At the end of last month we said farewell to Chris Allan (above) who had worked in the Alpine Department for over 8 years. He has moved to a post in a private garden. In the previous log I showed a single flower of *Gentiana farreri* 'Silken Star' Group on the crevice garden, but since then more flowers have opened and I should show the whole thing to do this fabulous plant justice:



Also on the crevice garden now is a single flower of Clematis columbiana var tenuiloba 'Ylva':



Many visitors are surprised to see a *Clematis* so short in stature! Not far away is *Casilleja integra:*



And so far we have managed to keep the slugs & snails off of the Campanula zoysii:



Opposite the crevice garden in a small raised bed is another much larger *Campanula*, *C. versicolor* which produces an abundance of flowers that fall over the path:



Inside the Display House yet another campanula – one of my favourites – is also in bloom. This is *Campanula fragilis*:



Other plants to pick out in the house right now are firstly one of the larger Eriogonums, this one being *E. allenii* 'Little Rascal'



Secondly is this lovely blue Allium sikkimense:



There is also another *Castilleja* in here, one I have not flowered before. This is *Castilleja* glandulifera:



Finally from the Display House is the summer flowering Gentiana paradoxa:



Back outside, a recent planting into the crevice garden is the well known and loved *Crepis incana*. We shall have to remind everyone, once it is out of flower, that this is not a weed to be removed!



Just outside the Display House, this tower of Sempervivums made by Anita has been looking great. The large one at the top is Sempervivum 'Othello':



The flowers on this when they open are also very large compared to most Sempervivums:



Finally just one picture from out on the rock garden is this Roscoea 'Red Gurkha':
