two red bars crossed, and gold stars. Col. Miles thought the ground should be red, the bars blue, and the stars white. Designs were received from many people. These were discussed with the officers at headquarters, and they agreed upon the famous old banner—the red field, the blue cross, and the white stars.

GENERALS OF THE WAR.*

These sketches are intended to be read (or told) by several pupils. However, some of them are rather long, and the teachers can exercise their own Judgment as to the best use to be made of them. If using them in full will make the program too long, the teachers can shorten the sketches, bringing out one or two incidents in the career of each general.

GEN ROBT. E. LEE.

At the beginning of the War, Robert E. Lee, then a colonel in the United States Army, was offered command of that army. He declined and resigned his position in order to serve his native State, Virginia. He was appointed major-general in the Confederate Army and was stationed in Virginia. After Johnston was wounded, Lee was put in command of the Confederate Army in Virginia. Immediately after taking command he won for himself a great name by his success in the famous "Seven Days' Battles," by which Richmond was relieved.

Twice did Lee lead his army toward Washington. On the second invasion his army was the finest ever put into the field by the South. After the great Battle of Gettysburg, he retreated into Virginia, and the idea of invading the North was given up. From that time Lee was engaged in defending Richmond. He kept the Federal troops out of the city until 1865. For four years Richmond had been the chief object of attack of the Federals.

In the last few years of the war, Lee's army killed and wounded more of the United States soldiers than he had men. At last, overcome by

*"The War" is the name common in South Carolina. The "Confederate War" used to be the term when more definite designation seemed needed, and is common now with old soldiers. "War for Southern Independence" and "War of Secession" are technically correct, as is "War Between the States," and the latter has been used by Southern historians. These are somewhat long, however, which possibly accounts for the tendency not to use them in ordinary speech. "Civil War" is almost as objectionable as "War of the Rebellion," as it implies a great consolidated country, and, therefore, surrenders the argument of State sovereignty, for which the South fought. There is an evident tendency among our later generation to adopt this term, largely, doubtless, because of its use by the histories and partly because it is short and convenient. Teachers are, therefore, urged to avoid it, and to adopt the term "Confederate War," which is equally convenient and historically correct.

numbers, he was forced to abandon Richmond, and soon afterwards surrendered at Appomatox, April 9, 1865.

Lee has been placed by the world among her famous military leaders. By the Confederates he was almost worshipped. His men trusted and loved him greatly. "A country which has given birth to men like him, and those who followed him, may look the chivalry of Europe in the face without shame; for the fatherlands of Sidney and of Bayard never produced a nobler soldier, gentleman and Christian than Robert E. Lee."—London Standard.

STONEWALL JACKSON.

At the Battle of Manassas, General T. J. Jackson was in command of some Virginia troops. General Bee, of South Carolina, while rallying his men, exclaimed: "Look at Jackson, standing like a stone wall!" From that time, Stonewall Jackson was the name by which this favorite general was known.

Jackson's Shenandoah Valley campaign is very famous. He was sent into the valley to threaten Washington, and to prevent the joining of two strong Union forces against Richmond. Great fear was felt in the North, and three generals were sent to capture him. He managed by rapid marches to defeat them separately and get back to Richmond in safety. He had successfully carried out his mission and Richmond was saved.

Jackson turned the tide of battle on several occasions by bringing up his men just at the right moment. His army became so famous for these rapid movements that his soldiers were called "foot cavalry."

In the Battle of Chancellorsville, when victory was assured, Jackson was accidentally shot by some of his own men, who took him for a Union officer in the dark. He lingered for a week, and died on the 10th of May, which has since been selected as our Memorial Day.

He was one of the greatest generals of the world, and at the same time a remarkably pious man. His death was mourned throughout the South as the greatest blow to the Confederacy. When Lee heard he was wounded he said, "Any victory is dearly bought which deprives us of the services of Jackson, even for a short time." Again, when sending a message to Jackson, he said, "Give him my affectionate regards, and tell him to make haste and get well, and come back to me as soon as he can. He has lost his left arm, but I have lost my right arm."

GEN. ALBERT SIDNEY JOHNSTON.

Gen. Albert Sidney Johnston was put in command of the Confederate

troops in the West at the beginning of the War, and was sent to Kentucky to oppose the Federal forces under Grant and Buell.

To prevent the union of these two forces, Johnston attacked Grant's army near Shiloh Church. Here one of the great battles of the war was fought. Just when it seemed that victory was sure for the Confederates, Johnston, ever in the thickest of the fight, was mortally wounded. The death of their leader was kept from his soldiers, and the battle went on under Beauregard. The latter was unwell and did not know Johnston's full plans. This caused a delay which prevented the great victory that would have been won if Johnston had lived a few hours longer.

Gen. Johnston possessed great military genius, and much was expected of him by the South. His loss, thus early in the war, was a blow to the cause. Jefferson Davis said of him: "In his fall, the great pillar of the Southern Confederacy was crushed, and beneath its fragments the best hopes of the Southwest lay buried."

GEN. JOSEPH E. JOHNSTON.

At the beginning of the Confederate War, Gen. Joseph E. Johnston was made commander of the Confederate Army in Virginia, and with Gen. Beauregard won the great Battle of Manassas. He successfully defended Richmond, until severely wounded, when he was succeeded in command by Gen. Robert E. Lee. He was afterwards assigned to command in the West. He opposed Sherman's march through Georgia with a skill that has made him immortal. As Sherman's force was twice as large as his, Johnston avoided a regular battle, and retreated, fighting at every favorable point. In a hundred miles of this sort of fighting he had so greatly weakened Sherman's army that he expected soon to destroy it. Unfortunately, the people of the South did not at the time understand his plans and splendid generalship. This misunderstanding and opposition to retreat caused President Davis to remove Johnston from the command. Sherman's march was easy after that. Johnston was restored to the command too late.

In face and figure, as well as in ability, Johnston was every inch a soldier. He was compared to a game-cock—always ready to fight; and he was as wise as he was brave.

GEN. JAMES LONGSTREET.

Gen. James Longstreet was a native of South Carolina, and at the time that the Confederate War began held a position of trust in the United States Army. This position he resigned to join the Confederate Army. He was appointed major-general and gained a reputation under Lee in his campaign in defense of Richmond. He was afterwards put in command of a corps as lieutenant-general. Longstreet was an able

and resolute general. He was depended upon by Lee even in the most critical times. Lee called him his "old war horse." Jackson and he were called Lee's right and left arms. A verse of a camp song shows that the men understood how Lee's confidence was placed:

"Lee formed his line of battle, Said, 'Boys, you need not fear, For Longstreet's in the center, And Jackson's in their rear."

GEN. P. G. T. BEAUREGARD.

When the Confederate War began, Gen. P. G. T. Beauregard had just been elected to the high position of superintendent of West Point. He resigned his position and entered the Confederate Army with the rank of brigadier-general. He was sent to Charleston to direct an attack upon Fort Sumter. Some time was spent in preparation. Then when all was ready, Beauregard demanded of Maj. Anderson the surrender of the fort. His demand being refused, he opened fire, and for thirty-six hours the bombardment continued. At the end of this time the fort was surrendered. The Confederate War had begun.

Beauregard was active during the whole war, commanding in Virginia and in the West.

Later he was again in Charleston, and directed the famous defense of that city. This defense is regarded as one of the most remarkable on record. For nearly two years the city was held against the constant attacks of strong land and naval forces.

Beauregard was with Gen. Jos. E. Johnston during the last days of the War and suffered with that general.

Beauregard was a born soldier and was always found leading the charge. At Shiloh, while leading, flag in hand, one of the charges, he was urged by a member of his staff not to expose his person. His answer was, "At such moments as these the order must not be, 'Go,' but 'Follow.'"

These words show the man.

GEN. J. E. B. STUART.

J. E. B. Stuart, like most of the leading Confederate generals, had been an officer in the United States Army, and resigned to enter the Confederate service. He became one of the ablest cavalry leaders of the world. He was a "dashing-looking cavalryman, with fighting jacket,

plumed hat, jingling spurs and gay decorations." His men fairly worshipped "Jeb," and they, like him, were characterized by a careless gayety. Stuart's favorite song was:

"If you want to have a good time, Jine the cavalry!"

and often as he rode through the woods his merry voice could be heard leading the chorus of this song, so dear to him and his men. However, like Lee and Jackson, Stuart was an earnest Christian, and had wonderful influence upon his men in camp as well as on the field of battle.

Stuart was famous for the boldness and dash of his charges, and his promptness in carrying out orders. More than once he succeeded in marching entirely around the enemy and returning in safety with stores, prisoners, and the needed information. When Jackson was wounded at Chancellorsville, Stuart took command and completed the rout of Hooker's army. When Stuart died, it was well said: "That is the greatest loss that army ever sustained, except the death of Jackson."

GEN. NATHAN BEDFORD FORREST.

Nathan Bedford Forrest was born in Tennessee in 1821. When he was still a boy his father died and he took charge of his mother and a large family of brothers and sisters. This prevented him from securing a good education at school, but he had much shrewdness and wisdom and became a rich planter. When the Confederate War began, Forrest entered the army and at once distinguished himself as a leader of cavalry. He fought in the West, and was almost always successful, although the forces of the enemy were much greater than his own. He would throw his whole force against a weak point and win the fight before help could arrive. When asked how it was he gained so many battles he answered, "I always manage to git thar fust with the most men."

Once he wanted to cross a river to fight the enemy but could not find a ford. A young girl told him she knew a place where she had seen her mother's cows cross and could show it to him. Forrest pulled her up behind him on his horse and galloped away at the head of his troops while her mother, not knowing what was the matter, ran after him, screaming. She showed him the ford. He sent her back safely, crossed the stream and whipped the enemy, and then wrote her a nice letter, saying that it was owing to her that he had won the victory. General Forrest was tall and strong and handsome, and with his great sword

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was very terrible in battle. He is considered one of the best cavalry leaders that have ever lived. After the war he became a railroad president. He died in Memphis, Tennessee, October 20, 1877.

FIGHTING DICK ANDERSON.

Richard Henry Anderson was born near Statesburg, Sumter County, S. C., Oct. 7, 1821. He graduated from West Point in 1842 and entered the United States Army. During the Mexican War he fought with great gallantry. At the beginning of the Confederate War he resigned and entered the Confederate Army, aiding in the bombardment of Fort Sumter. In the battles around Richmond he was complimented by General Johnston for gallantry, skill and coolness. At Manassas, Harper's Ferry, Sharpsburg and Gettysburg he greatly distinguished himself. In May, 1864, General Anderson was made a lieutenant-general, and during that summer held important commands. In September, when the race began between Lee and Grant to reach Spottsylvania Court House Anderson was in the front line of the Confederate Army. Marching all night, he reached the town next morning in time to hold it against the Federal troops. He was still fighting bravely when Lee was compelled to surrender.

General Anderson was called "Fighting Dick Anderson." He was noted for his modesty and dignity of character. For some years after the war General Anderson lived in Camden. He died at Beaufort, S. C., in 1879.—From White's Cyclopedia of Biography.

GEN. WADE HAMPTON.

When South Carolina seceded Wade Hampton raised the body of soldiers known as the Hampton Legion. This legion he commanded with great ability at the first great Battle of Manassas.

In 1862, Hampton was transferred to the cavalry in Virginia as brigadier-general. His brigade figured largely in making the history of the cavalry of Northern Virginia. As second in command he was with Stuart in all his famous charges and raids.

In Lee's famous campaign of '64, the cavalry was a powerful aid. When Stuart was mortally wounded Hampton was placed in command, and continued to direct the cavalry movements until the close of the campaign. The skill with which he directed these movements won praise even from his foes.

At the close of 1864, Hampton was sent to South Carolina to take charge of the cavalry sent there to recruit. He was, therefore, not with Lee in his final campaign. In a personal letter to Hampton, Lee regretted that he had not his whole cavalry, commanded by Hampton, with him at Five Forks. He expressed his belief that the result might have been different had Hampton been there.

Hampton led his men during the war as only a born leader can. His mere presence was an inspiration and made heroes out of ordinary men. His kindly and gracious manner, and his custom of sharing all hardships with his men gave them a feeling of personal attachment to their leader.

There is no name more honored and beloved by South Carolinians than that of Wade Hampton.

IV.

Special Reports from County Superintendents of Education.

Here follow a request made of County Superintendents about the first of December for special reports, and the reports received in response. Where the report is not given in full, no essential point is omitted. These reports are interesting, and some give very valuable information and suggestions.

"Since you have been in office two years, you are able to look back upon the condition of the schools of your county as you found them, and to note the leading features of your policy. I should be glad for you, therefore, to write for me to use in connection with my Annual Report a review of what has been done in your administration, and what specially needs to be done, according to your observation and reflection."

ANDERSON COUNTY.

There is nothing of special importance to say concerning the actual operations of the schools during the last year or two. The patrons are taking more interest in our schools, and I believe there is a healthy growth of educational interest among the people generally.

TRUSTEES' ASSOCIATION.

The trustees, as a rule, are giving more time and attention to the schools of their respective districts, and in some places are doing much to bring about an increase of popular interest. Several boards have purchased patent desks for their schools during the past two years. The trustees have formed an association, which meets quarterly. Heretofore the discussions have been general and informal, but hereafter a special programme will be arranged, and discussion will be restricted, during the regular exercises, to the subjects chosen by the committee. These meetings are attended much better now

than at first, and I believe the trustees are deeply interested, and are earnestly trying to secure something better for their districts.

TEACHERS IMPROVING.

The teaching force of this county will, I think, compare favorably with that of any other county. Many of the teachers are zealously striving to improve themselves and to give their employers better work. This is proven by the excellent average attendance at our normal school last summer. While it is true that many of the teachers did not attend, those who were present exhibited much enthusiasm, and all did a good month's work. Teachers who at first were inclined to think the summer school somewhat akin to a school entertainment are beginning to realize that it is held for work, and its worth is rapidly being seen by both patrons and trustees.

RURAL SCHOOLS.

The city and town schools seem to be prospering. The quality of the work being done in these schools is very creditable indeed, and while no marked improvement can be noticed in the rural schools, they are probably improving as rapidly as circumstances will permit.

ONE-TEACHER SCHOOLS.

We are suffering in some localities with too many schools. The impression prevails among the people that a school must be located wherever twenty-five pupils can be collected. This impression has led to the establishment of some unnecessary schools. Another impression, which is a serious hindrance to the proper consolidation of the schools, is that one teacher can very reasonably be expected to do good work in a school containing not more than twenty-five to thirty pupils. The teacher's work is estimated solely upon the number of pupils enrolled, and the number of grades is not taken into consideration at all.

No radical improvement can be made in our rural schools except by a judicious consolidation of two or more weak schools into one strong one, and the employment of more teachers which this consolidation will make possible. When the masses of the people realize that the same two teachers can do double work if their schools are thrown together, then they will be ready and willing for any reasonable plan of consolidation. They do not yet thoroughly realize that this is a fact.

TRANSPORTATION OF PUPILS?

I would like to see the experiment tried in this State of giving free transportation to those pupils who live at too great a distance from the school house. This plan, as far as I am informed, seems to be giving entire satisfaction in other States, and in many places it would make possible consolidation which is otherwise impossible. If this free transportation is not too costly, it seems to offer a plan for the discontinuance of the one-teacher schools, and the superficial instruction which necessarily attends them.

I believe we are on the up-grade, and that much improvement will be accomplished in the next few years, not only in Anderson County but all over the State.

BARNWELL COUNTY.

It is very gratifying to state that there has been considerable progress in the public school system of Barnwell County the past two years.

- Ist. The teachers are much better qualified to impart instruction, resulting from the superior educational advantages of the present day,—especially have the State and County Summer Schools been the means of accomplishing so great an improvement.
 - 2d. The sessions of the schools have been lengthened.
- 3d. The Teachers' Association has been a powerful auxiliary in aiding in the progress of the educational interests of the county. Instruction is given at each monthly session in Mathematics, English, History, the Primary Department and School Management.
- 4th. The system of public schools is now on a cash basis, the first time since its inauguration in this county.
- 5th. The school buildings are in a more comfortable condition and several new ones have been erected.
- 6th. The parents of the children are manifesting more interest in their education.

The special need of the system is more money, so that the sessions of the schools be for a period of nine months, and the salaries of the teachers be increased. The present policy is onward.

CHESTER COUNTY.

As a general thing, there is increased interest in the public schools of this county, shown by an increased desire for better teachers, with increased salaries.

EXODUS FROM THE COUNTRY.

Some of our white schools have been nearly broken up by the exodus of the poorer classes from the farms where they have been renters or croppers, and some land owners, to the mill towns, where they and their families can earn a support by working in the mills. I regret to see this; but for the two years previous to this, crops have been so poor that these families either lost their lands, they being mortgaged for supplies, or could not as lessees make a support. * *

REDISTRICTING NEEDED.

We have in this county more good school houses than ever before, but to get more high grade teachers we need more funds. One way to accomplish this is to have smaller school districts in some places than we now have, but, under the present school law, Section 31, this cannot well be done, as the hands of the County Board of Education are tied, since a move, by petition, must first be made by at least one-third (1-3) of the qualified electors embraced within the limits of such proposed school district. This *proviso* should in my judgment be eliminated.

BOOK DEPOSITORY.

The sale of text-books at cost is a great boon to school children, but a great hindrance to the other work of the County Superintendent of Education, when this business must be conducted by him personally.

TEACHERS.

We have no County Teachers' Association now. It has been faithfully tried for several years in this county, but a great many of the teachers board, and being largely dependent upon their patrons for transportation, find it almost impossible to get to the meetings. We fear, however, that some did not take that interest in the meetings that they could have.

Our schools, all of them, are on a solidly cash basis, the only way the public should undertake to do business. There should, in my judgment, be at least three (3) teachers' examinations during the year, say the third Friday in February, June and October.

LATIN IN THE SCHOOLS.

While Latin is not a public school study, it is taught to a considerable extent in our public schools, especially in those schools that supplement the public fund. It seems to me, therefore, that the authorities of State and denominational colleges might, with great benefit to those pupils who propose to enter these higher institutions, adopt for a period of years, say ten (10), a uniform series, Latin Grammar, Beginners' Latin books, etc., etc. I will not take time to elaborate this.

Lastly, I don't see where educating the negro as we now do is helping us. We furnish the money and they instill such principles as are prejudicial both to his and our welfare.

CHESTERFIELD COUNTY.

When I entered this office just 21 months ago I found the schools of Chesterfield County in need of a great many things.

As every one knows (who knows the condition here), it is almost impossible for a Superintendent to start and carry out many new ideas in the two years that he serves.

IMPROVEMENT OF TEACHERS.

My board each of the years gave \$5.00 on the expenses of the teachers to the Summer Schools. We did this knowing the great benefit to be derived from them. This is very unpopular here. Our Summer Schools have been profitable and the best teachers appreciate them to the fullest extent.

My work has been almost entirely with the teachers, as I realize that good teachers make good schools. I am very much pleased with the results of my work along this line, as most of my teachers deem me their personal friend and know that I have their interest at heart.

TEACHERS' SALARIES.

Two years ago very few teachers received \$30.00 a month; now we have at least fifteen who get that or more. Of course, we still have some districts that believe in \$15.00 teachers, but they are the exception now where they have been the rule.

The trustees in several districts have left the selection of teachers to me, as they knew I was in closer touch with all the teachers. I have made it my business to know all my teachers as teachers.

LOCAL TAX.

I have worked for the special levy in all my districts and have succeeded in several and I am sure that it will be only a short time before every district will levy this tax.

Of course as far as money goes we cannot show much increase, in fact our dispensary reports are much smaller.

Our people are very much interested in education and the interest still grows.

RENEWAL OF CERTIFICATES.

Our board has renewed no certificates except for those who did satisfactory work in Summer Schools. The renewing of certificates for personal gain has been one of the greatest drawbacks to our schools.

I hope to be able to help my successor in many ways, as I intend giving him my plans and my aid in carrying them out.

DARLINGTON COUNTY.

On January 1, 1901, when the present superintendent assumed the duties of County Superintendent of Education, a grave difficulty had to be met. The exchange and sale of school books at cost, to over seven thousand school children, had commenced under his predecessor. The office of the County Superintendent being not over twenty feet square—entirely too small before—was now filled up and crowded, to the great discomfort and distress of all persons who had business to transact in the office. There were no shelves or protection for the hundreds of dollars worth of books on hand: public property was exposed to loss and ruin. Although such was

the case, the Board of County Commissioners refused to pay for shelves and protection of the books, which were then piled up on the floor or in boxes. The County Superintendent had the work done and the books protected, but not until much time and effort were spent.

SALE OF TEXT-BOOKS.

This book business took up most of the time and attention of the County Superintendent, and hindered and obstructed his work for and among the schools to an extent that was, and is, appalling: it still ties the hands and obstructs his work to an alarming extent.

The county depository ought to be done away with and the County Superintendent of Education allowed to designate merchants in all sections of the county to sell the books at ten per cent. above the cost, and in case of any breach of this agreement by merchants selling for more than ten per cent., the County Superintendent of Education should have a remedy at law against them.

As it now is, the book stores and merchants charge as much as twenty per cent. on school books, and there is no remedy—book stores and merchants will not handle school books for less than ten per cent.

SUMMER SCHOOL OF 1901.

The most successful summer school ever held in Darlington County commenced in August and ended in September, 1901. Primary work—and geography—by Miss Sarah Withers; grammar, class management and keeping teachers' registers, by Miss Augusta Dunbar, were thoroughly taught. They did conscientious, hard and tircless work for Darlington teachers and children. We consider these ladies two of the most accomplished teachers in the State. Their names in Darlington are as "household words" to teachers and children.

INSPECTION OF PRIMARY WORK.

During the year 1902, the schools continued to do good work, and more interest in having good schools was manifest among all classes of our people. Early in the spring of this year, Miss Sarah Withers, under the direction of the State Superintendent of Education, came on an inspection tour of the country schools of Darlington. She visited seven of these, which were fair specimens of our country schools.

SUMMER SCHOOL OF 1902.

During August and September of this year we again had a most useful and successful Summer School. Prof. S. H. Edmunds of Sumter, conducted the school with great zeal and ability. Unsparing and exacting, he still held the esteem and won the praise of the teachers. Never before had they had so thorough a drill in arithmetic, algebra, grammar and literature. These were the studies in which they most needed the master mind. It was a great triumph and pleasure to Prof. Edmunds that those teachers who continued to the close of this school passed all examinations satisfactorily, and he felt proud of the fact that they could teach successfully in any of the public schools of the county. He, too, captured the teachers, who will ever remember his splendid instructions.

GENERAL IMPROVEMENT.

The schools have made rapid and continuous progress—the teachers are more efficient, better equipped, more progressive and ambitious, and determined to excel.

Many attended the State Summer School, some traveled, and all did their best to improve themselves. They now take more pride in their calling, have more books bearing on the art and science of teaching, and general literature, than ever before.

The trustees have been more active and alive to the interests of their schools. As a consequence of this, we have many new and better schools, more comfortably and better furnished; nice seats and desks, with an easy, revolving chair, and nice table, for the teacher.

There are more books for school libraries, and more of the best literary works are read by teachers, children and patrons than ever before; more special school districts have been formed and are in process of formation, and more special taxes for school purposes have been levied than in any previous years.

TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION.

We have now a Teachers' Association which bids fair to be a great factor in country school work. Col. J. J. Dargan, the historian, is president. Prof. Thomas Sharpe is chairman of the executive committee. Miss E. C. Ervin is secretary. Many able and accomplished teachers, and some of the most influential citizens, attended the last meeting—December 13, 1902. At this meeting, much enthusiasm was aroused during the discussion of "The duties of trustees to teachers" and "How can teachers help the trustees?"

The Teachers' Association was recognized as a medium through and by which the intelligence of Darlington County might be organized so as to work as a unit in the betterment of our teachers and schools. The Association will have its next meeting at Hartsville, and wishes to go to different sections of the county from time to time, so that every community may be reached.

INSPECTION OF SCHOOLS.

It is the desire of the County Superintendent to have, in every section of the county, some of the professors of the high schools to visit the schools in their district, or adjoining district, and aid and assist the teachers in every way that is possible. I can conceive of no plan that would be more helpful to teachers than associational work—and even an exchange of work for a day might be worth trying.

EDUCATION OF THE MASSES.

It is the opinion of many intelligent persons that our public schools are rapidly changing so that no one need be ashamed of them. There are many earnest and quiet workers for the schools. They do not talk—but work. They feel that the foundation of all success in higher education is the prosperity of the county schools. Educate the masses and all will be educated; neglect the masses and but few will be educated. What we most need is more money to work with.

THE COLORED TEACHERS.

The colored teachers had a very fully attended summer school in July and August, 1902. Prof. Cain is doing a good work for them. The teachers are making good progress, and have their teachers' association.

The reports of Prof. D. W. Davis to the County and the State Superintendent will speak for themselves as to the good work he is doing as "inspector" of the colored schools. Yours sincerely,

I have been fortunate in having with me good and strong men as members of my Board of Education, but there is not near enough time allowed them for the work required of them. They should be allowed at least twelve or fifteen days in each year.

NEWBERRY COUNTY.

Notwithstanding my efforts to raise the standard of education in my county, I have met with some difficulties which held in check, somewhat, the progress that might otherwise have been realized.

UNIFORM TEXT-BOOKS.

One of the most noticeable of these difficulties, perhaps, was the adoption of new text-books in the schools. I found in my efforts to enforce the law respecting the "New Adoption" that in many of the schools there were patrons who felt financially indisposed to comply with such a wholesale change of books. As a result the enrolment throughout the county was greatly diminished. This difficulty, however, has been met successfully, and I am glad to say that every school in the county has fallen in the line of advancement and is now using a uniform set of books.

TEACHERS IMPROVED.

I am gratified to note that in the last two years the teachers have attained a marked degree of efficiency, and, as a whole, have done very faithful, efficient and most satisfactory work. It is evident, however, that in order to secure the services of the most competent and expert teachers there must be an increase of salary, such as will warrant the employment of such teachers. I am glad to state that the salaries for teachers in Newberry County for the past two years have increased somewhat, and there are now few teachers in the county who receive less than thirty dollars per month for a term of six to nine months.

CERTIFICATING TEACHERS.

In pursuance of my desires to raise the standard of education and secure a more thorough and efficient corps of teachers, it has been my aim and purpose always to be very careful as to the grading of examination papers and thus allow no persons to receive first grade certificates except those who are justly entitled to and worthy of the same.

TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION.

We have a Teachers' Association that meets the second Saturday in every month. By this means of bringing the teachers in contact with one another much good has been accomplished in the way of educational progress. Our association is meeting with marked success, and I feel proud of the fact that I have conducted so successfully such an important organization in my county. I think, to promote the cause of education, every county in South Carolina should have some kind of teachers' association.

SCHOOL HOUSES.

As a whole, the school houses are good, and I think will compare with those of any of the counties of the State. Many of them are new and well equipped with modern improvements in the way of patent desks and other school furniture. There are still a few old school houses in the county that I hope very soon to have removed and have erected in their stead more modern and up-to-date buildings. In this connection, however, it is pleasant for me to note that in the town of Prosperity there is soon to be erected a handsome and well equipped school building that will add honor and credit to the town. I am always glad to encourage such enterprises of this kind.

NEED OF MORE MONEY.

One of the greatest needs respecting our educational facilities here in the South, is more money. We must have it before we can ever hope to educate the great mass of our people. One of the best plans for obtaining more money, now in operation, is the levying of a special tax for the schools. There are at present ten school districts in my county that have a special levy of two mills, and I should be glad indeed if all school districts in the county would adopt this plan of advancing the educational interests of their respective schools.

NEED OF COMPULSORY EDUCATION.

There is one more very important feature I should like to include in this report, and that is the irregularity on the part of parents in sending their children to school. Although the plan of our educational system is by no means an ideal one, it does seem that parents might make the proper use of what opportunities are afforded them under the present system, and send their children to school as regularly as possible. I am convinced that if parents are under obligations to their children in one respect, they are so in all respects. Since the Ruling Power of the Universe has blessed man with children, He did it that they might be brought up in such a way as to be most useful to their country, and glorify Him. To this end it is necessary for our children to be educated, and, as the head of education in Newberry County, I hope to see some kind of law enacted that will require parents to send their children to school.

HOPE FOR THE FUTURE.

It shall be my plan in the next term of my administration to continue my same line of advancement, and by the end of the next two years I hope to realize marked and wonderful progress in the schools of Newberry County. I hope to make Newberry second to none in the State in respect to her educational interests.

For fear of indulging too long on this review I shall now close with thanks and sincere praise for the very valuable and high-toned way in which you have conducted the affairs of education in South Carolina during your term of office. I am sure, in going out of office, you carry with you the honor and respect of every true citizen of South Carolina.

OCONEE COUNTY.

One of the most favorable changes I know anything about is that the people have seen (most of them) that the constant shifting of teachers from one school to another is a mistake. This is due to your influence, as you have recommended that trustees should not change teachers often.

The people seem to be more willing to pay good prices for good teachers than they were a few years ago.

Some of our teachers who used to get from \$23 to \$25 per month get from \$35 to \$40 now. These gentlemen were greatly improved by the Summer School for teachers and have made themselves wanted by constant appreciation and by the attendance upon the Summer School. I believe that these schools are a great stride forward in the efficiency of the free schools of this State. I believe that much good has been done in Oconee by them, and I earnestly

hope that they will be continued for many years. More good has been done in Oconee by these schools than by anything else for many years.

RICHLAND COUNTY.

My report covers a period from January, 1901, to December 2, 1902.

GOOD SCHOOLS.

There are strong country schools in various sections of the county, which serve as worthy standards for imitation. In some communities in which the three mill tax is not sufficient to defray the cost of good schools, the patrons volunteer a subscription fund to meet the necessary cost.

I have three or four white schools in the county having three teachers in each, which, of course, means the introduction of the graded system.

I have five white schools with two teachers in each with the tendency to have a third, because the value is made evident. It is my policy to have the best teachers money can employ, regardless of all other considerations. The trustees agree with the county authorities that the best schools are the cheapest. As a result of the improvement of a few schools, the inferior schools are disturbed as never before—taking inspiration and hope from better ones.

SCHOOL HOUSES.

I have had built and established since my superintendency began ten school houses.

I have had every school house in the county repaired and most of them painted and whitewashed, furnished with patent desks and all other necessary appliances. The children all over the county can be warm and free from the dangerous results of exposure at school.

BEAUTIFYING ROOM AND GROUNDS.

In my trips over the county I try to arouse an interest among the teachers and children in the matter of school room decoration and beautifying yards and grounds.

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CONSOLIDATION OF SCHOOLS.

The idea of consolidation seems to be gaining ground in some sections. It will make the little isolated school a thing of the past.

The improvement of the roads is making possible the consolidation of small and weak schools into larger and more central ones, supplying favorable conditions for graded school work. The roads of the county are now excellent. They really make direct inspection possible, allowing you to spend most of your time in the school house instead of on the road.

COURSE OF STUDY.

The course of study is enforced all over the county to the best of my ability. At my request the text-books were sold by several merchants in various parts of the county last year at the contract price, the publisher allowing to the dealer a profit of 5 per cent., which plan enabled all the children to purchase the books.

REPORT CARDS.

Report cards are supplied to the teachers to be sent to each parent every month, showing the pupil's progress in studies and standing in other respects. It is signed by the parent and returned each month. At the end of the term the general average fixes the classification and grade of each pupil. Such a plan very materially assists the teacher in carrying out the course of study prescribed by the State Board of Education.

JEFFERSON DAVIS DAY.

In some of the schools Jefferson Davis Day is observed.

LITERARY SOCIETIES.

There are three literary societies in active operation in various sections of the county, and more in sight or contemplation.

THE CENTER OF COMMUNITY LIFE.

I discover that the school is becoming the center of interest everywhere. People seem to consider it the pride of the community.

TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION.

The Teachers' Association is organized upon a very efficient and working plan, which is as follows: The body is formed into a class for systematic study and investigation, under the guidance of a faculty of instructors appointed for the scholastic term. Two hours are given to regular class room work once a month.

During the last scholastic year Mr. H. C. Davis, a member of the county board of education, kindly consented to teach Buehler's Grammar and Arithmetic. They were taught with skill and success. I taught Landon's School Management and Peterman's Civics, which subjects are of vital interest to popular education. Miss Ellen Reif, of Columbia City Schools, gave several very fine lectures on primary work.

This year the same plan is continued. Dr. E. S. Joynes, of South Carolina College, teaches English; Prof. R. Means Davis, of the College, teaches United States History; and Mrs. Inez H. Whitlock gives instruction in primary work, with a class for illustration.

At first the plan of going to several sections of the county was tried, but the teachers preferred to meet in Columbia. Now we have the largest and most enthusiastic meetings in the history of the Association.

TEACHERS' READING.

I established a teachers' circulating library. I do not think a teacher in the county is so lost to a sense of professional obligation as not to be a subscriber to one or more educational journals.

RENEWAL OF CERTIFICATES.

No certificates are renewed unless the holder has attended a Summer School either in this State or in some other State, or has a reasonable excuse. We renew for one year only.

EFFECT OF SUMMER SCHOOL.

The County Summer School is doing more to solve the question of expert supervision than is generally supposed, by causing teachers to demand of the person who holds the position the necessary information, or force upon him the consciousness of ignorance, which is not very pleasant.

AID OF NEWSPAPERS.

The newspapers were freely used as an agency to give publicity to the campaign for rural school improvement, and they are a power for good in our generation.

The appended "plan," issued in a leaflet at the beginning of my term, is my platform of principles, which I have labored to see realized. I believe in their ultimate success through hard work.

PLAN FOR THE BETTERMENT OF PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The county board of education for Richland County at its last meeting endorsed the following plan, as formulated by County Superintendent E. B. Wallace, for the betterment of the public schools:

First. A record book, indicating the advancement of the schools, be kept by each teacher.

Second. Private ownership of text-books used in the schools for personal benefit of teachers.

Third. A public week for visits of patrons, trustees and other school officers.

Fourth. Attendance at Summer Schools and Teachers' Associations.

Fifth. That the county superintendent shall make a note of the progress of the schools during his various visits over the county.

Sixth. That the schools be supplied with up-to-date equipments.

Seventh. A uniformity of text-books and courses of study, neatness of surroundings, regular time of opening and closing, 9 a. m. and 3 p. m., and that each teacher take one or more educational papers.

The following resolutions, offered by Prof. Howell Morrell, were adopted:

Resolved, That all applicants to the County Board of Examiners for Richland County, S. C., for teachers' certificates, on and after June 4th examinations next, be required to present to the said board a certificate from the best citizens of their respective neighborhoods, or other reliable sources, as to their moral fitness to teach in the public schools of the State; provided, that such applicants are not known personally by some member of said board.

Resolved, That the trustees of the public schools of Richland County, S. C., for the ensuing scholastic year employ only such teachers as can furnish a certificate of attendance upon the monthly meetings of the County Teachers' Association of the county in which they last taught, and also one showing their attendance upon the last year's sessions of a County or State Summer School, or schools of similar character elsewhere, unless good and sufficient reasons are given for non-attendance.

School trustees are expected to do their duty in carrying out this plan.

YORK COUNTY.

We are making some progress and our schools will probably compare favorably with those in a majority of the counties, but the gap between our present system and any model school system is so wide as to make us feel keenly the comparative insignificance of what has been accomplished in one short term.

TEACHERS.

Probably the most noticeable improvement is found in the increased efficiency of our teaching force. In accordance with the policy of the State Superintendent special attention has been given to this phase of the county superintendent's work. By means of teachers' meetings, Saturday institute work and the Summer School, gratifying results along this line have been obtained, and by a rigid and impartial system of grading examination papers we are striving to make the term "first grade" really mean something. The teachers will, it is hoped, eventually receive their reward for better preparation in the shape of larger salaries. There are, in fact, already some evidences of improvement in this respect. Four years ago, outside the graded schools, there were only thirteen teachers in the county receiving more than \$25.00 a month. Now, exclusive of the graded schools, we have a total of forty-one who go above that figurefourteen males and twenty-seven females. One country school is paying its principal a monthly salary of \$70.00 for a nine months' term, and they justly consider it a paying investment. female teachers get salaries of \$30.00 and upwards. These figures would no doubt appear quite small in some sections of the State, but comparatively speaking they are encouraging.

TEXT-BOOKS.

Another important feature in the work of the past two years was the exchange of text-books. This was a very delicate question, one which touched the "pockets" of the people, and it required some nerve to enforce strictly the regulations of the State Board in regard to the exchange. However, the work was most successfully done, and the result is something new in the history of our schools, viz.: an absolutely uniform series of text-books.

BUILDINGS AND FURNITURE.

We have only recently recovered from the attack of Tutwiler and his "Evans' chart" gang, who "struck" this county for something like \$2,500, and consequently not much has been done in the way of improved furniture and modern school buildings, but considerable attention is now being given to this subject. Quite a number of schools have recently purchased desks, and others will buy in the near future.

The county superintendent has prepared plans and specifications for comfortable and convenient one and two-room school houses, which present a creditable appearance and which can be erected at a cost of from \$250 to \$500, according to size, location, etc. Several buildings in accordance with these plans are now under way, and as soon as they are completed photographs, specifications, and other information in regard to them will be collected and published for distribution throughout the county. During the next two years, at least, all new buildings will be required to conform as nearly as possible to these plans. In this connection, I am glad to note that the town of Yorkville is just completing a new \$12,000 building for her graded school.

EXTRA LEVY.

Seven districts are now levying an extra tax for the support of their schools, an increase of three in the last two years.

FUTURE POLICY.

As to plans for the future we expect to continue as far as possible the policies of the last four years, and, in addition, shall give special attention to the question of new buildings and better furniture. By consolidating and otherwise reducing the number of schools, we hope to lengthen the term of the white schools from six months, the present average, to at least seven or eight months. An eight months' average term is a possibility in this county without any increase in taxation, but it can be done only through the patrons themselves. If we can get them fully aroused to the importance of the question, the rest will be easy. With this end in view we expect to conduct a kind of educational campaign next "laying-by" time—July and August. By working up a rally and a picnic in each section of the county and providing good speakers for these occasions it is hoped some good may be accomplished.

SUPERVISION.

The most pressing need of the rural schools, in my opinion, is some more satisfactory method of supervision. The annual or semi-annual visits of the county superintendent are nothing more than a farce so

far as supervision goes, and in the larger counties he cannot get around oftener.

A division of the schools into groups of seven or eight, with an experienced teacher in charge of each group as a kind of traveling principal, would probably be an improvement on the present plan. With the teachers in each group subject to the supervision of a "group principal" and these principals in turn subject to the supervision of a capable county superintendent, we could get a uniformity in grading, classification and course of study, which is impossible under existing arrangements. The salary of the principal could be paid promptly by the schools in his group, without any appreciable reduction in the length of term, and the good results obtained would certainly more than justify the necessary expenditure.

It would require too much space to give in full the details of this plan, but I am persuaded that we can never have a school system worthy of the name, until we adopt this, or something similar. * * * Respectfully submitted,

PART II.

STATISTICS

ACCURACY OF STATISTICS.

Every effort has been made to insure against possible error in the printing of these statistics. All the proof of this and the preceding Part, after being read and corrected in the regular way by the proof-readers of the State Printer, was re-read in this office. In scrutinizing every item about which a query could arise, Miss Withers and Miss Davis have shown the greatest painstaking care and intelligent skill.

It is not altogether the fault of the county superintendents if many items in their reports are inaccurate. Some teachers' reports are very defective, and some teachers cannot learn how to keep correct records. The present school system affords little power and no encouragement or stimulus to the average county supeintendent to exact proper reports. I have advised and warned the superintendents to gather the necessary data during the school term, and to take care to approve no salary warrant unless the accompanying monthly report passes scrutiny. If these reports were required (as the law directs) and were full and accurate, and if the data were tabulated promptly, the annual report for the county would be almost entirely made up by the close of the school year. If the errors are ever to be corrected, they must be discovered while the teachers are within reach. Yet, in some counties the teachers' reports are not looked at until the following fall, months after the annual report should have been in the hands of the State Superintendent. Then they are found to be largely blank or otherwise worthless.

As an extreme instance of gross errors, see the average attendance in Williamsburg, greatly exceeding the total enrolment. When asked about this, the county superintendent said he had made up the totals from the data furnished by the teachers' reports.

Some county superintendents themselves make grievous mistakes, due in part doubtless to haste. In Barnwell, District 8, the total session of two white schools was given as 160 weeks (20 months each in one year!). Enquiry brought the information that the correct total was 36 weeks, 18 for each school. The one negro school in the same district had been credited likewise with 80 weeks, when the correct total was 16. In District 21 a white school had been reported at 60 weeks instead of 16, and in District 23 the same error occurred.

The total number of weeks' session (and number of schools) in

each district has been asked for in order that I might be sure that the average session for each county is calculated correctly. In the past I had discovered that some superintendents made up the county average by adding district averages and dividing by the number of districts, regardless of the different numbers of schools in the several districts.

In this office we looked very carefully for discrepancies in totals and averages for the county, but did not think it possible there was need of verifying the additions and calculations for the individual districts, reported in Tables 1 and 2.

A separate report, however, of the total weeks of session of the schools in towns and in the country, showed such disagreement in some cases with the totals in Table 1, that we determined to go over very carefully the weeks for each district, trying to reach the truth. Thus, we discovered sessions that seemed improbable, or were impossible. In each such case, enquiry was at once made of the county superintendent. Satisfactory replies were not always received in time to make the corrections before the table had been set up in type. Foot-notes in such cases call attention to the errors, but the totals were made correct, and the county and State averages. When the proof was being read—too late for correction without expense and delay—patent errors were discovered in the average number of pupils to school or to teacher. Foot-notes call attention to these errors.

These reports are for the year ending June 30, 1902. They should be completed and sent to this office in July. The State Superintendent would then have time to study them, and make valuable comparisons and calculations, and could issue his Report several months before the meeting of the Legislature. Some of the county reports were received in July, and many in September, but some not until November. In the majority, however, we found some blanks, or patent contradictions, so that extensive correspondence was required to bring these reports to their present consistency—as to accuracy, I do not know.

The reports from Charleston and Pickens were without flaw, and those from Anderson and York were practically perfect. The reports from the following named counties were good: Aiken, Bamberg, Cherokee, Chester, Fairfield, Greenville, Hampton, Kershaw, Lancaster, Lexington, Marlboro, Spartanburg, Union. I recognize that the reports require considerable labor and care, and a few deficiencies should bring no discredit to the superintendent.

Two county superintendents have not yet reported. Superintendent Hardee of Beaufort is sick and unable to make out his report. Numerous enquiries of him were answered, and not until Dec. 2d did he write me of his disability—almost too late then for the publication of the report if it were ready. However, I then appealed to the county treasurer and members of the county board to get up the report. They cheerfully consented, but soon reported that from the shortness of time and absence of data they must give up the task. The treasurer sent the total receipts and expenditures for the county.

Superintendent Berry of Marion, after once promising his report, ignored all the numerous letters of enquiry afterwards mailed to him and the one telegram. I have written to his town and learn that he is walking about. His report last year was long delayed and then very defective.

The law is at fault in not providing a penalty for failure to make reports. The salary should be withheld after a certain date until the report is made, and approved by the State Superintendent of Education. Sections 1190 and 1192 of the Civil Code, requiring the county superintendent to make certain important reports to the State Superintendent and the county treasurer, impose no penalty. But Section 1225, requiring the county treasurer to make a report to the State Superintendent, imposes a fine of \$500 for failure. This treasurer's report, by the by, should be abolished, since it is of no use to the State Superintendent's Report as required for the scholastic year (Section 1176). The county treasurer's report is for a fiscal year.

Annual Report of Board of Trustees.

Hon. John J. McMahan, State Superintendent of Education, Columbia, S. C.

Dear Sir: The Board of Trustees of the South Carolina College herewith submit their annual report to the General Assembly for the scholastic year July 1, 1901, to July 1, 1902, together with the report of the Treasurer of the College for the same period.

At the close of the session, Dr. F. C. Woodward, President and Professor of English, was retired from his position in the College. Maj. Benjamin Sloan, Professor of Physics, was asked to serve as President temporarily, with the salary attaching, until the Board should elect a permanent President. Prof. Sloan consented, although loath to undertake the new duties. An instructor was provided to relieve him of some of his classes. At a meeting of the Board in September C. A. Woods, Esq., of Marion, was unanimously tendered the presidency of the College, but for personal reasons he declined. The Board is gratified with the spirit and work of the College under President Sloan's management.

During the session 215 students were matriculated. Of this number 23 pursued the classical course of studies; 47 the literary courses; 33 the scientific courses; 38 the normal courses; 34 the special courses; 32 the law courses; 10 the graduate courses. Men students, 186; women, 29.

Several new special courses have been offered by the faculty for teachers, and already a number of teachers have taken advantage of this privilege.

THE STEWARD'S HALL.

The new Steward's Hall has been placed under the control of a committee consisting of three members from the faculty and three from the student body. Under this control two ladies have been selected as matrons, and the beautiful hall has been made, under their care and skillful management, very attractive; and good wholesome fare is there, neatly and daintily served to 110 students at the price of \$10.00 per month each.

THE LIBRARY.

The library is more and more used by professors and students. Five hundred and twenty-seven volumes have been added by purchase and gift since June, 1901. Valuable books have been donated to the library by the following: Col. W. H. Manning, H. E. Ravenel, W. A. Courtenay, Mrs. V. D. Young, Harry Hammond, of our own State; John C. Calhoun, of New York; Max Ehrmann, Dr. E. L. Green, of the South Carolina College, and Dr. J. M. McBryde and T. L. Preston, of Virginia.

The cataloguing of the books is progressing fairly, though under difficulties, as the librarian and assistant can only give a portion of their time to that work.

The need of more room is a grave matter, shelf room for incoming books is wanted, and floor space for study tables.

THE CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION AND THE EXHIBIT IN CHARLESTON.

The South Carolina College celebrated the one hundredth anniversary of the granting of its charter on the 19th of December, 1901, in Charleston, at the South Carolina Interstate and West Indian Exposition. Hundreds of its alumni gathered on this occasion in honor of their Alma Mater. It was an event full of interest and happy results. An interesting printed account of this celebration is transmitted herewith.

