Although Reeve was dead at the time of publication Loeber suggests there is a slight possibility that *Fatherless Fanny* was based on a later-discovered manuscript of Reeve's *Castle Connor*. The late Miss Taylor does not seem to have been investigated: she is not Jane or Ann Taylor who were both still alive, but possibly Eliza Taylor who published one novel. Sarah Green wrote a number of novels and satires and in her preface implies that she may have interpolated material not already added by the previous reviser 'an author of celebrity'.



Although successful as a novelist, essayist and dramatist, it is for his ground-breaking works of political philosophy that Godwin is chiefly remembered. His most influential work was An Enquiry Concerning Political Justice, 1793, which attacked existing political institutions, and presented a system of fairer governance based on principles of education and enlightenment. His politics were evident in his fiction too, in particular in Things as They Are; or, The Adventures of Caleb Williams, 1794, which in part constituted a critique of aristocratic privilege.

Hardy eschewed prose in favour of poetry after the critical rejection of Jude, publishing Wessex Poems in 1898.



Playwright, poet, and historical novelist, Scott was the pre-eminent figure of late Romanticism in Scotland, and a key player in establishing a distinctly Scottish literary canon. He remained a prolific writer until the very last, in part due to his parlous financial situation, caused by the bankruptcy of the publisher Ballantyne & Co., with whom he was a partner.
