FROM THE DIRECTOR

Here it is November already, how quickly another year has flown by! It has been so good to welcome children and their families again for outdoor programs and field trips, host the Enchanted Forest event, and continue the development of educational displays.

There were several milestones in terms of diversity that were revealed, or re-defined in the last year here. Each finding reflects the complexity of our ecosystems. Last fall, the forked aster, a threatened forest plant, was found. With the help of more experienced botanists, we hope to propagate and expand the presence of this little wildflower.

Second, we discovered the location of a red-shouldered hawk nest, documenting the reproductive success of that species here. For a number of years, we have heard and seen pairs of red-shouldered hawks in and above the forest. This year, our interns found a nest with three young birds. A researcher captured and GPS-tagged the adult female so that its movements could be tracked. Feathers were gathered for DNA analysis, and future studies will confirm if the pair, or their offspring, return to nest. These threatened birds illustrate the importance of large tracts of unbroken swamp forest.

We began restoration of old fields for the benefit of pollinating insects. A DNR led survey discovered eight rusty patched bumble bees - an endangered species once common to our region, on our

restoration site. If we were to leave these fields unmanaged, the fate of these precious animals would be uncertain.

Our Henry wetland restoration project is flourishing. The establishment of more than 150 species of plants has already been populated with interesting wildlife, including our first summer Wilson's phalarope and dozens of migratory

green-winged teal. Thanks to careful planning and restoration work, wildlife is quickly populating what was once soybean fields with few animal species.

And finally, our fall Motus data collection revealed the presence of 11 tagged birds which migrated to and from Canada or northern Wisconsin - stopping by Woodland

Dunes during their journeys. This is the largest number of tagged birds we have recorded so far. It also reinforces the connection between our preserve and important bird areas far off. We also caught and banded more than 30 saw-whet owls and one screech owl during October, when we detected a total of five owl species in the preserve.

It has been a remarkable year for Woodland Dunes, and we have only scratched the surface in terms of our understanding of the preserve. Thank you for helping to make all these things possible through your generous donations and your help. Each year we realize a bit more how truly special this place is.

Helen Massey

Former butterfly garden volunteer and nonagenarian, Helen Massey recently spent time with me reflecting back on her time at Woodland Dunes. Now in her 90s, she sometimes forgets details, but when talking about the Dunes, she's all smiles and has lots to say.

"That was one of the places I loved to go. I would get up in the morning, get dressed, and get out there and work in the garden. I had a special plot that I took care of. The other girls worked in their own little sections. It was a lot of time on your knees... but it had to be just so perfect."

Love is not an exaggeration when Helen is referring to Woodland Dunes. She volunteered in the butterfly garden from 2004-2015. In those eleven years she met a lot of fellow volunteers and developed special friendships. "I enjoyed and got along well with the other ladies in the garden. They were good people. Special. And I miss that."

One of those ladies was volunteer Merrie Star. I reached out to Merrie (the butterfly garden is named in memory of her mother, Dorothy). This is what she had to say:

"I treasure Helen and precious memories of her time volunteering in the garden! She has such a kind and giving nature, doing anything and everything to make the garden inviting to all, but especially the children.

I know she participated in many of the butterfly festivals held at Woodland Dunes, joyfully face-painting herself and the children in beautiful markings of imaginary butterflies. There were loads of butterfly cookies made by her and some of the other volunteers too! I have a special place in my heart for Helen!"



After meeting Helen for the first time, I can see why Merrie feels this way. She captivated me immediately. I noticed she has piercing blue eyes - eyes that are warm and alert, intelligent and ready for good conversation. She also has a wide smile, playfully hiding it with her hand when she starts to laugh. (It's an endearing trait that I've come to cherish during our visits.) Her long, broad fingers show strength and a lifetime of physical work, yet, she adorns them with dainty rings. Around her neck is a necklace or two. She reminds me of a pretty flower from the garden - not a fragile one, but more like a cup plant - strong, purposeful, and bright.

In an undated photo with Helen and other volunteers, I noticed her big white hat. My impression was that she wore it because it was functional, but also because it added personality. (Helen's got lots of personality.) So I asked her about it. "Oh, that was my one white hat. I had it with all of my garden stuff in one container and it was always ready to go."

True, Helen had a passion for our butterfly garden, but she wasn't the only Massey that helped out, and in one way or another, she probably had something to do with it. There were nine children in the family, 10 if you count their exchange student from Brazil - which they do.

Daughter Pat worked alongside Helen in the garden quite a bit. Pat and her husband continue

to help us with our saw-whet owl banding project to this day. Daughter Susan enjoyed the sacred space of Woodland Dunes so much that she chose to marry here. Susan also helped Helen create a photo book of the butterfly garden, which they in turn gave to us. Son Daniel secured a matching gift through his employer when Woodland Dunes

paved the walkway from the Nature Center to the butterfly garden. (The critter stamps you see along the way are compliments of Helen and Pat's fun creativity.) Others have supported our Dash at the Dunes and other fundraising events that keep us sustainable.

There is a bench on our observation tower with a plaque that reads, "Don & Helen Massey, 60 years of wedded bliss." Their anniversary date follows and then it reads, "With love from your 10 kids." Don was the love of Helen's life for 67 years as of this June. Unfortunately, Don passed away in August. Helen told me, "We put together a love that was one of a kind." It's apparent that with 10 children and a husband of 67 years, it's more than flowers she grew.