"The instructive exhibit of the College at the Exposition was early in place and attracted the attention of visitors from all parts of the United States. Rare and handsome books, selected from the thousands of volumes in the library, served as an exponent of its wonderful advantages to students and scholars. Portraits and photographs of former Presidents of the College and of soldiers, scholars, divines, jurists, and statesmen, its graduates, men whose lives had been full of usefulness to the communities in which they lived and who had won highest distinction at home and abroad, emphasized the wisdom of the State in establishing and fostering this institution, and forcibly impressed upon those who thoughtfully looked upon these things the necessity of cherishing and maintaining the College."

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Report of Chairman of the Board of Visitors, South Carolina Military Academy.

Charleston, S. C., October 27th, 1902.

Hon. John J. McMahan, State Superintendent of Education, Columbia, S. C.

Dear Sir: I have the honor to submit the annual report of the Board of Visitors of the South Carolina Military Academy closing on the 30th of June last.

The very thorough report of the Superintendent accompanying this communication will be found interesting to those desiring information of the details of military instruction at this old and honored State institution.

There were graduated on the 28th of June, 36 cadets, who, by their bearing and conduct, reflected credit on the Academy and showed the careful training received under the professors and discipline of the school; letters received commenting favorably upon this closing scene of the year's work were most gratifying.

The occasion of the South Carolina, Interstate and West Indian Exposition in Charleston furnished the opportunity in the ceremonies attendant upon the visit of the President of the United States, and other public functions during the winter, for the corps of cadets to appear before the citizens of our own State, and visitors from all sections of our country.

The visits of the corps of cadets from the Virginia Polytechnic Institute, and from the Virginia Military Institute, with both of which corps our own cadets appeared on parade and even in sham battles, served to illustrate the thorough training of the South Carolina Academy.

In this connection attention is asked to the accompanying report of an inspection of the corps of cadets on May 23d last, made to the War Department of the United States by Captain A. F. Curtis; the language of encomium employed by Captain Curtis is high praise coming from an accomplished officer of the United States Army.

The many calls for the public appearance of the cadets during the Exposition, with the attendant loss of time and expense, induced the Board of Visitors to omit the usual military encampment in July.

The unusually large number of applicants (128) for the State

scholarships made vacant by this retiring class is strong evidence of the value attached to this State benefaction by the parents in the several counties.

The experience of another year serves to emphasize the necessity for improved methods of heating and lighting the Academy buildings; as this report is made so long a time in advance of the meeting of the Legislature, the Board will ask now for the ordinary appropriations for the maintenance of the institution, reserving the privilege of approaching the Legislature with a special report should the Board of Visitors so decide.

The following items of appropriation for the maintenance of the Academy for the ensuing year are respectfully asked:

REMARKS.

The South Carolina Military Academy was originally established Dec. 20th, 1842, and continued in operation until the close of the War Between the States, in 1865. It was re-opened by the Board of Visitors October 1st, 1882, under the authority of an Act of the General Assembly, approved January 31st, 1882.

CLASSIFICATION OF CADETS.

The cadets are arranged in four distinct classes, corresponding with the four years of study. The cadets employed on the first year's course constitute the Fourth Class; those on the second year's course the Third Class; those on the third year's course the Second Class; and those on the fourth year's course the First Class.

The Academic Year commences on the last day of the Annual Encampment. On or before that date, the result of the Annual Examination, held in June, is announced, and cadets are advanced from one class to another. At no other time shall a cadet be advanced from one class to another unless prevented by sickness, or authorized absence, from attending at the aforesaid examination, in which case a special examination shall be granted him; but in no case shall a cadet be advanced from one class to another, without having passed a satisfactory examination by the Academic Board.

NOTE

Those Cadets marked (*) are officially selected for publication, conformably to a regulation which requires the names of the most distinguished cadets, not exceeding two in each class, to be reported for this purpose at each Annual Examination.

EXPLANATION OF MERIT AND CONDUCT ROLLS.

Note I. In the "Merit Rolls" the numbers give the relative standing of the cadets in their classes.

Note II. The "Conduct Roll" shows the absolute as well as the relative standing of the cadets in conduct.

Note III. Attention is directed to the following paragraph of the Regulations:

MERIT ROLLS.

P. 52. How Made Up.—The marks on which the Merit Rolls provided for in Paragraph 50, shall be made, shall be the sums of the

monthly marks received, divided by the number of months for which the cadet was marked, and multiplied by the value of the branch as established. To obtain the aggregates on which the relative class standing is arranged, the averages of each branch as above ascertained shall be added together, and to this sum shall be added, or from it shall be subtracted, the Conduct Mark, which is ascertained by dividing the total number of Merits or Demerits, by the number of weeks during which the cadet was present, and multiplying the same by the value of Conduct as fixed.

CONDUCT ROLL.

- P. 53. Rolls exhibiting the relative standing of the cadets in Conduct, shall be formed by the Superintendent, at the June examination for the whole Academic Year, in the following manner:
- 1st. Merits—Merits shall be awarded to the Cadets upon the following basis:
- 2d. Demerits—To all the recorded delinquencies of the Cadets shall be affixed a number, not exceeding 10, corresponding to the degree of criminality.
- 3d. The degree of criminality for the various offences shall be fixed by the Superintendent, subject to the revision of the Board of Visitors.

- 4th. In determining standing on the "Conduct Roll," Merits and Demerits shall have correlative value.
- P. 54, Deficiency in Conduct—When any cadet shall have a number expressing his Demerits on the General Conduct Roll greater than 200 for his Fourth Class Year, 170 for his Third Class Year, 150 for his Second Class Year, 130 for his First Class Year, such cadet shall be declared deficient in Conduct, and be immediately suspended, and reported to the Board for action at its next meeting.



Report of Superintendent.

EXPOSITION.

Shortly after your meeting in December, our exhibit was placed in position in the northwest part of the Palace of Agriculture and was cared for daily, Sundays excepted, until the close of the S. C., I. & W. I. Exposition, by a detail of two cadets, one serving in the forenoon and the other in the afternoon. The exhibit was awarded a gold medal for equipment and students' work. The handsome picture of the Citadel drawn by Cadet T. I. Weston, of the First Class, was very much admired, and has been presented to the Academy by As was foreseen, the existence of the Exposition for six months in the city, causing a large influx of visitors, especially from all parts of the State, greatly impaired the work of the institution. The regular detail for attendance on our exhibit, the frequent imperative calls for service of the Corps on parades and other exercises, made such inroads upon the time for academic work that I felt it to be necessary to recommend that no encampment be held. The most serious impairment, however, was the distraction of mind on

the part of the cadets from the arrivals in the city of their parents and hosts of relatives. It was difficult, and well nigh impossible, for them to keep up to standard academic work, and much friction was felt by me in endeavoring to moderate the extravagant desires of both parents and cadets for frequent and unreasonable leaves of indulgence. In spite of all this stress on discipline and study, the usual courses have been accomplished fairly well, the esprit of the Corps, with some individual exceptions, is healthy, and the discipline is good. That the educational value of the Exposition to the cadets was great, goes without saying.

EQUIPMENT AND REPAIR.

The laundry plant installed this year is now doing satisfactory work for the present size of the Corps. There was so much trouble at the start and some extra expenses to secure good work that the expenditures involved some draft on the academic funds outside the \$1,500 appropriated by the General Assembly of the State. The ordinary running expenses are about the same as the system previously employed. It will probably be necessary to supply a wide (shirt) body-ironer before next spring. A change from the open drying room to a sectional one would be of great advantage in economizing heat; but I am not yet prepared to estimate the cost of the change. The condition of the barracks is fairly good, with the exception of the bath-rooms and water-closets. The latter is a source of heavy expense annually on account of the yielding floor on which the basins are set. Nearly all the breakage is in the syphon neck, which renders the basin at once unusable. The entire platform should be supported by an unyielding brick foundation. The bath-room needs a new flooring and a general refitting. Something should be done to render the chapel more attractive. With the exception of new seatings and an occasional coating of whitewash nothing has been done to it since the rehabilitation of the institution nearly 20 years ago.

FIRES.

I regret to report that on the 12th of December an alarm of fire arising from a defective hearth took place, but the discovery being prompt very little damage occurred. On the 11th of January a much more serious affair took place. The fire started in the lamp-room on the ground floor, in which were all the recently filled lamps and a half-barrel of oil. The prompt arrival of the chemical engine of the

City Fire Department prevented what might have been a most disastrous result. As it was, the loss was estimated at \$427, which was promptly paid by the insurance companies interested. It is thought that some cadet who did not go to supper went into the lamp-room to get his lamp, which he probably lighted and then carelessly threw the half-extingished match on the floor and went to his room. Sergeant Condon, who always had charge of the lamp-room and personally filled and gave out the lamps, was ill at his home and his duties had been performed by one of the mess hall servants, who inadvertently left the door of the lamp-room unlocked when he went to wait on his table at supper. These occurrences serve to emphasize what I have in previous reports said on the subject of heating and lighting this large building by some system less fraught with danger, and ultimately less expensive than that now in use.

HEALTH.

Up to March the health of the Corps was good, but about the middle of March both measles and mumps appeared. Of the former two cases occurred; both made good recovery and the disease did not spread, although there were about 40 other cadets who were not immune. Of the mumps we have had 18 cases, occurring in groups of two to four at a time, at intervals extending to the present time. The last case is now out of the hospital, but not quite fit for duty. There were about 60 cadets, who, according to their statements, had never had this disease. We had one severe case of inflammatory rheumatism, which has left the subject, Cadet Register of the Fourth Class, with heart somewhat affected. While he is at present able to keep up with his classes, he is not fit for military duty. case, and the cases of Cadet Metts, heart disease, and of Cadet Roberts, the same with increasing goitre, requires some special action by your Board, as they are all beneficiary cadets. The foregoing statement, however, gives no adequate idea of the sick record shown by the hospital books. An inspection of this might, probably would, give the impression that the institution had become a kind of public infirmary. The physician has no absolute tests beyond the thermometer, the stethoscope and certain obvious physical signs; he must largely rely for his diagnosis upon the statements of the subjects. Where the latter is at all inclined to simulate or exaggerate the physician must accept the statement or charge the patient with fraud or falsehood. A free hospital with free medical attendance, free medicines, free special diet, and free opportunity to shirk

work is too tempting a place for the idler and malingerer to avoid. The cost of drugs, special diet and service very largely adds to our item of miscellaneous expenses. Perhaps the evil would be very much abated by a fixed rate of charges for all expenses in the medical department beyond the physician's examinations and prescription.

BASEBALL TEAM.

I regret to state that I was forced to disband the baseball team this year in consequence of violation of a rule of the Article of Agreement of the Inter-Collegiate Athletic Association of South Carolina, of which this institution is a member. Those rules were made largely for the benefit of our cadets, the object being to place them on some degree of equality with students of other colleges in matters of athletic contests, by ruling out anything like professionalism and confining the contests to bona fide students. The manager of the team, Cadet T. C. Marshall, and the captain, Cadet L. N. Fishburne, persisted in playing a game with a cadet on their team who was not qualified under the rules, in defiance of the warning and prohibition made by the Athletic Committee of the Faculty. As I could not treat this action as insubordination under the Academic Regulations, I published an order disbanding the team. In this connection, I submit the accompanying recommendation of the Academic Board.

I take pleasure in handing to you a letter from Col. J. C. Lynes, Professor of Chemistry, donating to the Academy a large number of books and pieces of scientific apparatus. The books were placed in the library last October and the apparatus was turned into the laboratory stock last January. This generous gift will doubtless receive proper recognition from the Board of Visitors.

The following proceedings and recommendations of the Academic Board are respectfully submitted:

(These recommendations being practically embraced in the matter of the official register, elsewhere quoted, are omitted.)

The Superintendent has had charge of the instruction of the First Class in Moral Science, the work embracing text-book on Natural Theology and Christian Evidences, with lectures; and in Political Science, embracing text-book on State and Federal Constitutions, with lectures. He has also taught the class in Military Field Engineering and Military Law and the Law of War. Some of the practical work done by the members of the class out of such material as could be found, was placed in the exhibit at the Exposition.

Much more could have been made, especially in the way of military bridges of different types, but owing to the space arrangements, the scale upon which they would have to be reduced would have rendered them mere toys. There was enough shown, however, to illustrate the practical character of the course.

Inspector's Report to War Department.

Fort Getty, S. C., May 23d, 1902.

To the Inspector General, U. S. Army, Washington, D. C.

Sir: I have the honor to submit the following report of an inspection of the Military Department of the South Carolina Military Academy, made this date, in compliance with Par. II., S. O. No. 102, Department of the East, May 5th, 1902, and in accordance with instructions contained in letter from your office, dated May 10th, 1902.

The military professor, Mr. J. W. Cantey (himself a graduate of this Academy) is well qualified and eminently suited to his position. In my opinion no improvement could be made, except, possibly, the detail of a West Point graduate of some experience in active service. Such detail, I have been given to understand, has not been requested by the College authorities, and is not recommended unless they themselves so request.

The corps of cadets is organized into a battalion of three companies.

Their appearance and bearing at review and inspection were superb; their steadiness and general behavior during inspection and the subsequent drills can be compared only with the corresponding characteristics of the cadets at West Point.

No cadets in ranks without uniform or partly uniformed.

The arms, accounterments and equipments were found to be in serviceable condition and fairly well cared for, but the arms are old and obsolete, and it is recommended that they be turned in and replaced by a modern arm. The Krag-Jorgensen carbine would, in my opinion, be most suitable.

The cadets' practical knowledge of infantry drill regulations, from the physical drill to the extended order drill, inclusive, is little short of perfection.

Instruction in the manual of the field piece has been carried only so far as to enable the cadets to fire a salute when occasion arises. At inspection, the execution of this manual was only fair, there being an evident lack of interest, probably due to the knowledge that their pieces (3" m. L. rifles) are obsolete. It is respectfully recommended that these be turned in and replaced, if practicable, by 3.2" b. I. rifles, and that manuals for the service of the same be supplied.

In signaling, a high degree of proficiency was shown, a message of nineteen (19) words being sent with the two-foot flag, and correctly received in eleven (11) minutes.

The heliograph on hand is worn out and should be turned in for condemnation. With this exception, all government property is in serviceable condition. Duty and interior discipline in general are modeled after West Point. The officer of the day and an orderly are continuously on duty in the guard room during the day, sentinels being posted only from retreat to taps, on the porches of the barracks.

The duties of guards and outposts are usually taught during the summer encampment. This instruction was omitted the present year owing to the numerous calls for the presence of the cadets at various ceremonies during the continuance of the South Carolina, Interstate and West Indian Exposition.

The graduating class, with only one or two exceptions, showed a high degree of proficiency in Military Law and Military Engineering, the only subjects in which they are theoretically instructed.

This institution is an old and honored one. The corps of cadets, though small in numbers, is certainly a corps d'elite, and the results attained, as shown by the subsequent careers of graduates, are so flattering as to assure the advisability of continuing the military department and to justify all possible aid and assistance that the War Department can afford.

LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL.

Clemson College, S. C., Oct 20th, 1902.

Dear Sir: I have the honor to submit herewith the 13th report of the Board of Trustees of Clemson Agricultural College for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1902. Attached are the reports of Dr. P. H. Mell, H. M. Stackhouse, Secretary of the Fertilizer Department; Col. M. B. Hardin, Chemist, and P. H. E. Sloan, Secretary and Treasurer; the latter is a comprehensive, summary financial report, and, unattached, is an itemized report of money paid.

Thirteenth Annual Report of the Board of Trustees of Clemson College.

In our last annual report we noted the change which had been made in the law, requiring the scholastic, as well as the fiscal year of the College, to end on the 30th of June in each year. In accordance with the expressed wish of the General Assembly for a more detailed statement of the annual expenditures and transactions of the College the Secretary and Treasurer has prepared such a statement for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1902, which is hereto annexed. This states the income received, how much income has been expended, showing the amount disbursed by each department of the College, also the amount expended for permanent improvements rendered necessary for the successful operation of the College.

This report shows that on the 1st day of July, 1902, there was a balance on hand of \$11,681.43. In reference to this we beg to say, as we said about the balance appearing in last year, that it is not an actual balance at the date of this report. That amount has been expended for the current expenses of the College for the six months, beginning July 1st, 1902. Our income is not received until the Spring, and this balance is husbanded in order to meet the current expenses of the College during the last six months of the year. There is no such balance on hand at this time.

We beg to report that the new barracks, to which the attention of the General Assembly was called in our last report, have been completed at a total cost of \$30,582.32—\$26,613.09, as shown by the report of the Treasurer, was expended this fiscal year. This enables us to house 446 students, putting two in a room. Experience has shown us that to undertake to put more boys in a room than two, is not only unprofitable and inadvisable, but also unsanitary. Two are as many as should be put in one room, but we allow three in a room at the beginning of the scholastic year, as many from one cause and another drop out.

We cannot but congratulate the Legislature and the people of the State generally on the increased attendance at the College. The total number of matriculates this year is 519, which is larger than any year except the first, when the mistake was made of crowding four students into each room, with disastrous results. The attend-

ance is all the more gratifying, as it proves conclusively the hold which the College has taken upon the people of the State, and the evidently felt necessity for just such education as this College offers.

In September last, our President, Dr. Henry S. Hartzog, received a call to take charge of the Agricultural College in Arkansas, and resigned his position as President of this College to accept that position. As it seemed to offer a larger field than this, the Board did not feel authorized in doing anything to prevent Dr. Hartzog from accepting the offer. Accordingly, his resignation was accepted.

To fill the place of President, the Board has elected Dr. P. H. Mell, who has for 24 years been connected with the Alabama Polytechnic Institute at Auburn, Ala. Dr. Mell has reported for duty, and so far has discharged the onerous duties of the President's position with entire satisfaction to all concerned. We believe that we have found the right man for the place.

The Board renewed its application to the War Department for the detail of a regular army officer to act as Commandant for the post. The Board felt that the strict discipline maintained by such an officer would be to the advantage of the corps. Largely through the efforts of Senator Tillman, Lieut. Edgar A. Sirmyer was detailed. Lieut. Sirmyer is now upon the grounds, discharging the duties of Commandant of the Corps, and so far, with entire satisfaction. We hope for the best results from his being with us.

On the 19th of February, 1901, the General Assembly passed an Act requiring the Board of Trustees of Clemson College to designate three of their number, to be known as the State Board of Entomology. To the said Board was given full power to adopt rules and regulations governing the inspections relative to the sale and transportation of trees, plants, shrubs, cuttings, budş, vines, bulbs, or roots that they may deem advisable to prevent or remove or destroy any insect pests or plant diseases in the State. The Board was also given power to appoint an Entomologist, who should be a skilled Horticulturist, and Assistant Entomologist, if, in their judgment, it would be impossible for the Entomologist, so to be appointed, to discharge the duties hereby devolved upon him. Such an Entomologist was also given the powers of an inspector with authority to visit in sections of the State where insects injurious to plants are believed to exist, and to determine whether such plants should or should not be destroyed. In accordance with the provisions of this Act the Board of Trustees has designated M. L. Donaldson, J. E. Wannamaker and L. A. Sease as the State Board of Entomology

under the said Act. They have organized with M. L. Donaldson as Chairman; have adopted rules and regulations as required by the Act, and have elected Mr. Charles E. Chambliss, who is a skilled Horticulturist, the Entomologist and Inspector under the Act. He has been faithfully discharging the duties imposed upon him, making tours of inspection as required, with good results to the people of the State.

On the 19th of February, 1901, the General Assembly also passed an Act empowering the Board of Trustees of Clemson College to promulgate and enforce rules and regulations for the guidance of the Veterinarian of said College in the treatment or destruction of animals affected with contagious diseases, and prescribe the powers of the Veterinarian in the case of such diseases appearing in any part of the State. The Board beg leave to report that they have discharged this duty so imposed upon them, and promulgated the necessary and proper rules and regulations and have enforced the same in every case where it became necessary. In view of the frequent appearance of glanders and other contagious diseases in the State, the Board feels that this action on the part of the Legislature was wise, and that good will result therefrom.

On the 20th day of February, 1901, the General Assembly passed an Act requiring experiments in the coast region of the State to be conducted by Clemson College. This Act requires the Board of Trustees to detail one of its Scientific Agriculturists to pay frequent visits to the coast sections of the State, to examine the soils, present methods of cultivation, fertilization, irrigation, etc., making tests of Sea Island cotton, and rice, experimenting with various varieties of seeds, and also make examinations into the diseases of cotton and rice which have cost so much trouble and loss in that section. The Board beg leave to report that they have discharged the duty imposed upon them by this Act; that the matter has been placed under the charge of the Experiment Station force, who have been conferring actively with leading agriculturists of the coast region, conducting the experiments, and performing the duties imposed by the Act. As this work was only started in the spring of this year, it is too early yet to report results, but we cannot see how anything but good can come from the action taken.

Under the law, the Board beg leave to report that they have held institutes in different parts of the State in every place from which a request was received. These institutes have proven most successful. It was found that they attracted much more interest than those held



last year and better results are expected from them. In consequence of this being election year, there were not as many requests as in a year in which there is no such disturbing element. But there were quite a large number at these institutes, and the increased attendance shows that they are appreciated by the people.

The Board cannot but call the attention of the General Assembly to the fact that all these general duties, devolved upon them, occasion expense which is not connected strictly with the College work. In doing so, the Board does not desire to be understood as in any way whatever objecting to these duties. On the contrary, they heartily approve of them, and feel that in performing them the College is discharging one of the chief ends of its creation. But it is only fair to the College to bear this in mind, when comparing the expense of this College with that of other institutions which have not this outside work, necessary and proper as it is, to be paid for out of their income.

The Board report further that the Annual Institute was held at Clemson College during the month of August, and was very generally attended; much more so than in any previous year. The importance of such meetings cannot be overestimated, and they are doing much to assist the farmers of the State.

The regular Fertilizer inspection has been carefully and thoroughly carried on. Every sample sent to the College has been analyzed and certificate furnished. For further particulars, the Board would refer to the report of Mr. H. M. Stackhouse, Secretary of the Board of Fertilizer Control, which is annexed hereto.

Deeming it a part of their duty, not only to supply the education now furnished at this College, but also to be prepared to instruct the students in the different varieties of live stock, the Board has turned its attention to that matter. They have in the course of erection a small barn to be utilized for the purpose of furnishing such instruction. Experiments can be carried on in the feeding and management of the cattle with our native products, and in our own climate. They can be used as models and types in lectures to classes, and the various points of difference between the several breeds, and the prominent points of each variety can be pointed out to the students. The Board have in contemplation the extension of this branch in order to more thoroughly equip the students, studying in the Agricultural Department, in all branches relating to the farm or farm work.

Under the law, a State Geologist has been appointed to examine into the geological deposits of the State. Under this law, it is made

the duty of the Chemical Department of Clemson College to analyze all samples sent in by the State Geologist, which the Board is very glad to do. They would take the liberty of recommending, however, that instructions be given to the Geologist to file with the College a specimen of every variety found by him in the State, to be used as a nucleus for a Museum in the College, and also for use as exhibits in the lectures in the Geological Department. At present, the College has no Museum. This would be the basis or starting point from which a Museum of great interest would result.

We can again congratulate ourselves and the friends of the College throughout the State on the excellent health of the College during the past session. There was no epidemic of sickness, and only slight indispositions among the students. We are glad to be able to report that no death occurred among the student-body. The greatest care is exercised in all sanitary matters, and every precaution taken to avoid disease. We believe that this in a measure accounts for our immunity from sickness during the last term. This supervision is maintained with great strictness.

The Board desire to report that the most rigid economy is practised in every department. No unnecessary expense is incurred or allowed in any department whatever. It must be borne in mind that this is not merely a literary college, where the students take an Academic course, but it is an institution with many ramifications, with farms and agricultural work involving very heavy expenses in order to keep it up.

We herewith submit the reports of the President of the College, of the Secretary and Treasurer, of the Chemist, and of the Secretary of the Board of Fertilizer control.

Honorable R. W. Simpson, President Board of Trustees.

Dear Sir: I have the honor to submit the following report of the condition of Clemson Agricultural College for the year ending June. 30th, 1902.

At the called meeting of the Board of Trustees, August 30th, 1902, I was elected to fill the position of President made vacant by the resignation of Dr. Henry S. Hartzog. The time has been so short since I assumed charge of the duties of the office, I have not had sufficient opportunity to become familiar with the College in all its departments to enable me to make anything more than a general report.

A study of the institution shows that the departments of the College and Experiment Station are well represented. According to the plan inaugurated by the authorities, the following classification appears:

There are forty-four teachers connected with the College, thirteen of whom are also on the Experiment Station staff. There are four-teen other officers and employees in the College and Station not engaged in teaching.

CHANGES IN THE FACULTY.

Since the last annual report the following changes have occurred in the teaching force of the College: Prof. C. M. Conner resigned to accept a position in the Florida Agricultural College. A Committee of the Board, consisting of Messrs. Simpson, Bradley, and Donaldson, appointed in his stead Mr. H. Benton, a graduate of the Alabama Polytechnic Institute, and who for two years was a student at Cornell. Mr. Benton has been engaged in practical agricultural work for a long time. He was Director of the Uniontown Alabama State Experiment Station for several years, and at the time of his election to fill the place at Clemson, he was the Agricultural Expert for Central of Georgia R. R.

Mr. Haven Metcalf, a graduate of Brown University, was appointed by the President to fill the position of Botanist on the Station Staff and in the College. Mr. Metcalf brings into his work a valuable experience as a practical botanist and a teacher, having filled responsible positions in institutions in other sections of the country.

Mr. Albert Barnes, the Assistant Professor of Mechanical Engineering, resigned the chair to accept a similar position in the A. & M. College of Mississippi, with a considerable advance in salary. By the authority vested in me by the Board, I appointed to this position

Mr. Sam B. Earle, a graduate of Cornell in the School of Electrical and Mechanical Engineering. Mr. Earle was strongly endorsed by the Professors at Cornell, and, upon the recommendation of the Head of the Mechanical Division of Clemson College, Mr. Riggs, I appointed Mr. Earle to fill the chair of Mechanical Engineering, subject to the approval and confirmation of the Board of Trustees at their next regular meeting.

First Lieut. Edgar A. Sirmyer of the United States 3d Cavalry, who was detailed by the Secretary of the War Department to fill the post of Commandant of Clemson Agricultural College Corps of Cadets, has entered upon the discharge of his duties. I am gratified to say that he has proven himself to be an efficient officer, and he has made a very favorable impression on the corps of cadets by his just administration of the regulations governing his department. He has prepared a series of rules for the control of the cadets which have received my approval, and these rules have been printed and are now in full force.

- Mr. L. C. Raiford, Instructor in Dyeing, has recently resigned to accept a similar position in the Mississippi Agricultural and Mechanical College. This chair has been filled by the appointment of Dr. Joseph H. James, of Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario. Dr. James is a graduate of Buchtel College, Akron, Ohio. He has pursued postgraduate work in Columbia University, New York City, and he received in 1899 the degree of Ph. D. from the University of Pennsylvania in the course of Chemistry. For some time he has been engaged in the metallurgical department of the Lake Superior Power Company.
- Mr. A. S. Shealy was given a year's leave of absence, and his position as Assistant Instructor in Veterinary Science has been temporarily filled by the appointment of Dr. Robert J. Foster, a graduate of Cornell University in the College of Veterinary Medicine. He was for a time House Surgeon and assistant to Dr. R. W. A. English, of the Jersey City Veterinary Hospital.
- Maj. E. M. Matthews, who filled the position of Assistant Instructor in Drawing, and who was also one of the Majors in the Barracks, resigned at the close of the last session of the College. Mr. F. T. Dargan was elected to fill the chair of Assistant Instructor in Drawing.
- Maj. E. P. Earle, at the close of the last session, resigned the position of Assistant Instructor in Forgework.

FARMERS' INSTITUTES.

These Institutes, the Professor of Agriculture, Col. J. S. Newman, reports, are increasing in popularity. This work I consider to be very important for the reason that the members of the Station staff

are enabled to present before the farmers of South Carolina the practical value of the experiments and instruction being conducted here in the laboratories and in the field, and the farmer is better prepared to appreciate the great value of this instruction in all of its departments, to all the people of the State.

Again, the farmer is helped by the intercourse he has with his fellow farmers in the experiences exchanged between them. And the Station men are greatly benefited in the contact with the men and women who are supplying the people of the State with the food and raiment so necessary for existence.

During the year, Farmers' Institutes were held at the following places in South Carolina: Appleton, Bounty Land, Clemson, Conway, Dixie, Greenwood, Kingstree, Richburg, Springfield, St. Georges, St. Lukes, Walterboro, and Winnsboro.

The following members of the College and Station assisted in conducting these Institutes:

- J. S. Newman, Professor Agriculture.
- W. S. Morrison, Professor History.
- F. S. Shiver, Instructor Chemistry.
- C. M. Conner, Assistant Professor Agriculture.
- G. E. Nesom, Instructor Veterinary Science.

- A. S. Shealy, Assistant Instructor Veterinary Science.

The Institute held at the College was more largely attended than at any other time or place. There were over five hundred farmers in attendance.

CHEMICAL DEPARTMENT.

The State Chemist has a full and exhaustive account in this report of the work accomplished in his department during the year ending June 30th, 1902. Under the wise management of Col. M. B. Hardin this division of the College has sustained the high efficiency of the past both in the analytical work performed for the State, in the examination of fertilizers, and also in the excellent character of teaching accomplished by himself and his able assistants. This report of the State Chemist shows the large amount of analytical work performed for the State each year by the Chemical Department of this College without a financial burden to the people.

ACADEMIC DEPARTMENT.

In the Departments of English, History, and Mathematics the teaching has been of a high order, and the gentlemen in charge of these subjects have manifested a degree of interest not only commendable in them, but the effect produced on the students whom they have taught during the year is evident in the other departments of the College in the better grade of written work presented in the examination papers, and in the application of mathematics to the solution of mechanical and scientific problems. The subjects of the literary departments are fundamental and no college course is complete without a thorough preparation in these topics. In these days no man is considered to be well educated unless he can express himself in good English and speak intelligently concerning the questions of historical interest.

GEOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT.

This division of the College is sadly in need of an equipment in the shape of mineralogical and paleontological specimens. The Museum was destroyed by fire several years ago, and but little has been done since then to rebuild this important adjunct to successful geological teaching. In order to make a beginning towards rebuilding the College Museum I recommend that the General Assembly be urged to pass a law requiring the State Geologist to make two sets of collections in the field, one of which shall be deposited in this College for the use of the Geological Department of the institution. There is some reason in this request from the fact that the Chemical Department of the College is required by law to analyze all specimens of rocks, minerals and earths sent the Chemist by the State Geologist, and the expenses of these analyses are defrayed by the College.

If this plan is put in the shape of a law, the young men of the College will be enabled to become familiar with the mineralogical and geological structure of their native State.

TEXTILE DEPARTMENT.

Prof. J. H. M. Beaty, Director of the Textile Department, furnishes me with the following information:

"For the past few years, the increase in the production of manufactured cotton goods, in the South, has been at an enormous rate, so that, at present, Southern mills practically control the output of plain coarse white fabrics. So long as there is a bale of cotton in the

South to be manufactured, so long may we expect cotton mills to be erected in the South. But as the coarse goods supply is already up to the demands, the prospecting manufacturer must look into the production of a finer class of fabrics.

"It is the purpose of this school to prepare young men so that after they leave here, they may be competent to secure positions in mills making any class of goods whatever. This Department has endeavored, and I think has succeeded, in keeping abreast of the needs of Southern mills, yet all of the divisions of the work are more or less hampered for lack of proper equipment.

"Several new machines, and also a considerable amount of apparatus for experimental purposes, have been added to the Department, and some other equipment has been arranged for. But still the need for additional equipment is urgent. The supply of power looms is not adequate for the number of students using them. Sometimes there are several students working on the same loom or standing about waiting an opportunity to get a loom on which to demonstrate some design gotten out by them. This prevents our getting the very best work out of the students. As yet there is no machinery in the school for printing, mercerizing, etc., and as all this class of finishing is done North for Southern mills, it is quite important that we should make arrangements in the near future for giving instruction along these lines. To add the machinery named above will require a considerable amount of money, for two reasons; first, these special machines are expensive, and second, the multiplication of textile schools throughout the country has produced such a drain on the generosity of machine builders that they have arrived at the point of not donating, but charging half price for machinery shipped these schools. So in the future we may expect to pay something like half value for all additional machine equipment."

Prof. Beaty also reports that the past year has been the most successful year in the history of the school. The scope and the thoroughness of the instruction have exceeded that of any former year. All the instructors have been deeply interested in their work, and have put the students through a broader and more systematic course of study. Several of the graduates are holding important positions with some of the mills of this section.

THE MECHANICAL DEPARTMENT.

This is one of the best equipped mechanical and electrical departments in the South, and the character of work put out by the Director and his able assistants is admirably shown in the fine positions held

over the country by the graduates who have completed the work of this division of the College. It will be a matter of general interest to publish sometime in the future a list of these graduates, with the positions they occupy.

The notable additions to the Department during the year are as follows:

- 1. A 50-H.P. McEwen's high speed automatic engine.
- 2. A General Electric Company's constant current arc light transformer.
 - 3. A pair of Tabor steam engine indicators.
 - 4. Individual sets of bench tools for the Sophomore class shop.

VETERINARY INSPECTION.

Dr. Nesom, the Veterinarian of the College and Station, spends a large portion of his time in State work, inspecting the cattle in all parts of South Carolina, in accordance with an Act of the General Assembly approved February 9th, 1901. This law "authorizes and empowers the Board of Trustees of Clemson College to promulgate and enforce rules and regulations for the guidance of the Veterinarian of said College in the treatment or destruction of animals affected with contagious diseases." In order to carry out the provisions of this law satisfactorily, most of the time of the Veterinarian will be occupied at points away from the College, and he cannot be expected to do much teaching. Dr. Nesom is now on a trip to the Northern States for the purpose of purchasing fine breeds of cattle, which will be shipped to Clemson to inoculate and acclimatize before distributing among the stockmen of South Carolina. This work in which the College is engaged, in the distribution of fine breeds of dairy and beef cattle among the farmers of the State, will go largely towards diversifying the industries on the farms, and will be the means of considerably increasing the farmers' bank accounts.

ENTOMOLOGICAL INSPECTION.

Prof. Chas. E. Chambliss, the Entomologist, has been engaged during the year in carrying out the provisions of the State Law, and in accordance with the rules and regulations passed by the State Board of Entomology. These rules were published in the Twelfth Annual Report of the College. The careful enforcement of this entomological inspection law is a great protection to the honest nurserymen and to the people who attempt to grow and cultivate orchards.

The San Jose Scale, Peach Yellows, Black Knot of Cherry and Plum, are diseases that unless protection is given to the orchardists in this State to prevent the introduction of these pests from other sections of the country, South Carolina will become the dumping ground for condemned fruit trees from the States where the inspection laws are rigidly enforced.

Prof. Chambliss makes the following report of his work in the State, inspecting the nurseries and orchards:

"In my inspections of the peach orchards, I have found the San Jose Scale at Sumter, Batesburg, Monetta, Ridge Spring, Johnston, and Trenton. With the owners of these orchards I am now perfecting plans for the treatment of the infested trees.

"That the work of this Board might become effective, and at the same time popular, I invited forty representative fruit growers and truck farmers to meet at Columbia, October 30, 1901, for the purpose of organizing a horticultural society. As a result of this meeting the South Carolina State Horticultural Society was organized, to which I was elected Secretary. The first annual meeting was held at Ridge Spring, August 1, 1902.

"To carry out my plans for the study of the insects injurious to the garden, which work I have taken up for the benefit of the truck farmers of the State, I am in great need of an insectary."

BOTANY AND BACTERIOLOGY.

Mr. Haven Metcalf, Professor of Botany, has called my attention to the inadequate condition of the laboratory in which bacteriological work must be done. As more stress is now laid upon Bacteriology in both College and Station work than heretofore, the problem becomes serious. With the present equipment of this Department it is unsafe, and therefore impossible to study or cultivate disease forms—which means that the most practical and important part of the work is entirely omitted.

There is pressing need for a small propagating house for the study and investigation of plant diseases. Under present conditions no practical work on plant diseases can be done except in the growing months.

THE DORMITORY AND THE DISCIPLINE OF THE COL-LEGE.

The new dormitory, referred to in the last Annual Report, has been completed and is now occupied by the cadets. It is a well constructed building, and the rooms are excellently adapted for comfort and health. The building is three stories high, 198 by 42 feet, containing 83 rooms.

With the accommodations thus provided by the two barracks we are now able to take care of 500 cadets, but this is the extreme limit of the capacity of the College, when only two cadets occupy the same room.

It gives me pleasure to report that the discipline of the College is being enforced by the officers of the Corps. A most gratifying response is being given by the members of the Junior and Senior classes to the efforts on the part of the authorities to preserve order in the College community. There is a decided tendency towards creating a College spirit of morality and good feeling among the young men, and this movement is a voluntary one from the student body.

Annual Report of State Chemist.

Clemson College, S. C., October 8th, 1902.

President P. H. Mell, Director of the South Carolina Experiment Station.

Sir: I respectfully submit the following report of the Chemical Department of the Station for the year ending June 30th, 1902:

I.

There has been completed and published a chemical study of the Sea Island Cotton Seed, by F. S. Shiver, Bulletin 68.

Mr. Shiver has also completed the work on the Ratation Experiment referred to in my last annual report, and has finished the investigation of the Tea Industry in South Carolina, to which reference was made in the same report. These results will be prepared for publication as soon as time permits.

We have also concluded the experiments which have been in progress for the last three years, in conjunction with the Agricultural Department of the Station, for the purpose of ascertaining if any *injurious effects* are produced on the cotton plant by the use of acid phosphates containing the small quantities of *free sulphuric acid* occasionally found in these goods, or carrying considerable quantities of *spent pyrites* as a filler. In none of the experiments were any injurious results observed.

As to work proposed, Mr. Shiver is making a collection of samples with the view of investigating the tobacco industry in this State.

Miscellaneous and routine analyses have been made as follows:

One sample of Paris green for Mr. B. S. Ellis, Zion, S. C., seven samples of sorghum juice for the Agricultural Department, and one sample of dried distillers' grains for the Dairy Division of the Sta-

tion.

The deficiencies in these samples were made up in money value by an excess of other ingredients, so that these fertilizers were not deficient under the law. While it is true that in many cases the deficiencies thus made up were slight, yet in others they were considerable, and it is obvious that in purchasing such fertilizers the farmer does not get the ingredients in the proportions he wants or pays for.

It is certainly not right when a buyer pays for say 60 pounds of ammonia that he should be furnished with only 40 or 50 pounds, and have the money deficit made up to him in phosphoric acid or potash. It is to be remarked that the deficiencies are mainly in ammonia and potash, and that these deficiencies are more numerous than they were last year.

The available phosphoric acid and potash in cottonseed meals were guaranteed in only sixteen samples, but these ingredients were determined in all cases. It will be observed that the average percentage of nitrogen (ammonia) in the meals is considerably lower than it was last year.

This shows that out of 237 samples, 178 were of the grade claimed for them, 55 were of a higher grade, and 4 of a lower grade than that claimed for them.

FARMERS' SAMPLES OF FERTILIZERS.

In addition to the samples collected by the Inspectors of the Fertilizer Department, there have been analyzed thirty-eight samples for individual farmers. As these analyses cannot be made unless the law and the rules of the Department governing such work are complied with, persons wishing samples analyzed should write in advance to the secretary of the Fertilizer Department for instructions.

WATER.

Seventy-three samples have been analyzed. Of these, twenty-two were from deep or artesian wells, thirteen of which were flowing.

ORES, MINERALS AND OTHER SUBSTANCES.

Thirty-three examinations, analyses and assays have been made. The results are not of sufficient interest to report, for although some of the specimens represent materials of commercial value, the Department is not in possession of any information as to the extent of the deposits from which the samples were obtained. The most interesting of all the specimens is a red clay from near Gaffney, quite rich in tin ore (cassiterite). As far as we have heard, no well defined vein of the ore has been discovered.

DISTRIBUTION OF THE WORK.

The analyses of fertilizers were made by Messrs. McDonnell and Robertson, the analyses of water by Messrs. McDonnell and Henry, the analyses and assays of minerals, ores, etc., by Messrs. Robertson

and Henry. I desire to express my appreciation of the services which these gentlemen have rendered the Department.

In the duties of the office I have had the assistance of Dr. Brackett, to whom my acknowledgments are due for carrying on the work so faithfully during my absence last summer.

Annual Report of the Fertilizer Department.

Hon. J. E. Tindal, Chairman Board of Fertilizer Control.

Dear Sir: I submit the following report of the work of this Department for the year ending June 30th, 1902. The work of this Department has been carried on in the usual manner, and but few violations of the laws of the State by manufacturers of commercial fertilizers have been reported. The fertilizer trade the past season was less than the previous year by about 37,688 tons.

The work of inspection has been carefully carried on, as thorough as possible, and at least cost consistent with efficiency.

The reports of all analyses were published in Bulletins 70 and 73 of the South Carolina Experiment Station in April and June, 1902.

A comparison of the results of these analyses with those of last year is given in the report of Col. M. B. Hardin, Chief Chemist.

I give below a tabulated statement of the work of this year, and for comparison the corresponding figures of last year.

REPORT.

Winthrop Normal and Industrial College, Rock Hill, S. C., Dec. 9, 1902.

Hon. John J. McMahan, State Superintendent of Education.

Dear Sir: I have the honor to submit the following report of Winthrop Normal and Industrial College for the scholastic year July 1st, 1901, to July 1st, 1902, as required by law:

The College made the greatest growth of any in its history during the past, its seventh, session at Rock Hill. It was enlarged in teaching force, enrolment of students, and in equipment, and accomplished more and better work than in any previous session. The number of officers, teachers, and assistants was 43, as compared with 38 for the previous session, and the enrolment in the College, not including some oo pupils in the Model School and Kindergarten, was 456 as against 372 for the previous year. The dormitory accommodations have always been taxed to their utmost since the organization of the College and the only opportunity for any difference in enrolment from year to year up to the past session has been in the number living and boarding in town; and it has not been the policy of the College to encourage such pupils to attend. The enrolment was not increased for the session in proportion to the increase in dormitory accommodations, because the old students who formerly boarded in town were brought into the new dormitory and new students were not allowed to board in town except with relatives. Each lady teacher was given a room to herself in the dormitories and the places for new students were thus still further reduced.

The new building has made it possible to have practically all students not living in Rock Hill equally under College authority, and has enabled them to share equally in all College opportunities. It has also served to bring the Faculty and students into close and pleasant relations. The marked improvement in attendance upon classes and all college duties is attributable in great measure to the fact that the students have not had to expose themselves during bad weather in attending school.

At commencement, June 18th, diplomas were awarded to 33 graduates as follows:

The average age of the College students was 18 years 6½ months, at the end of the session. The legal age of admission is 15 years—the same as that of the other State colleges—but there are

very few in the school under 16 years of age. There has been a marked improvement during the past few years in the preparation of the students entering Winthrop. Among the new students admitted the past session were 68 graduates of high schools and colleges, besides many others who had pursued an advanced course of study before coming to the College, though not graduating.

It will be seen from the enrolment of students in departments that there were 306 students in the Normal Department this past year, an increase of 129 in two years and of 75 over the previous session. The fact that four college graduates entered Winthrop solely for the professional training given there is further evidence that Winthrop is growing in the direction intended by its charter. Of the thirty-three members of the graduating class, thirty were normal students, and only three literary. All of these graduates had had training in industrial branches and some twenty other students were awarded certificates for completing special industrial courses. These figures, representing results of the work of the College, give assurance that the strength of the institution is being concentrated upon normal and industrial work. The graduates of the College are in great demand as teachers. Two of the graduating class were elected to important positions, one in the Laurens Graded School and the other in the Gaffney Graded School, before receiving their diplomas. The graduates of previous years have good positions and are holding them.

Fifty-four per cent. of the students could not have attended any other college if Winthrop had not brought education within their reach.

Winthrop College has begun this present session, its eighth at Rock Hill, most auspiciously. The enrolment in the College classes since the opening, September 17th, is 452. This number would have been greater if more of the 820 girls applying for admission last summer, the largest number ever applying in the history of the school, had been able to meet the entrance requirements. A gratifying feature of the enrolment is the large number of old students returning. One of the greatest drawbacks to thorough work in girls' colleges has always been the lack of stability in attendance. All of the old students in the Junior Normal Course have returned for their Senior year, and all of the Sophomore Normal students, with only a few exceptions, have returned for their Junior year.

The enrolment in the Model School and Kindergarten thus far



this session is 97, making the total number in all departments cared for by the College this session 549.

Every county in the State is represented in the enrolment this session, as last.

The Senior and Freshman Classes are about the same as last year, but the Sophomore and Junior Classes are much larger.

The average age of the students is greater this year than last, being at the beginning of the session 18 years, 3 months, and 26 days, which will make it over 19 years at the end of the session.

There is no Sub-Freshman Class this session. In accordance with the rule adopted last June and announced in the catalogue, no student was admitted to the College this session who was not prepared for the Freshman Class in a majority of studies. This rule was adopted in order that the College might confine itself more closely to its legitimate work and not undertake to do the work of the preparatory schools in addition to college work, and thus prevent the concentration of the energy of the teaching force upon the normal and industrial work, which the College was established to do. Under this rule, 212 of the 444 girls standing the entrance examination at the County Court Houses of the State, July 11th, and 23 of the 70 who went to the College at the opening of the session to stand it, failed of admission. It is to be regretted that all applicants for admission to the College by examination do not avail themselves of the opportunity to stand the examination during the summer in their own counties. Much valuable time would be saved in the organization of the College at the beginning of a session if they would do so, and applicants would be saved the loss of time and money and the disappointment of coming to College without the requisite scholarship to take up profitably College work. Under the rules of the Board, a few students 16 years of age or over are being taught in one or two studies in a sub-collegiate class to enable them to make up special deficiencies.