Outside of Helen's apartment is an array of birdfeeders, planters, and garden décor. She proudly tells me she has more bird feeders by her windows than any of her neighbors. She also added a wish that she could clean up the mess of dried plant material - spoken like a true gardener.

I asked Helen if she had any final thoughts to share. With a twinkle in her eye and smile that slowly crept from the corners of her mouth she said, "I had a good time."

Thank you for your wonderful service, Helen. We appreciate all of your good works. You are a perennial in our butterfly garden and in our hearts.



The Butterfly Garden

Let's Give a Hand to the Cup Plant!

Often times while working in the Dorothy R. Star Butterfly Garden I will be asked about "those tall plants growing along the back of the nature center." I also have a few growing in the garden itself. I am happy to introduce visitors to the what I like to think of as the giraffe of the Dunes—the cup plant (*Silphium perfoliatum*). It gets its name from the fused leaves that form cups where water can pool.

The cup plant can grow anywhere from 3-10 feet tall and show off a flower with light yellow rays later in the summer. Cup plants find a home just about anywhere in Wisconsin, from moist prairies and meadows near rivers to railroad ditches and fence rows. Its erect, square stems, central taproot, and shallow rhizomes allow it to thrive and spread.

It is a wonderful pollinator plant! It is highly attractive to several bees: sweat bees, leafcutter bees, carpenter bees, digger bees, and bumble bees. Butterflies love it too. Last summer a group of black swallowtails stopped by and I was fortunate to catch a photo of one enjoying our cup plant blossoms.

If you plan to grow cup plants in your yard, make sure you have plenty of room and choose to plant them as a backdrop to shorter plants. You won't be disappointed with this lovely, later blooming native plant!

Rare Bee Found in Manitowoc County

As a volunteer at Woodland Dunes, I've heard about the endangered rusty patched bumble bee seen by staff on the preserve. I, too, watch the bees, hoping to see a rusty patched myself.

On July 30, I noticed a large bumble bee in our hosta blossoms at home. It looked more yellow than our common eastern bumble bee so I snapped a few photos with my phone.

To be certain of this bee's identification I sent my photos to entomologist Jay Watson and the Bumblebee Brigade at the Wisconsin DNR. Eva Lewandowski of the DNR responded with good news.

The bee in our flowers turned out to be an american bumble bee! Once the most widespread bumble bee, its population is threatened and may be listed as endangered through the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service after a year of review.

This bee was the first american bumble bee reported in Manitowoc County since the Bumblebee Brigade began in 2018.

Mini Greenhouse Grab & Go Activity

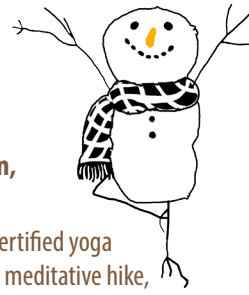

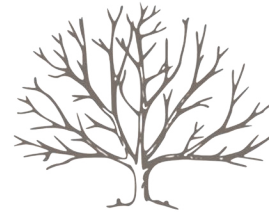

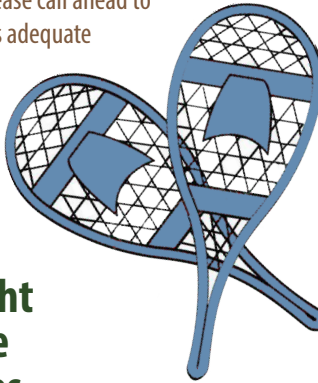
Family Snoga and S'mores

Habitat Management

There's a lot of activity happening on our trails currently. At the Henry Wetland Restoration Site, a six-foot tall observation platform has been installed, allowing visitors an elevated view of the 80-acre property on Woodland Drive and Goodwin Road. At the former Kaas property, located on the south side of the railroad tracks from the main Woodland Dunes preserve, a new trail is being planned. The new boardwalk on Willow Trail has been completed, and along the Ice Age Trail and Trillium Trail, a boardwalk restoration project is in a planning phase and grants are currently being requested.

The new "Henry" observation platform, weighing nearly 1000 pounds, is welded of structural steel with no bolts. Former welder Steve Olson donated the materials and his time to build the tower. Terry York, Seiler Bros. Construction, and Paul Herrmann also donated their time and talents to make this public viewing tower a reality. Currently there is a temporary mowed trail on the Henry Wetland Restoration site, starting at the gravel parking lot and heading straight west. There are plans in place to create a more permanent mowed trail loop meandering throughout the site.

We have also been working with Stantec Consulting Inc, through a grant from Sustain Our Great Lakes, to restore the wetland habitat at the south end of our preserve. This location will also have a trail in the near future, which will be open to the public. We are excited to be adding two new trails and increasing the miles of trails in our preserve.

Woodland Dunes staff, interns, volunteers and volunteers from Dominion Energy constructed a new boardwalk on Willow Trail. This boardwalk covers 616 feet of Willow Trail and Goldenrod Loop, (in the wettest areas). Many visitors have already told us how much they enjoy the new boardwalk.

We are now planning to widen a 100' long bridge /boardwalk along the Ice Age Trail/Trillium Trail. This project will include adding hand railings to make it safer for visitors using the trail. It will also allow staff to use an ATV and trailer to haul out materials and trees for our habitat restoration projects.