Applicants who have gone over the required ground for admission to the Freshman Class in one of the accredited schools of Winthrop College are admitted to the College without examination upon the certificates of the principals of those schools. An accredited school must have not less than nine grades or the equivalent. The number of such schools in the State is now 42. They are the following:

The number of students admitted to the College upon certificate from accredited schools this session is 41.

Among the new students admitted this session are 72 graduates of high schools and colleges, besides many others who had pursued an advanced course of study, though not graduating before coming to the College. Of those in attendance, forty have taught school before coming here to further perfect themselves as teachers.

SCHOLARSHIPS.

The scholarships in Winthrop College are worth \$44.00 in money and free tuition. The number awarded to each County is the same as the number of representatives from that County in the lower house of the General Assembly. These scholarships are awarded upon competitive examination held at the County Court Houses of all the Counties of the State on the same day, the same lists of questions being used. The questions are prepared by the teachers of the College and the examination papers are sent to them for grading. This competitive examination is open to all girls of the County who are at least 15 years of age, of irreproachable moral character, of sound physical health, and intend to teach. It is held upon Arithmetic, Algebra through simultaneous simple equations, Grammar and Composition, Geography, United States History, Spelling and Writ-These subjects are all taught in the country schools, and the applicant living in the country has equal opportunity with the one living in town of passing the examination and winning a scholarship. As a matter of fact, the scholarships have usually been about equally divided between country and hamlets, and cities and towns.

The applicants securing the highest general averages are awarded the scholarships in the order of their standing, provided no one shall receive an appointment who does not make 70 per cent. on the whole examination and not less than 50 per cent. on each subject.

These scholarships are good for one session of nine months, but may be continued from year to year for four years or until graduation, upon the good behavior and earnest, conscientious application to duty of the beneficiary. But in no case will they be continued to students whose rank or standing is low, whose general demeanor is objectionable, who do not give promise of usefulness as teachers, or whose health or other circumstances prevent constant attendance on or performance of College duties.

These scholarships have proven a great blessing to many a deserving girl, and have, no doubt, been of much benefit to the common

schools by encouraging and enabling more worthy students to prepare themselves to teach than would have otherwise been able to do so. Through the competitive examination those students best in scholarship are obtained, and usually those most mature and best prepared to profit by the instruction of the institution and to become good teachers. This examination was held last July 11th, and 444 stood it. There were 39 applicants in one County for one scholarship.

The scholarship students constitute a body of earnest, conscientious, hard-working girls, who exercise a fine influence upon the whole student body.

The scholarship examination in the different Counties of the State is also used as an entrance examination. By this arrangement the College can more readily insist on complete and thorough preparation of applicants for admission, and applicants are saved the loss of time and money and the disappointment of coming to College without the requisite scholarship to take up profitably College work. The improvement in the preparation of new students noted by the teachers is due in a measure to this County entrance examination. If it were possible to have all new students stand this examination, the labor of organization at the beginning of each session would be materially reduced and the preparation of entering students could be still further improved. It seems impossible to do this, however, as many parents cannot, or do not, determine to send their daughters to College until after the examination has been held, and an entrance examination must, therefore, be provided for them at the opening of school in September.

COUNTY APPORTIONMENT OF SCHOLARSHIPS.

According to the new apportionment of representatives to the several Counties under the last census, the 124 scholarships will be apportioned next session according to law as follows:

HEALTH.

The health of the College was good last session.

As a matter of precaution, samples of the water from the College supply were sent to Johns Hopkins University before school opened this session to be analyzed chemically and bacteriologically. The analysis showed the water to be unusually free from organic matter and an exceptionally pure drinking water. A smoke test was made of all the plumbing and an inspection of the sewerage by a sanitary expert, and all leaks discovered were stopped and the plumbing made thoroughly safe.

In accordance with the rule of the Board, every one connected with the College, including servants, has been vaccinated this session, except those successfully vaccinated within the past five years.

The resident physician and the director of physical training and outdoor exercise have made a physical examination of every student this session in order that the proper physical exercises may be assigned to each, and also that the health of the individual student and of the student body may be safeguarded in every particular with more certainty.

The following report was recently made to the President by the resident physician, who is also the sanitary officer of the College, and similar reports are made from time to time:

"President D. B. Johnson.

"Dear Sir: The general hygienic conditions are good in all departments.

"In the College buildings the sewage is effectually disposed of by the frequent thorough flushing of the pipes. A disinfectant is used in all closets, and lime is scattered about the kitchen door and waste barrel when needed. The waste barrel is emptied daily. The College forms a little community of itself, but drainage and general oversight are such that any offensive odor from closets or waste is very seldom noticed.

"At the farm the dairy is well kept; vessels, butter utensils and separator are carefully cleansed and the tin vessels are sterilized by steam and exposed to the air and direct sunlight.

"The cattle barn is well cared for and the cows are supplied with pure running water. The slaughter house and its surroundings show careful attention to cleanliness.

"Great care has been taken to prevent the introduction of any contagious disease into the College. Rooms, trunks, clothing, books,

etc., have been disinfected with formalin when there was any possibility of contagion from them.

"All students and servants who have not been successfully vaccinated within five years have been vaccinated.

"There are the usual number of cases at the Infirmary, but no dangerous illnesses yet. A single case of whooping cough has been isolated for four weeks. The patient is doing well and there are no other cases.

COURSES OF STUDY.

The courses of study have been materially strengthened this session along normal and industrial lines. They are arranged in conformity with the purposes of the establishment of the College to secure to its pupils a broad and liberal education so necessary to good teaching, training in the science and art of teaching and in those practical studies by which women may be qualified to make a living for themselves or make their homes happier and better.

In order that certain industrial studies which were thought to be more important than others might be taken by all students, especially in the normal courses, without fail, they were required in all the normal courses. As one result of the new arrangement, 117 pupils are now receiving instruction in cooking, whereas, heretofore, the number has not been more than 45 or 50 in any one year. All students who take the normal course hereafter will be required to take drawing in the Freshman Class and cooking or sewing in the Sophomore and Junior Classes.

Fourteen courses of study are now offered at Winthrop:

- 1. Normal Latin Course (four years) with Industrial Studies, leading to the degree of A. B., with life license to teach.
- 2. Normal Literary Course (four years) with Industrial Studies, leading to the degree of A. B., with life license to teach.
- 3. Normal Scientific Course (four years) with Industrial Studies, leading to the degree of A. B., with life license to teach.
- 4. Three-Year Normal Course, with Industrial Studies, leading to the degree of L. I.
- 5. Normal Course with Music (four years), with Industrial Studies, leading to the degree of A. B., with life license to teach.

- 6. General Latin Course (four years) with Industrial Studies, leading to degree of A. B.
- 7. General Literary Course (four years) with Industrial Studies, leading to degree of A. B.
- 8. General Scientific Course (four years) with Industrial Studies, leading to degree of A. B.
- 9. Special Course in Stenography and Typewriting of nine months.
 - 10. Special Course in Dressmaking of nine months.
 - 11. Special Course in Millinery of nine months.
 - 12. Special Course in Bookkeeping of nine months.
 - 13. Special Course in Music for the training of teachers of music.
- 14. Special Kindergarten Course for the training of kindergarten teachers.

Provision has been made to organize post-graduate courses when desired. The degree of A. M. will be conferred upon those who satisfactorily complete the work prescribed for this post-graduate course.

In addition to the studies of the regular courses of study are taught Stenography, Typewriting, Freehand and Industrial Drawing, Designing, Bookkeeping, Sewing, Cooking, Horticulture, Floriculture, Housekeeping, Expression, and Physical Culture. One industrial study, at least, is required of every student.

The advisability of undertaking poultry raising and bee culture for the boarding department of the College, as well as to give instruction in those important industries, is under consideration. Other subjects, such as silk-raising, photography, printing, etc., will be taken up for consideration and determination as the demand for them arises and the means for teaching them are secured.

During the past seven and a half years there have been enrolled in the Department of Sewing, Dressmaking, and Millinery 956 students, through whom the work has reached at least 900 homes throughout the State. The hats and bonnets made in the Department have gone to Toronto, Canada; Cincinnati, Ohio; Augusta, Ga.; Greenville, Camden, and many of the smaller towns of the State. The dresses made in the Department have gone as far North as Pennsylvania and West as far as Western Tennessee, and to homes throughout the State.

In Stenography and Typewriting 342 students have been enrolled during the past seven and a half years, and a number of the gradu-

ates of this Department are now holding important positions in the State and elsewhere.

During the same time, the number of students instructed in Cooking was 391; in Bookkeeping, 140; and in Floriculture, 218.

The total number of students receiving instruction in the industrial branches during the past seven and a half years, not including 1,271 in Industrial Drawing, is thus seen to have been 2,047.

Every student is required to keep her own room in order, and is given directions by the matrons in this part of housekeeping.

The students do the waiting in the Dining Room, and thus secure valuable training in this part of domestic economy.

MANUAL TRAINING.

Manual training as distinct from industrial training is provided for in most of the leading normal schools of the country, because it is being very generally introduced in one form or another into the public schools. It is not easy to overestimate the value to the children of manual training, for the ability to plan and design lies at the foundation of nearly all the arts and crafts. It is the basis of good industrial training. The Board have under consideration the practicability of organizing such a department at the College.

MODEL SCHOOL.

The work of the Model School has been much improved this session by the employment of an additional critic teacher and the increase of the time given for practice work in the Senior year.

The Model School is the distinctive feature of a good normal school. The more complete the Model School, the broader and better and more practical the training of the student-teachers. The student-teachers observe and practice teaching in the Model School under the supervision of critic teachers, and thus secure experience in discipline and teaching before undertaking regular independent teaching. Under the present arrangement, a student gets experience in managing a school under conditions that will obtain, as a rule, in the schools to which she may be called as a teacher. The method of Practice Work now used at the College is that in force in most of the good normal schools of the country.

The number enrolled in the Practice School this session is 62.

The College is much in need of a Practice School building. Such a building was planned in connection with the new dormitory, but

it could not be built at that time for lack of funds. The most effective way of strengthening the Normal School work of the College is to strengthen in every way possible the Model School. It is to be hoped that a Practice School building will be provided for the College in time.

The Board of Trustees of the Rock Hill Graded School contribute annually \$360.00 to the maintenance of this department, inasmuch as children living in the city are instructed in it.

KINDERGARTEN.

We have made provision during the past three years for the training of kindergarten teachers, thus broadening the scope of our teacher-training work and emphasizing our special mission of teacher-training. The supply of kindergarten teachers in the State is not equal to the demand. The work is so important in the opinion of the Board, and the opening for teachers so promising, that scholarship students are allowed to choose between the Normal and Kindergarten Courses, as both prepare for teaching, and the kindergarten graduate makes a most excellent primary teacher if unable to secure a position in a kindergarten. The best primary methods are based upon kindergarten methods, are, in fact, moulded in great measure by them, and for this reason the regular normal students are given an opportunity of observing the work of the Kindergarten school.

ALUMNAE ASSOCIATION.

A large and active Alumnæ Association of the graduates of the Winthrop Normal College at Columbia transfers its allegiance to the enlarged institution at Rock Hill. It has been, and continues to be, most helpful in advancing the interests of the institution. An interesting meeting of this Association was held at the College during Commencement week, and its membership was increased by the 33 graduates of 1902, making in all 416 alumnæ, earnest, devoted women, most of whom are teaching in this State, and by their work and example are elevating the tone and standard of the common schools. This number does not include the graduates of special and industrial departments, who, as a rule, are occupying important positions.

LITERARY SOCIETIES.

The two Literary Societies, Winthrop and Curry, have undertaken the publication of a College magazine. The two societies have equal representation on the Board of Editors and Managers, and are responsible for the management of the undertaking. A committee of the Faculty supervises the work of the editors. The magazine is called *The Winthrop College Journal* and it is a creditable College publication.

The two societies have a large and enthusiastic membership. The teachers are honorary members of both and take an active interest in them.

YOUNG WOMEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION.

The Young Women's Christian Association is the largest student organization in the College. It enrolled 315 members last year and is expected to enroll an equal, if not greater, number this year.

It exerts a strong and wholesome influence upon the whole Christian life of the College and is encouraged in every way possible.

The Association has decided to start a building fund to build an Association Hall on the campus, as has been done at a number of other colleges, and, from the spirit and determination shown, it will succeed, no doubt, in the undertaking.

The Association assists materially in looking after new students and making them feel at home. It has printed a little hand-book of useful information for new students intending to enter Winthrop, and these are sent out with the catalogues.

In connection with its other work, it has contributed to the support of the free kindergarten for the poor mill children of the city.

RELIGIOUS LIFE.

Students are allowed to attend their own churches in the city, or the churches to which their parents or guardians belong, every Sunday morning, and are required to attend services in the College Chapel every Sunday night, conducted by the ministers of the different denominations in Rock Hill in rotation. Attendance upon Sunday School is encouraged.

SOCIETY FOR THE IMPROVEMENT OF RURAL PUBLIC SCHOOLS IN THE STATE.

Members of the Senior Class, actuated by a most commendable purpose, have organized among themselves a Society for the Improvement of the Country Schools of the State. Many of these students are farmers' daughters, and they realize fully the pressing necessity for improvement in the country schools and are determined to do what they can to this end. They will address themselves first to the beautifying of buildings and grounds. Each member of the society will do something during the session to improve the country school near her home, and during next session will try to arouse an interest in this matter among the patrons and pupils of the school where she may be located. It is a question of care, thought, and taste in accomplishing results in this work, rather than money, and we feel that it is a most appropriate work for students of the College established and maintained by the State chiefly to train teachers for the common schools of the State. Any effort in the direction of the improvement of rural schools, of making the country more desirable as a place of residence for the white farmer, and, therefore, checking, even to a very limited extent, the harmful tendency of the white man to desert the farm for the town, is to be commended.

Similar societies are being organized in other States and are accomplishing much good.

The membership of the society is not to be confined to students or alumnæ of Winthrop.

LIBRARY AND READING ROOMS.

The Library is an invaluable and indispensable adjunct to the College. It now contains over 5,800 volumes of well selected books—dictionaries, reference books, works on education, and standard works on art, science, and literature. Many volumes are added to it

every session with the special appropriation for this purpose made by the Legislature. During the past session there have been donations of valuable books by Messrs. A. M. Lee, Charles W. Dabney, J. P. Kinard, D. B. Johnson, and Miss M. H. Leonard. Some good pictures and valuable relics have been presented to the Library by E. B. Mobley and D. B. Johnson.

The Library room is a spacious hall, 54x71 feet, with a high ceiling, and is well lighted. It is handsomely furnished with everything necessary to the convenience and comfort of the students. It is arranged with a view of making it an attractive place and a genuine literary workshop. The students do much supplementary reading in the Library in the prosecution of their studies. The most approved card catalogue is used, which makes all the books available.

There is no charge to students for the use of the Library. It is kept open every day and a Librarian is constantly in charge.

In connection with the Library are two reading rooms, where the leading magazines, periodicals, and newspapers are on file.

FARM AND GROUNDS.

The farm is an indispensable part of the College. The boarding department could not be run properly without it at the low prices charged students for board and with a limited market to depend upon. Other colleges in the South have been compelled to run farms to keep cost to students down and to secure an unfailing supply of fresh vegetables, fruit, milk, butter, and meat.

The dairy herd was much improved during the summer by the purchase of good cows upon trial and test. No cow was bought that did not give a yield of from 3 to 4 gallons of milk per day and whose milk did not test up to $3\frac{1}{2}$ to 5 per cent. of butter fat. There are now 59 cows in the herd.

The present farm of 144 acres is not large enough for the purposes of the College since it has been enlarged. It would pay the College and the State to have more land.

Convict labor could be used on the farm, as is done at Clemson College, economically and to great advantage. The experience at the College with convict labor has been entirely satisfactory. From 25 to 35 per cent. more work can be obtained from them than from the same number of free hands, at a cost of 50 to 60 per cent. less.

By a thorough system of checks and bookkeeping it can be readily seen just what the products of the farm are for a given time, with the cost of their production.

SUMMER SCHOOL.

The State Summer School was held at Winthrop last summer from June 25th to July 23d, and was attended by over 400 teachers from all parts of the State.

The State Teachers' Association, the Association of Graded School Boards of Trustees, the Association of County Boards of Education, and a conference of the Trustees of the State Colleges, all met at the College during the session of the Summer School.

The College appropriated \$322.50 to help pay instructors in this school and furnished board at \$14.25, this charge including an infirmary fee of 25 cents to cover nursing, care, and diet. The business men of Rock Hill subscribed, through the Commercial Club, the remainder of the \$600.00 necessary to run the school.

The services of the executive force of the College were given free of charge to the Summer School, and all of its apparatus, books, and appointments were placed at its disposal.

Although the Board will have a number of extra expenses to meet for the coming year, yet they feel that an earnest effort should be made to continue the Summer School. It would be a distinct loss to the teachers and to the College to discontinue it.

EXHIBIT AT THE SOUTH CAROLINA, INTERSTATE, AND WEST INDIAN EXPOSITION.

A gold medal was awarded the College by the Committee of Awards for the exhibit of College work and results made at the South Carolina, Interstate and West Indian Exposition. An eminent writer, commenting upon the exhibits in an article in the Century Magazine, says: "Among the appeals to the intelligence in the South Carolina Building it seems to me that the exhibit of Winthrop College stands first. Some 500 are being taught there and it turns out teachers for the schools of South Carolina. Its diploma indicates that besides her book-learning each young lady has already benefited during two years by a practical experience of teaching the younger classes. From its kitchen exhibit to its examination papers this showing of Winthrop College is admirably presented. The institution must do great good."

VISIT OF STUDENT-BODY TO THE EXPOSITION.

The visit of the students to Charleston last April 2d, 3d, 4th, and 5th to see the Exposition was very enjoyable and profitable in every

way. The necessary expenses of the whole trip, including railroad fare, board, admission to the Exposition grounds, street car fare, and trip to the Isle of Palms, amounted to less than \$8.00. The girls paid their own expense.

It was the only opportunity most of the girls will ever have of visiting an exposition, and all who took advantage of it were broadened, instructed, and greatly benefited.

It is gratifying to note that the healthful appearance and good behavior of the girls on all occasions elicited very general and favorable comment.

DEPORTMENT.

The order at Winthrop during the session has been very good indeed. The students have been earnest, diligent, and law-abiding, and there has been no friction or trouble in the school. The matrons in charge of the dormitories report: "The order has been excellent, most of the girls being conscientious, faithful students. All have worked together in harmony. With very few exceptions, the girls have been faithful in their work, respectful and kind in their bearing toward those in authority, and pleasant in their intercourse with each other."

Winthrop has the usual College rules, somewhat liberalized, and the authorities enforce them kindly, considerately, and sympathetically, but with firmness. It is the feeling of the President and his assistants that strong individuality and the best that is in one are developed by confidence and trust.

UNIFORM DRESS.

The richest girl at Winthrop cannot be distinguished from the poorest by her dress. All students, without exception, whether regular or special, are required to wear a uniform dress to secure economy and to promote equality of opportunity. The uniform is neat and stylish. The material is a navy blue serge. The whole cost for dressing for a session of nine months under our arrangements need not exceed \$26.00.

FINANCES.

The College has been conducted on the appropriation made by the Legislature at its last session only by practicing the strictest economy, by postponing some much needed improvements provided for in the estimate submitted to the Legislature by the Board, by using current funds temporarily for carrying the insurance on the College property until the next meeting of the Legislature, and by raising the price of board to the students, thus increasing the revenues of the College and decreasing the amounts of the items heretofore charged to the State appropriation. The cut in the appropriation asked for has made it exceedingly difficult to run the College properly, with its scope, work, and numbers enlarged as they have been during the past two years, and as they had to be to meet the legitimate demands upon the College by the people of the State.

The financial report of the Treasurer of the Board for the scholastic year, July 1st, 1901, to July 1st, 1902, with the report of the Finance Committee of the Board, is appended to this report.

The balance of the State appropriation for the support of the College, \$16,853.22, undrawn at the date of the financial report, July 1st, 1902, is not included in the receipts of the College.

This balance is drawn out of the State Treasury, as needed, and, together with the balance reported in the College treasury July 1st, 1902, \$735.99, is used for running the College to January 1st, 1903, and will be accounted for in the next annual report, in accordance with the law.

In the total receipts of the College we have included the money paid by students and teachers for board and the scholarship fund, which, however, do not go to the general support of the institution, but to the running of the boarding department.

The cost of conducting the College proper for the past scholastic year, including all salaries, improvements, repairs, etc., apart from the boarding department, was \$64,976.52, and the total receipts, not including money paid for board and the scholarship fund, \$65,712.51.

An itemized statement of the receipts and disbursements of the College is filed with the State Superintendent of Education, and of expenditures with the Comptroller General, as required by law.

The Treasurer of the Board gives a good and sufficient bond, which is deposited with the State Treasurer.

ESTIMATES FOR NEXT SESSION.

A careful estimate of expenses based upon the experience of last session and a thorough consideration of the necessities of the College, with its present enlarged scope and work unchanged, shows that we shall need the following amounts for running expenses, equipment, insurance, repairs, etc., for the coming year:

This estimate is less than that of last year by \$1,000.00 and is made so only by cutting off some items which were asked for then and are needed now, but which can wait for another year.

The Board of Trustees have exercised the greatest care in making up this estimate and have included only those items which the well being and the proper conduct of the College imperatively demand. The College cannot be run with its present fine and large work unimpaired on less money.

It will be noted that the estimate provides for three years' insurance on all College property, and for repainting the old buildings, which badly need it for the preservation of the woodwork. In fact, this painting can hardly be postponed longer without serious injury resulting to the property. The insurance has been provided for temporarily, until the meeting of the Legislature, by using current funds, which must be replaced to enable the Board to pay salaries and other necessary current expenses up to January 1st, 1903. On account of the complete system of fire protection at the College, a very low rate of insurance is secured.

The estimate does not include the scholarship fund as a resource of the College, because that fund is paid not to the College, but to the students individually to help them defray their expenses, according to the Act approved March 9th, 1896. The College acts as agent for the student in drawing the money from the State Treasury.

The above estimates are for running one of the largest institutions of its kind in the country on an economical basis. Winthrop College is a young and growing institution and has been greatly enlarged in the past two years in scope, work, and numbers, and hence the necessity for more money to run it; but, neverthelesss, a comparison with similar institutions will show that the per capita cost is low and that the request of the Board for some \$60,000.00 to conduct it is reasonable, and that strict economy will have to be practiced to conduct it properly on that amount.

To the Hon. J. J. McMahan, State Superintendent of Education of South Carolina, Columbia, S. C.

The Board of Trustees of the Colored Normal, Industrial, Agricultural and Mechanical College of South Carolina, respectfully submit the following report through you to the General Assembly of South Carolina:

We herewith submit the report of the President of the College, embodying reports of the Academic, Normal and Industrial Departments, showing that good, solid work is being done, harmonious efforts being expended by all concerned.

The Industrial Department is scoring a signal success, the fine exhibit of the industries, securing a gold medal at the South Carolina Interstate and West Indian Exposition. No better work of the kind is being done anywhere. There were 804 industrial units pursued last year out of an enrolment of 624 students, thus showing that each student at least took one or more trades or industries. The students that leave this school will be self-sustaining and not parasites on the body politic.

The farm continues to make a good showing. Farmers' Institutes were held in fifteen (15) counties this year, to the edification of the white and black. Experiments still continue on the farm with various kinds of cotton and corn, and especial attention was given this year to prolific green stock feeding plants, with success.

The health of the student body continues to compare most favorably with any similar institution.

Five thousand, nine hundred and forty dollars and forty-seven cents have been expended on the new brick Industrial building. It will require about \$5,000.00 additional to finish and place the machinery in said building.

A steam heating plant has been installed in Morrill Hall at a cost of \$3,300.00, which adds much to the safety of the building and the health and comfort of the students.

The President's Report shows the receipts and disbursements for the year, an itemized account of which has been filed with the State Superintendent of Education. It is always subject to inspection. The President's report likewise shows the itemized needs of the institution necessary to continue the construction in hand and to run the institution on, viz.:

A storm this summer damaged the roof of the new industrial building several hundred dollars on account of its unfinished state.

HEALTH.

The health of the institution, on account of the medical aid and directions of the college physician, Dr. J. W. Lowman, has always been good, having had very little sickness that is not common to the localities from which students have come.

HEAT AND LIGHT.

We have placed in position a steam heating plant at a cost of \$3,300.00, in Morrill Hall, which heats comfortably every room in the said building. Bradham Hall and all other buildings are heated with wood stoves. All buildings are lighted with kerosene lamps, which is a continued source of danger. I therefore most respectfully ask that \$8,000.00 be appropriated with which to purchase a dynamo, first, for the purpose of furnishing light in all the buildings, second, for the purpose of teaching the advanced students applied electricity.

NEW INDUSTRIAL BUILDING.

We have begun the erection of a new Industrial building 120x90 feet, two stories high. When completed we shall have floor space sufficient to provide for nine Industrial Departments. This building is being constructed with brick. We have expended in all \$5,940.74. It is a little over half finished. It will require \$4,000.00 to finish all the departments of said building.

ADMISSION.

In the College dormitory boys will not be received under fifteen years of age, nor girls under fourteen. All students must be of good health, are required to bring testimonials of good moral character, and have a knowledge of the ordinary branches of an English education. If they are not qualified for the higher departments, they will be permitted to prepare for the same in the lower grades.

DEPARTMENTS.

The Military Department shows general progress. Regular drills are held three times a week, upon which all male students over fourteen years of age are required to attend. Guard duty is performed each night, all cadets taking part. In addition to this, regulation fire drills will be instituted, thus providing discipline and protection in cases of emergency.

The Department of Agriculture is doing well. The Model School and Kindergarten are accomplishing much. The subjects of Pedagogics and Civics are especially for those who desire to teach, and hence are pursued by all students of the Normal course and those who are in the Literary and Industrial courses.

The work in this department is bringing forth excellent results. I call your attention to the Department of Bricklaying and Plastering. This department is turning out good work. All the brickwork and plastering of the buildings have been done by the students of this department. They are instructed practically. Architectural Drawing is also taught. The department is accomplishing its aim and achieving good results.

The Department of Woodwork is a model. The material furnished therefrom (with which our buildings are constructed) is admired by all visitors.

In the Iron-Working Department there are sixty-eight students, some of whom will reflect much credit upon the College. The Painting Department is doing well. All of our buildings are painted from time to time by students in this department. There are many boys in the painting class.

The Sewing Department, managed by Miss C. C. Davis, is attended by 264 girls. Each girl is required to give one day out of every week therein. They are instructed in plain sewing and dress-making.

FARMERS' INSTITUTES.

The Farmers' Institutes, organized and conducted in the different counties last summer, were a success and thoroughly enjoyed by the farmers. They were held in the following places: Manning, St. Paul, Bishopville, Camden, Eastover, Winnsboro, Chester, Lancaster, Yorkville, Gaffney, Ridgeland, Walterboro, Adams Run, Bonneau, and Georgetown.

The contract for erecting school building, as stated in last annual report, was awarded to Geo. W. Waring, of Columbia, for the sum of \$18,943. Said building will be ready for occupancy by the opening of next school term, October 1st. Said building is brick, three stories high, covered with slate, and contains eighteen class rooms, eight music rooms, a large chapel, Superintendent's office, teachers' room, storeroom, and two toilet rooms. All rooms are provided with ventilators and ventilating stacks. The building is heated by steam, lighted by electricity, and well supplied with pure spring water. It is substantially constructed and well suited to our work, and has been pronounced by competent experts in our line of educational work as one of the best arranged and equipped school buildings in the United States. The chapel or auditorium, which is located in the West end of the building, is large, well ventilated and easily accessible both to the public and to the pupils. The blind and deaf children of South Carolina are to be congratulated on their good fortune in having the State thus to provide so handsomely and liberally for their educational interests.

Our insurance policies have been renewed for three years, except two which will soon expire, and these will be covered by the balance on hand for that purpose as shown by the foregoing financial statement.

The entire lower halls of the main building have been replastered, and the reception room, parlor, and pupils' dining room will be replastered during the vacation months.

The new boilers for heating our buildings, recently put in, gave us good service during last winter, and we think will prove to be of sufficient capacity to heat the new school building as well as the main building.

The spring has been securely protected by a substantial granite curbing, and thus insures us a safe and adequate supply of good water for all purposes.

The cold storage room has proven a success and has added much to the economy and efficiency of our supply department.

The one thing now needed to make Cedar Spring an ideal location in every way for our work is the extension of the electric car line, which now runs within one and a half miles of us, to the institution. This would make us in fact a suburb of the progressive and growing city of Spartanburg. The schools of this kind, located in cities, are clamoring for removal from said cities to the suburbs in order to have the quiet and healthful advantages of the country, and at

the same time, with safe and rapid transportation, to secure any advantages that may be afforded by the city.

In accordance with resolution of your Board, as passed two years ago, the law governing the composition of the Board of Commissioners of this institution was changed by the last Legislature, so that hereafter the Board will be composed of five members, viz.: The Superintendent of Education, ex-officio, and four others to be appointed by the Governor.

The following appropriations will be necessary for the proper maintenance of the institution for next fiscal year, viz.:

For support\$24,000 00 For repairs, buildings and premises......500 00

The increase asked for in appropriation for support is required on account of the increase in number of pupils in actual attendance.

In conclusion, I desire to place on record my hearty thanks to the members of your Board and to your predecessors for the confidence reposed in me for so many years, and for the active, cordial, and enthusiastic support given me at all times in the furtherance of the interests of this institution. The Chairman of your Board has given his services gratuitously, and almost continuously for nearly a quarter of a century, to the well-being and upbuilding of the school. He has seen its growth from a small school with three or four teachers and about forty pupils, occupying a building heated with open fire places, lighted with candles and kerosene oil lamps, and dependent on shallow wells in the yard for a water supply, to its present size with an expert corps of instructors, with 180 pupils in attendance and an up-to-date equipment in every way.

TERMS OF ADMISSION.

1st. Persons desiring to procure the admission of pupils should apply by letter, or otherwise, to the Superintendent of the institution for instructions as to the manner of procedure, and no pupils should be sent to the institution until such instructions shall have been fully complied with.

2d. All are required to come provided with an adequate supply of good comfortable clothing, embracing suitable articles for both sum-

mer and winter wear, in such quantity as to admit of the necessary changes for washing and repairing, the whole to be neatly packed in a good trunk, with a good lock and key.

- 3d. Each article of clothing should be distinctly marked with the owner's name, in order to prevent confusion or loss, and must be sent in good order and condition, not only upon the first entrance of the pupil, but also at each subsequent return from home after the vacation.
- 4th. A small amount of money, say five or ten dollars, will be required to be deposited with the Superintendent for the benefit of the pupil should need require.
 - 5th. Pay pupils charged \$150 for session of nine months.
- 6th. Except in cases of sickness, all pupils are expected to remain at the institution from the commencement to the close of each session, at which time parents or friends should be prepared to take them home to spend the vacation.
- 7th. The scholastic session commences on the first Wednesday in October and closes on the last Wednesday in June.
- 8th. No person of imbecile or unsound mind or confirmed immoral character or incapacitated by physical infirmity for useful instruction will be knowingly received into the institution; and in case any pupil shall, after a trial, prove incompetent for useful instruction or wilfully and persistently disobedient to the regulations of the institution, such pupil will thereupon be discharged.

LOCATION.

The South Carolina Institute for the Education of the Deaf and the Blind is located at Cedar Spring, Spartanburg County, four miles south of Spartanburg, C. H., and one mile west of Glendale Station, on the Spartanburg and Columbia Railroad, and occupies a healthful and pleasant site.

REPORT.

To the Honorable Members of the General Assembly:

The South Carolina Interstate and West Indian Exposition has passed into history, and its record is one of which the State and the whole South is proud. The very conception of such an undertaking was an evidence of great industrial reawakening among us, and its grand and successful accomplishment proved beyond question to the world that in all that goes to make up a live, energetic and progressive people, we are not behind any other people in the country, but that those particular qualities which are yet destined to make the State and the South the manufacturing, agricultural, commercial and industrial centre of the Union were only dormant; and if the Exposition did no more than make this known to the world, and was the cause of urging us on to greater activity, it will have returned to us an hundredfold the expenditure we placed upon it. dom of the State in appropriating \$50,000 towards a State exhibit was honestly questioned by some when the suggestion was brought up, but now that it is over, its effects can be easily seen by any one who takes the small trouble to make only a cursory investigation. Our great resources, material and otherwise; our splendid educational system, which may be said to be yet in the infancy period of development; the genius, the civilization and culture of our people. were shown to the world in a more attractive and substantial way than ever before. As a result, more inquiries have been made by outside capitalists looking for investment than in the history of the State, and that actual results have followed from such inquiries is a fact well known to many of our officials, as well as citizens of different localities in the State. It is unfortunate that we have no statistical department by which all these things could be shown, for then it could be proven by undisputable figures what good has resulted. However, it is only necessary to state the fact, and no doubt a large number of the members of the General Assembly can recall in their own or neighboring communities some evidences of industrial progress already realized, as well as a feeling of confident hope of greater development in the future. Some of this feeling may be ascribed to the general prosperity with which our country has been blessed during the past year, but without the Exposition our people would

never have realized the hidden resources of our own State; but, knowing them, they are now encouraged to develop them; and, lacking though they may be, in the means whereby this development may be consummated, they, with little exertion, can secure all the financial aid necessary, for by this same Exposition, capitalists beyond our borders were for the first time made to perceive the great possibilities in our State, and they are more than willing to invest with us. These things being true, the people of the State may well congratulate themselves upon their course in regard to the Exposition, and if it had to be done over again, we believe the display of our varied resources would be greater, broader and grander than before, and that quicker and vaster development would surely follow.

As Chairman of the South Carolina Commission under the provisions of the Act of the General Assembly to cooperate at the South Carolina Interstate and West Indian Exposition, it is my pleasure to make you a report of the work done.

Under the provisions of the Act, I appointed the following citizens as Commissioners:

Hon. Louis Appelt, of Manning.

Capt. Thomas Wilson, of Cades.

Hon. John B. Cleveland, of Spartanburg.

Capt. F. W. Wagener, of Charleston.

These selections were made after consideration, and the proffer of the appointments were accepted.

It is my pleasure to report that the Board of Commissioners worked diligently and faithfully and that the members of the board willingly responded to every call. It consumed a great deal of the time of the members of the Board to attend the meeetings and take up the details of the work.

The board went to work just as soon as was practical. The Exposition work had to be started at the very beginning. The exhibit which the State had was destroyed by fire at Clemson College, and there was not even a nucleus for the exhibit at Charleston. The State Commission, under the terms of the Act, accepted the beautiful plans of Mr. Bradford L. Gilbert, and of course the plans and details for such a grand scheme took considerable time for development. After the plans were finally received, the Commission experienced a great deal of trouble in securing a contract on the State Building at anything like the figures of the architect-in-chief, but finally, with his hearty cooperation, managed to get a remarkable reduction from the original estimates on the building.

The Commission, at its first meeting in Charleston, found the estimates on the structural work alone ranged from \$26,900 to \$42,000, and the lowest bid on the stucco or staff work was \$11,000. The architect-in-chief fully agreed with the Commission that this was entirely too much, and the board refused to make any contract, but Mr. Gilbert assured the board that the cost of the building could be reduced without affecting the plans. The board adopted the following resolution:

"Whereas, That inasmuch as this Commission is not altogether satisfied with the bids that have been submitted, regarding them as entirely too high, and believing that the proposed building can be erected for considerably less than the bids presented;

"Resolved, That this Commission rejects all of the said bids, and herewith instructs the secretary of this Commission to return to the bidders their bids and checks by mail, which have been filed with him.

"Resolved, further, That the proposition coming through Mr. Gilbert be left open for consideration, to enable Mr. Sutton, his agent and representative, to get the additional data as to the cost of the inside and mural decorations, and also the proportionate cost of the general color scheme showing the cost of the building complete."

All of the deposits were accordingly returned to the contractors by Mr. August Kohn, who had been elected secretary and auditor to the Commission.

At a meeting held on May 2d, 1901, in Charleston, the Commission was still dissatisfied with the proposals, and the architect-in-chief urged that the contractors were too high, and then the following resolutions were adopted:

"Whereas, This Commission finds that such complications exist in getting sufficient data to formulate a definite idea of the total cost of the State Building, and in order to facilitate matters and the award of the contract, and in the interests of economy;

"Be it Resolved, That the chairman appoint a committee of three, with full authority to award the contract for the State Building, or to make such arrangements as will best carry out the scope of the Act as to the building;

"That the secretary of the board shall act at the call of the committee and attend to such matters as he may be called upon for, and all papers and records be filed with him.

"That the total cost complete for which authority is given shall not exceed \$27,000, being the estimate of Architect B. L. Gilbert.

"That the committee report to the chairman within ten days."

Under this resolution, a sub-committee, consisting of Capt. Thos. Wilson, Capt. F. W. Wagener and Mr. Louis Appelt, of the Commission, were to work with the architect. The committee worked in Charleston, saw the contractors, and finally agreed to make the best possible contract.

The final figures are shown in this report:

"Administration Building, Exposition Grounds, "Charleston, S. C., May 6th, 1901.

"Subject: Proposal for Palace of Agriculture.

"Col. John H. Averill, Director General and Secretary S. C., I. & W. I. Exposition Company.

"Making a total which includes everything I included in my estimates of any of the Palaces heretofore contracted for\$28,960 05

"I therefore recommend that with the consent and advice of your General Counsel, after carefully examining the contracts, this building be contracted with the firm of contractors above named at the price named without any further delay, and desire to call your notice that I have experienced the greatest difficulty in securing this bid because of the increase in the price of labor, together with the constantly increasing difficulty of finishing this building within the time required.

"I desire to state that this latter condition of affairs cannot be too strongly emphasized. Respectfully submitted,

"(Signed.) Bradford L. GILBERT,

"Architect in Chief.

"per Charles M. Sutton,

"Principal Assistant."

The action of the Committee is embraced in the following:

"Resolved, That the total bid for the construction of the Palace of Agriculture for the South Carolina Interstate and West Indian Exposition, for the sum of \$28,960.05, be accepted.

"Resolved further, That as the Committee is limited to the expenditure of \$27,000 for this building, Mr. Thos. Wilson has guaranteed personally the payment of \$1,000 and the Exposition Company having guaranteed the payment of \$960.05, that the State Commission make an appropriation of these several amounts, relieving them of their guarantees, and accept the full amount of the bid, namely, \$26,060.05.

"(Signed) Louis Appelt,
"F. W. Wagener,
"Thomas Wilson"

The full Board of Commissioners at a subsequent meeting heartily approved of the action of the sub-committee; congratulated them on their contract, and assumed on the part of the Commission, for the State, all liability and responsibility incurred.

The contract was regarded as very favorable.

The State had one of the handsomest and most attractive buildings on the beautiful grounds.

On the 6th day of May, 1901, the formal contracts for the building were signed. The builder's contract was with McCarrell & Sloan and the staff work was undertaken by the Exposition Company.

The contract stipulated that the building be completed on or before November 1st, 1901. A bond was required and given for the acceptable completion of the work at the time agreed upon. For a variety of reasons the building was delayed, causing a great deal of trouble and delay, but when completed was an exceedingly handsome building.

At the meeting of the Commission on March 28th, 1901, the Directors of the Exposition Company were requested to submit in writing statements showing that: "the subscriptions to the capital stock of the Exposition Company amount to \$200,000 by responsible subscribers, payable in cash, and that not less than \$50,000 has been appropriated by the City Council of Charleston, for the erection of a building and otherwise promoting the said Exposition."

Certificates as to each of the terms having been fully complied with were forwarded and were placed on file in the Comptroller

General's office before any funds were drawn from the State's appropriation for the Exposition work.

The State Commission felt that everything possible should be done to cooperate with the Directors of the Exposition Company in carrying out the work, and especially in the collection and care of the exhibit.

Joint meetings were held between the State Commission and the Board of Directors of the Exposition Company, and the plans were fully discussed. Director General Averill met with the Commission and cooperated in every way towards the preparation of successful plans.

The State Commission found when it was appointed some preliminary work had been undertaken.

As a result of the joint meetings and the views of the two Boards the following suggestion was submitted by the Board of Directors, April 12th, 1901:

"Whereas, At the recent joint meeting of the State Board of Exposition Commissioners and this Board, a suggestion was made that this Board should assume the disbursement under the provisions of the Act of the Legislature of the funds or the remainder after cost of building was paid, therefore be it

"Resolved, That this Board is ready and willing to aid the State Commissioners in any way, and they therefore request that the State Board would present such propositions as they may desire this Board to consider and the same shall have the careful consideration of this Board."

There were numerous suggestions as to how the exhibits could be best secured and arranged. There was no time for delay, and it was thought best to have a Superintendent and place him in the field. Mr. Alex. W. Love, of Chester, was elected Superintendent and asked to push his work as much as possible. He worked faithfully, intelligently, and well, and accomplished surprisingly satisfactory and handsome results. Superintendent Love found it difficult to secure cooperation in many instances, but the State made a creditable and handsome exhibit at Charleston.

After fully considering the matter the Commission adopted the following resolutions, which were submitted to the Exposition Directory, through Director General Averill:

The South Carolina Exposition Commission having received an invitation from the Board of Directors of the South Carolina Interstate and West Indian Exposition, beg leave to make the following proposition:

Whereas, It is desirable to have a complete exhibit of the natural resources of the State, and as the Exposition Company has a full and complete organization with officers and other equipment, that the South Carolina Commission delegate to the Commissioners of the Exposition Company the undertaking of preparing a creditable exhibit of the resources of the State, under the provisions of the Act of the General Assembly.

It is desired that the said Exposition Company, through the Board of Directors, assume charge as the Agent of the South Carolina Commission in carrying out the provisions of the Act of the Legislature so far as the preparation of the exhibit is concerned and the proper care and return of the same.

That the Commission elect a Superintendent, who is to be paid \$100.00 per month and actual expenses, and is to be under the direction of the Directors of the Exposition Company as one of their department officers and subject to their rules and regulations. His duties shall be the securing of proper exhibits throughout the State under the provisions of the Act of the General Assembly. He shall have charge of the arrangement of the exhibit, the transportation to and from the Exposition, installation, care and return of the exhibits, and make account to the Exposition Commission, through its Secretary.

The Superintendent elected by the South Carolina Commission shall be the custodian of the State Building after its completion, and shall monthly make report to the Exposition Company of the work done, and copies of such report shall be filed with the Secretary of the South Carolina Commission.

First. It shall be a condition of the delegation of this authority to the Exposition Directors that they shall appropriate out of the State's funds the sum of \$500.00 each to Clemson College, the South Carolina College, and Winthrop College, and \$250.00 to the Citadel Academy.

Second. That these appropriations should be made for the purpose of enabling these institutions to make an exhibit at the Exposition, and are upon condition that each of said institutions shall appropriate an equal sum, or more, from its resources. The amount to be left to the Trustees or Board of Directors of each institution,

with the understanding that not less than \$2,000.00 shall be voted by Clemson College and \$500.00 each for Winthrop College and the South Carolina College. That the sum of \$250.00 be appropriated for exhibit from the Institute for the Deaf, Dumb, and Blind, and \$250.00 for the State Hospital for the Insane, if so much be necessary.

Third. That the Directors of the Exposition Company shall further reserve and pay from the State funds as premiums, the sum of \$1,000.00 to the county having the best exhibit of its natural resources; the sum of \$500.00 to the county making the second best exhibit of its natural resources; the sum of \$250.00 for the county making the third best exhibit of its natural resources. The prizes awarded to the successful counties to be paid to the county treasurers and to be used for the benefit of the counties in such manner and for such purpose as shall be determined by the County Board of Commissioners, of which the County Supervisor is Chairman.

Fourth. That the sum of \$1,000.00, if so much be necessary, be appropriated and paid for the collection and preparation of exhibits of the mineral and forestry resources of this State. The said work to be under the direction of the State Geologist, in connection with the Exposition Directors.

Fifth. That the sum of \$250.00, if so much be necessary to pay the actual expenses only of the State Commission, be appropriated out of State funds.

Sixth. That the sum of \$250.00 and expenses be appropriated and paid to the Secretary of the State Commission.

Seventh. The Board of Exposition Directors assume all responsibility for the care and return of the exhibits.

Eighth. Provided further that in making disbursements under this agreement, all bills and invoices shall be certified by the Superintendent and audited by the Secretary of the State Commission, who is hereby appointed Auditor for that purpose, and approved by the Governor of the State, as required by the Act.

The following sum is allotted and is hereby guaranteed by the Exposition Commission:

For the carrying out of the contracts made for the completion of the State Building, \$29,576.60.

The following appropriations of the funds are suggested by the Exposition Commission:

All disbursement shall be made strictly in accordance with the appropriations indicated, as far as made, and no money shall be diverted except by the approval of the Chairman of the Exposition Commission.

All claims and bills, before payment, shall be audited by the Auditor of the Exposition Commission, and upon his approval submitted to the Governor for approval, and when approved by him, shall be paid.

All claims shall come through the Directory of the Charleston Exposition Company, and approved by the Director General of said Exposition.

All exhibits of the resources of the State of South Carolina shall be placed in the State Building free of all costs to the exhibitor, under such rules and regulations as the Board of Directors see fit as to floor space to be allowed.

The plan was adopted, and the State Commission received the following extract from the minutes of the Directors of the South Carolina Interstate and West Indian Exposition of July 8th, 1901:

Whereas, The South Carolina Exposition has submitted to the South Carolina Interstate and West Indian Exposition Company a proposition delegating to the latter the duty of assembling a creditable exhibit of the resources of this State to be made at the approaching exhibition to be held in the city of Charleston, S. C.,

Therefore, be it Resolved by the Board of Directors of the above named Exposition Company as follows:

First. That the said Exposition Company through its Board of Directors will, as the agent of the above named South Carolina Exposition Commission, undertake to carry into effect the collection

of an exhibit of the natural resources of the State, to be made in the building being erected by said Commission on the Exposition Grounds in the city of Charleston aforesaid under the provisions of an Act entitled "An Act to provide for a building and a State exhibit at the South Carolina Interstate and West Indian Exposition and to make an appropriation for the same," approved 8th February, 1901.

Second. That the Exposition Company will operate through A. W. Love, Esq., the Superintendent elected and provided for this purpose by the said Commission, who will be under the direction of the Board of Directors of the Exposition Company and subject to the rules of said Company. His duties shall be to secure proper exhibits throughout the State, and he shall have charge of the arrangement of the same in said building, their transportation to and from the Exposition, and their installation, care and return. He shall make monthly reports to the Exposition Company of the work done by him in this matter. He shall be the Custodian of the building after its completion.

Third. That the Exposition Company will, at the cost of the said Commission, assume all responsibility for the care and return of the exhibits through the above named Superintendent of said Commission

Fourth. That all exhibits of the resources of this State shall be made in said building free of charge to the exhibitor under such regulations as the said Board of Directors may make regarding the allotting of floor space.

Fifth. The Board of Directors of the Exposition Company understand that the said Commission have appropriated the funds at their command as follows:

Sixth. That, as required by the Commission, all bills will be passed upon by the Director General of the Exposition Company, it being understood that no payment will be made except upon bills and invoices certified to by the said Superintendent, audited by the Secretary of the State Commission, and approved by the Governor of the State.

The funds were expended on the lines indicated, and no money has been paid out except upon receipts and the approval of the Chairman of the Commission, all of which are filed with the worrants in the hands of the Comptroller-General.

The books of the Secretary and Auditor show the expenditure of the State's appropriations, and a statement therefrom is attached.

At the meeting of the Commission on October 17th, 1901, in Charleston, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That all manufactured products of this State be admitted into the South Carolina Building, without cost for floor space, as can be consistently allowed them. The space to be granted on application to A. W. Love, Chester, Superintendent of State Exhibits, or John H. Averill, Charleston, representing South Carolina Commission"

The conditions as to the prize for the best county exhibit were amended so as to provide the prizes "for the best collective exhibit."

Mr. Jesse T. Gantt was requested to arrange an exhibit of the historical relics of the State at this meeting, and Superintendent of Education McMahan was authorized to prepare an exhibit of the schools of the State.

The Board of Directors approved these matters.

I beg to say that the Commission has met with the cooperation of the Board of Directors, the Director-General and the Architect-in-Chief, and that the members of the State Commission, Superintendent, Secretary and Auditor have all done their work—much of it which does not appear—with care and faithfulness.

The South Carolina Commission found that the Exposition management had its hands so very full with the enormous details of its great work that, while it was eager and anxious to lend every possible assistance, the work of collecting and arranging the exhibit fell almost entirely on the Superintendent, Mr. A. W. Love, the members of the Commission, and the Secretary and Auditor of the Board

Although it was hard work, the State made a most creditable and satisfactory exhibit, and all who visited the Exposition expressed intense satisfaction with the State's exhibit.

The exhibit proved entirely acceptable to even the most critical. Considerably more than half of the State's appropriation had to be expended in the erection and preparation of the State Building, and it will be appreciated what rigid economy and great care had to be exercised in making so creditable a display with the available funds, and then be able to report an unexpended balance of \$1,024.61. Of course the State building would not have been near so completely filled had it not been for the great interest and fine displays of various counties, the State Colleges, and others. A detailed report

as to those who so generously cooperated in the great work is given in the report of Superintendent Love, which is attached. South Carolina certainly has abundant reason to be satisfied and proud of the building and exhibit which were made possible by the wisdom of the General Assembly.

There was considerable rivalry between the various counties for the prizes offered by the State Commission, and it will be of interest to submit the report of the jury of awards, which follows:

Dear Sir: Pursuant to appointment by His Excellency, Governor M. B. McSweeney, and realizing the responsibility placed upon it, your Jury has examined, with great care and painstaking, the exhibits made by the counties of Berkeley, Chester, Darlington, Dorchester, Florence, Georgetown, Greenwood, Horry, Marlboro, Orangeburg, Pickens, Spartanburg and Sumter. There are items of great merit in each, and your Jury was greatly impressed with the high character of the average exhibits presented by each of these counties, and by the variety and quality of the products shown.

The competition was very close, and your Jury has been greatly perplexed in trying to fix upon an equitable distribution of honors, where so much of excellence has been presented. Adhering, however, strictly to the schedule of points handed the Jury for its guidance, to wit:

Charleston, S. C., May 28, 1902.

To His Excellency, Governor M. B. McSweeney.

of a public Park, all the land deeded to said Association by the South Carolina Jockey Club. Upon the land thus purchased by the City stand the Cotton Palace, that belongs to the City, the Palace of Agriculture, that belongs to the State of South Carolina, and some few buildings belonging to the Exposition Company. Unfortunately the Auditorium, the Administration Building and the West Indian Building are not situated on the land that belongs to the Charleston Library Association.

It is the desire and wish of the City to make this property the site of a public Park, and as far as our means will permit to retain and continue its present beautiful appearance.

We have, however, expended in this purchase considerably more than the amount paid us for the part of Chicora Park purchased by the United States Government for the Naval Station. We will have no money left for improving and keeping up this Park, except what is raised by direct taxation. On behalf of the City, I write to know if the State of South Carolina will transfer to us their building known as the Palace of Agriculture, and also what arrangements can be made for the permanent continuance therein of the State exhibit under the care and charge of the Board of Park Commissioners of the City of Charleston.

Asking your favorable consideration of this request, and a prompt reply, I remain,

The South Carolina Commission readily and heartily, so far as it could, cooperated in the plan of establishing a permanent exhibit, and adopted the following resolutions:

"Resolved, That the South Carolina Exposition Commission tender to the City of Charleston such of its exhibits as may be used for a permanent exhibit in the City of Charleston, subject to the condition that the State's exhibit be used in part or entirely in connection with the State and county exhibit at the St. Louis World's Fair Exposition.

"The Commission expects the City of Charleston to insure and protect the exhibits that may be turned over.

"Under the provisions of the Act the Commission is not vested with the final disposition of the exhibits after the St. Louis Exposition, but if it be left to this Commission it will favor returning the

exhibits to Charleston, provided permanent quarters and care be taken of the exhibits in Charleston."

To the Honorable the Mayor and City Council.

Gentlemen: The Board of Park Commissioners would present the following communication and respectfully ask the passage of the resolutions as are herein set forth:

1st. Letter of Chairman of Maryland Exposition Commission, offering the "Maryland Building" free, to the City of Charleston, in consideration that the City pay the ground-rent, \$250.00, due on November 1, 1902. Which offer the Park Commissioners recommend be accepted by the passage of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the City Council of Charleston accept the offer of the Maryland Exposition Commission to transfer to the city of Charleston the "Maryland Building," subject to the terms of the lease of the land on which said building now stands, and that the sum of \$250.00 be and the same is hereby appropriated for the settlement of the ground-rent under said lease, and the payment of the same authorized by the City Treasurer upon the approval by the Corporation Counsel of the deed of transfer of said building, etc., and that said "Maryland Building" be and is hereby transferred to the care and custody of the Board of Park Commissioners, with full powers, as to its location or disposal.

Be it further Resolved, That the Clerk of City Council is hereby instructed to notify the Chairman of the Maryland Exposition Com-

mission of the acceptance of their offer, and to extend to them the thanks of City Council in due and proper form.

2d. Letter of Mr. D. H. Means, Chief Clerk of the State Sinking Fund Commission, offering the City of Charleston the State (Agricultural) Exhibition Building for the sum of \$250.00. The Board of Park Commissioners would recommend the acceptance of the said offer and the passage of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the offer of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to sell and transfer the State (Agricultural) Exhibition Building to the City of Charleston be accepted, and that the sum of \$250.00 be and is hereby appropriated to pay in full for said building, payable upon execution and delivery to the City Treasurer of proper deed, approved by Corporation Council, transferring said building to the City of Charleston, free of all conditions, and that said State (Agricultural) Exhibition Building be and is hereby transferred to the care and custody of the Board of Park Commissioners with full powers to make such disposal of the same as in their judgment is deemed best.

Be it further Resolved, That the Clerk of City Council is hereby instructed to notify said State Sinking Fund Commissioners of the acceptance of their offer and to extend to them the thanks of City Council in due and proper form.

3d. Letter of Mr. August Kohn, Secretary South Carolina Exposition Commission, enclosing a resolution of said Commission setting forth the terms upon which they will allow the State exhibits at the Exposition to remain until the time of the St. Louis Exposition, to which it is desired to send them, and stating that the Commission is not vested with the final disposition of said exhibits. While appreciating the generous spirit of this Commission, the Board of Park Commissioners cannot recommend the acceptance of their offer, on account of the limited powers of the Commission as to the final disposition of said exhibits, together with the necessary large expense incidental to the care and security of these exhibits, which would fall upon the City of Charleston, and be the same for their temporary, as for their permanent exhibition, and therefore the passage of the following resolution is recommended:

Resolved, That the Clerk of City Council be and is hereby instructed to convey to the South Carolina Exposition Commission the thanks of City Council for their kind endeavors to obtain the State exhibits for the City of Charleston, and the regrets of City Council

that it cannot at this time accept the offer of said exhibits under the conditions set forth by the Commission.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

There was some correspondence upon the matter, and the final conclusion is in the following report:

Under the terms of the Act the building was turned over to the Sinking Fund Commission, and that Board, cooperating with the State Commission, offered the building to the city for \$250, and it is understood that the Park Commission has since sold the building.

The State Commission found it impracticable to care for the various county exhibits or to gain the consent of all, and finally secured the use of a warehouse where such of the material as was available and that belonged to the State is now stored. The quarters were kindly tendered by Mr. P. H. Gadsden, of the Consolidated Company, and the material is stored under the care of State Geologist Earle Sloan.

The State Commission, in view of the postponement of the St. Louis World's Fair, has done nothing towards that work, and I have not had the Commission meet specially to consider the St. Louis exhibit.

I beg to submit as information the exhaustive financial report of Mr. August Kohn, Secretary and Auditor, and Mr. A. W. Love, Superintendent of the Exhibit and Building.

The original Board of Commissioners appointed for the Charleston Exposition, believing that it has finished its work, has decided to tender its resignation as a body. I am, therefore, authorized and requested to say that the members of the Board of Exposition Commissioners hereby tender their resignations, to take effect as soon as their successors may be appointed.

This course is not taken with a view of shirking any responsibilities, but the Commission is of the opinion that it was organized for the purposes of the Charleston Exposition, and those purposes having been accomplished, and a new administration with new responsibilities having charge of the work in connection with the St. Louis Exposition, it was deemed only proper to place the resignation of the Board as a whole in the hands of my successor, so that he might select members of a new Commission.

SUPERINTENDENT'S FINAL REPORT.

The report of A. W. Love, Superintendent South Carolina Exhibits and South Carolina Building, is as follows:

His Excellency, the Hon. Miles B. McSweeney, Governor, and Chairman of the South Carolina State Exposition Commission to the above Exposition.

Dear Sir: I beg to submit my final report of the work done by me, or under my direction, for the State at the Exposition, and to make this report a general one, covering the whole work done and describing in detail the results accomplished.

On June 6th, 1901, at a regular meeting of the State Commission, I was appointed superintendent of South Carolina Exhibits and of the South Carolina Building at the Charleston Exposition. I was directed by the Commission to visit every county of the State to induce exhibits for the Building, and to cooperate with the management of the Exposition at Charleston in every way possible, and to obey the orders of the Director General of the Exposition Company, Col. Ino. H. Averill. I began work immediately and was furnished a list of the county commissions by Col. Averill. These commissions were composed of four members each, and had been appointed and commissioned by the Exposition Company the year previous for the purpose of raising county exhibits and for advancing the interests of the Exposition in their respective counties. I notified every commissioner of my appointment and made a date to meet with each commission in its county to formulate plans for raising and making a county exhibit. From the very first I found the undertaking a very difficult one; the commissioners, as a whole, had been selected without regard to their interests, to their wishes, or to their peculiar fitness for the work.

As a rule no special interest was taken in the work, and a number of commissions as a whole refused to have anything to do with the work, and new commissions had to be formed, which was a very hard and delicate task because no one wanted to be a "second choice," and a number of the counties for this reason never had an organized commission. Then a large number of individual commissioners refused to serve for personal reasons, and this hindered the work to a great extent.

The forty counties were visited and as many started to work as possible; the following counties organized and determined to make an exhibit of their resources and industries: Abbeville, Aiken, Bamberg, Berkeley, Cherokee, Chester, Clarendon, Colleton, Darlington, Dorchester, Edgefield, Fairfield, Florence, Georgetown, Greenwood, Horry, Kershaw, Laurens, Lexington, Marion, Marlboro, Oconee, Orangeburg, Pickens, Richland, Spartanburg, Sumter, Union, Williamsburg, York. Total, thirty counties. By the first of November all had given up the work except the following coun-Bamberg, Berkeley, Chester, Darlington, Dorchester, Edgefield, Florence, Georgetown, Greenwood, Horry, Marlboro, Orangeburg, Pickens, Spartanburg, Sumter, Total, fifteen. Bamberg and Edgefield Counties failed, leaving only thirteen out of the forty represented, and not more than half of these made as creditable displays as could have been done, but the time was too short for them to do any better after the start was made.

From the first I saw that the State could not depend upon the counties to make a representative and creditable display of the resources and industries of the State, therefore, with the consent of the Commission, I made all necessary arrangements for the State to make the exhibit directly, which was done with the aid of those counties making a first-class show of their wealth.

The Exposition Company, having in charge the roofing and staff work of the South Carolina Building, was long delayed in the completion of this work, thereby delaying the installation and causing much of the exhibit material to become damaged by the elements. I was assured by the contractors on the 5th day of October that the building would be ready for exhibits by the 1st of November, and on the latter date I began the movement of material to Charleston, but the building was not nearly completed and was not weatherproof, therefore the installation of exhibits could not begin and the material had to be stored in the wings of the building and be protected from the weather as best we could, to await the finishing of the building. While remaining in this condition many articles were damaged and a few were stolen. About the 1st of January the building was fairly well along and the installation of exhibits was begun again, because the Exposition Company insisted upon it; after several exhibits had been installed a heavy rainfall necessitated the taking down and restoring of the exhibits until the building was fully completed, and weatherproof. This extra work, of course, entailed further delay and additional expense. After so long a time the installation was begun the third time and speedily finished, many valuable articles were placed in the various exhibits, and were exposed to both damage and theft, because the roof never was thoroughly waterproof and the doors of the building were delayed in shipment and the contractor did not get them hung for two or three weeks after the exhibits were installed, and this left the building exposed on all sides to any person wishing to steal. A guard was on duty all the time, but at night it was impossible for him to properly guard the building on account of the size and open condition. and a number of articles disappeared while these conditions existed. About the 20th of February the building was said to be completed and the exhibits were completed, and the South Carolina Building was ready to receive its visitors. After all the vexations, delays, disappointments and other troubles. I am glad to be able to report to you that the State had the best and most beautiful building on the grounds, architecture, exhibits and decorations all considered collectively or singly; this was the decision of every visitor to the building, and the Commissioners from other States unhesitatingly said it was the finest show they had ever seen any State make at an exposition.

DESCRIPTION OF BUILDING AND DECORATIONS.

The South Carolina Building was eighty feet wide and four hundred feet long; it had one large central dome and eight lateral domes. On the inside the roofs were supported by large arches, which furnished the finest opportunity for artistic decoration. The overhead was profusely decorated with national and State flags and the side walls were gracefully draped in white and blue bunting, the State's colors. The E. D. Allen Decorating Co., of Buffalo, N. Y., was employed to do all the decorating and installing of the State exhibits. and the work was well done. The decorations in all the exhibit spaces were made to correspond with the general decoration scheme. and the result was a perfect harmony of colors and effects over the entire building. The floor space was divided into seven divisions. three in each wing and one in the centre. Each wing had two aisles which divided the space into three exhibit spaces, the centre one being capable of having a front on each aisle or on only one as desired. Beginning at the south end of building, on the west side of west aisle the first exhibit was

THE SOUTH CAROLINA HISTORIC RELICS AND RECORDS.

This exhibit was composed of four large glass floor cases filled with the relics and records of the State from its settlement to the present time. A large number of the documents had never before been exhibited to the general public, and were a great attraction and study to a majority of the visitors. Mr. Jesse T. Gantt, of the Secretary of State's Office, collected and arranged the exhibit.

MULLINS TOBACCO.

Mullins, Marion County, made a splendid display of the bright tobacco from the warehouses of that market. The tobacco was arranged according to grade in a large glass floor case, and the export tierces were grouped around it, showing the tobacco ready for export. This exhibit received a gold medal for merit. Credit is due Mr. L. B. Gravely, of Mullins, S. C., for collecting and arranging this exhibit.

DORCHESTER COUNTY EXHIBIT.

The third exhibit on this side was that of Dorchester County, a general exhibit of the farm and forest products. This was not a large exhibit, but it was a very good one and reflected credit on one of the new counties of the State. This exhibit was collected by the Commissioners and was installed by the State. The Commissioners were Dr. C. U. Shepard, J. E. C. Pedder, Maj. T. W. Stanland, Capt. J. A. Weeks, and M. P. Felder.

HORRY COUNTY EXHIBIT.

The fourth was that of Horry County, composed of the farm and forest specimens, the latter being especially worthy of mention. This exhibit was small, but contained some of the finest specimens in the building. It was collected by the Commissioners and installed by the State. The Commissioners were Col. C. P. Quattlebaum, D. A. Spivey, Jere. Smith, and J. A. McDermott.

SUMTER COUNTY EXHIBIT.

The fifth was that of Sumter County, which was a very fine exhibit and a large one. It comprised specimens from the field, forest, mines and factories. The special features of this exhibit were the water and telephone exhibits. Water was shipped from the artesian wells

in Sumter in barrels, and then put into a large glass tank for free distribution to the thirsty visitors. This was much appreciated by all, as no provision was made to supply drinking water anywhere else on the grounds. The telephone exhibit was a magnificent one, made by the Telephone Manufacturing Company of Sumter, S. C., and showed the latest improvements and the best workmanship in telephony. Especial mention is made of the services of Col. A. W. Suder, active Commissioner, who collected and installed this exhibit and was with it during the entire Exposition period. It was ranked as the fifth best exhibit in the building. The Commissioners were Hon. R. I. Manning, Col. A. W. Suder, Capt. T. O. Sanders, and Mr. Chas. T. Mason.

SOUTH CAROLINA INVENTIONS.

The next space was devoted to the patents and inventions of South Carolinians, and was well filled with bicycles, printing presses, cotton planters, corn planters, fertilizer distributors, stalk cutters, etc.

ROSE HILL GREENHOUSES.

The last space on this section was occupied by the Rose Hill Greenhouses of Columbia, S. C., and was entered as a commercial exhibit. It comprised pot plants, palms, ferns, roses, cut flowers, etc., and was a beautiful exhibit and added very much to the general beauty of the building. It was awarded a gold medal for merit.

DARLINGTON COUNTY EXHIBIT.

Returning to the south end of building and beginning on the centre tier of exhibits, the first on both aisles was that of Darlington County. This was one of the best in the building. It was a very large exhibit and was composed of specimens of everything grown or produced in the county. Especial mention is made of the exhibit of bright leaf tobacco, exhibited and arranged by Mr. E. M. Williamson, a large tobacco raiser and an expert judge. The tobacco was shown in all its grades, old and new, and in every stage of preparation from the plant to the export tierce, packed and marked to a foreign port. A model curing barn filled with drying tobacco attracted and held the attention of every visitor. The display of finished samples of wood was very fine; it was prepared and made by C. Mooney & Son, Darlington, S. C.; it was beautiful and educational, showing that some of our commonest woods are susceptible

to the highest finish when properly treated. This exhibit tied with that of Georgetown County for the third prize of \$250.00 offered by the State. It was collected and installed by the Commissioners, and they deserve credit for their untiring efforts in producing such an excellent exhibit. The Commissioners were Hon. Bright Williamson, Col. E. R. McIver, Gen. W. E. James, E. W. Cannon, and E. M. Williamson.

MANNING HOSIERY MILLS.

The second exhibit on the east side of west aisle was that of the Manning Hosiery Mills, of Manning, S. C., a commercial exhibit consisting of the different styles and grades of hosiery manufactured by these mills, neatly arranged in glass cases. A silver medal was awarded this exhibit for merit.

CHESTER COUNTY EXHIBIT.

The third and last exhibit of this centre tier, occupying all the space at the northern end of the tier between the aisles, was that of Chester County, a large and splendid exhibit, composed of specimens of the field, forest, mine and factory. This was the second largest exhibit in the building, and was awarded the second prize of \$500.00 offered by the State for county exhibits. Especial mention is made of the magnificent display and assortment of agricultural products; this was the largest and best display of these products in the building, and held the attention of every agriculturist who viewed it. The wood exhibit was unique and instructive; it was composed of two longitudinal sections and one transverse section, together with the leaf and fruit of every variety of wood in the county. It was prepared and arranged by Prof. H. A. Green, who also prepared and exhibited a sample of the many kinds of soils in the county, showing that there were soils suitable for the production of almost any crop.

This exhibit was collected and installed by the Commissioners, with the aid of two assistants, Messrs. Green and Miller. The commissioners were Col. Jno. R. Culp, Jas. G. L. White, A. M. Aiken, S. M. Jones, and Dr. W. B. Cox.

BERKELEY COUNTY EXHIBIT.

This exhibit was on the east aisle between the county exhibits of Darlington and Chester. It was composed of samples of farm and

forest, the latter being exceptionally fine and showing the timber resources of the county off to the best advantage. The exhibit of the Hardwood Manufacturing Company was excellent, and showed the hard woods manufactured into mill supplies for the cotton mills of the United States, and represented one of the new industries of the State. This county exhibit was collected by the Commissioners and installed by the State. The Commissioners were C. M. Wiggins, Jno. C. Porcher, T. S. Browning, and J. B. Morrison.

DEAF AND BLIND INSTITUTE.

This was the first exhibit in the south end on the east side, and was made by Superintendent Walker, of the State Institution for the Deaf and Blind at Cedar Springs, S. C. It comprised the text-books used in the instruction of the students and the handiwork done by them. All was nicely arranged and received the compliments of all visitors

SPARTANBURG COUNTY EXHIBIT.

This exhibit occupied the whole space on the east side of building and was the largest exhibit in the building. It was awarded the first prize of \$1,000.00 offered by the State for the county exhibits. The installation of this exhibit was its chief feature; the many articles composing it were arranged according to class, showing first the general wealth of the county, and second in detail the occupations and achievements of its citizens. The space was gorgeously decorated with agricultural products and was kept in the best of condition during the whole of the Exposition.

More money was expended on this exhibit than on any other in the building and it was wisely expended and did the county untold good in an advertising way. New enterprises and manufactures were induced by this exhibit to locate in the county, and much capital will be invested there as a direct result. This Commission set actively to work, and its great success shows what can be accomplished if the proper means are employed.

Especial mention is made of the work of Mr. Paul V. Moore, Superintendent. This exhibit was collected and installed by the Commissioners, who were Col. T. J. Moore, N. F. Walker, Jno. T. Floyd, L. G. Harris, and Gen. Jos. L. Stoppelbein.

Beginning at the north end of the building on the west side, the first exhibit was that of

SOUTH CAROLINA PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

This exhibit showed by drawings, charts, models, text-books, etc., and the work of the pupils, the methods of instruction used in the public schools of this State. The exhibit was made under the direction of Hon. Jno. J. McMahan, State Superintendent of Education, and was installed by the various principals of the public schools.

SOUTH CAROLINA MILITARY ACADEMY.

The next exhibit was that of the only State military institution, the South Carolina Military Academy at Charleston, S. C. There were exhibited the modern methods of transportation and bridging employed during war, and a case of valuable books and the text-books of the institution.

A cadet was in attendance all the time to explain the exhibit to the public. The exhibit was made and installed by the instructors of the Academy and was a pleasant place for the alumni to assemble.

MARLBORO COUNTY EXHIBIT.

This was a small exhibit, but a select one; the cotton stalks with the matured staple in the bolls were the finest that were exhibited, as were also some of the agricultural samples. This exhibit was collected by the Commissioners and installed by the State. The Commissioners were Col. C. S. McCall, C. F. Moore, J. C. Dunbar, and Col. W. D. Evans.

FLORENCE COUNTY EXHIBIT.

This was a very creditable exhibit, showing the fine bright to-baccos grown in the county, the field and forest samples in a huge cornucopia, and that the City of Florence was the railway gate to the State; a miniature railway scene reproduced the appearance of the depot at Florence twice a day. This exhibit was collected by the Commissioners and installed by the State. The Commissioners were H. M. Ayer, R. M. McCown, J. W. McCown.

PICKENS COUNTY EXHIBIT.

This was another small exhibit, its special features being the large and numerous ears of corn and the fine display of pottery. This exhibit was collected by the Commissioners and installed by the State. The Commissioners were D. F. Bradley, Dr. R. F. Smith, W. F. Blassingame, and I. M. Mauldin.

GREENWOOD COUNTY EXHIBIT

Another small county exhibit, but a nice one, the forest specimens especially being well selected and prepared; the farm samples were few in number but exceptionally fine. This exhibit was collected by the Commissioners and installed by the State. The Commissioners were R. H. Henderson, T. J. Kinard, R. M. Hays, and Dr. S. T. Lea

RICE EXHIBIT.

Returning to the north end of the building and beginning on the middle tier of exhibits, the first one was the rice exhibit made by the State. This was a handsome and instructive exhibit: a large octagonal stand made of natural finished hard woods was surrounded at its base by sixteen rice barrels, with plate glass heads, containing rice in all its grades from the "White Seed Rough" and "Golden Seed Rough" through the milling process, and including the "Hulled," "Pounded," "Whole," "Broken," "Middling," "Small," "Flour," "Meal," "Hulls." The plate glass heads were lettered in gold leaf and had "South Carolina Rice Exhibit" around the edge. and the grade of rice as above given through the centre. On the second platform, just above the barrels, were the modern drums for shipping rice and the regular commercial pouch. The roof was supported by eight hollow glass columns filled with rice, and the roof was thatched with sheaf rice. The services of Mr. Ino. L. Sheppard, of Charleston, S. C., a veteran rice dealer, tended to make this exhibit as attractive as it was.

GEORGETOWN COUNTY EXHIBIT.

This exhibit fronted on both the east and west aisles and was a very large and showy exhibit. The space was enclosed by a framework made of natural pine, by Georgetown workmen; this, together with a large oil painting of the plant of the Atlantic Coast Lumber Company, well advertised the lumber resources of the county. Another large oil painting advertised the City of Georgetown as a port, showing the harbor and the location of the City.

The exhibit material contained samples of everything produced or found in the county. The naval stores were well advertised, showing that this port has sufficient to supply a large quantity to the market each year. The farm products were many and very excellent; the rice, corn, grain, etc., compared favorably with any in the building.

The game of this section was well advertised by speciments of taxidermy, fish, aquatic fowls, turkeys, etc.

A young lady was in charge of the exhibit to explain it to all visitors. This exhibit was collected and installed by the Commissioners, who were Hon. W. D. Morgan, S. T. Donaldson, H. Kaminski, and Dr. G. F. S. Wright.

CLEMSON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE.

The next exhibit of the centre tier was that of Clemson College; it occupied a large booth and opened on both aisles. The different departments of the College were all represented; the agricultural department by specimens of farm products, showing by comparison those best suited to the soils of the State; the horticultural department by specimens of preserved fruit; the veterinary department by pathological specimens, text-books, models, instruments, etc.; the mechanical department by contrivances designed and manufactured by the students; the electrical department by dynamos, motors, and appliances built by the students; the engineering department by drawings and designs; the textile department by patterns designed and woven by the students in the textile mill at the College. A student was always in attendance to explain the exhibit. This exhibit was made and installed by the College faculty and was a credit to the College.

ORANGEBURG COUNTY EXHIBIT.

This was a good exhibit, displaying the general resources of the county. It was collected and installed by one Commissioner, Mr. T. M. McMichael

Returning to the north end of the building and beginning on the east side, the first was the

SOUTH CAROLINA COLLEGE.

This exhibit contained the portraits of the illustrious alumni and a choice selection of the old and valuable books from the large library of the College. Miss LeConte was in charge of this exhibit and made it a pleasant place for all the alumni to assemble. This exhibit was prepared and installed by the professors of the College, and alumni.

STATE HOSPITAL FOR THE INSANE.

The next exhibit was that of the State Hospital for the Insane, consisting of portraits of the founders and prominent regents, also drawings and pictures of the grounds and buildings. It was prepared and installed by the Superintendent, Dr. Jas. W. Babcock.

WINTHROP NORMAL AND INDUSTRIAL COLLEGE.

This was the largest of the educational exhibits, and occupied the greater part of the northeastern side of the building. It was arranged in sections, each section representing a department of the College. The first was the art section, showing the models, drawings and paintings by the students; the second was the literary section, showing the work of the students in this department; the third was the kindergarten section, showing the methods and advancement in kindergarten work; the fourth was the needlework section, showing specimens of needlework by the students; the fifth was the culinary section, showing modern cookery and a model kitchen.

Two young lady graduates were present all the time to explain the details of the exhibit. It was prepared and installed by Prof. D. B. Johnson and a corp of assistants.

THE FREE KINDERGARTEN SCHOOLS.

The next exhibit was that of the free mill kindergartens of the State, maintained and managed by a number of ladies of the State. The exhibit consisted of the methods of instruction and the work done by the pupils. It was collected, prepared and installed by Miss Evelyn Holmes.

CONFEDERATE HOME SCHOOL.

The next exhibit was that of the Confederate Home School of Charleston, and consisted of work done by the students. It was prepared and installed by Mrs. Stoney, of Charleston, assisted by the teachers of the school.

THE MISSES FROSTS' SCHOOL.

This was an exhibit of the work done by the students of this school, which is conducted by the Misses Frosts in Charleston. It was prepared and installed by them.

SOUTH CAROLINA FOSSILS.

This was a very fine display of a magnificent collection of South Carolina fossils and phosphates, owned by Capt. C. A. Scanlan, and loaned to the State by him for exhibition. It was most tastefully arranged by Capt. Scanlan himself, and attracted much attention. This collection has been further loaned to the State for exhibit at the World's Fair in St. Louis

COLLEGE OF CHARLESTON.

This exhibit of the oldest College of the State was a good one, consisting of specimens from the large museum, photographs of buildings, campus, etc. It was prepared and installed by Dr. Ashley, of the College.

THE HUNT PACKING COMPANY.

A pyramid covered with canned oysters put up by the Hunt Packing Company, of Beaufort, S. C., illustrated a new enterprise of the State and one that is meeting with a deal of success.

DOWLING, THE PHOTOGRAPHER.

This exhibit was made by Mr. W. P. Dowling, the official photographer of the Exposition Company, and showed the pictures of modern photography.

This completes a description of the county, commercial and educational exhibits. A brief description of the State exhibits proper in the centre of the building is as follows: In the immediate centre and directly under the dome was a large four-sided stand, thirty feet at its base and rising forty feet in height. This stand was covered with blue bunting and trimmed with cotton batting, and further decorated with all the agricultural products available. On all sides of the stand were shelves to hold the large glass jars, urns and other vessels containing the exhibit material. The State's motto was placed on one side and statistics on the other three.

All the agricultural pursuits of the State were represented here, the horticulture and truck farming being shown by the fruits and vegetables naturally preserved in fluid. The pecan exhibit was exceptionally fine, the nuts being large, finely flavored and well meated. Seven gold medals were awarded to this exhibit alone. The dis-

plays of wheat and oats were good, more than sixty varieties being represented by first-class samples. The other small grains were well exhibited also. The corn exhibit is the best the State has ever made, and was pronounced by all to be finer than that made by any other State at the Exposition, and that is saying a great deal, considering that some of the best corn States had exhibits there.

The cotton exhibit was very fine also. The stalks were prepared with the matured staple in the bolls; one stalk was taken from the twenty most prominent varieties and each stalk was enclosed in a glass case for protection. The cottonseed were shown in large quantities, as were also the products from the seed oils, crude and refined, soap stocks, cake, meal, hulls, etc. The Upland cotton was shown in bales and the Sea Island cotton in bags, as prepared for market. Over the main entrance to the building was a large oil painting of a modern cotton mill in the centre of a large cotton field, with negro laborers picking the staple from the boll, and the following motto below the picture: "Invest Well. The Factory in the Field Pays." Thus advertising that the proper place to locate the cotton mills of the future is where the cotton is raised. The point was deeply appreciated by all the northern visitors, especially, and many signified their intention of investing in new southern mills.

The silk exhibit was beautifully arranged by the State Silk Commissioner, Miss E. A. Kelly, of Charleston, who is also on the staff of the United States Bureau to promote the silk culture in the southern States. This exhibit consisted of the silk worms at work spinning cocoons, the finished cocoons, thread, silk cloth, etc., together with a full set of modern instruments, equipment appliances and seed for rearing the silk worms.

The geological exhibit was made under the direct supervision of State Geologist Earle Sloan, who will report directly what was accomplished. This exhibit was grouped around the large centre stand, and was contained in large museum cases and flanked by the forestry specimens.

I succeeded in making admirable arrangements for the receiving and returning of all exhibits by freight that came and went in carload lots. A track was laid to the rear door of the building, and a platform was built along the track and a truck way to the building, thus enabling us to move the exhibits without the expense of transfer drayage, and insuring prompt and careful attention to each and every shipment.

The thanks of the State are due to the railroads of the State for the free transportation of all the State's exhibit material, and for the many courtesies extended during the Exposition period. I have thanked the Joint Agent of the Charleston lines who had charge of the Exposition Station, Mr. Frank McCabe, for his courteous and prompt attention to all matters connected with his position. I have also thanked the Bell Telephone Company, of Charleston, for giving to the State building a telephone station free of all charges for the use of the employees of the building during the time of the Exposition

A total of 123 medals was awarded to exhibits in the South Carolina Building, thus testifying to the merits of the many exhibits contained in this building.

At the close of the exposition, as per the instructions of the Commission, I packed all the State's property and stored it in the warehouse of the Charleston Consolidated Street Railway, Gas and Electric Company, in the City of Charleston, where it now is.

In conclusion, I beg to thank the members of the South Carolina Commission for the great aid given me by the members of the Commission in my work for the State, and to express to them my appreciation of the uniform kindness and consideration with which I was always treated by the Commission.

I also beg to thank the Secretary of the Commission, Col. August Kohn, for the prompt and courteous attention given all matters connected with the office so creditably filled by him.

REPORT.

To His Excellency, Miles B. McSweeney, Governor and Commander-in-Chief.

Sir: In conformity with the laws governing the Volunteer system of South Carolina, I have the honor to submit herewith the Annual Report of the Adjutant General's Department for the year A. D. 1902.

The work of reorganizing the Volunteer service of the State, commenced in A. D. 1800 under the present military regime, has been diligently promoted, and I can confidently announce to your Excellency that the Military Organizations of the State are at this date fully sufficient in numbers, arms, equipment, and training to successfully cope with any emergency that is likely to menace or disturb the peace and dignity of the Commonwealth: nevertheless, it is my duty to advise you that there is still room for vigilant interest and activity upon the part of the State in fostering and encouraging the further development and improvement of her Volunteer system. The rapid advance made in recent years in military science and the arts of war, necessitating, after practical tests, various changes in models of ordnance, uniforms, etc. (with which the regular army has heretofore been equipped), along with the manifest interest of the National Congress, as shown in the consideration and passage of laws providing for substantial assistance to the States by the general government, in furtherance of the development of the Volunteer service, suggest and demand that the States themselves should be more liberal in appropriations for the support of their Volunteer soldiery; and South Carolina cannot afford to grow callous of her duty, or lag in patriotic effort to keep abreast of the military spirit and progress of the period.

STRENGTH OF VOLUNTEER FORCES.

The numerical strength of the Volunteer troops, as tabulated from the annual Inspection reports, and including all branches of the service, rank and file, is (3,060) composed as follows: Three (3) Regiments of Infantry; one (1) Regiment of Cavalry; one (1) Company of Artillery; and three (3) Divisions of Naval Reserves.

The Companies that compose these forces are not as well distributed through the State as they should be; nevertheless, a fair majority of them can, in any emergency, be easily and quickly reached by wire, and transportation is also equally accessible, so that, however sudden the necessity for military aid, there is nothing to hinder the utmost celerity of movement of troops to and from almost any portion of the State.

I am still impressed, however, with the urgent importance of having at least one thoroughly equipped and disciplined organization in each county, and I feel sure that my successor in office will continue the efforts I initiated in the commencement of my administration, until that result is accomplished.

FIRST BRIGADE INFANTRY FORMED.

The organization and admission of six new Companies of Infantry within the present year, which completes the full quota of three (3) Regiments of that branch of the service—it was found necessary and important to form a Brigade, to which your Excellency assented—said Brigade has been duly formed, to be known as the 1st Brigade of Infantry, and General Orders announcing same, as well as changes and assignments of Companies, to Regiments composing said Brigade, will be published as soon as the reports of annual inspections (just closed) have been examined, and the standing of the Companies ascertained and passed upon. Col. Wilie Iones' appointment and promotion to Brigadier General and Commander of the 1st Brigade has given universal satisfaction to soldiers and citizens; his long service in the Militia of the State; his experience as Colonel of the 2d Regiment in the Spanish-American War; his wide acquaintance and popularity throughout the State; and more particularly his patriotic and enthusiastic interest and energy in helping to build up and encourage the progress of our State Military, justly and meritoriously entitle him to the recognition he has received, and the promotion to which he has been duly commissioned by your Excellency.

ANNUAL INSPECTIONS.

The annual inspections were completed the 1st of December. The reports of same made by Colonel Frost and Major Newnham, as well as those made by the Adjutant General in person, all indicate most clearly that from every standpoint the State Militia is gradu-

ally but steadily improving all along the lines that make an efficient and reliable Volunteer soldiery. I am pleased to note (as you are aware) that no disturbance or infraction of the peace (of any consequence) has occurred during the year that required the aid of the Military to suppress. Therefore, we conclude that the very fact, so widely known in this State, that we have a well organized and equipped Militia, has in a great measure acted as the ever present barrier to lawlessness; and if so, how vitally important for the peace and progress of the State that the General Assembly should make ample provision for the support and development of her Military Department—"the paramount power of all Governments, at last."

STATE ARMORY.

As regards this important subject, I insert here what I said in my report of two years ago, and which I feel is even more strongly applicable today than it was then:

"In my last Annual Report I called the attention of the General Assembly to the fact that the State was without an armory for storing military supplies and ordnance stores and other material received annually from the national government, and that we were therefore obliged to rent from year to year a house for the storing of said military supplies. The necessity of an armory building is absolute, to preserve and protect thousands of dollars worth of military material loaned annually to the State, to equip, arm and uniform our militia, and the national government requires that such material be kept secure from damage or destruction, except from natural causes. I submit the matter again for your consideration, whether it is best to rent an armory from year to year, or for the State to build one of its own, and thereby stop an annual outlay that in five years would amount to the cost of a suitable and substantial State building."

It is also highly essential that some provision be made to furnish armories for the Companies of the Volunteer service, where they can assemble for drill, and where the arms, uniforms, and ordnance stores can be safely kept. It has been said that "A good armory is almost as surely productive of a good Company, as a good home is productive of a good family." At present the State does nothing in that direction. A small appropriation added to the present one of \$8,000.00 would enable Companies that have no armories to provide one. And where Companies already own their armories taxes

thereon should be remitted, and the amount charged to said Companies, in lieu of their quota of any appropriation made for that purpose.

I would state that besides the fact that rents in Columbia are steadily advancing, it is difficult to find a building suitable for the storing of military goods, the one now occupied being too small and unsafe.

Owing to the increased appropriation by the national government, a much larger quantity of military stores are received and dispensed, requiring double the room capacity for handling; hence the reason for urging immediate action on this important matter.

CONFEDERATE ROLLS.

The Confederate Rolls were placed in charge of the Adjutant General's Department three years ago by the General Assembly; during that time but very few names have been added to them. The examination of the rolls to oblige citizens, in search for the names of relatives and friends, and for various purposes, are of daily occurrence, and the wear and tear engendered thereby is unavoidable. Many of the written rolls are fading as time advances, and in a few years will have to be retraced to keep them legible. It appears futile to expect many more additions to the present enrolment; but if the present scheme inaugurated by the Legislature should be successful in discovering some names not enrolled, that need not delay the publication of the rolls as they now stand, because any names discovered thereafter could be very easily added in supplemental form at a mere nominal cost. I think, therefore, that careful reflection upon the subject indicates most clearly the wisdom and economy of the General Assembly making immediate provision for the publication of the Rolls as we now have them, in a cheap, substantial book form: and by their publication not only preserve a most brilliant link in the history of the State, but fulfill at the same time a sacred duty that the State owes to the invincible heroes that composed the grand army contributed by South Carolina to the Confederate Cause.

NAVAL MILITIA.

This most important branch of our Volunteer Service deserves the highest commendation; from year to year the improvement has been steady and highly gratifying. Three Divisions, numbering in the aggregate (rank and file) 225 men, is the strength of this arm of the service. Each Division is splendidly equipped in the most modern style, and this year has received new uniforms complete, from appropriation made by the last General Assembly for that specific purpose. During my administration each Division of the Naval Service has been furnished with cutters or patrol boats, thoroughly furnished and equipped for any emergency, foreign or domestic. Each Division is also armed with Lee Magazine Rifles, cutlasses, and one one-pound rapid fire gun each.

ENCAMPMENTS.

No man of military knowledge and experience will deny the efficacy of encampments for training and disciplining the Volunteer soldier, "and there is no question of more vital importance to the service than that." In each of my past three reports I strenuously advocated encampments, and have continuously sought in various ways to interest and impress members of the General Assembly of the importance of appropriating a small sum annually for that important work; but in every instance I was thwarted, and that great obstacle unremoved has been one of the greatest troubles I have had to contend with in the four years' struggle I have made to perfect a Volunteer system of which the State might be proud.

I have the honor, however, to report that there is now pending in the United States Senate (which passed the lower House at the last session of Congress) a bill entitled, "A Bill to promote the efficiency of the Militia and for other purposes," that provides for the payment of the expenses of State encampments of the Militia by the national government. If the bill becomes a law (and there is hardly a doubt, as it has the endorsement of the President and War Department), then the greatest impediment to the efficient development of the Volunteer Service will have been removed.

DIFFICULTIES ENCOUNTERED.

I consider it due to this administration in closing my report to call attention to the fact that the present head of the Militia entered upon his duties under the most disheartening conditions. The Volunteer system of the State was in a manner dismantled. The disorganization following the close of the Spanish-American War had caused an apathy and waning of enthusiasm for the State Volunteer Service, that resulted in the depletion and disbandment of organizations all over the State; and everything connected with the State

Military, as regarded discipline, order, and efficiency, was in a most confused and chaotic condition. The decline of spirit and interest in the Military (so unlike South Carolina in the past) was a matter of comment and criticism everywhere, and the reasons given were legion: but, in my opinion, the one over-topping reason that from year to year gradually provoked the decline of sentiment was the lack of interest and support given her Volunteers by the State, through her law-making body. In consideration of such dispiriting conditions, it is gratifying to note that in a large measure, at least, "the old time" military spirit and interest has been revived, and the Adiutant General's Department placed upon a strict business basis. And now, with the recently increased national appropriation, sufficient to arm, uniform, and equip the service in "up-to-date" modern style; with the passage of the present "Military Bill" before Congress, providing for the payment of the expenses of annual encampments of State Volunteers, together with the growing interest and liberal support expected from the State, my successor in office, with his superb capacity, energy and enthusiasm, will speedily carry to the highest standard of excellence our State Military, where comparison ("at home or abroad") will not be feared with any State in the Union.

SOUTH CAROLINA MILITARY ACADEMY.

Since the establishment of the South Carolina Military Academy it has been the custom for the Adjutant General at the annual inspection of the Charleston State Volunteers, to inspect, and the Governor and Staff to review the Corps of Cadets. The same custom has been pursued during my administration; and it gives me great pleasure both in the capacity of inspector and as a member ex-officio of "The Board of Visitors" for four years, to bear witness to the efficient work and benefaction it is achieving for the State. In my opinion, for the amount of money appropriated for its sustenance, the Military Academy gives back more solid, substantial education to the youth of the State, than any other institution of learning supported by the State. With an enrolment of 130 students the current year, more than half of that number are graduated every four years absolutely free of all expense to the student, the only requirement by the State being, that each beneficiary graduate shall teach in the public schools of the State for two years, for which, of course, he receives a salary. The Academy is modeled after West

Point, and "the system of its entire management is strictly based on the lines of West Point Academy," and so far as the infantry branch of the regular army is concerned a young man graduating at the South Carolina Academy is as fully competent to perform the duties and fill the position of 2d Lieutenant in the regular army as a graduate of West Point. For its age, and the number of graduates that the South Carolina Military Academy has sent forth from its walls, there is no institution in the State that has to its credit a longer list of distinguished Carolinians, either in the civil or military walks of life. When I was elected Adjutant General the arms, accoutrements and equipment that had been in use for fifteen years at the Academy I found, on my first inspection, were so badly worn as to be well nigh unserviceable. During the second year of my first term I succeeded in securing a complete, new Infantry outfit, and before I retire from my second term. I shall have the present arms (Springfield rifles) exchanged for the Krag-Jorgensen carbine. which will place the Academy in the most modern form, as to infantry, arms, accourrements and equipment. Capt. Geo. B. McMaster, a native of the State and graduate of West Point, has recently been detailed as Tactical Officer of the institution.

Four years of official connection with the institution gives me knowledge of its management, and enables me to know that its future is full of promise; and with the same fostering and generous support by the State as in the past, it will not be long until the fame and influence of that grand old institution will be felt and liberally patronized throughout the South.

CONCLUSION.

In concluding this my fourth and last Annual Report as Adjutant General of the State, I desire to extend to your Excellency my sincerest thanks for the uniform interest you have always shown in every effort I have made as your Chief of Staff, to build up and develop the Military Department of the State. And I also deeply appreciate and acknowledge the uniform courtesy that on all occasions (on duty and off duty) has been accorded me by every officer and enlisted man in the service, with whom I have come in contact. And I have nothing but praise and the highest commendation to express for the earnest cooperation, able and faithful service rendered me by the Assistant Adjutant General, Colonel John D. Frost, throughout both my terms of office.
